### Navy Wildcat Purchased for Instruction

It's a FR-1... Ah, your pater's goatee; it's a P-6 7-8... you're both loony as frosh; it's a FM-2 That is an example of the remarks heard recently when a FM-2 navy fighter, purchased by the school for instructional purposes, landed on the nearby airstrip.

This plane, commonly known as the "Wildcat" is practically new, having only 80 hours flying time. It was purchased from the Navy and was flown here by a Navy pilot from the Naval Air Station at Tillamook, Oregon. To be used for instructional purposes, the plane was purchased for one hundred dollars which is less than the cost of having it delivered. Normally, the cost of a completely equipped FM-2 would be 40 to 50 thousand dollars, which shows where your income tax returns are going.

Don't start forming a line to go up in the plane, however. The terms on which it was purchased state that the plane cannot be flown; it's strictly terrestrial from now on.

As for the school airstrip, the latest news from M. C. Martinsen, head of the Aero department, is that it is still in the process of construction. It is hoped that the strip will be completed before Poly Royal so that planes can be brought in for the Aero displays, and also, so that any out-of-towners can drop in by plane for the big occasion.

The team is now preparing for their double header for this weekend against the strong San Diego club Friday, and against the Fresno State Bulldogs, Saturday in Fresno.

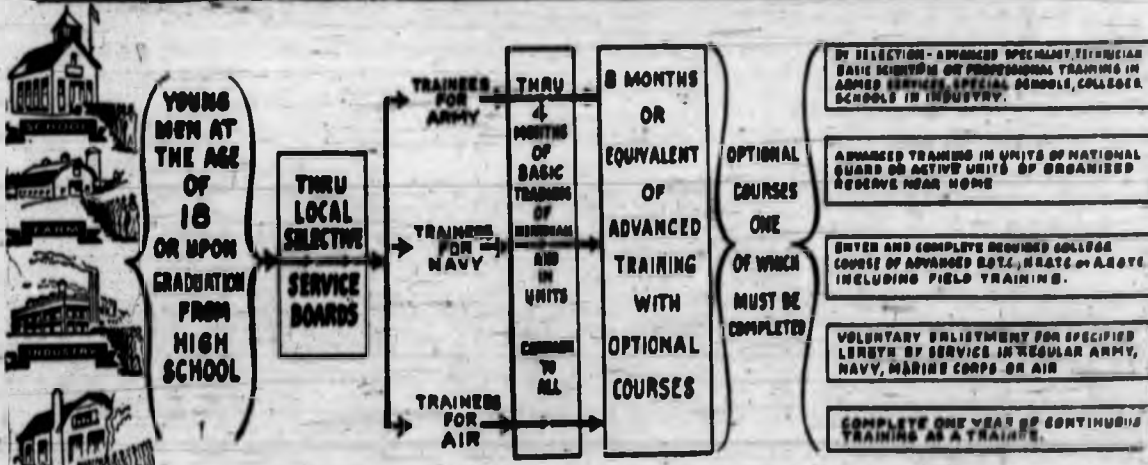

### THE AMERICAN LEGION PLAN OF UNIVERSAL TRAINING

UNDER THE ADMINISTRATION OF A CIVIL AUTHORITY CREATED BY CONGRESS



The above is a chart of the American Legion plan of universal training for national security which is being offered as an amendment to the Gurney-May bill now pending in Congress. In this carefully prepared program the American Legion believes it has met the objections of the clergy, educators and parents to other plans.

Under this plan the young man, upon reaching the age of 18 or upon graduating from high school, whichever is later, would take a four months' basic military training course which could be given during the summer months. Thereafter he would have five options for completing his advanced training. He would thus be able to select the course that would not interfere with his schooling or business plans. The American Legion believes this is the best plan of military training yet advanced for both the nation and its young men.

## "How I Create"

In an article of How Authors Create, in which the writing methods of various masters of English prose like Conrad, Shaw and Barrie are explained (with photographs of them in knickerbockers plaguing dogs and pushing against sundials), I discover that I have been doing the whole thing wrong all these years.

When I am writing a novel I must actually live the lives of my characters. If, for instance, my hero is a gambler on the French Riviera, I make myself pack up and go to Cannes or Nice, will-nilly, and there throw myself into the gay life of the gambling set until I really feel that I AM Paul De Lacroix or Ed Whelan, or whatever my hero's name is. Of course, this runs into money, and I am quite likely to have to change my ideas about my hero entirely and make him a bum on a tramp steamer working his way back to America, or a young college boy out of funds who lives by his wits until his friends at home send him a hundred and ten dollars.

I find that, while working, a pipe is a great source of inspiration. A pipe can be placed diagonally across the keys of a typewriter so that they will not function, or it can be made to give out such a cloud of smoke, that I cannot see the paper. Then, there is the process of lighting it. I can make lighting a pipe a ritual which has not been equalled for elaborateness since the five-day festival to the God of the Harvest. (See my book on Rituals: the Man.)

In the first place, owing to twenty-six years of constant smoking without once calling in a plumber, the space left for tobacco in the bowl of my pipe is now the size of a medium body-pore. Once the match has been applied to the tobacco therein, the smoke is over. This necessitates refilling, relighting and re-knocking. The knocking out of a pipe can be made almost as important as the smoking of it, especially if there are nervous people in the room. A good, smart knock of a pipe against a tin wastebasket and you will have a neurasthenic out of his chair and into the window sash in no time.

And so you see now how we creative artists work. It really isn't like any other kind of work, for it must come from a great emotional upheaval in the soul of the writer himself: and if that emotional upheaval is not present, it must come from the works of any other writers which happen to be handy and easily imitated.

### Vet Insurance Policies May Be Reinstated

National Service Life Insurance policies that have lapsed may be reinstated without physical examination if the veterans will submit a signed statement that he is in as good health as he was at the time the policy lapsed. General Omar N. Bradley, administrator of Veterans Affairs, announced.

This liberalization of reinstatement privileges will remain in effect until January 1, 1947, and will also apply to any NSLI policies that lapse between now and then.

The liberalization, of course, does not affect the requirement regarding payment of premiums. In the case of NSLI, which has not been converted to a permanent form, only two monthly premiums must accompany the application for reinstatement. In the case of NSLI which has been converted, payments which have been missed must be repaid with interest.

Veterans who are totally disabled for a period of at least six consecutive months may apply to VA for a waiver of premiums on their NSLI. Before the waiver is granted, however, the veteran must continue premium payments.
