'Visiting' Hours At SB Campus Issued

University of California's Santa Barbara campus will be closed to Cal Poly students from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. next Monday through the following Monday, ASB President George Martin announced yesterday.

Students of the Santa Barbara college will be prohibited from the Cal Poly campus during these same hours. The regulations will be strictly enforced by security forces of the two campuses.

Martin pointed out, however, that open house at the UCSB Coleta campus will be held between noon and 6 p.m. Friday preceding the Mustang-Gauchos football game.

Poly students are also invited to a joint rally at 6 p.m. in the UCSB stadium on the beach at Santa Barbara. An after-game dance is tentatively scheduled.

The foregoing measures resulted from unfortunate circumstances that occurred last year, when both campuses suffered extensive damage. Damage to the UCSB Administration building amounted to \$1,200.

Meeting on the Santa Barbara campus on September 17, representatives of the two colleges agreed to the restrictions and that any disciplinary action taken by the administration of either college would be supported by mutual understanding.

Poly spokesmen at the September meeting were SAC advisor James McGrath and ASB officers George Martin, Richard Johnson, and Charles Anderson. UCSB representatives were Dean of Men Lyle Reynolds and ASB President George H. Allen.

Tradition Revived

At the largest gathering of faculty and students ever held on Cal Poly's campus, President Julian A. McPhee yesterday delivered a speech outlining the responsibilities of the students to Cal Poly.

In former years this convention was an annual affair, but in recent years has been bypassed because of the press of duty. But now President McPhee hopes to reestablish the old tradition, and make it a time to hear of the latest and future developments of Cal Poly.

Groups, Panels, Highlight Leadership Conference

More than three score student leaders and two dozen staff members converged on Cambria's Camp Ocean Pines for the third annual Fall Leadership conference last weekend. Says Jerry Hill, conference chairman, these annual affairs are held for "the purpose of promoting unity and understanding through the college as a whole, and to reaffirm student goals for the ensuing school year."

Group discussion and panels on various phases of college activities, both student and otherwise filled the two day gathering.

Discussion groups meeting simultaneously throughout Saturday provided the bulk of meeting time. Discussion groups included: Goals for this year, led by George Martin; School spirit led by Ed Slevin;

AH Prof Turns Author; Fifteen Years Effort

"Profitable Sheep" is the title of a textbook just completed by Spelman Collins, instructor in animal husbandry at Cal Poly.

Collins announces that the book will be published by MacMillan company and will be on the market by fall of 1955.

The Cal Poly instructor says he has been 15 years in writing the book. It was written as a high school or college text but places emphasis on the practical approach to sheep raising.

Collins feels that although the book is aimed at the person who has had little experience with sheep, it can be used as a reference by the experienced wool growers.

"As indicated by the title, the book's contents differ from the usual text in telling not so much about sheep but how to raise them and handle them to make the business more profitable," says Collins.

Richard F. Johnson of the Cal Poly animal husbandry staff did the art work of illustrations and diagrams for the text.

Collins' experience with sheep covers a period of 30 years. A graduate of the University of California in 1925, he has taught at Cal Poly since 1940.

He is an honorary director of the California Wool Growers association and is vice president of the southwest counties division of the organization.

Workers Sign Payroll

All students who are now employed by the State and are working on campus must sign the State and Foundation payroll before they receive their checks. Anyone concerned must sign up in the Placement office in the Administration building.

Finances, led by Bruce Barnett; Awards, led by Don Clark; Student government, led by Bill Galliher; and College union, led by Jim Shields.

Summarization of conclusions reached by the various groups and their recommendations, as reported to the final general assembly, are as follows:

School spirit: Ed Slevin reported his groups had decided that Cal Poly has an over abundance of spirit, often misguided. It was also felt that leadership in this line was not lacking in the negative areas, but definitely lacking in some of the positive activities.

Finance: The discussion revolved around the controversial subject, "Should the El Mustang and Collegian staffers be paid?" No conclusions were reached, but the groups strongly recommended a general student body vote to decide the matter.

Awards: The group led by Don Clark recommended that the present ASB award set-up needed an overhauling. The group further recommended that the newly instituted activity transcripts as well as the present point system be used in determining awardees. The activity transcript calls for a "grade" of the job done, while the present system assigns an arbitrary amount of points to the job. The group also recommended the ASB activity award key be presented during commencement exercises.

Student government: Discussion in this group revolved around the proposed revamping of the present system. The new system drawn up by the student government committee calls for a three body government modeled after the national system.

College Union: This group discussed the need for such a facility and proposed plan for a temporary college union in the present Hillcrest lounge.

Goals: ASB Proxy George Martin presented his plans for an enlarged and co-ordinated publicity program to serve all student body organizations.

A committee led by George Martin and Bill Long was set up by the general assembly to refer the conference recommendations to the proper groups, and to insure action upon them.

Silveira Places Third In National Welding Contest

Thomas Silveira, 1954 graduate of Arroyo Grande High School has been adjudged a third prize winner in the national Lincoln arc welding foundations annual arc welding contest for farm youth enrolled in high school agriculture. Young Silveira, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe C. Silveira of the lower Arroyo Grande valley, was awarded third prize money consisting of \$200.

Silveira is now enrolled in the agricultural engineering division at Cal Poly.

In competition with farm boys from 48 states, he entered two pieces of farm equipment he made last year. They were a rear platform attachment for his father's Ford tractor, and a vegetable grading merry-go-round similar to the ones used in packing sheds. Both were designed and built by him.

This year is the second year in which Thomas has been awarded recognition for his welding ability. Last year, in a similar contest sponsored by the Lincoln foundation, he placed in the sixth award group and won \$25 for his entry of a tilted, two-wheel implement trailer.

His major project, the vegetable grading merry-go-round, was built at a cost of \$1105 and is of all metal construction. The grader is 19 feet 2 inches long and five feet 8 inches high. It has 17 individual baskets which are 18 inches by 24 inches by 6 inches. It has a 250 gallon all metal water tank with dimensions of 3 feet by 4 feet by 5 feet. To facilitate ease of movement, each basket has two 2 1/2 inch bronze rollers mounted under them. The grader is geared to three speeds forward and can be reversed.

As a result of building this machine, both time and labor have been reduced greatly. Before using the machine this past summer, it took three packers and five trim-

mers one hour to turn out 45 crates of celery. With the new machine, the same crew can turn out approximately 90 crates in one hour.

This year marks the third year in which an Arroyo Grande FFA member has won an award in this national contest.

Early 'Hear' Checks Advised by Lovett

Now, hear this, men! And Doc Lovett does mean "hear" — with a double meaning.

The good doc has imported a trained hearing and speech correctionist. She has been giving audiometer checks to a list of students called in for appointments after pre-fall physicals indicated they might need some help with hearing difficulties. They can be handled much more easily now than if they're let go until later. This is the rub!

"Our correctionist," says Doc, can work only on Saturdays, but a good many of the students don't turn up for their appointments. In fact, where we could be handling from 60 to 80 students per Saturday, we're handling only 30 to 40. Frankly, if you'll all come in and keep your appointments, we can get the examinations all done for just about half of what it's going to cost us at the present rate.

The examination is easy and not at all unpleasant, Doc emphasizes. "There's not a needle in sight, and nothing to take. All you do is sit down, put on some earphones and listen to some little sounds."

Eventually, Doc wants to give the benefit of the free examinations to the entire student body. Right now, however, he wants to complete the list produced by the physicals.

"Actually," he points out, "the student is getting something valuable. Something he might pay a pretty good fee for elsewhere. And it might well be that he can secure some help that will make all the difference between good and poor grades here at college."

If for any reason students cannot keep their appointments, they should notify the Health Center in advance so other students can be given the time.

Students, Faculty Invited To Submit Verse for Publication

All Cal Poly students, as well as students of colleges all over the nation, are invited to submit original verse to be considered for publication in the Annual Anthology of College Poetry.

Over 100,000 manuscripts have been submitted to the National Poetry Association in the past ten years. Of these, about 4000 have been accepted for publication. This is the 12th annual college competition.

Manuscripts must be typed or written in ink on one side of the paper. Student's home address, name of college and college address must appear on each piece of work. Students may submit as many items as they wish.

Scholarships In Mexico Offered

Scholarships for study in Mexico during 1955 will be offered by the Mexican Government, according to the Institute of International Education.

The awards are given through the Mexico-United States Commission on Cultural Cooperation and are open to graduate and undergraduate students with a knowledge of Spanish. Awards are for the academic year beginning March 1, 1955. Closing date for application is November 1, 1954.

Requirements for the Mexican Government awards are U.S. citizenship, knowledge of Spanish, a good academic record, a valid project or purpose, and good health.

The five undergraduate and eleven graduate scholarships are expected to cover tuition and full maintenance. Applicants should have other funds for incidental expenses and travel costs.

Recommended fields for study or research are architecture, Indian and physical anthropology, ethnology, archeology, museography, painting, cardiology and tropical medicine, biological sciences, and Mexican history. Suggested undergraduate fields of study or research are philosophy, languages and literature.

Applicants with sufficient previous training may take Mexican history, ethnology, archeology, and physical anthropology.

Proposed College Union Affected By Changes in Constitution

You, the students of Cal Poly will have a chance next week to vote on the proposed changes to the Constitution and By-laws of Cal Poly. The biggest questions voted on will be, "Shall the social program be turned over to a College Union board?" and "Shall the vice-presidential duties be changed to make him an executive assistant to the president?"

Polling booths will be established in front of the Post Office and in the passageway in front of El Corral all day Monday, and Tuesday until one.

Persons wishing to work at the Polls are requested to sign up in the ASB office with Dick Johnson. Following is a list of the changes as they will appear when and if they are approved:

CONSTITUTION ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE POLYTECHNIC COLLEGE

San Luis Obispo ARTICLE II Membership

Section I. Active

a. All enrolled students of the California State Polytechnic College shall become active members by purchase of an Associated Student Body card at the time of registration.

Section II. Associate

a. Any faculty member, immediate member of the faculty members' family, regular employee in the California State Polytechnic College, and wife of any enrolled student may become an associate member upon purchase of an Associate Membership card.

1. An Associate Membership Card shall be required for participation on all Associated Student Body Councils, Boards and Committees, provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws of the Associated Students or created by the Student Affairs Council.

2. Any associate member who has been an associate member for five consecutive years shall be granted annual associate membership without further annual assessment.

Section III. Honorary

a. Any individual who performs an outstanding service or deed for the benefit of the Associated Students may have honorary membership bestowed upon him by the Student Affairs Council.

b. Inter-Department Council as established in By-laws, Article IX, Section I.

1. One representative for each division as established in the curriculum of the California State Polytechnic College.

c. Inter-Club Council as established in By-laws, Article IX, Section II.

1. One representative for each eight (or part thereof) clubs or societies approved by the Student Affairs Council, under the provisions of the code pertaining thereto.

d. Boards as established in By-laws, Article VIII.

1. One representative from each of the following officially constituted boards:

- (a) Athletics
- (b) Music
- (c) Publications and publicity
- (d) Poly Royal
- (e) College Union

e. Regular classes

1. One representative from each class, elected as provided for in the constitution and By-laws of that class:

- (a) Freshman
- (b) Sophomore
- (c) Junior
- (d) Senior

f. Faculty

- 1. One faculty advisor.
- 2. One representative of the faculty or administration.

g. Graduate Manager

ARTICLE VI

Meetings

Section I. Associated Students

a. Special meetings of the Student Body may be called by the President of the Associated Students.

b. Special meetings must be called within two weeks by the President of the Associated Students upon order of the Student Affairs Council.

c. Special meetings must be called within two weeks by the President of the Associated Students upon presentation of a petition signed by twenty (20) per cent of the active members of the Associated Students.

Section III. Advisory Commission.

a. The organizational meeting shall be called by the President of the Associated Students no later than the sixth week of instruction of the Fall Quarter.

b. Meetings may be called by the President of the Associated Students.

c. Meetings may be called by the President of the California State Polytechnic College.

d. A meeting must be held within one week after referral of any matter to the commission for action as designated in Article V, Section I.

ARTICLE VIII

Recall

Section I. The provisions of this article shall pertain to positions filled by vote of the Student

Body and/or positions requiring the approval of the Student Affairs Council.

Section II. Elected Officers

a. Any elected officer may be subject to recall upon the presentation of a petition at a meeting of the Associated Students if said petition is signed by thirty (30) per cent of the active members of the Associated Students.

b. The petition shall then be referred to a vote by ballot of the members of the Associated Students within two weeks. Such an election shall be held under the provisions of Article IV, of the By-Laws.

c. A two-thirds majority of the votes cast shall be affirmative to recall.

ARTICLE IX

Referendum

Section I. Procedure

a. On petition of thirty-five (35) per cent of the members of the Associated Students, any official act of the Student Affairs Council must be submitted to a vote of the members of the Associated Students.

b. To be effective, such a petition must be filed within two weeks after the announcement of the action.

c. The President shall then call a special meeting of the Associated Students, at which meeting the question shall be openly discussed and a date set for election, not less than one week nor more than two weeks, from the day of the meeting. Such an election shall be held under the provisions of Article IV, of the By-Laws.

d. A two-thirds majority of the votes cast shall be affirmative to effect a referendum.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

Section I. Procedure

a. The proposed amendment must be initiated by either of the following two methods:

1. It shall be signed by at least twenty (20) per cent of the active members of the Associated Students and handed to the Student Affairs Council through the secretary of the Associated Students.

2. It shall be recommended, upon two-thirds majority vote approval, by the Student Affairs Council.

b. The date of the filing of the petition and notices of the election, with a full statement of the amendment, shall be posted conspicuously and shall be run in the columns of the paper of the Associated Students for one week previous to the election.

c. Voting shall be by secret ballot, and a favorable vote of two-thirds of those voting shall be necessary to pass the amendment. Such an election shall be held under the provisions of Article IV, of the By-Laws.

d. The amendment is to take effect immediately upon passage by the required majority, unless a different time be specified on the ballot.

ARTICLE XI

Administrative Review

Section I. All regulations and procedures outlined in the A.S.B. Constitution, By-laws and codes, as well as constitutions and by-laws of other groups, and the amendments thereto, shall be subject to review by the President of California State Polytechnic College.

ARTICLE I

Section I. (Not included.)

Section II. Associate

a. Admission to all student body sponsored activities, including athletic contests, music activities, and social functions, free or at reduced rates as prescribed by the Student Affairs Council. (Rates subject to federal tax, if any.)

b. Participation as advisors

and/or members on all Associated Student Body councils, boards, and committees provided for in the Constitution and By-laws or created by the Student Affairs Council.

c. One copy of the yearly publication, El Hodeo, free or at a reduced rate as prescribed by the Student Affairs Council.

d. Subscription to the weekly publication, El Mustang.

e. Such additional privileges as may be prescribed by the Student Affairs Council or as otherwise designated in the Constitution or By-laws.

ARTICLE II

Dues

Section I. Establishment, Collection, Administration

a. Upon the favorable vote of two-thirds of the students voting in an Associated Student Body election a membership fee shall be established which shall be required of all students.

b. This required fee may be subject to referendum upon the presentation of a petition containing the signatures of thirty-five (35) per cent of the Associated Student Body to the Student Affairs Council through the Associated Student Body Secretary.

c. The annual student body active membership fee may not exceed twenty dollars (\$20).

d. The annual student body associate membership fee shall be established by the Student Affairs Council.

e. Active membership fees shall be collected by the College officials during quarterly registration, and transmitted to the Graduate Manager for deposit to the account of the Associated Student Body.

Section II. Authority

a. All provisions of this article are set forth in the Education code of the State of California, Sections 80845.6, 80845.6, and 80845.7 which shall be incorporated in full in the Associated Student Body code pertaining to finances.

Duties and Qualifications of Officers

Section III. Vice-President

a. Shall act as substitute for the President of the Associated Students in case of absence or disability of the President.

b. Shall be the Chairman of the Inter-Department Council.

c. Shall be the Chairman of the Inter-Club Council.

d. Shall be chairman of the A.S.B. Election Committee.

e. Shall be chairman of the constitution and code committee.

f. Shall be parliamentarian for the Associated Students and for the Student Affairs Council.

g. Shall act as an executive to the president in carrying out his duties.

h. In case of the resignation of the Vice President or his inability to fill his office, the President with a two-thirds vote of approval of the Student Affairs Council shall appoint a Vice-President pro-tem who shall serve only until the earliest possible time that a special election can be held to fill the vacancy.

Section III. Secretary

a. Shall be Secretary of the Student Affairs Council.

b. Shall keep a record of the meetings of the Associated Students and of the Student Affairs Council and shall cause the minutes of such meetings to be filed in a safe and permanent place.

c. Shall keep a roll of the membership of the Student Affairs Council, and shall notify the members of meetings.

d. Shall notify officers and shall keep a roll of the members of councils, Boards, and Committees of their election or appointment.

e. Shall keep a current list of the officers of all councils, boards, committees and other college organizations.

f. Shall keep in a safe and permanent place the original copy of the Constitution, By laws, and codes and cause any amendments thereto to be officially recorded.

g. Shall notify members of special meetings of the Associated Student Body.

h. Shall post the minutes of the regular Student Affairs Council meetings within five days after a meeting in at two prominent places on the campus.

i. Shall post the minutes of the meetings of the Associated Students within one week after a meeting in at least two prominent places on campus.

j. In case of the resignation of the Secretary or his inability to fill the office, the President with a two thirds vote of approval of the Student Affairs Council shall

appoint a secretary pro-tem who shall fill the vacancy.

Section IV. Qualifications of President, Vice-President, and Secretary

a. Shall be upper classmen during their term of office; i.e., shall have completed at least ninety (90) units of collegiate study and shall not graduate during the term of office.

b. Shall carry at least twelve units (12) each quarter during the term of office.

c. Shall have an accumulative grade point average of 1.0 or above in academic work taken at this and/or any other college at the time of nomination.

d. Shall have been in regular attendance at the California State Polytechnic College at San Luis Obispo for at least two consecutive quarters prior to nomination.

e. Shall hold active membership in the Associated Students.

Section V. Qualifications of other officers.

a. Elected and appointed officers of recognized Associated Student Body councils, boards, committees, and all other organizations except as enumerated in Article III, Section IV, of these By Laws shall have an accumulative grade point average of 1.0 or above in academic work taken at this and/or any other college at the time of nomination or appointment.

b. Special consideration may be granted by joint action of the Student Affairs Council, the Dean of Students, and the student's advisor, except that no one is eligible with an accumulative grade point average below 0.60.

c. The provisions of this section shall be considered as minimum standards only. Organizations may set higher standards.

ARTICLE IV

Elections

Section 1. Election Committee

a. The Election Committee shall be a standing committee of the Student Affairs Council, organized as

provided for in Article X, Section III, of the By Laws.

b. An election shall be considered official upon the acceptance by the Student Affairs Council of the Election Committee's report.

Section 11. Voting

a. The preferential voting system shall be used in electing all Associated Student Body Officers, as provided for in the code pertaining thereto.

b. A simple secret ballot shall be used in voting on all other matters pertaining to the Associated Student Body, where the choice is a simple "Yes" or "No."

Section III. General Spring Election

a. The general election of the officers of the Associated Students shall be held during the hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on a Tuesday and during the hours of 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on the following Wednesday of the third, fourth, or fifth week of instruction in each Spring Quarter, the actual date to be set by the Election Committee and approved by the Student Affairs Council.

b. Constitutional amendments, referenda, recalls or such other matters as shall be properly presented shall be included on the ballot.

c. Nominations for the elective offices of the Associated Students shall open three weeks prior to the opening date of the election and close ten days prior to the opening date of the election.

d. An active membership card in the Associated Student Body shall be presented as evidence of registration at the time of voting.

e. A candidate must receive a majority of the votes cast for the office for which he is running in order to be elected.

Section IV. Special elections.
a. Special elections may be held for the following reasons at any time specified by the Student Affairs Council which conforms to the requirements assuring sufficient time for publicity, as provided in Articles IX and X of the Constitution.

1. To fill a vacancy in the offices of Vice-President or Secretary of the Associated Student Body, occurring as provided for in Article III, Sections II and III of these By Laws.

2. To vote upon constitutional amendments, referenda, recalls, or such other matters as shall be properly presented.

b. The Election Committee may, with the two-thirds approval of the Student Affairs Council establish rules for the conduct of any special election.

c. A candidate must receive a majority of the votes cast for the office for which he is running in order to be elected.

Section V. Records of elections.
a. The ballots and any other records of any Associated Student Body election shall be kept in a safe place for a period of two weeks after the election.

b. Any person wishing to contest the official results of the election must do so within a period of two weeks after the election.

ARTICLE V
Student Affairs Council
Section I. Duties and Powers

Shall establish standing rules for the conduct of the business of the Student Affairs Council.

ARTICLE VI
Advisory Commission

Section I. Appointed and Elections
a. The members will be elected or appointed annually to take office at the organizational meeting held no later than the sixth week of instruction of the fall quarter.

Section II. Officers
a. The officers shall consist of a chairman and a secretary to be elected by the Advisory Commission from among its membership.

Section III. Duties and powers
a. Shall act in an advisory or recommending capacity on all mat-

ters referred to the Commission.
1. Shall report any action taken to the originating body with recommendations.

2. May recommend that the matter be referred to the President of the California State Polytechnic College.

b. Shall act as interpreting agent for the Constitution, By Laws, and all codes

ARTICLE VII
Graduate Manager
Section II. Duties of the Graduate Manager

a. Shall assist the Finance Committee in the preparation of the annual budget of the Associated Students for the Student Affairs Council.

b. Shall act as fiscal officer and business manager of the Associated Students.

c. Shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that the provisions of the code pertaining to finances are carried out.

d. Shall be an ex-officio member of the Student Affairs Council and the Board of Athletic Control.

ARTICLE VIII
Boards

Section I.
a. A board shall be established with an appropriate code for each of the following Associated Student Body activities receiving direct appropriation from funds of the Associated Students:

1. Athletics
2. Music
3. Publications and publicity
4. Poly Royal
5. College Union

b. In requesting funds each board shall conform to the provisions of the Finance code pertaining to such matters.

c. Each board shall be responsible to the Student Affairs Council and shall prepare reports as requested.

d. In the event any act of a board is vetoed by its faculty advisor, the matter shall be referred to the Advisory Commission for recommendations.

e. Officers.
1. The student Chairman of each board who shall also be the representative to the Student Affairs Council.

2. The Faculty advisor.

3. Other officers as provided

f. Meetings.
1. Each board shall elect and in the codes pertaining thereto, recommend to the Student Affairs Council for its approval of candidates for the chairmanship of the board during the next year. Such candidates shall be elected at a meeting held not later than the eighth week of instruction of each Spring Quarter.

2. Meetings may be called by

the chairman or the advisor.

Section III. Board of Music Control

a. Membership

1. Student

(a) Student Chairman selected by the board and approved by the Student Affairs Council.

(b) One representative elected by each established organization within the Music Department

(c) One student at large appointed by the President of the Associated Student Body.

2. Faculty, one of whom shall be elected by the board as its advisor.

(a) The head of the music department.

(b) One faculty member at large appointed by the President of California State Polytechnic College.

b. All members shall be voting members except the faculty advisor, who shall have veto power.

c. The board shall be responsible for the funds allotted to it.

d. The board shall be responsible for the general policies concerning the music activities.

Section VI Board of College Union Control

a. Membership

1. Student

(a) Student chairman to be selected by the Board and approved by SAC.

(b) Student Secretary to be selected by the Board.

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or P.O. Box 983

(c) Student Treasurer to be selected by the Board.

(d) The chairman of each recognized Activity Committee (See Code for recognized activity committees.)

(e) Six members at large (student directors).

(1) Chosen by application submitted to the board. (See Code for qualifications, term of office, etc.

2. Faculty or Administration.

(a) The College President or his appointed representative.

(b) Union Director, who shall be Advisor.

(c) Social Director of the Union.

(d) One member chosen by the Board from the faculty.

3. Alumni

(a) One alumnus who shall

be the President of the Alumni Association or his appointed representative.

b. Voting

1. All members shall be voting members except the Union director who shall have veto power.

c. The Board shall control funds allotted to it.

d. The Board shall be responsible for conducting the College Union program at the San Luis Obispo campus. (See Code for specific responsibilities.)

ARTICLE IX
Councils

Section I. Inter-Department Council

a. An Inter-Department Council shall be established, whose function shall be to act as a coordination

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Colts Battle To Tie Bulldogs 12-12 In Season Opener

Battling the powerful and experienced Cal Poly Colts, a green Hancock College eleven fought to a 12-12 standstill last Friday night.

Fielding their first team in many a year, the Hancock Bulldogs found the going rough against the seasoned Colts. Behind the star-studded throwing of Quarterback Don Tucker, the Colts gained 132 yards in the air on 23 attempts with 13 completions. With such halfbacks as Hill Rohrer and Tom Kennedy eating up yardage they gained 110 yards on the ground.

In the second quarter of play, Hancock took the lead when Tucker's pass was intercepted by Bulldog end, Cooper who romped 70 yards for a TD. The conversion attempt was wide and the score remained Hancock Bulldogs 6, Cal Poly Colts 0, ending the first half of play.

The Colts countered in the third period when Bob Bolinger's ill-manned passing drive sparked by

quarterback Don Tucker by taking a pitchout and skirting right end for a 14-yard TD tying the score.

With three minutes of play remaining in the third quarter, an alert Colt recovered a Bulldog fumble and it looked like they would score again. However, Hancock recovered the ball a few plays later and moved 45 yards on a pass play. Then followed another pass and Hancock scored again. The conversion attempt failed and the score stood Hancock 12, Cal Poly Colts 6, ending the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter left end Bill Moore hauled in a pass from Tucker and scampered 70 yards before he was brought down on the Bulldog 10 yard line. Halfback Tom Kennedy went the rest of the way on a handoff from Tucker. The conversion attempt was blocked and as the final gun sounded the final score was Hancock College 12, Cal Poly Colts 12.

Number 18 proved unlucky for the Mustangs when they opened their 1954 grid season against the San Diego Marines. The Hughesmen were riding high but after 60 minutes of play were shown even the best of teams can be beaten.

The Mustang fighting eleven outran the Devil Dogs of San Diego but the final score saw the Green and Gold on the short end, 23-3. The combined tosses of Bobby Neal and Jerry Duncan gained 155 yards to the Marines 50, but the Scarlet and Gold Leathernecks took the rushing yardage 140 yards to 114.

Actually, Poly lost the game on their fumbles, five in all, which were muffed in dangerous territory.

Following their loss to the Marines, LeRoy Hughes took his men to Salem, Oregon where they met the Bearcats of Willamette. After

being run over the year before, 55-7, the Bearcats gave the Mustangs a bitter fight but the Green and Gold came home with their first win of the season 19-13.

Murrin and Jeter were the high men in the individual rushing with totals of 68 and 58 yards respectively. The Bearcats equaled the first downs of the Mustangs with 11 each.

10th of the month for which the certification is being made.

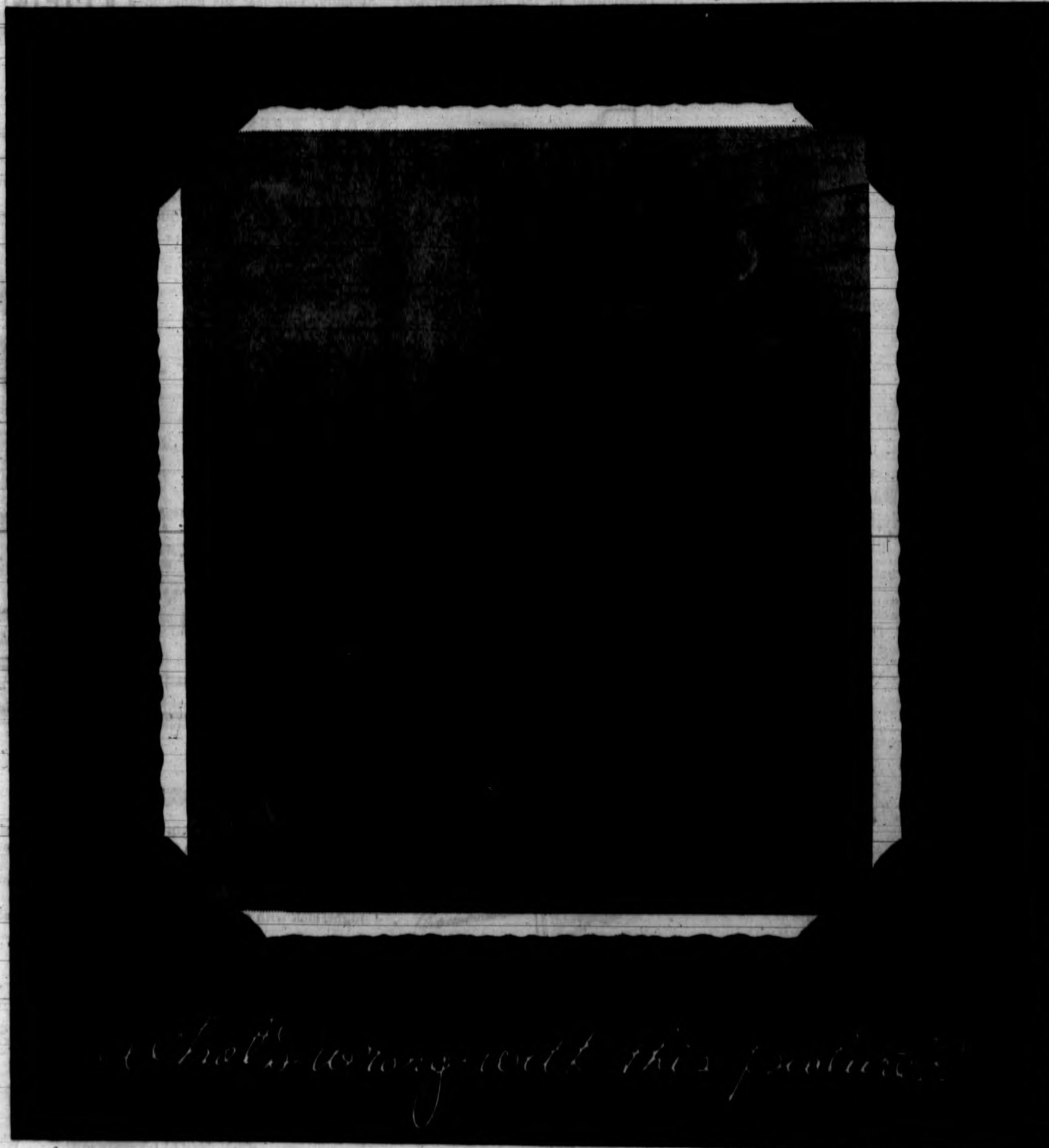
Deadline date for adding courses was Sept. 28. It is possible, however, to drop courses without a penalty until Oct. 14. The student is required to process a "change in program" permit in order to accomplish this.

After the three week period, (Oct. 12) a "withdrawal from course" form must be processed. The instructor will assign a "W" grade unless the student is failing the course. In such case, an "F"

grade will be assigned.

Students are reminded that no grade can be recorded for a course that does not appear on their study list.

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El Mustang

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YOU FRESHMAN . . . you're on your way . . . registration, seemingly endless waiting lines, billfold stripping and the beginning days of college life are now old stuff and ready for that first big letter of which Mom and Dad are so anxiously awaiting.

You're filled with welcoming speeches, ready smiles from old-timers and probably well-informed on the town's female situation. And you should know by now that the friendly greeting "Hi" is pretty indispensable around Cal Poly. It's sorta like food for the hungry . . . it makes you tick when Sue doesn't write as expected . . . when things don't go just the way you'd like.

The little word with a lot of meaning also tells you the Green and Gold's smiling welcome mat is ever-standing and not only for a few to dust their feet on but for each of you. We're on the subject of Cal Poly so let's talk history for a bit . . . Poly's history, as you have probably read in the catalog, isn't too old; not as most colleges go.

Opening its doors for the first time back in 1901, classes were first taught on the state vocational high school level and was soon the forerunner in California of vocational education in agriculture and industry. When 1927 rolled around, it was changed to junior college standing.

Growth was continuous and in 1933 the change was made from a junior college to a two-year and three-year technical college. In 1936 a degree-transfer program was added and in 1940, a full step was taken with the State Board of Education authorizing the college to grant the bachelor of science degree for completion of the four-year curriculum. Two years later the first baccalaureate exercises were held.

As the history reads, Cal Poly gave skills and methods courses for agriculture teacher candidates in cooperation with the University of California for 16 years. Then in 1946, a fifth year of instruction was added.

The march of progress continued and in 1948 the college was approved for offering teaching credentials in any of the following majors: social studies, mathematics, physical science and general science, life science, agriculture and physical education.

The master of arts approval was soon to follow. In 1949 the college was approved to grant the master of arts degree with concentrations in agriculture, biological science, mathematics, health and physical education, physical science and social science.

Since then the marching of progress has not slowed. Not even during the summer months when enrollment figures as high as 700 students have been recorded. With the current Fall quarter's enrolling figure at a near 2700 students, that figure is expected to soar even higher in nearing years when those real, live, walking dolls register for Cal Poly courses.

No, Cal Poly's history isn't to be considered old as most colleges go. But how would you compare its growth with others? Perhaps we shouldn't even try. At least not until you've had time to get into the spirit and find out just what this method of "learn-by-doing" is all about.

Graduate Program Has New Advisor

Giving added stature to Cal Poly's rapidly growing graduate program, President Julian A. McPhee has announced that with the start of the fall quarter Dr. Arthur G. Butsach is coordinator of graduate studies and will have charge of the graduate program.

As coordinator, Dr. Butsach will direct the admission of graduate students and will assist departments in maintaining graduate programs which are in keeping with the Cal Poly philosophy. He will continue to devote the greater portion of his time to instruction in the education department.

In 1949, Cal Poly was authorized by the state board of education to begin granting the master of arts degree with concentrations in agriculture, biological science, mathematics, health and physical education, physical science, and social science. Since then, an even 60 graduate students have earned the degree — 14 of them having completed their work the past summer. First M.A. from Poly was granted in 1951.

Dr. Butsach, member of the education and psychology faculty since 1950, has his doctor of education degree from Stanford university and Sacramento state college, and was a teacher and later principal at Lower Lake union high school. He has been working closely with the teacher training program since coming to Cal Poly.

ting body between the groups represented by its membership and the Student Affairs Council.

b. Membership

1. Student

(a) A Chairman who shall be the Vice-President of the Associated Student Body.

(b) The president or elected representative of each recognized department club.

2. Faculty

(a) One faculty member at large, elected by the council.

c. Duties

1. To elect from its membership to the Student Affairs Council one representative from each division.

2. To elect from its membership to the Advisory Commission one representative.

Section II. Inter-Club Council.

a. An Inter-Club Council shall be established, whose function shall be to act as a coordinating body between the groups represented by its membership and the Student Affairs Council.

b. Membership

1. Student

(a) A Chairman who shall be the Vice-President of the Associated Students.

(b) The president or elected representative of each recognized social club and society.

2. Faculty

(a) One faculty member at large elected by the Council.

c. Duties

1. To elect from its membership one representative to the Student Affairs Council for each eight, or part thereof, recognized club or societies.

2. To elect from its membership to the Advisory Commission one representative.

Section III. Officers

a. Chairman

1. The vice-president of the Associated Body shall be chairman of both councils.

b. Secretary

1. The secretary shall be elected by each council from its membership.

Section IV. Meetings

a. Meetings may be called by the vice-president of the Associated Students, who shall designate the time and place.

ARTICLE X

Standing Committees

Section I. Rally Committee

a. Membership

1. Chairman selected by the Student Affairs Council.

2. Forty two members recommended by the chairman of the Rally Committee and approved by the Student Affairs Council.

3. One faculty advisor appointed by the President of the California State Polytechnic College.

b. The committee shall be responsible for promoting school spirit and shall assist in conducting student activities.

c. The committee shall select the yell leaders through an Associated Student Body election.

d. The committee shall be responsible to the Student Affairs Council.

e. Meetings shall be called by the chairman.

f. The committee shall be provided with appropriate insignia and equipment by the Student Affairs Council.

g. The Committee shall operate under a code, formed according to the provisions of the code pertaining thereto.

Section II. Award Committee

a. Membership

1. The Secretary of the Associated Students shall be chairman.

2. Four members, two each from Junior and senior classes, recommended by the chairman and approved by the Student Affairs Council.

b. The committee shall be responsible for evaluation of student activity points.

c. The committee shall recommend to the Student Affairs Council the award of an activity key and certificate to meritorious students.

d. Meetings shall be called by the chairman.

e. All records shall be securely kept in the custody of the activities officer.

f. The committee shall operate under a code formed according to the provisions of the code pertaining thereto.

Section III. Election Committee

a. Membership

1. The Vice-President of the Associated Students shall be the Chairman.

2. Nine student members appointed by the Vice President and approved by the Student Affairs

Council.

b. The committee shall be responsible for conducting all elections of the Associated Student Body as provided for in Article IV of these By-Laws and the code pertaining thereto.

c. The Committee shall report the result of each election to the Student Affairs Council and these results shall not be announced until declared official by the Student Affairs Council.

d. Meetings shall be called by the Chairman.

ARTICLE XI

Amendments

Section I. Procedure

a. The proposed amendment must be initiated by either of the following two methods:

1. It may be signed by at least twenty (20) per cent of the active members of the Associated Students and handed to the Student Affairs Council through the Secretary of the Associated Students.

2. It may be recommended, upon two-thirds majority vote approval, by the Student Affairs Council.

b. The date of the filing of the petition and notices of the election, with a full statement of this amendment, shall be posted conspicuously and shall be run in the columns of the paper of the Associated Students for one week previous to the election.

SPECIAL RATES

To Students and Faculty

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c. Voting shall be by secret ballot, and a favorable majority vote of those voting shall be necessary to pass the amendment. Such an election shall be held under the provisions of Article IV of these By-Laws.

d. The amendment is to take effect immediately upon passage by the required majority, unless a different time shall be specified on the ballot.

ARTICLE XIII

Activities Code

Section I. Purpose

a. In order to provide a means for recording the specific regulations of any student activity, the Student Affairs Council shall initiate activity codes which shall be a part of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Associated Students.

b. Such codes shall be drawn up or amended in accordance with the

provisions of the code established for the purpose.

Section II. Operation

a. With the approval of the Student Affairs Council, any organization may draw up regulations or amend its regulations governing its operations and policies, provided they are not in conflict with the Constitution or By-Laws, of the Associated Student Body.

b. Such regulations shall be drawn up or amended in accordance with the provisions of the code established for the purpose.

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
