Al Smith Day planned for April 14 at Swanton Pacific

The ninth annual Al Smith Day celebration will be held April 14 at the Swanton Pacific Ranch, at Davenport, 11 miles north of Santa Cruz.

Train rides, tours of the ranch facilities, and a Santa Maria-style barbecue are planned as part of the festivities.

The one-third-scale, steam-powered train will run 10:30 a.m.-4 p.m., and the barbecue lunch will be served around noon. Tours of the ranch, forest and train facility and demonstrations of

dogs herding sheep will be given throughout the day.

The celebration honors College of Agriculture alumnus Al Smith, who left his 3,200-acre Swanton Pacific Ranch, valued at \$20 million, to Cal Poly when he died in 1993. Smith earned a bachelor's degree in crop science in 1944 and a master's in agricultural education in 1956. The ranch serves as an extension of instructional programs in agriculture, forestry and other disciplines.

Harold Kerbo, longtime Social Sciences professor, has been selected a 2003 Fulbright Scholar in Austria.

Kerbo will serve next spring and summer as the Distinguished Chair in the Human and Social Sciences Department at the University of Vienna, where he will teach sociology and political science as well as a course about the global economy and economic development in poor countries.

"Professor Kerbo previously has filled Fulbrights in Asia," said Harry Hellenbrand,

"Part of our job as volunteers is to raise the funds necessary to take this trip," said Shirley Paredes, a chapter member and mathematics graduate student. "We are required to provide our own transportation and food and to make a donation to the affiliate that will host us in Portland."

The student group has received a \$400 grant from Cal Poly's Center for Community Volunteerism and \$300 from the San Luis Obispo Habitat for Humanity affiliate.

Since 1976, Habitat for Humanity has built more than 100,000 houses in more than 80 countries, including some 30,000 houses across the United States. To ensure that the houses remain affordable, they are sold at no profit; no interest is charged on the mortgage; the homeowners and volunteers build the houses under trained supervision; and individuals, corporations, faith groups and others provide financial support.

Graphic Communication opens new laboratory

Testing Machines Inc. (TMI), a Graphic Communication "partner in education," has established a modern Substrates, Ink and Toner Laboratory that will be used to serve the research, testing and product-evaluation needs of the printing, packaging, imaging and supply sectors of the graphic arts industry.

The university dedicated the TMI Laboratory and recognized the company's role as its major contributor during International Printing Week 2002. TMI provided the lab with nearly \$60,000 worth of equipment, including an ink tub tester, a monitor-smoothness tester, a smoothness gauge, a basis weight scale, an Elmendorf tear tester, a pendulum 1600 Gram, a gloss meter, a Laray viscometer, and a printability tester.

In addition to research, testing and product evaluations the equipment will also be used in academic programs and in industry seminars and workshops.

"Through TMI's support, Cal Poly now has an unprecedented laboratory in the western United States for educating students on testing procedures and standards used in printing, packaging and related imaging fields," said Harvey Levenson, head of the Graphic Communication Department. □
