Modern History Professor to Discuss ‘Human Rights, Citizenship and Women Refugees’ Nov. 7

“Human Rights, Citizenship and Women Refugees” is the subject of the talk featuring Dr. Silvia Salvatici, Susan Currier visiting professor, at 6 p.m. Monday, Nov. 7 in Chumash Auditorium, Right Wing. Salvatici is a professor of Modern History at the University of Teramo, Italy. She has written extensively and taught a variety of courses on gender and social upheaval in Europe, from World War II through the Balkan Wars of the 1990s. Her talk will focus on whether men and women refugees enjoy equal access to international protection; and what the intersection is between the gendered construction of citizenship and the gender ratio of forced migration. She will draw on literature about women and human rights and argue that gender offers a privileged view into the larger question of humanitarian interventions. 

'Managing' Racial Diversity to be Explored in Nov. 3 Talk

Sam Sommers, associate professor of psychology at Tufts University, will discuss the practical, ethical and legal aspects of racial

diversity in a free public talk Thursday, Nov. 3. Sommers will present "Examining Racial Diversity: How Situations and Strategic Concerns Shape Intergroup Interactions" from 11 a.m. to noon in Fischer Science Hall, Room 328. Sommers will make the case for the importance of studying diversity empirically. He will explore such topics as how a group's racial diversity affects its actual performance; the circumstances under which interracial interactions tend to go well versus not so well; and how accurate intuition is when navigating diverse settings.
