Poly Escapes Hosts Wilderness Certification, Re-Certification Courses

The Wilderness Medicine Institute of NOLS and ASI Poly Escapes are sponsoring a two-day course covering a wide range of wilderness medicine topics for people who travel outdoors. Application Deadline for Cal State CDIP Program is Feb. 15

Through the Chancellor's Doctoral Incentive Program (CDIP), the California State University (CSU) provides student loans (up to \$10,000 per year for a total of \$30,000) to a limited number of individuals pursuing doctoral degrees at accredited universities throughout the U.S. The program aims to increase the number of promising doctoral students interested in applying and competing for future CSU instructional faculty positions. After participants earn their doctoral degrees, are hired for a qualifying instructional position in the CSU and meet the CDIP program requirements, 20 percent of the loan will be forgiven for each year of full-time postdoctoral teaching employment in the CSU.

Part-time teaching in the CSU may also be considered for partial loan forgiveness if the participant teaches at least half-time and has successfully completed the doctorate degree.
