Cal Poly Architecture Dean to Return to Teaching


R. Thomas Jones, dean of Cal Poly's College of Architecture and Environmental Design, will step down as dean and return to the Architecture Department to teach and to expand the college's Learn by Doing programs.

Jones, who has led the college since 2003, will remain dean until a successor is named – a task expected to be completed by mid-summer 2012. The 65-year-old said he has been eager to return to teaching but waited until the university could complete its recent search for a new provost, who oversees the college deans.

"My tenure as dean has been incredibly fulfilling and satisfying, but now it's time for a new person with a fresh perspective to guide the college to an even higher level," Jones said. "I have enjoyed working closely with our talented faculty to create unique learning opportunities for our students.

"I'm grateful to our faculty for their efforts through these tough financial challenges to enhance the college's excellent reputation while attracting interest from students throughout the world."

President Armstrong Announces Administrative Reassignments

President Jeffrey D. Armstrong has announced that David Conn, currently the university's associate vice president for Inclusive Excellence and director of Ombuds Services, will become associate vice president for Institutional Review effective Jan. 1. He will work with his colleagues from across the university on completing the WASC reaccreditation process, for which he has provided oversight as the Academic Liaison Officer since its inception in 2007. Conn will also analyze the campus administrative policies and conduct an overdue review and update of the campuswide structure of committees to better align with our strategic imperatives and serve our campus' current and future needs. In Winter 2013, Conn plans to return to teaching as a faculty member in the City and Regional

Planning Department in the College of Architecture and Environmental Design.

Meanwhile, Armstrong has asked Martha Cody, director of Employment Equity, to add to her duties by also serving as special adviser to the president for diversity. Her duties will be expanded to focus on campus climate issues and tracking and measuring the effectiveness of diversity and Inclusive Excellence initiatives that are developed and implemented throughout the university. She will continue to serve on the Inclusiveness Excellence Council, and her office will coordinate the Inclusive Excellence Council meetings and agendas.

Under this reorganization, Patricia Ponce will become the student ombuds, and the Office of Student Ombuds Services will report to the Office of the President.
