Spiller to be featured in concert Sunday

The Cal Poly Chamber Orchestra, conducted by founder and Music Professor Clifton Swanson, will perform music by Mozart, Haydn, Dvorák and Chopin in its Winter Concert at 3 p.m. Sunday (March 17) in the Theatre.

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Architecture Dean Harms to leave post in June

Martin Harms, dean of the College of Architecture and Environmental Design for the past five years, has announced that he will leave his post at the end of the academic year.

After a sabbatical year, Harms will return in 2003-2004 to a faculty position in the Architecture Department and will also undertake assignments for the university to support fund-raising efforts and the development of international and other programs.

"Martin Harms has provided dedicated, effective service to the college and the university," said Provost Paul Zingg. "He has fostered interdisciplinary activity, launched the college's Centennial Campaign, and strengthened its advisory council and industry relations.

"He also has advanced the college's reputation, both regionally and nationally, as a center for excellence in undergraduate architecture and environmental design programs."

Richard Zweifel, associate dean of the college, has been appointed interim dean by President Warren Baker and Zingg to succeed Harms until a national search identifies a permanent dean.

"The search for a new dean will begin immediately through the engagement of the faculty and other college constituencies to develop the position description and to align it with the college's strategic plan and needs," Zingg said. □

More tours offered during spring break

To accommodate the hundreds of visitors expected on campus during high school and community college spring break, Poly Reps and the Admissions office will offer campus walking tours at 10:10 a.m. and 2:10 p.m. every weekday during the weeks of March 25-29 and April 1-5. The only exception will be April 1, when the campus will close in observance of Cesar Chavez's birthday.

During those two weeks, tours will leave from UU 220. Visitors do not need to make advance appointments for a tour, which lasts approximately 1 1/2 hours. Because the week of March 25-29 coincides this year with Cal Poly's own spring break and no classes will be in session, tours that week will be conducted by Admissions staff members instead of the student members of Poly Reps.

An optional Admissions Information Session is being offered noon-1 p.m. each tour day. Separate, simultaneous admissions sessions will be offered to prospective students and those who have been accepted to the university. Those interested in attending either session should meet at the Information Desk in the UU at noon.

Also during those two weeks, the Housing Office will give tours of the residence halls at 1 p.m. weekdays except April 1. Anyone interested should meet in front of the Administration Building. No advance reservations are needed.

During Open House, Poly Reps will conduct campus tours on Friday, April 19, from the UU Plaza and on Saturday, April 20, from Dexter Lawn. Those interested should refer to the Open House schedule available during Open House for four times.
