### Society of Women Engineers honors Peter Y. Lee

The Society of Women Engineers has recognized College of Engineering Dean Peter Y. Lee as this year's recipient of the Rodney D. Chipp Memorial Award for "exemplary leadership and sustained commitment to the recruitment, retention and advancement of women engineering students and faculty." Lee has served as dean since 1987, and in that time has significantly advanced women in engineering. During his tenure, the number of female tenure-track engineering faculty increased from one to 18; the number of women engineering students enrolled increased by 35 percent; and graduate students grew by 87 percent. Lee helped found Cal Poly's Women's Engineering program in 1998.
