Remaining Cards
The remaining cards are available at \$3.25 in El Corral business office or in the student body office. Cards will not be available after today. "Only senior card holders will have the privilege of participating in senior activities other than graduation," says Bob McKellar, class president.

Duplicate first prizes are an automatic electric coffee urn for residence showing most improvement and beautiful residence; an electric alarm clock and an electric corn popper for second and third prizes, respectively, for the most improved residence.

A conference of state college educators—deans of students and deans of instruction—are convening on campus this weekend to exchange ideas and discuss problems in higher education.

Representatives of the state board of education will also meet, in this, the first of the group's two conferences this year.

Everett Chandler, dean of students and C. O. McCorkle, dean of instruction, will represent Cal Poly at the three-day spring conference.

The agenda will include coordination of departmental problems, counseling and job placement, among other matters.

Charles Koonts, junior animal husbandry major, topped all other contestants to win Cal Poly's annual all-campus livestock judging contest late last week.

Koonts, along with LeRoy Cheda, freshman; Jerry Biggs, sophomore; and Duane Noyes, junior, will have his name inscribed on the J. I. Thompson award plaque. Cheda, Biggs and Noyes were high individuals in cattle, swine and sheep, respectively, according to Richard F. Johnson, AH instructor.

In all, nine classes were placed, three each of cattle, swine and sheep. Official event judges were: Dean of Agriculture Vard Shepherd, cattle; J. I. Thompson, swine; and Harry Parker and S. B. Collins, sheep.

Reasons were given in three classes. Top six placings were as follows: Koonts, first; Phil Scott, second; Shane Combs, third; Burt Caldwell, fourth; Henry Gaspar, fourth; Duane Noyes, fifth; and Keith Smith, sixth.

Top Freshmen
Top three freshmen were Combs, Smith and Cheda, in first, second and third spots, respectively.

Individual winners in cattle, swine and sheep were:

Cattle—Cheda, first; Koonts and Robert O'Dell, second; Don Clark, Robert Commer and Phil Scott, tied for third.

Swine—Biggs, first; Burt Caldwell, second; Combs and John Gustafson, tied for third.

Sheep—Noyes, first; William Taber and Koonts, tied for second.

Koonts and Combs received judging canes for their efforts.

New Power Plant, ME Lab Building Begins By Fall

"Actual construction of the new power plant and mechanical engineering lab can be expected to start by fall of next year," according to Tom Zilka, ME department head.

"Excavation is slated to start during this school year," he explained.

The new power unit will be erected on what is now known as parking lot 3-A.

Students Will Move
Mechanical engineering students will move from the present frame and stucco structure to the new plant, upon completion, and will find themselves provided with numerous facilities needed for engineering laboratory experiments. Classrooms for lectures and computation will also be conveniently located.

The plant will fill needs of mechanical engineering department now served by a one room building on campus with exception of the strength of materials test laboratory, which will remain in the nearby welding and engineering building.

fabricated of steel and will be 25 feet high, according to Zilka. It will house two boilers and all their accessories, two shops and provide enough space for two additional boilers.

The auxiliary power generating plant section will be 18 feet high and contain internal combustion engines, generators and accessories, a five-ton traveling crane, test block for trial set-ups or construction, a pipe shop and removable wall.

This section also has a sound-proofed classroom and engineering laboratories on the east side mezzanine floor, Zilka emphasized.

Various Facilities

In addition, there will be instructors' offices, student wash-rooms and individual lockers.

"The two boilers will provide 20,000 pounds of steam each per hour at 125 pounds per square inch pressure," says Clifford H. Anderson, ME instructor, who worked on the project's planning.

"This will supply more than enough for the needs of the college," Anderson stressed.

Installation of much of the laboratory equipment will be done by students, says Zilka.
