Big Summer PE Seminar To Cover Athletic Scene

Responding to demand from over 800 PE instructors and health and recreation directors from the valley and coastal areas of California, Cal Poly will be host to the fifth annual workshop for men and the third for women during the summer months. Scheduled for July 27-Aug 8 is the

women's physical education workshop in which 15 types of instruction are offered. Besides popular games such as tennis, softball, swimming and basketball, there will be instruction in tumbling, archery, golf and badminton.

The "Problems in Physical Education" class, an outstanding feature of the past two years, will be under the leadership of Doctors Allene Lockhart and Eleanor Metheny. Both are from USC.

Body mechanics, and this has nothing to do with the little red convertible, will be analyzed by Dr. Valerie Hunt of UCLA. Instruction in rainy-day games will be taught by Miss Irene Harris of Stockton college, and just to make sure the girls put their best foot forward, a class in folk dancing will be given.

Football Gets Coverage

Highlighting the two-week workshop for men Aug. 10-22 will be a football symposium which will embrace all levels from high school to the professional field.

Milt Axt, coach of football at Polytechnic high school in San Francisco, will represent the secondary school; Robert Blackman, Pasadena city college, who coached his team to national jaycee winner last year, will be on the panel for the junior colleges; Robert Bronsan, head football coach at San Jose state will bring many of his techniques to the discussion; and Dudley DeGroot, University of New Mexico head football coach, will add the benefits of his extensive experience as college and professional coach to the series.

Basketball classes offered enrollment will be under the direction of John Wooden and Chuck Taylor. Wooden, UCLA, is doing a "command performance" because of his highly successful discussions last year. Taylor, of the Converse Rubber company, will conduct his well known program.

Also on the program is Payton Jordan, Occidental track coach; members of the Pittsburgh Pirates baseball organization; Roger Plasted and Dave Beaver, swimming; Don Gill and Ronald Logan, athletic training and conditioning; and Ira Walsh, public relations.

Rules To Be Aired

Norman Duncan, chairman of instruction, Southern California Football Officials association, will discuss high school rules while Vic

Schmidt, Pacific Coast conference, and Frank McCormick will discuss officiating.

Poly's Gene Smith will be in charge of tennis and George Lake and Al Lape will handle the golf instruction.

An enviable feature of having the workshop at Poly is the quick access to all facilities—eating, sleeping, training and recreational. Housing on the campus is available to participants with families as well as those without.

The over-all program is sponsored by the California Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

In charge of arrangements for the college are Dr. Hubert Semans and Bob Mott.

Dr. Robert Munger To Address Grads

Dr. Robert Munger, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Berkeley, will be guest speaker at Cal Poly's baccalaureate services, to be held June 13, (Friday) at 3 p.m. in the Veterans Memorial auditorium.

Doctor Munger, a graduate of the University of California and Princeton theological seminary, is popular with young people and is much in demand as a conference speaker.

His speaking engagements have been on numerous campuses, including Columbia university, University of Washington, and University of British Columbia. A noted radio speaker, he has also written several magazine articles.

With the end of Poly's school year near at hand the Mustang Booster club is rallying itself for a bigger and better year than the 1951-52 period. Boosters have been rounding up members for some three weeks now, with an apparent degree of success.

Glynn Wyatt, Booster president, reports that the membership drive for the coming year is well ahead of the most successful of all drives, conducted last year. Glynn was one of the men responsible for the new system of conducting the drive which was tried for the first time this year. A Thank You Note

It would be asinine to do nothing but complain about the setup with-

No Help

As I see it the real fly in the ointment is in the editorial end. The editors simply don't get enough help. What is needed is a 40-man staff. Anything less than this would mean those long Tuesday and Wednesday nights doing nothing but processing copy.

Of this 40-man crew five would be editors and the rest would serve in other capacities. Six of the remaining 35 should be re-write men who can be here on Monday and Tuesday evenings. Four reporters should be in training for future editorships; three more should be working in the advertising division. The remainder should have regular beat assignments.

Every reporter, before working for the paper, should be thoroughly grounded in the mysteries of spelling and punctuation. Most reporters feel that consulting the dictionary is a sign of weakness. Learning to type wouldn't hurt matters, either.

Club Meetings

There should be a meeting of all club reporters with the editor at the beginning of the Fall quarter. This would give club reporters a chance to learn El Mustang's style as well as the essential elements of a club news story.

Lastly, El Mustang needs a couple of photographers. Those who now help us are connected with the News bureau, not El Mustang. This means that we have to make arrangements far in advance.

Not only is there a supply of rugged leather slingers due to return, but the tentative slate appears to be the best in Mustang fistic history. One sad note to an otherwise bright campaign is that Paul Flachbeck will be among the missing.

Coaches Will Rely On Freshmen; Bravo Is Backbone

Spring sports at Cal Poly are over and it's time to start hunting for cow bells and rooters caps in preparation for one of the best Mustang grid seasons next fall. Each-year Coach Roy Hughes has been building for better seasons and 1952 is no different. This season with no spring practice, the "Silver Fox" is a little skeptical as far as material goes. Military service has taken its toll and the Poly coach feels he will again have to rely on freshmen.

Four Reliables

Four men from last year's club will feature the Mustang attack. They are Vic Bucala, who was named on all-conference squad and received honorable mention on the little All-coast eleven; guards Bob Boanich and Dick Mathias; fullback Marjion Anich.

Anich is expected to be switched from defense, where he was a standout last year, to offense in next year's play.

Bravo Back Again

The backfield quartet is expected to be built around Alex Bravo, sprinting 185-pounder. Bravo was named to the little all-coast second team last year and was picked as one of the best backs in the SCSA conference. He led the loop in rushing and scoring.

Hughes expects to greet 10 lettermen in September. Quarterback Bob Neal, along with the other signal caller, Ron Davey, will direct the Mustangs from the "T" formation.

Island Agriculture Booming, Says Millard McCollum

Commenting on the high level of research and fertilization carried on in the Hawaiian Islands, Millard M. McCollum, manager of the western states territory of the American Potash Institute, reports that agriculture is on a definite upswing in the islands.

McCollum addressed the Poly chapter of the Soil Conservation society of America with a discussion on Hawaiian agriculture and used color slides throughout his talk to illustrate cultural practices of growing sugar cane and pineapples in the islands.

During the meeting held last Friday night future plans of the group were also discussed. Plans for next year include distribution of "Down the River," a conservation pamphlet put out by the ACSA. Plans are underway for setting up a land judging contest for the FFA convention next spring and sending two representatives from the student chapter to the national convention of the ACSA next year.

Guests present were Richard Mohr from the soil conservation service at Santa Maria; Robert Carmen soil scientist at Santa Maria; Ray Cooper, soil scientist at Paso Robles and a former graduate of Poly in the class of 1951; and Forrest Fullmer, southern representative of the American Potash Institute.
