Cal Poly Scholar Awards are granted to outstanding first-time freshmen, selected from among National Merit Scholars like Scott Dirkse.


Exceptional students like these stimulate their classmates to more creative achievement, assist faculty on research projects, lead in academic competitions, tutor fellow students, and volunteer in community programs.

To maximize the value of each sponsorship gift, the university and the Cal Poly Foundation have established a matching-fund program.

Each Cal Poly Scholar receives an undergraduate scholarship, renewable for up to four years of continuous enrollment (and five years for five-year programs). The annual cost to support one Cal Poly Scholar is \$8,000.

Time-limited naming opportunities are available for commitments of \$32,000. Permanent naming opportunities will be established for an endowment fund of \$200,000, which will provide perpetual support for a scholarship in a designated college.
