

Poly, Raisinmen Clash In 2C2A Opener

The lid of the 1949 CCAA conference season will be pried off under the lights of Fresno's Radcliffe Stadium tomorrow night when Coach Chuch Pavelko sends his Cal Poly Mustangs against the battling Bulldogs of Fresno State College. With both teams boasting strong lines and capable passers, the conference opener looks like a virtual toss-up with no more than one touchdown separating the two teams after the sixty-minute tilt.

From the blue and red encampment come cheers mixed with occasional tears. Coach Alvin

"Pix" Pierson pushed the Fresno grid machine off to a late start, and since that time the Bulldog mentor has been experimenting with several combinations, including crying towels and a well-thumbed Leahy script. Although reportedly weak in the backfield, the Bulldogs have a couple of sophomore backs by the names of Baldo Giorgi and Fibber Hirayama. These two newcomers, joined by such veterans as Dick Blami, Johnny Morse, Skippy White and Moose Myers, form a fast and well-rounded offensive unit.

Up front, Coach Pierson has

aided some much-needed poundage to the Bulldog forward wall. Although running not too deep, the Fresno mentor has such talents as Chuck Moran, left guard and season captain; Len Stewart, 300 pound guard; and at left end, Delmar Hanner. Chances are that all three of these men will start against the Mustangs.

From the local side, it will be a Mustang with a slight limp in his hind hoof that gallops onto the Fresno turf tomorrow night. Minus the running and passing abilities of Bill Hobbs, the Mustang backfield will have to depend on the right arm of Pinky Bebernes to a great

extent. Should Gene Seminario, first string quarterback, remain on the sick list, second man Stu Brown also will be forced to take on a double load.

On the line, Coaches Sheldon Harden and Bob Herwig announce but one casualty, that being the injured Dick Yraceburu. From end to end the Mustangs will be almost 15 pounds per man heavier than the team which beat the Bulldogs, 26-14 last season.

From the press box it looks like a hard fought defensive game with the scoring staying on even terms. At a Monday Morning Quarter-

back's dinner in San Francisco this past week, publicity man Ed Platon of the Fresno Kennels announced that Fresno will have a line as good as any in the CCAA. If this is the case, the Mustangs will be forced to play their best in order to bring home the first SCRA victory of the 1949 season.

If conditions remain the same, a line-up pretty close to the following will start tomorrow night's tilt. Weber and Knighten, ends; Chambers and Harader, tackles; Holman and Frost, guards; Kimbrough, center; Johnson and Phillips, halfbacks; Bebernes at full, with Brown at quarter.

21st Annual FFA Meet Slated For Next Week

More than 400 Future Farmers of America local chapter officers will throng the Cal Poly campus from Monday to Wednesday next week, as they participate in the 21st annual state FFA convention. The session this year is billed as the "Coming of Age" convention. Official business will be transacted by two delegates from each of the 188 active FFA chapters in California high schools which have vocational agriculture departments. In addition, many winners of state-wide awards will be present to receive their honors.

Directing the annual two-day convention will be State President Dino Petrucci. Madara, a junior this year at Cal Poly; and Byron J. McMahon, state adviser and chief of the state bureau of agriculture education, whose headquarters are also at Cal Poly.

Tent Accommodations

Visitors will be housed in tents set up inside the football stadium area. Convention sessions will be held in the engineering auditorium, with committee meetings and regional meetings scheduled for various classrooms. The boys will eat at the campus dining halls.

The college will be host to the group on Monday evening in the gymnasium with a program which has been arranged by Harry Winroth and Marty Engler of the student welfare office. On Tuesday evening, the annual "Awards Night" program will be held in the gymnasium, with the Cal Poly Collegeians furnishing music for the 90-minute program.

Varied Awards

Awards to be made include Master Chapter honors to about 70 chapters, a "Star State Dairy Farmer" award and runner-up prizes totaling \$175; presentation of honorary State Farmer certificates, state winners in farm mechanics and public speaking and the most-prized honors of regional and Star State Farmer selections.

Honorary State Farmer awards will go to Carl Garrison, secretary-manager of the Grand National Livestock show at San Francisco; E.P. Green, secretary-manager of the California State fair; Richard I. Leach and George M. Drumm, heads respectively of the poultry and dairy departments at Cal Poly.

There will be many convention visitors, including Bill Michaels, Billings, Montana, national vice-president for the 11 western states; and Andrew Sundstrom, former national president, now a California businessman. Both will make addresses to the convention group.

Campusites Included

Many of the boys to receive State Farmer degrees are now in the freshman class at Cal Poly. They should all plan to be in the gymnasium at 7:30 Tuesday evening.

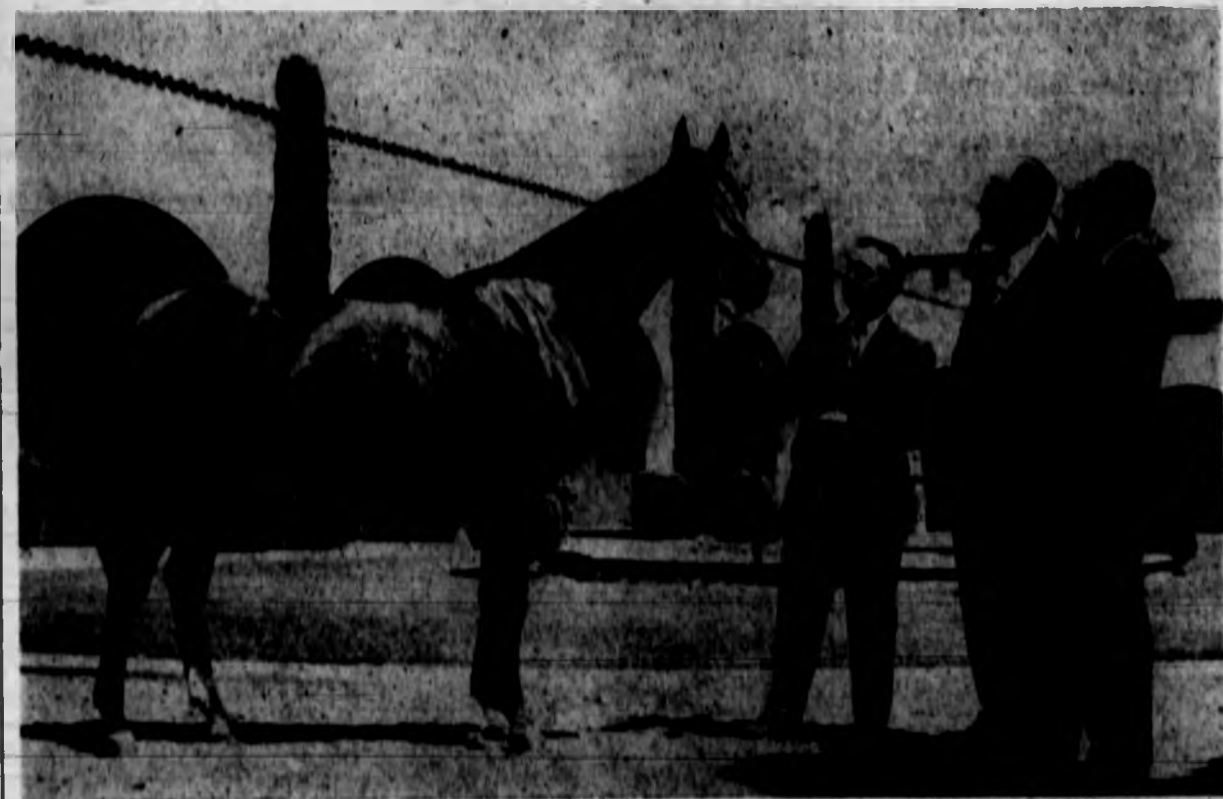

Plans Formulating For '49 Frosh-Soph Brawl

Plans for the annual Frosh-Soph brawl, scheduled for next week, were made public today by Stan Billingsley, junior class president. He said that classes will be dismissed so that all students can watch or participate in the brawl.

Second of its type to be held since the war, the brawl will take place at 8 p.m. next Friday, Sept. 30. It will be sponsored by the junior class again this year, with the juniors officiating at all events. Individual events will be judged and scored by two or three members of the senior class.

Aiding Billingsley in putting on the affair are Roy H. Lomborg, junior class advisor, Jim Dowe, Paul Appling, Jack Oneto, Ken Evans and other members of the junior class. Billingsley stated that Coach Ed Jorgenson will be field manager for the brawl.

Eight different events will be

held during the afternoon. There will be a push ball contest, the ball having been rented from Whittier college, a 100-yard three-legged race, a burden relay in which a 80-pound weight will be carried 50 yards, a tire drag, a wheelbarrow race, a mounted joust, and a greased pole race where the teams will have to climb a greased pole to capture a flag.

"I want to urge all freshmen and sophomores to uphold the honor of their classes and to plan to participate in the brawl and help their classes to win," said Billingsley. "I would also like to remind the participants to wear old clothes and to bring an old tee shirt to be dyed at the field just before the brawl. Following the tradition at Poly, the freshmen will wear green tee shirts, and the sophomores will wear gold ones."

SAC Decides Song Leaders Here To Stay

Four girl song leaders became an official part of the Cal Poly cheering section by decision of the Student Affairs council at its first meeting of the school year last Tuesday night.

The girls, all student wives, were commended for their debut at the Cal Poly-University of Mexico football game last Saturday evening. The SAC authorized the four to lead songs at every Cal Poly game at which the band plays. To pay for the girls' costumes, SAC appropriated \$72.

Although original plans had called for a student body election to decide whether or not the girls would become song leaders, they were so well received at the opening game that SAC gave its official sanction for Meredith Smith, Maggie Calhoun, Val Munger and Helen Chase to continue their duties as song leaders for the rest of the football season.

Additional funds were set aside to provide transportation for the song leaders and three cheer leaders for each out-of-town football game where there will be a Poly rooting section.

A schedule of 16 ABB dances was presented by George Strathorn, student body vice president, but no cost decisions were completed because the budget committee has not finished its financial studies for the present school term. Last year's dance budget totaled \$1,760. Until a definite budget may be agreed on, a sum of \$220 dollars was appropriated for the next two school dances.

A traffic committee, in answer to a request from R. A. Steiner, chief security officer, was appointed by the SAC. The appointees are Duane Baldwin, Wes Combs and John McMann.

A motion was passed to change the present Poly account name, California State Polytechnic school, to Associated Students, California State Polytechnic college. It was also decided to rent a safe deposit box at the Security First National bank for the storage of deeds, bonds and other valuables which have been kept in the SAC vault. These motions were both recommended by Tut Starkey, campus graduate manager.

Starkey was given a vote of confidence for the coming years by the assembled members.

Soils Science Now Offered As Major

A new soils science major is now being offered this fall. Dr. Logan S. Carter, head of the new department, reported today. Dr. Carter explained that the offerings in this field, covering vocational, technical and degree curricula, have been designed to provide a maximum of training for work in general agriculture, conservation, soil science and specialized fields of teaching and research.

Dean of Admissions Announces Thesis Completion Date

Seniors who expect to receive a Bachelor of Science degree at the college commencement exercises on June 2, 1950, should keep in mind that April 24, 1950, is the last day for filing an Application for Graduation, according to C. Paul Winner, dean of admissions.

The last day for accepting completed theses in the registrar's office will be April 24, 1950, the same day as the last day for filing an Application for Graduation. Starting with the fall quarter, 1949-50, all degree candidates must complete Thesis 461, Thesis 462 and Seminar 463. Students who are irregular in schedule and who will graduate at the close of the fall quarter, 1949-50, or at the winter quarter, 1949-50, should make special arrangements to complete all three of these courses.

Students who expect to receive a Vocational or Technical certificate also must have their Application for Graduation completed by April 24, 1950, Winner said. Applications for Graduation are made through the Recorder's office, Ad building, room 102.

Navy Antenna Falls, Barely Misses Man

A near-accident occurred at the Army camp last week when a tall radio antenna crashed to the ground nearly striking a passerby, according to E.A. Steiner, chief security officer. The antenna was one of several of the structures surrounding the Navy Department radio station maintained at the camp. Because some prankster cut the supporting wires, the wind blew the antenna down.

Tampering with government property is a serious offense, Steiner declared, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment or both.

"Unless the deliberate vandalism by some of the childish students of this school stops, drastic disciplinary measures will be taken to end this wanton destruction," Steiner said.

Graduate Record Examination Will Commence In October

PRINCETON, N.J., Sept. 22—Tests of the Graduate Record Examination, required of applicants for admission to a number of graduate schools, will be administered at examination centers throughout the country four times in the coming year, Educational Testing Service has announced. During 1948-1949 nearly 15,000 students took the GRE in partial fulfillment of admission requirements of graduate schools which prescribed it.

This fall candidates may take the GRE on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 28 and 29; in 1950, the dates are Feb. 8 and 4, May 8 and 6, and Aug. 4 and 5. Since the GRE is not required by all graduate schools, ETS advises each student to inquire of his prospective school whether or not he is expected to take the test and, if so, on which dates.

The GRE tests offered in these nationwide programs include a test of general scholastic ability, tests of general achievement in six broad fields of undergraduate study, and advanced level tests of achievement in various subject matter fields. According to ETS, candidates are permitted several options among these tests.

Application forms and a bulletin of information, which provides details of registration and administration, as well as sample questions, may be obtained from advisors or directly from Educational Testing Service, Box 592, Princeton, N.J., or Box 2416, Terminal annex, Los Angeles 54, California. A completed application must reach the ETS office at least two weeks before the date of the administration for which the candidate is applying.

Parking Stickers Apportion Spaces

In order to reduce traffic congestion, parking areas have been assigned to resident and non-resident students, according to E.A. Steiner, chief security officer.

The stickers indicate: 1A, orange, off-campus faculty; 1B, orange, on-campus faculty; 1C, orange, off-campus employees; 1D, orange, on-campus employees; 2A, blue, off-campus students; 2B, blue, students at camp housing; 3A, green, Heron, Jespersen, Deuel and Chase dormitories; 3B, green, Coronado, Catalina, Dauntless, Buffalo and Mariner dormitories, the health center and the new athletic field house; 3C, green, Vetsville; 3D, green, Poly Crest trailers; 3E, green, Wildcat and Helldiver dormitories; 3F, green, Poly Vue trailers; 3G, green, shops, Gymnasium and outlying units; 3H, green, upper and lower units.

Students who live on campus are limited to parking in the lots provided for their buildings during class hours, including Saturday mornings. California boulevard, Cuesta avenue, and large parking lots A and B are reserved for off campus students. They are not allowed to park in the lots provided for on campus students.

Several questions have been directed to the security office concerning the gate at Parker's barn on Highway 1. The administration has found it necessary to keep this gate closed because the road is not considered safe for fast traffic, Steiner stated. There have been three traffic accidents on the road and one man had to be hospitalized.

Insurance Refunds As High As \$528

Veterans who held the maximum amount of GI insurance may expect to receive up to \$528 back on their policies sometime next year.

For policies taken out between Oct. 1941 and Oct. 1945 by veterans under 40 years of age, there will be a return of 55 cents per \$1000 of insurance. For example, if you enlisted in July 1942 at the age of 40 or under, signed up for \$10,000 and paid the full premium until you were discharged in Nov. 1945, you would have paid for 41 months. The 41 months is multiplied by 10 which gives 410. This is multiplied by 55 cents which comes out \$225.50 to be returned to you.

Mustangs Turn Back Puma Warriors, 42-2

Cal Poly gave the good-neighbor policy a rude jolt last Saturday night as it handed the University of Mexico a 42-2 setback. The Mustangs scored at least once every quarter as Coach Chuck Pavelko swept the bench of reserves. Much credit must be given to the Mexican players as they gave their best throughout the game regardless of the score and their rival's superiority. The Pumas' only score came in the third quarter when Quarter-back Bob Hardy fumbled a high pass from center while attempting to punt from deep in the end zone, and the ball rolled out of the end zone for an automatic safety.

Bebernes Scores First TD

Cal Poly started the scoring midway in the first period as Bill Hobbs passed from the Mustang 35 to End Charlie Weber, who took it on the Puma 40 and raced down the left sideline to score. A few minutes later, Halfback Don Sims went wide around left end and outraced the safety man to the goal line. Just before the end of the half, Pinky Bebernes tossed one to End Walt Kolar and Kolar was finally brought down on the three-yard line. Three plays later, Bebernes plowed over from the one. It was the first touchdown Pinky had scored in his college career although he has passed for a considerable number of six-pointers in the past three years. Pinky then kicked his third extra point of the night, and the Mustangs left the field at halftime with a very comfortable 21-0 lead.

Hobbs To Weber For 80 Yards

No sooner had the second half begun than Bill Hobbs found Weber with another of his aerials for 80 yards and another Mustang TD. After Mexico picked up two points on an automatic safety, Quarter-back Stu Brown passed to Weber for 40 yards and a first down on the Puma 16. Halfback J.D. Phillips bucked over left guard from the five to score, and Brown ran over for the conversion. Fullback Jim Dove closed the scoring festivities with a touchdown from the three, making the final score 42-2.

The best offense the Mexicans could muster was a spot-passing attack. Halfback Alberto Cardona completed several fine spot passes for short gains before being injured while attempting to pass. Only the Pumas' fine condition and competitive spirit kept the game from becoming a complete rout.

The game proved costly to the Mustangs as Dick Yrabeburu received a brain concussion in the second half and will be lost for an indefinite time.

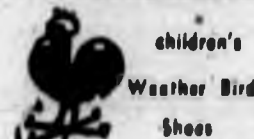
