# Cal Poly students most proficient in CSU in math, English

The CSU announced the results of its annual proficiency report on first-year students' readiness for college. Cal Poly students rank at the top of the list for proficiency in both mathematics and English and hold the highest mean entering grade point average in the CSU system: 3.74. Some 95 percent of first-year Cal Poly students were proficient in mathematics and 91 percent were proficient in English.
