Firm donates \$500,000 for lab in new CM building

Simpson Strong-Tie, one of the largest suppliers of structural building connectors in the world, has donated \$500,000 to help fund a laboratory in the new building that will house the Construction Management Department.

The Simpson Strong-Tie Materials Demonstration Laboratory will be the largest element in the building's Center for Construction Excellence.

Students in several disciplines will be able to use the 5,000-square-foot lab to design, build and test a variety of structural components. The Materials Demonstration Lab will support activities of four adjoining labs in the center, where students will gain hands-on experience with fundamentals of construction management and with residential, commercial and heavy/civil construction.

The College of Architecture and Environmental Design is working to raise \$7.5 million in private gifts to help fund the new building. The college will receive \$17 million in state funds for the project. Groundbreaking is scheduled for 2005, with completion in the fall of 2007.

"The new demonstration laboratory is designed to provide an interactive learning environment for students that can simulate 'real-world' projects, from the construction of roads to structural seismic mitigation that will protect homes and buildings from the forces of nature, including earthquakes and high winds," said Construction Management Department Head Allan Hauck. □

EE student wins first in CSU research contest

A Cal Poly electrical engineering senior won first place in the undergraduate division of the engineering and computer science category of the CSU's recent 2004 Student Research Competition.

Sarah Ahrendes won for her paper "Design of High-Density, Light-Weight DC-DC Power Converter."

A computer science graduate student and an undergraduate physics student each won a second-place award in their respective categories. Ching Kang Cheng of Singapore won second in the graduate division of the engineering and computer science category for his research on "Ontology-Based Semantic Classification of Unstructured Documents." Physics senior Christopher France took second in the undergraduate division of the physical and mathematical sciences category for his paper "Theoretical Investigations of Polymer-Blend Solar Cells."

This year's competition took place at Cal State Northridge. Six Cal Poly students were among the 200-some competitors, also including biology senior Eugenia L. Hurlbut, business administration senior Robert Rendler and physical science senior Jeff Sevadjan. □
