## Hughes' Mustangs Tromp LA State, 32-7; Annex First Conference Flag

Spirited Green and Golders Tackle Redlands At University Stadium Saturday Afternoon

Perhaps the most unhealthy football club in the California Collegiate Athletic Association for several years until last year's second place, Poly's Mustangs last weekend exchanged their predominate conference "gory road" doormat for a spanking-brand-new "glory road" flag. They trampled

Los Angeles State's Diablos, 32-7, here to whack from San Diego State the CCAA grid championship—marking the first time a Mustang football club has done so since joining the loop in 1946.

Redlands university's Bulldogs host the SCFA masters in a non-loop contest Saturday afternoon at University stadium. The Mustangs have won five, lost three, while Redlands has a 2-5 mark, many of the defeats coming from CCAA clubs. The tilt is set for 3 p.m.

Poly completed an undefeated conference season with the Diablos, who have yet to win in loop play after two years.

As they have done consistently—discounting the Whittier smash-up—the Mustangs of Coach Ray Hughes banged to a teepee within the first two and one-half minutes of the game, climaxing a 78-yard, six-play drive.

### Lawson Scores First

Bob Lawson, fullback, went 23 yards to score the initial tally, with Len Smith adding the PAT. Bob Neal passed 15 yards to versatile Bob Smith for the second touchdown just as the first half ended.

Linebacker Tom Vessella, intercepting Quarterback Neal's pass, raced 41 yards for LA's lone touchdown in the third period.

Tom Enos, Mustang guard, racked up another six points when he recovered in the air Diablos Halfback Jessie Hendrick's fumble. The play was good for 28 yards.

### 'Boom Boom' Scampers

Halfback Alex Bravo broke loose for a 26-yard scoring scamper, rounding out a 40-yard, six-play spree, with Len Smith converting. A pass interception by Bob Smith, who plays nearly any spot, set up the final TD from the 18, Chuck (Continued on page four)

1) No recommendation from IDC or ICC subcommittee enabling Blue Key to legally sponsor drive on campus.

### Famed Psychiatrist Speaks At Assembly

Dr. Douglas M. Kelley, noted psychiatrist, will speak at Thursday morning's 11 a.m. assembly in Crandall gym, Vice President San Arnold announced today.

During the war Dr. Kelley served as a Lieutenant Colonel in

the Army Medical corps. He was chief consulting psychologist and acting consulting psychiatrist of the European Theatre of Operations before being appointed psychiatrist to the Nuremberg Jail. In this latter capacity he examined minds of leading German war criminals and incorporated his findings in the thought-provoking book "22 Cells in Nuremberg."

"Psychiatry is rapidly expanding in its viewpoints, developing a concern for the function of the community as well as for the individual," says Dr. Kelley.

Coach George Prouse's eleven upset John Muir college last week, 14-8, and ended a three game losing streak. The Colt record stands at two wins, three losses and one tie to date and will take on a favored role when they tangle with the Broncos of San Dimas Friday.
