Daniel Galvan is Cal Poly's Student Employee of the Year

Daniel Galvan, a senior majoring in Sociology and minoring in Spanish, was recently selected as Cal Poly's 2011-12 Outstanding Student Employee of the Year. Galvan, originally from Riverside, Calif., was unanimously selected from 36 student nominees. He was the year's most highly recommended candidate, and those who recommended him for the award said he is a well-respected leader who inspires those around him and provides outstanding services to his department. Galvan's nomination also won recognition in the regional and state competitions sponsored by the Western Association of Student Employment Administrators (WASEA). This is the second consecutive year Cal Poly's outstanding student employee also won both state and regional awards. Galvan and Cal Poly's other 35 outstanding student employee nominees were recognized at a reception April 12 (during National Student Employment Week) at the Albert B. Smith Alumni and



Conference Center on campus. During the reception, Galvan was congratulated by Cal Poly President Jeffrey D. Armstrong and by Jackie Biron, a representative from WASEA. He received a framed certificate of appreciation and a plaque from WASEA recognizing him as the 2011-12 Northern California Student Employee of the Year and WASEA's regional 2011-12 Student Employee of the Year.

CMS/PeopleSoft HCM Outage Set for May 17-23

Beginning at 5 p.m. Thursday, May 17, PeopleSoft HCM (Student & HR Administration) will undergo a major systems upgrade. This will affect various campus administrative services such as Employee and Student Self Service, Enrollment Registration, Admissions, Degree Progress Reports, Financial Aid, Student Finance, Student Payroll System, Human Resources, and Temporary Faculty Processing. During the upgrade, the PeopleSoft HCM system will be unavailable. It is expected to be back up no later than 8 a.m. Wednesday, May 23. The upgrade is required to maintain vendor support of applications and improve reliability of the system. During this outage, the Common Financials System (CFS) will remain available. PolyData (Data Warehouse) will remain available throughout the outage with PeopleSoft HCM data as of 7 p.m. May 16. Professor Emeritus Art Chapman died April 9. He taught at Cal Poly for 37 years in the College of Architecture and Environmental Design's Department of Architecture. Chapman taught introductory and advanced classes in computer-aided design, building science and design studio, and he played a pivotal faculty role in the architecture graduate program. He received his undergraduate degrees in Architecture and Mathematics from Cal Poly in 1970 and earned his master's degree in Computer Science from Penn State in 1972. After graduate school, he worked for architectural firms in New York and Los Angeles before his return to San Luis Obispo to begin his teaching career at Cal Poly. Cal Poly Team Places Second in Regional Human Resource Games



A team of three Cal Poly undergraduates took second place at the recent Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) Pac West Regional Case Competition at Pepperdine University in Malibu. Better known as the "HR Games," the competition tasks students with presenting their analysis and action plans for a company experiencing a downsizing and presenting those ideas to a panel of senior-level human resource executives. Cal Poly's team was comprised of Orfalea College of Business seniors Michael Grimaud and Nicole Shane and Graphic Communication senior Veronica Kopp. Grimaud and Shane are officers in the university's Human Resource Management Association (HRMA), a student organization that encourages participation in the annual HR Games. Shane also served as team captain. Students receive some financial assistance from Cal Poly's Instructionally Related Activities

program. Grimaud is from Moorpark, Kopp is from San Ramon and Shane is from Irvine. Ten teams from across the Pacific West region competed in the 2012 tournament. Cal Poly and the University of Nevada, Reno ultimately competed head-to-head in the finals. In addition to a plaque, the Cal Poly trio received \$2,000 to help them achieve their educational goals.

ASI Rec Sports to Offer Youth Swim Lessons

ASI Recreational Sports will offer summer youth swim and water polo lessons at the Recreation Center. Swim lessons consist of two-week sessions with nine 40-minute

Free Baroque Performance Set for May 3

The Cal Poly Music Department will host a free Baroque oboe performance by Laura Osbaldeston at 11 a.m. Thursday, May 3, in Room 218 of the Davidson Music Center on campus. Osbaldeston will be joined by soprano Mary Rawliffe-Fairbanks, cellist Jeanne Shumway and harpsichordist Paul Woodring. The program will begin with the J.S. Bach aria "Gerechter Gott, ach, rechnest du" from Cantata No. 89, for soprano, obbligato oboe and continuo; followed by Antonio Vivaldi's Sonata for oboe and basso continuo in G minor, RV 28; and G.F. Handel's aria "Meine Seele hört im Sehen," hymn for soprano and continuo, HWV 207. Osbaldeston was born in San Luis Obispo and grew up in South Africa where she attended the National Highschool for the Arts, majoring in oboe and piano performance. She later studied at the California Institute of the Arts under Alan Vogel, oboe, and Patricia Mabee, harpsichord. Osbaldeston went on to study Baroque oboe at the Amsterdam Conservatory of Music with Alfredo Bernardini, followed by a master's degree at the Schola Cantorum Basiliensis in Basel, Switzerland. She currently resides in Alsace at the border to Basel, Switzerland, where she teaches piano lessons and works as a freelance oboist. If time allows, Osbaldeston will talk about her studies and professional life in Europe and the pursuit of authentic performance practice. 
