Create Goodwill in Town

Glenn Arthur, president of the Mustang Masquers, said:

"The Poly Follies will undoubtedly do a lot to create good feeling between the townspeople of San Luis Obispo and the student body of California State Polytechnic.

"The production, under the direction of Bill Himmelman and sponsored by the Mustang Masquers will help to bring much publicity to this college. The Poly Follies will be a musical comedy review in which both music department and dramatics students of the school will take part. One of the highlights of the show will be an all-men's chorus."

Series of Skits, Specialty Acts

The men's chorus, Arthur explained, will be patterned after the dancing group of men students at Harvard university who each year present a musical revue. In addition to the dancers in the Poly show, there will be a series of comedy skits, jokes, and specialty acts that probably will include such performances as Bill Stephenson twirling the rope and musical soloists.

Efforts will be made to obtain use of the Elmo theater downtown to give the show on two successive evenings. Admission charge will be made, with a part of the proceeds tentatively scheduled to be used for a fund to purchase new uniforms for the Poly band.

The review is being coached by Paul H. Gifford, dramatics coach, and is planned as an annual event entirely produced and presented by students.

Revisions Made In Constitution By Committee

Meeting this week to add final revisions to the present student body constitution, the constitution committee added the following clauses to that document:

Article IV, section 10, replacement of officers.

1. Should any vacancy occur on the Poly Royal executive committee, the division or department making the original appointment shall fill the vacancy.

2. Should the vacancy be that of an officer of the committee, the position is to be filled by an election within the executive committee.

Change in Treasurer's Duties

Section 7, part I, student body finances.

1. That accounting officials have full control of the finances of student body and that student treasurer be given new duties. Also that the salary paid the treasurer be eliminated.

Poly Royal assistant superintendent.

1. That the office of Poly Royal assistant superintendent shall be created. This office is to be filled by appointment of the Poly Royal general superintendent from the opposite division. The assistant superintendent shall have charge of his division during Poly Royal.

Rally Group To Supervise Brawl

Rally committee chairman.

1. That the rally committee shall select its own chairman and officers and that they will have complete charge of the freshman-sophomore brawl. That the chairman of the rally committee be that committee's representative to the SAC. The yell leader shall be an ex-officio member of the rally committee.

These revisions will be put to a vote at the next student body assembly on Friday morning, Jan. 10.

740 Students Enroll As Poly Commences 1940 Winter Quarter

An increase of 15 per cent in enrollment at California State Polytechnic during the past year was shown this week when a total of 740 students registered at the San Luis Obispo and San Dimas units of the school.

Vernon Meacham, head of the horticulture branch in Los Angeles county, reported that 122 students, an unexpectedly large increase in the enrollment, had registered by the first of this week. Last fall's enrollment there was 103, and approximately the same number had been expected for the winter quarter.

Rains Slow Registration

The total registration at the San Luis Obispo unit totaled 618, compared to 574 for the fall quarter and 549 for the winter quarter of 1939. Included in the enrollment are 40 new students, including degree transfer men.

Heavy rains during registration week slowed down the enrollment process, administration officials said, but classes now are in full swing.

The officials attribute the large increase in the student body to the special courses offered and the job placement service to graduates.

Dormitories Reported Full

Both cottage units and dormitories were reported full this week, and a large group of students were seeking lodging in town residences.

Jack Tobias of Ventura, state alumni president, will come to San Luis Obispo from Ventura to make the Fresno trip with the Poly group.

One of the principal items of business to be discussed at the committee meetings is the state FFA convention on the Cal Poly campus on May 2, 3, and 4. The convention will bring more than 800 boys to the campus.

Poly Dairy Department Will Tabulate Results In Butterfat Contest

California Polytechnic's dairy department will tabulate records in a statewide dairy herd butterfat contest for Future Farmers of America, it was announced in the January issue of the California Future Farmer, FFA magazine published at Cal Poly.

The contest started this month at the request of the dairy enterprise improvement committee of the California Agricultural Teachers' association, headed by L. M. Clausen, director of agriculture at Turlock high school.

Purpose of the contest is the stimulation of greater interest in good cattle, encouragement of keeping butterfat records, and recognition of boys who are doing a good job of commercial dairying.

The Poly dairy department, in charge of George M. Drumm, will tabulate the results each month and submit to the magazine a list of the high ranking projects.

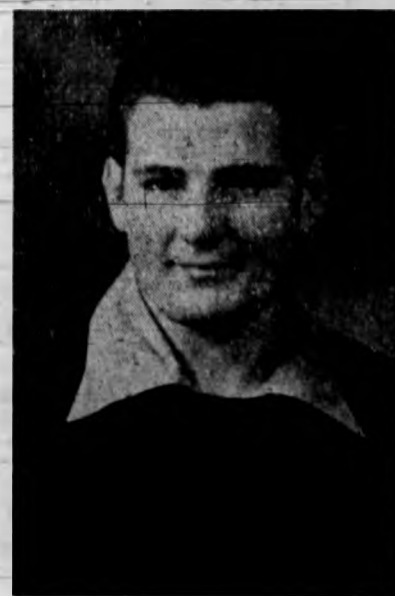

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Treasurer of Honduras Visits Son at Cal. Poly; Praises American Unity

Agreements reached at the recent Panama conference have strengthened the unity between the United States and other republics of the western hemisphere, is the belief of Esteban Diaz, treasurer general of the Republic of Honduras, who visited the California Polytechnic campus last week.

Accompanied by Mrs. Diaz and Emory Barga, consul for Honduras in Los Angeles, Diaz came to San Luis Obispo to see his son, Roberto, who is an aeronautics student at Cal Poly.

"Close unity and friendship always has existed between my country and the United States," Diaz said, "and now this bond has been strengthened by the events abroad. I believe our relations with the United States and the other pan-American nations are improving greatly."

Escorted on Tour of Campus

Barga acted as interpreter in an interview that took place after Mr. and Mrs. Diaz had met Julian A. McPhee, Cal Poly president, and had been escorted on a tour of the campus by C. E. Knott, dean of industrial education, and Paul H. Gifford.

Diaz expressed warm approval of President Roosevelt's good neighbor policy as applied to nations of South and Central America. He said that the government of Honduras had joined with the United States and 20 other pan-American countries to protest against violation of the neutrality of the western hemisphere by the naval battle off the coast of Uruguay. He declined further comment on the protest, pointing out that it had been made since he left for a visit to the United States and that he was not familiar with the details.

Son to Return Home and Work

His son will return to Honduras after completing the Poly aeronautics course and engage in aviation work there.

"Aviation has been developed in Honduras to a greater extent than in any other Central American republic," Diaz explained. "The mountainous nature of my country makes it necessary to use the airplane for transportation purposes."

Diaz and Mrs. Diaz came to the United States for a vacation and to visit Roberto and his brother and sister who are being educated in Los Angeles. They spent the holidays together. They flew to the United States by Pan-American Airways and drove to San Luis Obispo from Los Angeles.

Admires California Scenery

Diaz expressed admiration of the scenery and climate of southern California.

"It is the garden spot of the United States," he commented. "I have made many trips to the United States, and each time I return home with a greater appreciation of your country."

Poly Renowned in Honduras

Progress of his son in the aeronautics course received the approval of the treasurer general.

He said that he and Mrs. Diaz had decided to send Roberto to California Poly after careful consideration of the aeronautics course offered, the instructors, and equipment. The school, he added, has gained a good reputation among the workers of the official Honduras department of aviation.

On Monday, Jan. 22, the Varsity quartet and the Four Colonels under the supervision of Harold Davidson will present a 15-minute radio program of vocal and instrumental music over KVEC at 9:30 p. m.

The Boots and Spurs club, which puts on the rodeo and livestock show consisting of beef, swine, and sheep at the annual Poly Royal, is beginning preparations for its part in the event and for the Marketing day at South San Francisco.

In swine competition at the Poly Royal there will be classes in fitting and showmanship of state-owned sows and gilts. There will also be classes for project-owned fat barrows. These barrows will be shown in marage classes according to breeds.

Meat animals instructors believe that all these classes will mean keen competition among the students of the department for the honors that are to be gained.

In sheep competition there will be classes of Hampshire and Southdown rams and ewes. These will be shown according to fitting, blocking, and showmanship. There also may be classes for ewe and ram lambs of the two breeds.

Market Day Precedes Royal

The reason for the lack of fat livestock is the fact that the South San Francisco Future Farmer Marketing day will be held before the Poly Royal.

At this Marketing day the California Poly men will participate. They are feeding out 10 fat cattle, 30 or 40 lambs, and 75 or 80 fat hogs. The plan of the Marketing day is to have the livestock graded and sold through the regular marketing channels.

There will be educational programs showing values of different market classes. Also on exhibit will be carcases of different grades on schedule.

Faculty Organization Endorses Recreational Program for San Luis

Endorsement of the proposed recreational program outlined for San Luis Obispo by the recreation committee of the coordinating council of local citizens was voted at the meeting of the California Polytechnic Faculty club Tuesday.

Members unanimously approved a resolution presented by Carl G. Beck, a member of the coordinating council. Recommendations made by the recreation committee include suggestions for parks and playgrounds in San Luis Obispo and for appointment of a full-time recreational director.

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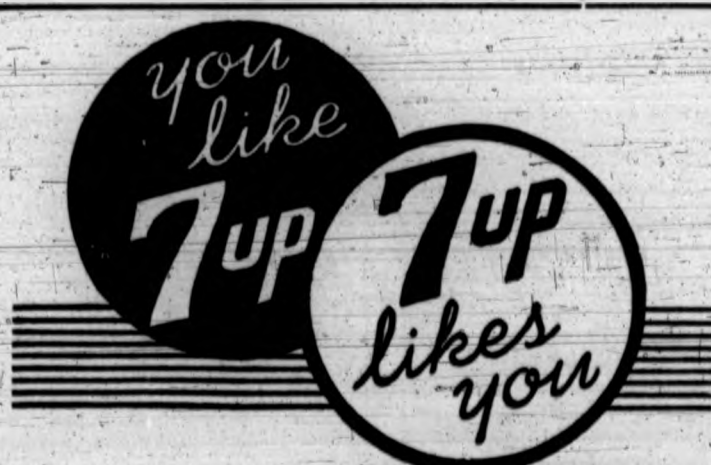
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Clowns' Antics Entertain Crowd Wednesday Eve

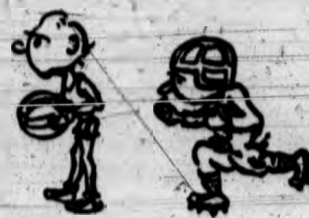
