

## Poly Royal Plans Aired; Long Beach Gets Queen Bid

It's in the air again. Everbody's talking about it. Cal Poly's annual Poly Royal; the event of the school year. You name it and Poly Royal has it: beautiful girls, the Coronation Ball, carnival dance, western dance, a queen and princesses, rodeo, livestock judging, athletics, carnival, a flower show, and dozens of "country fair" exhibits.

Right now the Poly Royal board is concerned with bids for the Coronation Ball, the Queen's Assembly, and the royal escorts.

First pre-Poly Royal event is; the Queen will be chosen from Long Beach State College. Two other Long Beach girls will be her princesses. One girl from San Luis Obispo high school and one from the junior college will also act as princesses.

The student body of Long Beach State will choose fifteen contestants to run for queen. Out of this 15, a Poly Royal Committee will choose three. From these three, the Cal Poly student body will select a queen. Also this committee will pick three girls from the local high school and three from the local junior college. Out of each group of three, the Cal Poly student body will select one to act as a princess. The voting will be done at the Nov. 18 assembly by secret ballot.

## Students Building Problem Solver

An electronic computer is being built as a senior project in the electronic department. The D.C. Analog computer is in construction by David Candon, Glenn Kinzer, Phil Rich, Walt Ross and Frank Rossi.

"With the use of a D.C. Analog computer mechanical, electrical, or acoustical analogies can be simulated on the computer and the actions of these systems studied on an oscilloscope," says Phil Rich.

"The construction is supervised by Clarence Radius, head of the Electronic and Radio engineering department," relates David Candon. "The cost of a commercial computer of this type would cost approximately \$7,000. This equipment is expected to be constructed by next June."

When finished the machine will be six feet tall and two feet wide. It will be built and sheltered in the electronic department's building and will be available to all departments who wish to use it.

This is a very popular device which is used in the analysis of any problem which can be written as a differential equation; such as the analysis of vibration in aircraft engine design.

## McMurry Beats Poly 49-14; Fresno Next Foe, Nov. 6

Fully recovered from Saturday night's 49-14 thumping at the hands of the McMurry Indians, Coach LeRoy Hughes is concentrating his Green and Gold grid machine on practice efforts in preparation for the Fresno tilt to be played Nov. 6.

After romping over four straight opponents, the Mustangs bogged down in losing to a strong McMurry eleven. Starting McMurry tailback Bill Atkins was outstanding as he scored three touchdowns for the Indians and led in rushing with 117 yards in 11 carries.

The heralded duel between elusive halfback Perry Jeter and McMurry fullback Elroy Payne failed to materialize as Payne was unable to uncork any of his running ability and was held to a measly 55 yards by the Mustang defense.

On the other hand, Mustang ace Perry Jeter chewed up 103 yards in 15 carries. The flashy half scored Poly's first touchdown in the third period of play as he put together runs of 41 and 35 yards to scamper all the way for the score. Jeter played a good defensive game, Hard charging fullback, Curt Reade was the second highest Mustang ground gainer as he picked up 38 yards on six carries from scrimmage.

## Journalists Plan Farm Bureau Trip

Typifying a part of their practical experience training program, a six-man crew from Poly's agricultural journalism department has been selected to help with coverage of the thirty-sixth annual California Farm Bureau Federation convention in Long Beach, Nov. 7-11. The team plans to leave Nov. 5.

This is the third consecutive year the department has been chosen to assist the regular CFBF convention staff.

Ken Kitch, head of the agricultural journalism department, has chosen Bill Mead, a senior, San Luis Obispo; Vern Highley, junior, Holtville; Dick Van Brackle, sophomore, Napa; Bill Long, junior, Cupertino; and Bob Flood, sophomore, Paso Robles; and George Hunter, senior, San Luis Obispo.

Each crew member will be judged according to an evaluation sheet prepared by a CFBF committee. And the member who is determined to have turned in the best all-around job will be taken on the CFBF's special train to the national convention at New York early in December.

With more than 60,000 farm families as members, the CFBF is California's largest farm organization. Cotton acreage allotments, use of diverted acres, the nation's farm program, schools and taxes are among the subjects scheduled for consideration.

The team's participation will consist mostly of meetings, photography and varied feature coverage.

The \$500 scholarship is awarded annually to a Cal Poly student with a serious interest in the poultry industry. The award is made on the basis of merit with academic record, leadership and interest in poultry industry activities.

Two Cal Poly judging teams, both recent winners at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition held at Portland, Oregon, are entered in competition in San Francisco's Cow Palace Saturday (Oct. 30) during the Grand National Livestock Exposition.

Entered in intercollegiate dairy cattle judging is a team composed of Jack Dei of Sebastopol, Norman Gomes of Hanford, Louis Sonka of Lemon Grove and Paul Spitzer of San Bernardino. The team is coached by Russell Nelson.

Vince Kennedy of San Mateo, Warren Vander Hule of Petaluma, Gordon Dick of Santa Rosa, Jerry Biggs of Sacramento, William Corkill of Fallon, Nev., and Roy Fellows of Salinas will make up the livestock judging team. Dick Johnson is coach.

Collegiate competition is expected from Utah State, Washington State, Oregon State, Fresno State, California Aggies, Brigham Young, Nevada and Arizona.

Both the livestock and dairy cattle judging teams won top honors at the Portland show last week. The dairy cattle judging team scored 4199 points out of a possible 4500 to tally one of the highest scores in the history of the Portland event.

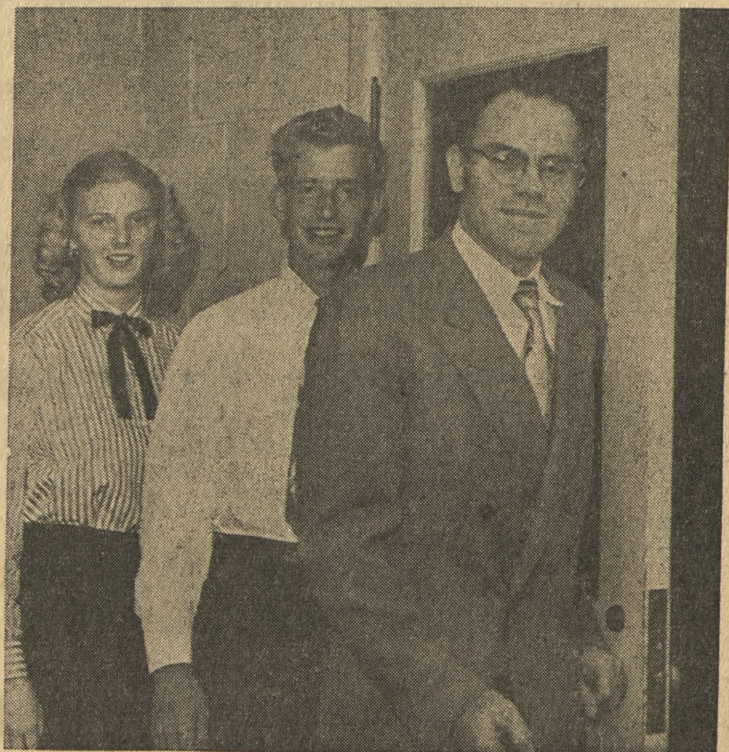

Cal Poly's soccer team placed themselves back in the league standing last week as they fought to two victories—one over Pomona 2 to 0, and the other over the USC Trojans 2 to 1. Tomorrow the Green and Gold squad plays host to Cal Tech at 11 p.m. on the practice football field.

Cal Poly, fighting hard for their well deserved victories, now has a league record of two wins and one loss. Soccer enthusiasts are hoping that tomorrow's game with Cal Tech will draw a large crowd of Poly rooters.

At this point of the season the UCLA Bruins seem to be the strongest team. However, the Bruins defeated USC by only one point in a recent practice match. Poly also defeated the Trojans by one point, yet lost by a big margin to UCLA at the beginning of the season.

In Poly's 2 to 0 win over Pomona, left wing forward Roberto Mombela scored his goal half way through the first half as Cal Poly held a 1 to 0 lead at the halftime.

Although both teams played on even terms throughout the first half, Poly took control of the second half, holding the home team scoreless and adding a point of their own when Andronicou tallied about midway through the quarter. Both squads had one goal called back because of a penalty.

Poly outplayed USC throughout the first half but failed to score. USC scored early in the first half and led at halftime by a 1 to 0 margin.

Cal Poly came fighting back and opened the second period with a goal by William Morgan that tied

the score. The remainder of the game was hard fought but evenly played until Andronicou scored with seven minutes left.

With four minutes left in the game the Trojans had a chance to tie the score when they were given a shot from twenty yards out following a Poly foul. The attempt was no good.

Unanimous Vote Of Confidence

Helped on its way by a unanimous vote of confidence from the S.A.C., a typical "Poly-minded" proposal is expected to be presented to Cal Poly's student body within the next few weeks—aimed at converting the campus weekly newspaper, "El Mustang", into a Foundation project.

The S.A.C.'s action at its meeting Tuesday evening gave supporters of the proposal an opportunity to present 'facts-and-figures' to the students at large prior to a probable setting of an election date at this coming week's S.A.C. meeting.

John Reid, chairman of the Publications Board of Control, and one of the group which has spent more than a year developing and testing the plan, explains the proposal this way:

"Cal Poly is a learn-by-doing college. That's why most of us are here. And one of the features that has enabled Cal Poly to be that kind of a practical institution has been its Foundation, which lends financial counsel and guidance to student-operated projects.

"All that we would like to do is see the financial supervision changed from the S.A.C. to the Foundation under a plan which establishes 'El Mustang' on a professional newspaper basis. Essentially, there would be no other difference except that we believe we could put out a consistently better newspaper and allow the students who spend long hours on the staff to share in some of the profits."

In making his presentation to the SAC, Reid pointed out that if the Foundation plan is approved, the set-up would include guarantees that:

1. Except for Poly Royal and one other special issue each year, editorial space will average at least 50% (the same as now).
2. The paper will be available at no cost to all students, faculty and staff.
3. The paper will continue to follow its already-established publication dates.
4. The primary editorial policy shall be to give the widest possible campus coverage, and control of editorial policy will remain, essentially, as it is now.

Urging favorable consideration of the expected proposal, Dick Van Brackle, editor of the paper, pointed out that operation of "El Mustang" does not cost the student government "a single penny."

"We have developed the newspaper," he said, "to the place where it is entirely self-supporting. Profits are rather small, compared to other publications of a similar professional size, but, frankly, the men who spend a great many hours per week producing the paper would appreciate an opportunity to share in a small way in some of these profits—similarly to students in other projects.

"Most of us hold outside jobs. If we can secure a measure of help through out work on the paper, we can cut down the amount of outside work we need to do and can give more time to putting out a better paper for a campus that deserves the very best newspaper we can produce."

A part of the agreement would be that, as in other Foundation projects, no student who received monetary compensation would receive academic credit.

In answer to a question posed at the S.A.C. meeting, preliminary to the vote of confidence, Reid stressed that "since the newspaper would continue to be published by and for students and since the success of any newspaper depends on the support of its readers, under the Foundation Project plan, 'El Mustang' would have an even more sensitive ear to all phases of student opinion than it does now."

He pointed out that the current plan operates as though the San Luis Obispo Telegram-Tribune were operated by the city council. Again, he said, the Foundation Project plan would put "El Mustang" on a "really professional basis."

Staff positions, as now, would be open to any qualified student.

"El Rodeo," the yearbook, and other publications are not included in the plan.

A definite date for the election is expected to be set at the next SAC meeting, Nov. 2. Details of the proposal are now posted on the SAC bulletin board, available for inspection.

On the basis of more than a year of planning and testing, and with the belief that operation of the newspaper under the financial supervision of the Cal Poly Foundation is wholesomely in line with Cal Poly's tradition, we urge your favorable vote in the forthcoming election.

Poly's Pulse

The board of publication's request for the approval of the SAC to grant a special student body election was discussed at the council meeting this week, with a vote of confidence being given the board.

In general terms the proposal asks for student body sanction in allowing "El Mustang" to negotiate with the college foundation in establishing the weekly newspaper as a student project.

"El Mustang" representatives believe that the adoption of this policy would provide a more realistic learning situation. They also stressed that they would probably be in a position to serve the college with a better newspaper through the support of the foundation. Increased income could be used for mats, cartoons, and salaries for certain key staff members.

If this proposal receives the "OK" of the student body and is accepted by the foundation, "El Mustang" guarantees that: (1) Except for the Poly Royal and one other special issue each year, editorial-news space shall average at least 50 percent. (2) The paper will be available at no extra cost to all students, faculty, and staff. (3) The paper will continue to follow its already established publication dates. (4) The primary editorial policy shall be to give the widest possible campus coverage.

Possible opposition to the proposal may claim that the newspaper would no longer be under the control of the student body, and that a portion of the profit, if any, made by the newspaper would not be returned to the ASB fund but to the foundation as project income.

What is your opinion of the requirement that rooters' hats must be worn to sit in the rooting section at athletic events?
