Competition is open to all high school seniors with a limit of three from each school. Each contestant, whether a winner or not, receives a certificate suitable for framing signed by President Julian A. McPhee and Dr. Milo Whitson, head of the Cal Poly mathematics department.

## Philippine Visitor On Campus Today

On campus today is Miguel Ocampo, superintendent of the Masbate National Agricultural school in Manila, Philippines.

Ocampo is in the United States on an exchange program sponsored by the Foreign Operations Administration and the Office of Education.

"There is a need for more information in the fields of irrigation, soil conservation, vegetable production and the improvements of various breeds of cattle in the Philippines," says Ocampo.

The superintendent has been in this country for the past six months, visiting Virginia Polytechnic Institute and state agricultural offices in North Carolina, Florida, and Texas.

Ocampo is enroute home to the Philippines and his grant has been extended so that he may visit Cal Poly.

While in this area he will tour the campus, visit classes, schools, local Philippine leaders, and special meetings to discuss irrigation and soil conservation.

Ocampo will leave the United States Saturday, March 12 for his trip back home to the Philippines.

## 25 Year Practice Pays Off In Increased Demands

Poly hatching eggs are wanted state wide and seven in adjacent states as a result of 25 years of careful record keeping and culling of poultry started by Richard Leach, poultry department head, since 1930.

It requires a full eight hours by Minnie Sleeter, Poly hatching egg recorder, to check the 1600 birds of Poly hatchery stock four times per day and tabulate the number of eggs laid by each hen. The size of the eggs, quality, and percentage of lay is kept on a separate record for each hen. The card also includes the pedigree of each hen.

When the better hens are picked as breeding stock, they are put in pens of five which includes one cockerel and are called a family. The hatches of these families will replace some of the 1600 and be used as hatchery egg producers. All of these chickens are projects of poultry majors and, except for the gathering and recording of eggs, the students take complete care of the birds.

The hatching eggs are sold to large hatcheries, such as Mc Keen Hatchery of San Luis Obispo. Also many former Poly students that are getting starts in poultry order hatching eggs from the department at Poly.

The eating eggs produced by the poultry department are used in the cafeteria, sold through the student store and other outlets.

## Pre-Scheduling Saturday Says Deans Committee

Spring quarter pre-scheduling planning meetings will be held on March 10, 1955, 11 a.m. to noon, to give all students and advisers an opportunity to make arrangements for pre-scheduling day, Sat., March 12, the instructional deans committee announced today. Advisers will distribute and explain the use of scheduling materials at the March 10 meeting, including the official "white pre-scheduling card."

The following is from information received from the instructional deans committee on pre-scheduling:

This card must be used by students to report their spring quarter program and obtain course and section approval before completion of the regular spring quarter registration forms which will be given to students in the registration line on March 28.

Students who fail to attend the March 10 pre-scheduling meeting will obtain their white pre-scheduling card from the Recorder's Office upon presentation of either a receipt for the payment of the regular \$2 fee for failure to meet an administrative appointment or an excuse which will be obtained from their division dean.

Summer quarter pre-scheduling sign-up sheets will be issued to students at the March 10 meeting. Instructions for spring quarter pre-scheduling and registration, including the time and place for all meetings, will be sent to each student through the college post office and to advisers through their departments.

### Sign When Completed

The adviser will sign the student's white pre-scheduling card as it is satisfactorily completed. In some cases this step may be completed on March 10 while others may find it necessary to complete this step on Sat., March 12.

After obtaining the adviser's signature, the student will sign up for class sections with the department and then return the white pre-scheduling card to his adviser, who will re-issue it to the student on March 28, Registration Day.

Every class and section sign-up must be acknowledged in the space provided on the card, but the student will not be permitted to sign up for sections until he has obtained his adviser's signature on the white pre-scheduling card.

### Avoid Congestion

On pre-scheduling day, Sat., March 12, students should report as scheduled to avoid congestion and waiting.

Students having Saturday classes or who are engaged in a college activity on that day should obtain a note from the staff member in charge if the student desires to appear at a time other than as scheduled.

Students who fail to sign into sections on Sat., March 12 will have no assurance that they will be admitted to any particular section during spring quarter.

Pre-scheduling activities on March 10 and 12 will not eliminate the necessity for each student to clear through the regular registration line Monday, March 28 at CR 17 and 19 and then report to his adviser.

### Instructions Sent

Separate registration instructions will be sent to each student regarding the March 28 registration activities.

Students subject to selective service should carry and complete at least 15 units every quarter. Old students who fail to complete pre-scheduling activities may do so Mon., March 28.

PL 550 students must register for a minimum of 14 units with at least 12 units being in addition to preparatory course units.

Summer quarter pre-signup sheets will be turned in by students in either of two ways: First to their adviser at pre-schedule time or, second, with their completed spring quarter registration forms on April 2 (to noon), 5 and 6.

## Cal Poly Model UN Gets Underway Soon

Preparations are now underway for Cal Poly's delegation to the Model UN Conference at San Francisco State college which will run from May 8 to 7.

The countries have been assigned to the various schools by the Conference Committee. Cal Poly will represent the government of Pakistan. In the past Poly has represented such countries as Yemen, Yugoslavia, and Bolivia.

The chairman of Poly's delegation this year will be Arnie Miller, senior Animal Husbandry major.

## Architects Build Products Gallery

An architectural products gallery, unique in even Cal Poly's "learn by doing" college is being built here by architectural and mechanical engineering students. Examples of the most modern ideas in window and door design, floor design, and roof and paneling material will be on display in a permanent structure.

"The purpose of the architectural products gallery," says George Hasslein, architectural department head, "is to provide a means to acquaint students with the vast number of products which exist in the building industry. The gallery is being built on the philosophy that a picture is worth 1000 words and that a sample is far superior to a picture," he added.

The gallery itself is a simple steel frame structure about 10'X 22'. Exhibits and products, some of which have already been donated by leading building material producers, will be inserted into the framework so that students and visitors will be able to operate as well as see the many new ideas in modern building.

Not only commercial products will be exhibited, but Cal Poly architectural majors will display some of their work also.

The mobile stations, located at or near check points, relayed up-to-the-minute race information as well as summoning help for injured cyclists.

# Five Seniors On '55 Squad Help Bring Poly's First CCAA Cage Crown

Coach Ed Jorgensen and Cal Poly will lose five men on this season's Mustang hardwooders. Four of these men are graduating seniors and one is finished because of eligibility rules. Graduating from the Mustang quintet is Dick Halvorsen, Larry Madsen, Gene Knott and Tony Nunes. The non-graduate is Bill Freeman.

Dick Halvorsen originally came to Cal Poly as a transfer student from Lock Haven state teachers college in Pennsylvania in 1953. He is a physical education major and hopes to return next year to do graduate work and obtain his secondary teachers credential in physical education.

Halvorsen says his biggest thrill in basketball was playing for a service team and scoring 84 points against a Marine all-star squad. He says Tom (Iola of LaBalle who was just recently mentioned on the All-American five, is the best player he has played against.

He would like to play AAU basketball next year and then after his graduate work go into coaching basketball and teaching physical education.

Larry Madsen, six foot, five inch center, is a three year letterman for the Green and Gold. Madsen played one year of basketball at Long Beach city college before coming to Cal Poly and also two years service ball while in the Navy.

"I think the best player I have ever been against was George Yardley who originally played for Stanford university," said Madsen. "As far as the best player I have been a teammate with, I would choose Bob Barnett. Barnett played for a small college in Evansville, Ind., and we played together while I was in the service. I think he was the best all round cager I have ever seen in action. He could hit from any position on the floor and was a tremendous ball handler," said Madsen.

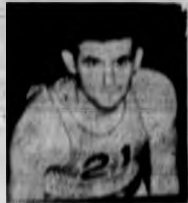

coming to Cal Poly in 1952. While playing for Long Beach, Knott received most valuable player, all-conference, all-metropolitan conference and second team all-southern junior college.

When asked his biggest thrill in basketball he said it was playing three years with the different athletes he met while attending Cal Poly. Knott likes playing against a man for man defense because he can use screens and it gives the player more of a chance to drive in for set ups and closer shots.

Tony Nunes is the fourth graduating senior on the Mustang quintet. Nunes is a 5'10", 155 pound speedster is a sharp passer and a keen shot and holds the school record for the season's highest average of free throws at 80 per cent, during the 1952-53 season.

In fact, for three years of playing for the Green and Gold, Nunes has made 79 per cent of his attempts from the free throw line.

He claims the recent UCLA-Cal Poly game as his biggest thrill since starting out in basketball in the seventh grade. Although the Mustangs were dumped by the powerful Bruins, Nunes played a great game. In fact Los Angeles KABC sportscaster Kenny Flowers acclaimed Nunes as Bob Cousy's understudy in saying "Bob Cousy has nothing on this boy Nunes." Cousy is the star dribbler and scorer of the Boston Celtics. Nunes led his teammates in scoring against UCLA.

Nunes states that San Jose state's Carroll Williams is the best ball player he ever played against.

Bill Freeman, six foot, five inch junior physical education major from Ventura is a newcomer on Coach Jorgensen's squad but his eligibility is up after this season of play.

Freeman played basketball in the service for the Fort Ord Warriors and Camp Robert five. Before entering service he played at Whitworth college in Spokane, Wash. where he made second team all-league. He graduated from Ventura high school in 1949 where he made all-league in football and basketball and all-CIF in basketball.

During his first year playing for the Mustangs Freeman has made 258 points in 25 games for an average of 11.8 points per contest. He is rough man under the basket and grabs many rebounds. The 205 pound veteran feels the valuable experience he gained in the army has improved his game. He played with and against many former college stars such as Dick Groat, former Duke all-American.

These five men who are playing their last year of ball for the Green and Gold have done a large part in obtaining Cal Poly's first CCAA cage crown.

The nine bout card is slated to begin at 8 p.m. Tabbed as top bout for the evening will be the Pete Godines, Ivan Polk tussel in the 189 pound class. Looming to be one of the best matches of the most is the Vic Buccola, George Pelonis bout in the 178 weight division.

Against San Jose state, Godines again fought his way into the win column as he decimated a seasoned ring veteran, Al White in one of last weeks featured bouts. Buccola who boxes in the 178 pound bracket, is expected to give Pelonis a tough battle. Pelonis is an end for the Bear grid team.

If Mustang boxer, Frank Loduca gets down to 147 pounds he

A natural 119 pounder, Labastida will have a tough match in the 125 division as both Fong and Torres are top contenders and will be all out to break the classy mittman's record. Coach Lee is undecided who will go in the 132 pound division. For the Bears, Leo Gascardone will probably get the final nod in the 133 class.

The 165 pound bout will pit Cal Poly's Rainald Johnston and the Bears Don Wilson. Mustang grider, John Rehder will battle one of the Bears top grid fullbacks, Steve Dimoff in the heavyweight division. Dimoff recently turned boxer and is tabbed as a top performer.

Tomorrow night's battle against the Bears will be the last match for the Mustangs before the Pacific Coast intercollegiate boxing tourney which will be held in Sacramento, March 17 through the 19.

"The preliminaries will be held at 6:30 March 11, and the semi-finals will begin at 1:30 Saturday afternoon. Finals will be held at 7:30 p.m. Mar. 12," said Harden.

Several colleges including Washington state, Oregon state and the University of Oregon are heavy tournament favorites. On the other hand, California, San Jose state, U.C.L.A. and the Mustangs have strong entries and could very well pull an upset tournament victory. Lewis and Clark will be led by two men who have remained undefeated in league competition this season.

Led by Art Keith, Washington state college will be out to retain their championship crown which they captured last season. Keith was last year's outstanding tournament wrestler. However, Oregon state is expected to give the Washington state grapplers a good run for their money. Oregon will enter the tournament undefeated.

We are expecting to have 100 entries for the PCI and I am sure that it will be the most outstanding tournament we have had in the history of the PCI," commented Harden.

Coach Harden has worked hard to establish Cal Poly as the host for the tournament and he has received good support. Marrell jewelry store has donated a wrist watch for the most outstanding wrestler of the tournament.

The Block "P" will sponsor the luncheon for the wrestlers and coaches and they are also handling the pre-sale of tickets for the tournament. The Rally committee will sponsor the award dinner and the Blue Key will be in charge of escorting the visiting teams.

The Mustangs will be led by two returning lettermen, Bill Plate who will be wrestling at the 187 pound slot and either Manuel Elias or Jack Del will be giving their all in the 180 division.

Rally committee will have their members at both cafeterias starting Friday night and will be collecting any donation you would like to contribute.



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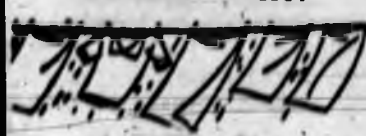

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## Harry Parker Resigns As AH Instructor At Poly

After 24 years as a member of the animal husbandry faculty at Cal Poly, Harry Parker, owner of the Diamond ranch in Los Ocas Valley, has announced his retirement from teaching. Due to his growing ranch business and the recent loss of his herdman, Parker has stepped from the teaching profession to devote full time to his ranch. In addition to owning the purebred Hereford ranch, he has leased the Marre ranch at Avila. He has just completed a leave of absence from Cal Poly, taken to obtain time for business affairs. He has been with the college on a part-time basis only for the past eight years.

### Sheep Rancher

Parker came to Cal Poly in 1932, fresh from sheep ranching in Sacramento. Previous to that he was a herdman for the Briggs ranch in Dixon handling Rambouillet sheep and Hereford cattle.

Born and schooled in Scotland, Parker was graduated from Kent College in Canterbury and attended Kingston college for many years at the old Fiscalini residence. Their home was many times the scene of student gatherings for social activities and professional advice on student projects.

### Hereford Herd

During the late 80's, Parker with two students began a small purebred Hereford herd. At the time, little did they recognize that the project they had begun would grow to the vastness for which it was bound. But it did grow and before long the herd—under the Diamond ranch name—brought them acclaim among leading purebred Hereford ranches in the west. Later, Parker became full owner of the ranch which is still under his operation. At the present time, says Parker, the Diamond is running between 250-300 head of registered Herfords and his commercial program at the Marre includes around 1500 head.

### Students Employed

Under Parker's ownership, the ranch has enabled several students to work themselves through Cal Poly with the employment he has given them. His herd has always been available to college classes for use in their judging or feeding problems.

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## Foresight By-word Of Poly Phasers

Foresight! That's the by-word of Poly Phase club members. Club members announced today tentative plans to revise its constitution to allow for coeds.

Revision is planned for next Wed. at 7 p.m. in the electrical engineering study room. Provisions are also under consideration to allow for an Electrical Engineering Alumni membership and an Associated EE alumni membership. Associated membership changes must be sent to Sacramento for approval by the school's Associated Alumni Membership council, according to Frederick White, spokesman for the group.

Julian A. McPhar, Cal Poly president, last week joined Engineering Dean Harold P. Hayes in approving the EE Alumni scholarship. The organization was praised for its initiative, White says.

"Poly Phase club is the first on campus to provide for any of these," he concluded.

3. Have better coordination between Band, Collegians and special Student Body activities on campus.
4. Wider coverage of Home Concert record sales.
5. Better transportation for Music Department publicity about Cal Poly students in tour program.
6. Department tours.
7. Dedicate the Home Concert records to different departments, instead of to certain individuals.
8. Work out an Alumni program in area that tour will be in.
9. Better coordination with Alumni of Music Department.
