## Advertising Omitted From Yearbook

Several hundred yearbooks had already been reserved by late this week as 81 "El Rodeo" salesmen accelerated their efforts to sell 1500 copies before the sale ends next month.

Meanwhile, nearly 700 students reached by a questionnaire survey last week voted 4-1 in favor of eliminating advertising and raising the price of the book from \$3 to \$4.

In spite of the price boost, the 1955-56 El Rodeo will still be one of the most low-cost yearbooks among California colleges, according to figures passed on last week by Bill Hubbard of the Yearbook House in Monrovia, which is publishing this year's book.

Hubbard said that last year Fresno State produced a 205-page book and charged \$6; San Diego put out a 310-page job and charged \$7.

El Rodeo charges clubs on campus \$20 for a full-page coverage, while both Fresno and San Diego State charge \$30.

"This year's book will be bigger in at least one respect, and probably two," according to Ken Tarbet, publicity manager. Tarbet pointed out the following:

(1) The elimination of advertising, which occupied 18 pages last year, will allow for additional coverage of college activities.

(2) The Yearbook House will publish FREE another 16 pages if the present pre-sale tops the 1500 goal.

This would mean a possible 206-page book.

Down payment is \$1, the balance to be paid when receiving the book. They are expected to arrive around the time of Poly Royal. A summer supplement, covering Poly Royal, late spring activities and graduation will be mailed out during the summer.

Students may order their annuals through individual salesman, or through the ASB office.

## Cal Poly Wins Rodeo In Idaho

Captained by Jim Lyons, Cal Poly's rodeo team brought home top honors from the Moscow, Idaho show last weekend.

Cal Poly accumulated 446 points. The University of Idaho placed second with 394 points and Brigham Young University of Utah placed third with 317. Oregon State placed fourth, Washington State fifth, Montana State sixth and Eastern Oregon last.

Cal Poly's Jim Lyons won first in the calf roping event. Jerry Anderson took bulldogging with Norman George third. Don Switzer won third in cow milking with Lyons fifth. Switzer also took third in bullriding. In bareback bronc riding, George was second, while Tyson and Ellery placed fifth and sixth.

In the overall contest, Mick McCarty, Idaho, was first (147); Jerry Anderson placed second, (140), and Don Switzer third (134).

## Grayhounds Chartered

## 600 Reservations Made For Poly Rooters at SJ

Six hundred seats have been reserved in San Jose's Spartan stadium for Poly rooters who will make the trek to the prune orchards of the Santa Clara valley next week-end to see the Mustangs tangle with San Jose State.

Cal Poly wired the "600" figure to San Jose this week, though it was anybody's guess just how many Mustangs might go. Estimates ranged all the way from a conservative 800 to 1,000.

Also making the trip will be Cal Poly's 64-piece marching band.

Special Grayhound busses to the game will be available at a special round-trip rate of \$4.52, following arrangements completed this week.

Whether even one bus goes, however, will depend upon how many make their reservations in the student body office before 5 p.m. Wednesday.

The busses will leave about 8 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 12, in order to arrive about an hour before game time at 8:15. The busses will stop at Salinas for dinner, unless arrangements are made through El Corral for a prepared box lunch.

The busses will leave about a half hour following the after-game dance, should there be one. Cal Poly is presently awaiting final word on the dance.

In anticipation of Cal Poly's first encounter with San Jose since 1949, Cal Poly fans will be watching the outcome of the game this weekend back in Wichita Falls, Tex. At the same time, San Jose state faces a tough Stanford Indian eleven.

Cal Poly's Circle K club will host approximately 60 delegates from over 20 colleges throughout California at the Circle K district convention here today and tomorrow.

District Lt. Gov. Chuck Erikson, Cal Poly printing engineering major, will call the convention to order this morning, followed by welcoming speeches from President Julian A. McPhee, ASB President Bob Grime and Kiwanis officials.

A tour of the campus is planned for visitors, as well as a luncheon and a dinner each day in the Harvest room of cafeteria one. General meetings are scheduled both days in the Engineering auditorium and Science building.

The local Circle K club is composed of approximately 20 members, with each department of the college limited to two men, representing a wide cross section of campus activity.

"We feel that we can give a wider and better service to the college than other organizations because of our members varied interests," said Erikson. "We hope to eventually build our club to about 55 members."

Major projects of the club this year have been meeting all trains and busses during freshman orientation, maintaining an information and welcoming booth during Poly Royal, ushering at football games and working with the local Kiwanis on cancer and Boy Scout fund raising campaigns.

Barlow cautions veterans to use a local address for their mailed checks to insure delivery.

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## Midwestern Next Poly Foe After Homecoming Setback

After having a five game winning streak derailed by the McMurry Indians, 23 to 13, Coach Roy Hughes and his Mustangs will attempt to get back in the win column, as they travel to Wichita Falls, Texas, in the role of a homecoming foe for Midwestern university, a team which lost 21 to 20 to McMurry earlier in the season.

Midwestern, who posted a four win, five loss and one tie record in the 1954 season, will count heavily on 26 returning lettermen, led by 185-pound fullback E.J. Webb, Calvin Myers, 205 pound tackle, looms as one of the top linemen in Indian history, along with Ernie Cunningham, a hefty 200-pound guard.

With an all new coaching staff led by head mentor Dick Todd and an entire new offense, the Indians are facing one of their roughest schedules in quite a while.

Thirty-three players will make the trip, led by Perry "Jet" Jeter, Mustang halfback who will bolster a backfield of Jerry Duncan, Marlon Anoleh and Danny Delgado. The forward wall, hurt by the loss of John Oakes, stellar guard who is out for the season, will consist of Jim Cox and Bud Chadwick at ends, Fred Odle and Lloyd Stringer at tackles, Chuck Austin and Mathias Medrano at guards, and Duane Wickstrom at center.

In the Homecoming contest, McMurry won the first half and that was enough to give them the ball game. Emerging from the first 30 minutes of play with a 20 point lead, the Indians led the contest on a 30 yard field goal with 12 minutes of play remaining.

### Win On Fumbles

Fumblytut and pass interceptions prevailed in the first half of play as Poly lost a chance to score in the first quarter. Vern Valdes fumbled on the Indian one as Cal Poly had second and goal to go. Twice, pass interceptions broke up Mustang scoring marches as the game appeared to be turning into a rout.

Surprising the crowd and looking like an entirely different ball club, the Mustangs charged out onto the field in the second half and showed a crowd of nearly 6,000 fans a real comeback. Only one thing stopped the Mighty Mustangs: they started too late.

### Pass To Cox

Taking the kickoff, the Mustangs drove down to the seven where Jerry Duncan passed to Jim Cox in the corner of the end zone for the first tally. Jim Africa's try for the extra point was wide. After an exchange of punts, the Hughesmen drove to the Indian two yard line whereupon Vernon Valdes fought his way into the end zone on a split-T option play. This time Africa's kick split the uprights.

Then for the second time, a fumble cost the Mustangs another score. Speedy Jim Antoine took a handoff near the midfield stripe and churned his way down to the 10 before he was hit from behind. The ball squirted from his hands and was McMurry recovered.

With time running out and the Indians stalled on the Poly 20, Indian Bob Baker booted a field goal to give his team their final three points. In a hurry to cross the goal line once more, the Mustangs ended the ball game on the Indian 10.

### Plagued With Hurts

The Mustangs, who were already plagued by injury trouble, got even more as they lost Oakes. Perry Jeter and Cox suffered sprained ankles, and Glen Harmon a mild head injury. Mel Hardy and Medrano are recuperating from minor hurts but are expected to see action against Midwestern.

## Harriers, Poloists Face Stiff Battles

Poly's cross country team is in Palo Alto today for a five-way meet, while Mustang water poloists are preparing for a home contest with Santa Monica city college tomorrow.

The harriers will run their third meet of the season this afternoon at 4 o'clock against Stanford, San Jose State, San Francisco State and COP. The lads of Coach Jim Jensen have won one and tied one, both with Santa Barbara college.

Coach Dick Anderson's mermen last week lost to Fullerton junior college, 7-5.

## Soccer Team Will Host Pomona Here Tomorrow

The Mustang soccer team will host Pomona college on the practice field tomorrow at 3 p.m. Poly is undefeated and Hans Mager, team advisor, is looking to another win.

Last Saturday the team added to the homecoming celebration by upending Caltech, 2-2. The Mustangs dominated the game throughout.

Marcus Ortiz was outstanding man, with absolute control of the ball in dribbling and passing and he masterminded most of the plays. Frank Hasso and Angel Ortiz carried the forward line into enemy territory and helped Dementia Pardo to be high scorer.

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## Students See Huge Valley Seed Ranch

Students of the commercial seed production class are back on campus this week following a field trip over into the San Joaquin valley, where they viewed alfalfa seed operations.

The group stopped at a 6,000-acre alfalfa ranch at Five Points (Fresno Co.) which averages a yield of 900 pounds an acre compared with the national average of 184. The ranch is owned by Sherman Thomas, who began his program 28 years ago as a small farmer, and now owns ranches in two states.

The class also inspected the ranch's seed mill, which can handle production from 20,000 acres, and a modern honey house used in their pollination program. Thomas presented each member of the class with a quart container of alfalfa honey as a reminder of the trip.

The group was conducted through a field where 16 combine harvesters were each cutting a 14-foot swath.

Move that SAC approve appointments made by the ASB president to date. Carried.

Move that SAC receive minutes of each board meeting (publications, Poly Royal, etc.) and also the minutes of the finance committee. Carried.

Move that the ASB business manager submit a monthly financial report to SAC, and that each member receive a copy of the report. Carried.

Move that SAC refer the mascot inquiry to the Rally committee. Carried.

Move that SAC request the Rally committee to contact the music department immediately about participating in the exchange assembly at San Jose State Nov. 8. Carried.

Move that SAC request the Rally committee to better organize the half-time activities at the Fresno game Nov. 11. Carried.

Move that SAC request the Alumni association to refrain from sending alumni literature to parents of prospective Cal Poly alumni. Carried.

Move that next week's agenda include discussion on the organized rooting section, and that involved persons of the Rally committee attend. Carried.

Old business: SAC code approval. Reports: Senior activities, Finance committee, Music board, Poly Royal board, Publications board.
