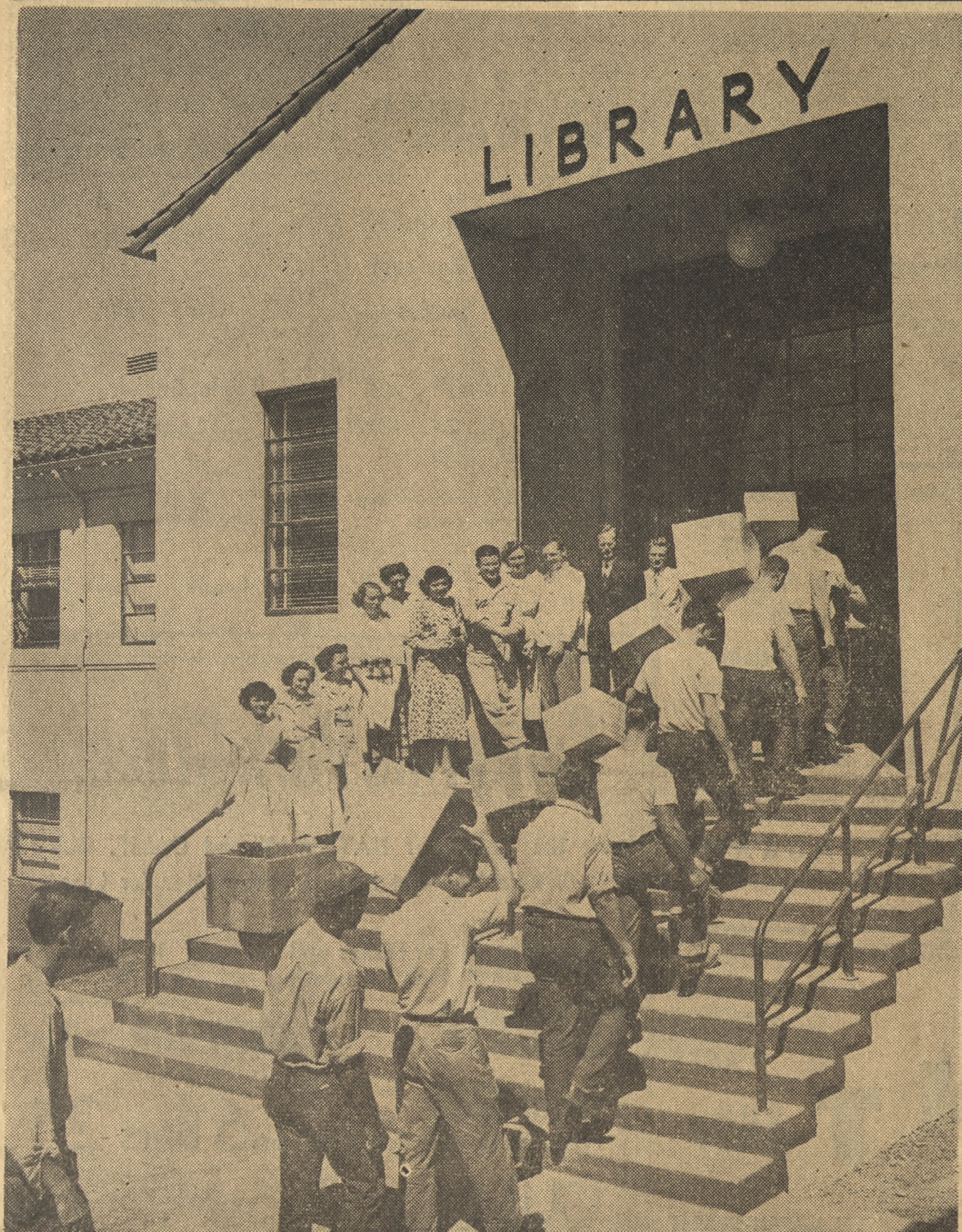

17,000 Volumes Ready As New Library Opens

The doors of the new library swung open Monday—after almost two years of patient waiting by the students. As the students and faculty members flooded into the foyer of the library, they were greeted by a librarian member in charge of information. On hand to aid in using the new library facilities were acting Head Librarian Frank Allen and a staff of 15 assistants.

Last week the library staff, with the help of a large crew of student workers, moved some 17,000 books and tons of bound and unbound periodicals into the new quarters. Spanish Architecture

The two-story concrete building is of Spanish-Moorish architecture. Directly in front of the building is a six-foot high adobe wall, which creates a large patio. It is planned that the ornamental horticulture department will landscape this area and that outdoor furniture of rustic redwood will be provided.

The two reading rooms on the main floor will seat approximately 500 persons. A card catalog is located near the main reading room.

Adjacent to the main reading room is a lounge complete with

fireplace surmounted by a large mirror. The lounge, in the near future, will be furnished with lounge-type chairs and sofas. The shelves will be stocked with books planned to promote recreational reading.

To the left of the foyer is located the periodical and reserve book room. Current issues of more than 500 different magazines, as well as bound copies, are available.

Along the south side of the foyer and main hallway are the offices of librarian, assistant librarian, cataloging and processing offices. Seminar and conference rooms, as well as public rest rooms, are on this floor.

McPhee Cites School Progress At Assembly

"Your conduct is part of the public relations of the school," declared President Julian A. McPhee in a welcoming address Wednesday before the largest student body ever assembled at Cal Poly.

McPhee gave a brief resume of the school's history from its beginning as a small trade school to its present status as a fully accredited four-year college. He also reported that Cal Poly is formulating plans to grant master degrees next year.

That all persons connected with the institution should work for the common objectives of making Cal Poly the best school of its kind in the United States, and promote its ideals of training men in the practical aspect of agriculture, business and industry, was stressed by McPhee.

Other speakers on the program were Bob Bowman, ASB president, who introduced President McPhee, George Streathorn, Pat Morrison and Art Gandy.

Latin Neighbors Will Try Favored Mustang Eleven

Cal Poly opens its 1949 grid campaign tomorrow evening in Poly Stadium when it hosts the University of Mexico Pumas. The Mustangs should have little trouble winning their first game against our south-of-the-border neighbors judging by the Puma's defeat by San Jose State, 103-0.

Enrollment Mark Still Climbing

Cal Poly's record enrollment continued to soar to new heights today as the total neared the 3000 mark. C. Paul Winner, dean of admissions, stated today that the record-breaking enrollment now totals 2865, with more students expected to arrive during the next three weeks. The dean of admissions explained that his early prediction of an estimated enrollment of 2700 was shattered.

Winner said that 945 new students have enrolled and 1919 old students returned, with approximately 300 new students transferring from junior colleges and universities. A more accurate estimate of transfer and foreign students will be available when registration cards are turned in, Winner added.

The dean of admissions emphasized that this all-time high enrollment is exclusive of Cal Poly's San Dimas campus. Reports from that campus indicate an enrollment of 426, representing a slight increase over last year.

Songstresses Prep For Saturday Game

Tomorrow night's game with the Puma team will usher in a startling new feature of the Cal Poly cheering section, Bob Bowman, student body president, said today.

"Yes," Bowman explained, "we are going to have girl song leaders to pep up the rooters. The girls are going to appear before the audience for one night only; then we'll hold an election to see if the students want the song leaders to continue their work for the season."

The girls, four in number, are student wives. They have been practicing song routines for the past week; they are Meridith Smith, Maggie Calhoun, Val Munger and Helen Chase.

The contest will give Coach Pavelko a chance to look at all hands without fear of losing the game. With the season just beginning, none of the starting men are sure of their respective positions. This is also supported by the fact that Pavelko has more material to work with, and thus there will be greater competition throughout the season.

Pumas' Attack Wide Open

Little is known of the Pumas except that they are light both in the line and the backfield, and that they specialize in an open, running and passing game. This type of game is effective in Mexico City's 7500 foot altitude against heavier teams from lower climates. However, the Pumas will be playing away from home and will lose that advantage. They will be greatly outweighed with their 165 pound line and 158 pound backfield.

Pavelko has been experimenting with several different combinations in the backfield. Such fine prospects as Bill Hobbs, Enard Johnson, Bob Loftus, Eddie Mack, Doss Sims and Paul Fishbeck combine with veterans J. D. Phillips, Pinky Bebernes and Gene Seminario to form several good teams.

Line Completely Changed

In the line are many new faces. Only End Charlie Weber, Guard Howard Heilman and Center Hal Kinbrough remain from last year's starting line-up. Supplementing the line are Tackles Don Christenson and Grover Harader, Guard Dick Yraceburu and End Hal Cramer.

Although there is little doubt that the Mustangs will win the game easily, the score will be a far cry from the 103-0 loss the Spartans handed the Pumas.

and final examination weeks. Advance notice for each showing will be placed in El Mustang and will be posted in the postoffice.

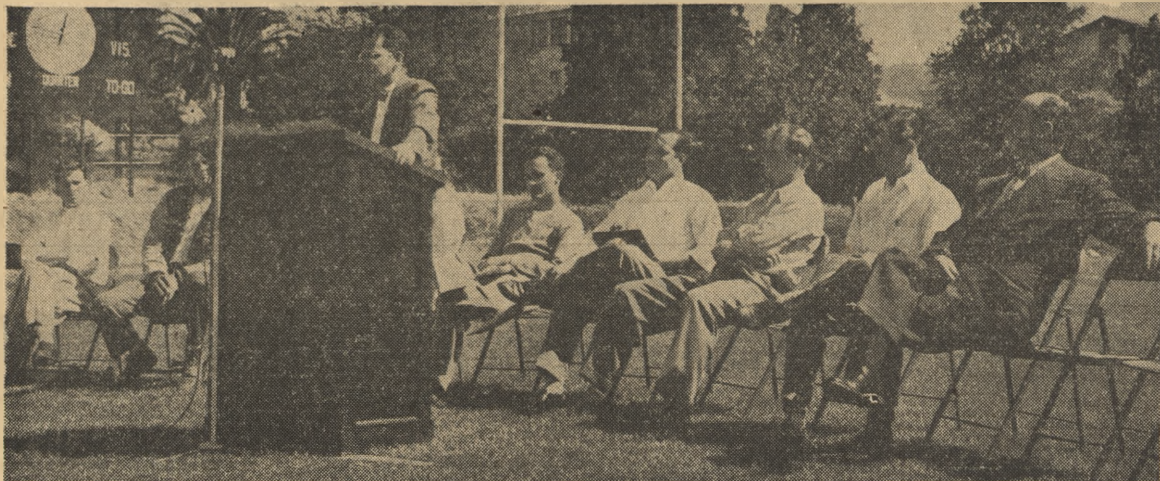

Campus Meat Animals Journey to Pomona

All three divisions of the meat animals department will be represented at the Los Angeles county fair which opens at Pomona today and lasts until Oct. 2, it was announced today by Rollin Landers, swine unit director.

Lyman Bennion, AH department head, and instructor Don Bower left San Luis Obispo Wednesday morning with 15 students and the campus exhibition fat stock for the Pomona competition.

In the sheep division, under the direction of Spelman Collins, sheep department head, a pen of Southdown lambs will be entered by Steve and Pete Juarena, Frank Franklin and Paul Grieve, and a group of carcass lambs will be shown by Elmer Valentine, Robert DeLong, John Mainvil and Robert Kretzman. The carcass class is first shown alive and then as the "hoof to hooks" class, said Collins.

Rookie Exhibitors

The swine entry consists of individual pens of three barrows, the weight classes being 170 to 200 and 201 to 230 pounds, and a carcass class will also be shown. Competing students are Otis Page, Bob Scott, Clyde Reynolds, Robert Mott and Ralph Carey. None of these men, according to Landers, has exhibited stock before, outside of Poly Royal.

Two Breeds

Nine head of fat steers comprise the beef department's ex-

hibit; six of these are Herefords and three are Shorthorns. Divided into groups of three, the animals weighing under 1000 pounds will be shown in the carcass class and the heavier cattle will be in the senior yearling, junior yearling and summer yearling divisions. The beef animals were fitted by Bud Collet, Al Johnson, Bob Chance, Slim Koester, Dick Arnold, Townsend Rose, Bill Armstrong and Leonard Young. Mitch Evovich and Bob Chance are the only students who will accompany the beef entry, however.

The stock will be judged tomorrow morning—the fat stock will be sold at auction while the carcasses will be sold by the show, Landers stated.

Crops Department Head Returns From Honduras

Paul Dougherty, head of the crops department, returned at the beginning of the school year from a vacation trip to Honduras. While there he was a guest of the United Fruit company, and was entertained by his former student, Don Fiester, a teacher at the Escuela Agrícola Panamericana near Teguchigalpa.

Fiester is in charge of the tropical plant propagation program at the school, which is endowed and maintained by the United Fruit company and is operated on the same "learn by doing" philosophy as at Cal Poly.

Former Polyites

While there, Dougherty also visited with Bill Armstrong, a former dairy student from Cal Poly, who is operating the dairy program and teaching dairy husbandry. Jim Miller, formerly employed in the Cal Poly business office, is in charge of the accounting program

at the school.

Dougherty said that Don, Jim, and his wife, Harriet, Bill and his wife, Ramona, and little David Armstrong, all asked to be remembered to their Cal Poly friends.

Sea and Air

Dougherty brought back an extensive collection of kodachrome slides, illustrating tropical agriculture practices, plants, and also views of the country. He traveled by fast banana boat from New Orleans and returned by air by way of San Salvador, Guatemala and Mexico City.

He took with him hundreds of seeds of peach and plum varieties which endure mild winters on the Cal Poly farm. Dougherty said it is hoped that these seedlings planted on a mountain site at an elevation of 6000 feet would produce fruit superior to that now grown in Central America.

All students are requested to observe all traffic rules and to drive carefully at all times—save-a-life!

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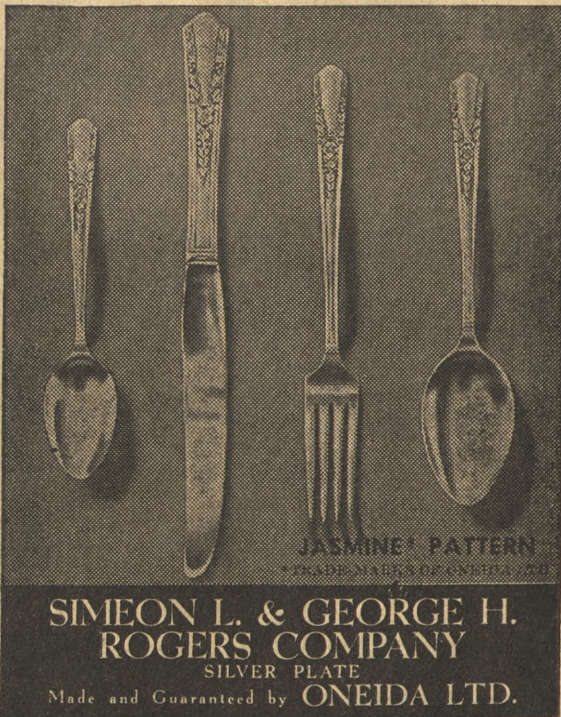
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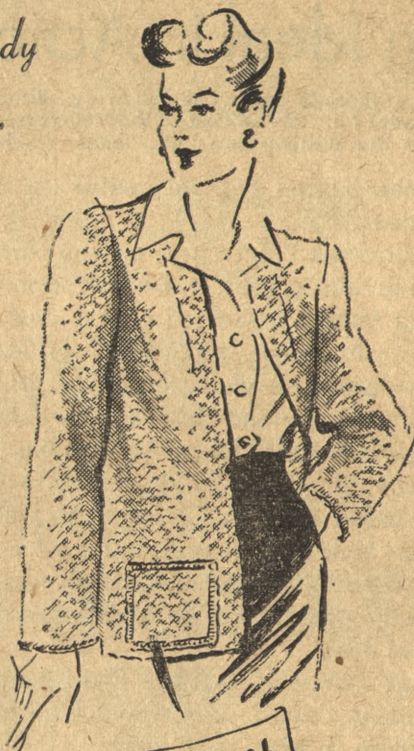

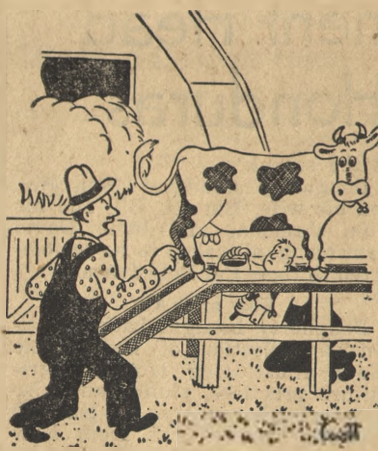

Glover Introduces Three EE Courses

Power system stability is the title of the new course being offered by the Electrical Engineering department in its curriculum this quarter. E. C. Glover, department head, announced today.

D. C. Bowen, electrical engineering instructor, will handle the new course which consists of three lectures a week. It will cover power system computations with balanced and unbalanced conditions, including transients. Also considered will be synchronous machine characteristics, network reduction, faulty current computations, symmetrical system stability.

Prerequisites for the course are Math 203 and EE 203, which are courses in differential and integral calculus and alternating current machinery. Two more new subjects, Power Transmission and Distribution, and Equipment Maintenance, will be offered during the winter quarter.

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Laundry Lists Lowered Rates For Fall Quarter

The Home Laundry and Dry Cleaning company has announced a new schedule of prices and hours of service for students, faculty members, and their families.

All students, instructors, their families are now entitled to a 25 percent discount on all dry cleaning delivered to the call office on campus or at Camp San Luis Obispo. The Laundry prices have been reduced an estimated 10 percent under those of the last school year.

The call office, in the basement of the Agriculture Education building, will be open Monday through Saturday from 11 a.m. to 12:50 p.m., and Monday through Friday from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

The call office at Camp San Luis Obispo Housing unit will be open during regular office hours. Dry cleaning and laundry will be picked up at the call office and at the dormitories as indicated on the posted notices.

The importance of enclosing a list with the student's name in each bundle of laundry and dry cleaning is stressed by R.D. Conner, plant manager.

All students desiring further information about dry cleaning and laundry service are invited to inquire at the call office on campus during hours of business.

Bargain Sale On El Rodeo

A limited number of '49 El Rodeos are still unsold and will be made available to new students and new faculty members for the low price of \$2.00 per book. Art Gandy, publications board chairman, stated before students at Wednesday's assembly.

This special yearbook sale, Gandy explained, is only for new Polyites, either students or faculty members, and is not to be considered as a precedent for the years to come.

The sale was approved at last Tuesday's meeting of the publication board as a means of disposing of the few yearbooks left over from last spring.

"The '49 El Rodeos should prove very valuable to the new students," Gandy told the board. "Since the new men will be working with the undergrads of last year and in the campus functions featured in the yearbook, the El Rodeos will provide them an insight to Cal Poly. A nominal charge of \$2.00 should make these books available to the new students and faculty members who come early enough to take advantage of this special sale."

Monday, Sept. 19, the books will go on sale at the graduate manager's office, next to the coffee shop, in the Ad building basement.

William Troutner, housing coordinator, will continue to act in this capacity, as well as advisor to Agricultural Inspection majors.

Joseph Deuel will handle all housing assignments for both single and married students. Arthur L. Colwell has been returned to full-time instructor status and his duties in housing will be taken by Deuel.

John Jones, placement secretary, will take over all responsibilities in regard to employment, both on and off campus. Those students seeking part-time jobs should con-

tact Jones in order that they may be placed on proper listings.

Harry Wineroth, former student and graduate of 1946, has been returned to assist in the Welfare Office. His duties will be to assist dorm superintendents with college housing. He will be responsible for general living conditions in the dormitories.

"It is obvious that much good can be accomplished by having definite and regular overseeing of all dorms as to cleanliness and orderliness," said Meacham. He will also represent the Welfare Office on the Student Board of Control. Wineroth had originally completed his training in 1940. Following a period of three and a half years in the Navy, he returned to Poly, securing his degree in 1946.

Although strong on the forward wall, the Bulldogs will again have trouble with their heavy slate unless some suitable backs can be found.

Santa Barbara, minus "Scootin" Sam Cathcart and Mel Patton, will have to be satisfied with a few places lower on the 1949 2C2A conference ladder. The Gauchos have lost everything, including their temporarily-absent head coach, Stan Williamson. Several JC transfers will keep the channel-city eleven in the race, but the blue and gold of Cal will sink to a new low before this season is over.

SPARTANS RATED BEST

Up north, where the talk has been of high scores and the good neighbor policy, San Jose will be the big noise of the 2C2A. Without COP to add to its conference collection, the Spartans will have clear sailing on the conference gridiron. With their smashing victory over Mexico U. already the talk of the coast, Coach Bill Hubbard's Spartans will be out to raise some more eyebrows on the morrow when they tackle the Leland Stanford Jr. aggregation.

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Library Opening With 17,000 Books Moved And Placed

projection of motion pictures; office for librarian in charge of visual education; film dark room; seminar rooms; storage rooms; with folding doors by which a series of smaller rooms can quickly be set up; a large receiving and order room and a staff room.

In addition, the ground floor contains two small listening rooms equipped with modern record machines. These rooms will be used mainly for classical records, which can be checked out much the same as books.

One room will be used especially for filing records on Poly's prize stock. It will be possible to trace any individual animal back to its origin with this accurate record of blood lines.

Steel Stacks

Book stacks, of standard construction, are four floors high and will accommodate 85,000 volumes. An elevator enables library workers to service the four floors with a minimum of effort.

Mrs. Dorothy Wright, assistant librarian, has added color to the attractive foyer of the library with a display of scores of new books in a large, built-in display case.

The new library was named for the late Walter Friar Dexter, former state superintendent of public instruction. Ceremonies honoring Dr. Dexter were a part of the cornerstone laying program, October 15, 1948.

Work on the building was begun November, 1947. Plans were drawn for the library by William J. Bartges, state division of architecture. Morgan Lewis was the resident supervising architect. The Amoroso Construction company of San Francisco built the structure.

Planned In 1941

Plans for a new library were started in 1941 but were halted by the war. During 1944 a faculty committee again began preparation of plans for the proposed post-war building project. It was these plans and specifications which Architect Bartges used as the basic requirements for the building.

One of the committee's reports indicated its planning was based on a possible enrollment of 2000 to 2500 students. On Monday the enrollment had reached 2839, with more expected.

Since 1942 the library has occupied a half-dozen classrooms of the second floor of the administration building. Previous to the construction of the administration building in 1941-42, the library had occupied two rooms in the classroom unit, opposite the welding laboratory.

Alumni's Paper Needs Stories

The Cal Poly Alumni association has just hit the street with the second issue of its quarterly news magazine, the "Green and Gold."

This magazine is sent free every three months, to all members of the alumni, which numbered upward of 2,000 at the last count.

Henry House, coordinator of student affairs at Poly, secretary of the Alumni association as well as business manager of the "Green and Gold," stated, "this magazine has long been the dream of every member of the alumni. It serves to let each member know what the others are doing and where they are located as well as give them information about the college."

"Right now," continued House, "the magazine is supported by the organization's general fund, but we hope that in the near future it will be supported by the business directory included in the magazine."

House continued with, "our greatest need right now is for people to write for the magazine. We want students to write of happenings around the college, for they would certainly interest the alumni. Any work that a student does on the 'Green and Gold' now, will certainly come back to him when he becomes a member of the alumni."

The editor for the past two issues was Boyd Haight of the Publicity department. Since Haight left Poly, the chair is now vacant and a new man will be appointed within the next few weeks.

Fire Equipment War Games Denounced As Campus Hazard

A plea was issued to students today by E. A. Steiner, chief security officer, to refrain from tampering with campus fire extinguishers. According to the security officer, 47 extinguishers have been removed and discharged by students during the past year. These empty extinguishers were then replaced, endangering the security of the dormitories.

"Don't be half safe," warned Steiner, "Leave fire extinguishers alone." If an extinguisher is accidentally discharged, report to the Power House immediately," he explained.

The security officer also emphasized that broken fluorescent lights are dangerous, since the gas and broken glass are poisonous. He explained that if one is broken, leave the room immediately until the vapor cloud has settled. If it is necessary to pass through the vapor, close eyes and hold breath.

Security Officer Warns Against Ignoring Citations

E. A. Steiner, chief security officer, announced today that during the past year 20 students have ignored traffic citations and were heavily fined by the Morro Bay court. He again warns that ignoring a citation is a serious offense and will continue to be punishable by fine.

Steiner has listed the following procedure to be followed by students receiving citations:

- (1) Report to Vernon Meacham, director of student welfare.
- (2) Appear at Justice of Peace Robin McDonald's court, Morro Bay, on or before the specified date.
- (3) Always answer citations. No excuses will be accepted for failure to appear in court.

The security officer added that if a student fails to heed a traffic citation, a \$15 fine will be levied against him by the Morro Bay court. This fine will be increased each day the citation is ignored.

In addition, disciplinary action may be brought against the student by the college. Second offenders are subject to disciplinary action.
