Bob Field is a Research Scholar in Residence, where he has been supervising student projects as an adjunct physics professor for eight years. He developed and taught a course on solar and global evolution and studies the structure and evolution of the sun and the earth. He was an aerospace, laser-systems scientist for 20 years, before his retirement.

NEW ELECTRONIC THESIS SUBMISSION PROCESS UNVEILED

The Office of Research and Graduate Programs, in conjunction with the Robert E. Kennedy Library, announces the implementation of electronic thesis and project report submission, beginning Nov. 1. This marks a shift away from the previous paper-based submission process and is expected to increase the availability and visibility of original scholarship by graduate students.

The new system allows a graduate student to upload his or her committee-approved thesis or project report into the DigitalCommons@CalPoly, where it is automatically reformatted into Adobe PDF and sent directly to the Graduate Programs Office. There, the document is reviewed for compliance with graduate program policy and format. Using an administrative tool, the thesis reviewer can accept the document or request formatting revisions. The author is automatically notified by email of the actions taken.

Once the document is accepted, it - along with supporting data - is made available to anyone with internet access and the digital item is expedited for bibliographic access in the library's online catalog. The new system is expected to substantially improve the current paper-based submission process. The back-end technology to support the new process was developed by The Berkeley Electronic Press (www.bepress.com).

Beginning Nov. 1, graduate students submitting Master's theses or project reports will be required to submit the electronic version of their final approved document to the DigitalCommons@CalPoly. Students will still have the option of having their paper copies bound through a third-party vendor, such as HF Group's online Thesis On Demand binding service (<http://www.thesisondemand.com>). SOILS SCIENCE PRESENTATION WINS FIRST PLACE AT HOUSTON MEETING

Soil science student Ian Leslie won first place this month for oral presentation of a paper he wrote with two professors and a technician. Leslie presented his paper at the Oct. 5-9 joint meeting of the American Society of Agronomy, Crop Science Society of America, and Soil Science Society of America International in Houston, Texas. Leslie's research, conducted with several other students in a soil and water chemistry course in spring 2008, looked at concentrations of nickel and chromium in the soil and vines at Cal Poly's vineyard.

The research found the levels of both heavy metals in the vineyard soil were well below U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's maximum contamination levels and posed no

risk to vine growth or quality. His paper was co-authored by Chip Appel, a soil science professor who taught the course; Keith Patterson, a viticulture professor; and Craig Stubler, an earth and soil sciences technician. It was the second straight year a student from the course won the competition. David Guereña took first place in November 2007.
