S.P.A.R.E. is a non-profit

Trans-Species Unlimited is a non-profit animal rights organization founded by Dr. George P. Cave in 1981. It is composed of individuals who are determined to put an end to the exploitation, abuse, and slaughter of non-human animals. We believe that the infliction of unnecessary suffering or death on sentient creatures is morally wrong and that they have a moral right to exemption from such treatment. We reject as speciesist sentimentality and human self-interest as the ideological foundation of animal rights, and deny that there is any fundamental conflict between legitimate human and non-human animal interests. We

subscribe to and support the principles set forth in the Universal Declaration of the Rights of Animals, as drawn up by the International League for Animal Rights. As an organization, we focus our attention on local issues, but also actively participate in the animal rights movement on a national and international scale. Our specific aims are: 1) to develop a comprehensive educational program on animal abuse, including the publication of a quarterly newsletter, 2) to attempt to expose to the public, through research and investigation, specific cases of animal abuse, and to redress these abuses through persuasive and legal means, 3) to engage, when necessary, in direct, militant, but non-violent action in opposition to the abuse of animals, 4) to promote a meaningful philosophical and moral dialogue in the intellectual community on the issue of animal rights, 5) to foster cooperation and exchange of information within the animal rights movement and 6) to promote awareness of the fundamental ideological rapport among contemporary liberation movements.
