Checked Each Week

Inspection Of Cafeterias Reveal High Standards

"A program of 'environmental sanitation' to safeguard the health of Cal Poly's students and staff personnel has been in continuing effect for three years now and has paid off in extra protection for all," says Doctor Earl Lovett, head of the health center.

The program includes inspection and testing of the school's water supply as well as other sanitary conditions throughout the campus. The water check is especially vital during Cal Poly's expanding building program when additional fresh water and sewage pipelines are connected with existing pipe lines.

Actual checks are made by biological science majors James Bear of Waterford and Richard Wunrow of Los Angeles. "A senior and a junior student are employed in this capacity each year," according to Lovett. Upon graduation of the senior, the junior student is available the next year with experience to carry on the program.

"Bear and Wunrow make it a habit to drop in at the cafeterias and El Corral on the average of once a week," says Doctor Lovett. Specimens are taken of anything in which food has come in contact, such as glassware, dishes, cooking utensils and food dispensing equipment. The two bio students prepare cultures with the specimens gathered for a bacterial count to determine if any streptococcus (causing sore throat, etc.) are present. The tests are conducted under the supervision of Dr. Hatfield of the biology department.

"To date, there has been uncovered no serious laxness in the preparation and serving of food at Poly," avows Lovett. At the beginning of the inspection program a check of the dish washing machine at one of the cafeterias revealed that the water used was below the minimum temperature of 180 degrees needed to insure killing all dangerous bacteria. The situation was quickly remedied," he said.

The student inspectors also check the refrigerators for proper temperature for preservation of stored foods.

All food handlers are required to have a complete physical examination and blood tests.

"The health center was not forced to set up the inspection program," Lovett emphasizes. "However, with the facilities for testing, the added valuable training for the student inspectors and the assurance of healthful standards, the program seems well worthwhile," says the doctor.

"It tends to prevent possible illness of students from contaminated foods. Without inspections an emergency could arise entailing the closing of all food serving facilities on campus until the exact causes could be determined," concludes Lovett.

Plans are nearly complete for the annual Spring Leadership conference to be held June 5 in the Veterans Memorial building. The program is scheduled to start at 5 p.m.

The affair will include a dinner, introduction of all officers for the coming school year and guests. An evaluation of this year's progress will be given, as well as contemplated goals for next year. "End-of-the-year" reports of all committees, councils and boards will be on display for discussion during the evening.

The confab is under sponsorship of the Student Affairs Council to acquaint new organizational leaders and other student body members with the activities, responsibilities and goals which must be accomplished next year.

Ed Blevin will act as master of ceremonies for the program. The invocation will be given by Glenn Shradar and the benediction by Richard Johnson.

All members of the student body invited to participate in the conference. Admission, to cover the cost of the dinner, is set at \$1.75 per person. Tickets may be obtained in the ASB office until 5 p.m. today.

Over 75 reservations had been received by yesterday noon.

Applications Now Being Accepted For Women Students At Cal Poly

Applications from women will be accepted now at Cal Poly and women teachers will be admitted for both of the 1955 summer terms; according to an announcement by President Julian A. McPhee. The four-weeks summer term will open June 27. To be admitted prior to September, 1956, women must be holders of a valid teaching credential. Other women will be admitted beginning in the fall.

Juniors Present 'Graduation' Prom Tomorrow Evening

The junior class will give the seniors their last social whirl before graduation when they present the junior-senior prom tomorrow night from 8 p.m. to 12:30 at the Veterans Memorial building.

The formal is open to all student body card holders, according to junior class president, Vic Buccola. Those who attend will dance in surroundings of a graduation theme to the awing and sway of the Collegian orchestra.

"This will be the first junior-senior prom," says Buccola. "The seniors have always sponsored this affair before, but we feel we would like to honor them and possibly set a precedent for the future."

Handling the decorations will be a committee headed by Bob Krehbiel, who assures something novel in the way of decor. Plans now include the use of caps and scrolls, plus a number of other colorful creations.

A door prize is also in the plans for the evening, Buccola reveals. All ASB card-holders and their dates are invited.

Three-Branch Govt. To Be Decided On For Poly Campus

Students will decide Monday and Tuesday whether Cal Poly will inaugurate a three-branch system of government. If passed, the system will become effective January 15, 1956.

Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday and 8 a. m. to 1 p. m. Tuesday. Balloting will be in the basement of the Administration building and at the entrance to the post-office.

Voting is delayed on the project because of several omissions in the original copy that appeared in the last issue of El Mustang.

Amendments and corrections are as follows:

Article IV, Section II, A, 5 - Insert "student" following campus and before activities.

Article IV, Section II, B, 2 - Substitute divisional for vocational.

Article IV, Section II, B, 3 - Insert "Instructional" following each and before division.

Article IV, Section II, B, 7 - Add "appointed by the president of California State Polytechnic College."

Article IV, Section IV, B, 2, a - Add "appointed by the President of California State Polytechnic College."

Article V, Section I, A - Add after President of Associated Student Body, "or the President of California State Polytechnic College."

Article V, Section I, B - to read: "Special meetings must be called within two weeks by the President of the Associated Student Body upon request of the Executive Council or the Judicial Council."

Article V, Section III, B - Insert during the between times and academic.

Article VII, Section II, A - Change to read: "If said petition is signed by thirty (30) per cent of the active members of the Associated Students."

Article X, Section I, A - delete "review" and substitute "approval" in the 4th line.

PL550 Unit Load Procedure Changed For Summer Class

The college has received a letter from the Los Angeles office of the Veterans Administration in regard to PL 550 which changes the procedure used in the past to compute student unit loads during our summer terms. It will no longer be acceptable to compute PL 550 students' summer quarter load, for either term, as being a total of 14 clock hours per week. It clarifies the definition of "standard class session" as used by the Veterans Administration.

"California colleges have set the ratio of three hours of Lab, Conference, Research or Field Work as the equivalent of a one hour lecture or class session."

Under this equivalency, a student's unit load for the 4-Week Term would have to be five units and in the 6-Week Term seven units, to meet the 14 "standard class session" requirement of the Veterans Administration as the minimum full time load. Lecture and Lab units are weighted the same under these conditions.

If the unit load involves Preparatory Courses, the base would be 12 "class sessions" or 4 units in the 4-Week Term and 6 units in the 6-Week Term.

PL 346 regulations are not changed by this letter. Three units for the 4-Week Term and five units for the 6-Week Term are considered full programs.

Small Vote Turnout Picks Class Heads

After all campaign bulletins were stripped from the walls and a final count of votes was made, 15 class officers were elected to their respective posts following the recent class elections in which some 15 per cent of Poly's voters participated.

The largest number of ballots cast in the light vote was for the "Class of 1956" officers. John Boston, junior animal husbandry major from August, won out over Fred White in a fairly close race for the presidency. Other officers elected were: Dan Marino, mechanical engineering major from Brooklyn, New York as the new senior class vice president; Secretary, Bob Oxley from Berkeley who is majoring in animal husbandry; Treasurer, Stan E. Jones from Ojai, who is majoring in dairy manufacturing and SAC representative, Glenn Shradar who is majoring in animal husbandry and claims Huntington Park as his hometown.

Majoring in aeronautical engineering, Dan Esau from Santa Barbara will head the "Class of 1957" next year. Other candidates unopposed for their offices were: Vice president, Ed Chelini printing engineering major from Santa Barbara; Secretary, Mike Simmons agricultural engineering major from Madera; Treasurer, Duane Coppak poultry husbandry major from Sebastopol and as SAC representative, Haydn Coffman Lee Jr., an agricultural engineering major from Carpinteria, California.

Unopposed, Steve Askew was named president of the "Class of 1958" receiving a landslide number of votes over six write-in candidates. Askew is an air conditioning major from Glendale. Other

The announcement followed the signing by Governor Goodwin J. Knight of the appropriation bill which included funds to make preparations necessary for the housing and instruction of women students. A sum of \$154,800 was appropriated for this purpose. It provides for the remodeling of Heron, Chase and Jasperson dormitories for the use of women, for remodeling of the Health Center to provide space for the women, for changes in two classrooms to make available suitable facilities for instruction in homemaking and for additional street lighting on the campus.

Co-Ed in '59
Although Cal Poly operated during its early history as a coeducational institution, in 1939 legislation was passed which limited registration to male students. The limitation was repealed in legislation enacted in 1957. Since then, there have been many applications from women. Because the college did not have adequate facilities, officials were forced to deny these applications from women on the basis that "no adequate facilities exist for girls."

Phys. Ed. Majors
The admission of women will involve additions to the curriculum at Cal Poly beginning in the fall of 1956. Already approved are new sequences of courses leading to the general secondary teaching credential with majors in physical education for women and homemaking and to the elementary teaching credential. Cal Poly now offers sequences leading to the general secondary credentials with majors in life sciences and general science, mathematics, physical sciences and general sciences, and social science to which women may be admitted.

Women will be permitted to enroll for studies leading to the bachelor of science degree in any of the college's present major departments.

Women who are admitted to the 1955 summer terms may enroll for the courses already listed for offering during these terms. The list of courses to be offered this summer may be obtained in request from the Admissions Office of the college.

Engineering Building
The budget bill just signed grants to Cal Poly support of \$3,089,631 and capital outlay (building) funds of \$2,534,650 for 1955-56 for all campuses. Capital outlay funds for the San Luis Obispo campus which total \$3,103,550 include \$1,410,500 for an engineering building, \$555,550 for site preparation in connection with it, and the \$154,800 item for preparation for the admission of women.

The Kellogg campus received capital outlay appropriations totaling \$1,431,100. Included are \$755,000 for a gymnasium, \$471,100 for a cafeteria, and \$225,000 for crops and ornamental horticulture units.

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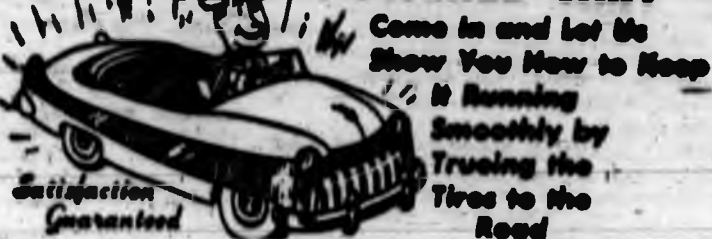
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Greens Beat Whites 18-6; Spring Game

Any one seeing ex-gridder Joe Bonnich should ask him which Neophyte let the air out of his right rear tire of his going Chevy. Find out yet Joe?

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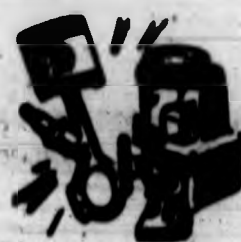
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Finals Just Part Of Agenda For Hustling Graduates
