Stone Soup ethnic faire to be Aug. 24-25

Cal Poly Arts' 10th annual Stone Soup Ethnic Music Faire will be held at the Ramona Garden Park in Grover Beach 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Aug. 24 and 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 25.

The faire features live music, food and craft booths, a health fair, a salsa contest and activities for children.

Central Coast Pipes and Drums will open the faire on Aug. 24. Additional music headliners that day will include Tempest, a band that blends traditional Celtic and European folk with hard-edged rock, and Satori Daiko, Japanese Taiko drummers from the L.A. Taiko Center.

Pan-A-Cea, a local steel drum band will perform the traditional music heard often in the Caribbean. Crowds can also look forward to the Cadillac Angels, a Santa Barbara-based band familiar to local audiences for their blend of surf, rockabilly and roots music.

The music line-up on Aug. 25 will include repeat performances by Pan-A-Cea and the Japanese drummers. Juan Luis Valdez will perform with Grupo Aries, and local salsa band Salson will close the two-day music fair.

Family activities will include a stage show by Zoo to You titled "Where Animals Call Home," and entertainment juggler Gary Elem as Dr. Magic. Zoo to You will also have its newly expanded petting zoo set up, and Grover Beach's newly opened Exploration Station will be available to youngsters while parents visit artist lecture demonstrations.

The two-day health fair will include representatives from the American Association of Retired Persons insurance program, the Arroyo Grande and Grover Beach DARE programs and the California Highway Patrol Kids I.D. program. A children's dental program, chiropractic services, smoking cessation classes and senior health glucose and cholesterol testing will be offered. Attendees can also

'Peter and the Wolf' to play Aug. 18

As part of the Cal Poly Arts presentation of the Russian National Orchestra at 3 p.m. Sunday (Aug. 18), special guest performers will narrate Prokofiev's famed "Peter and the Wolf" and a new, commissioned work, "The Wolf and Peter."

Former Ambassador James Collins will narrate the classic "Peter and the Wolf." Collins served from 1997 to 2001 as the U.S. Ambassador to the Russian Federation and is one of the leading authorities on U.S. relations with Russia and the countries of the former Soviet Union.

Conductor-producer-narrator Russell Gloyd will voice the new "The Wolf and Peter." Gloyd has served as conductor and music director for Dave Brubeck and his quartet. In 1997, he conducted "To Hope! A Celebration" with the Russian National Orchestra at the Moscow Conservatory of Music.

"The Wolf and Peter" is a modern tale of a boy and a wolf. The storyline has an environmental perspective and conveys the value of recognizing others' points of view and understanding different people and cultures.

Commissioned by the Russian National Orchestra and developed under the artistic direction of concert conductor Kent Nagano, "The Wolf and Peter" combines a score by Jean-Pascal Beintus and text by Walt Kraemer and Martha Bredon.

Children 18 years and under may be entitled to free concert tickets. Up to six free tickets may be included with the purchase of one full-priced adult ticket at \$42 to \$54.

Substantial discounts are being offered to adult students with valid I.D. □

Recreation Center fees to increase fall quarter

Recreation Center membership fees will increase from \$45 to \$50 a quarter beginning fall quarter. Annual memberships, payable during fall quarter only, will increase to \$180 a year. The new fee for those who pay by payroll deduction will be \$40 a quarter, or \$13.34 a month for one member and \$26.68 a month for a member and a spouse.

New members can sign up for fall quarter beginning Sept. 9. Access to the Recreation Center for new members will start Sept. 16.

Renewing members must complete a new membership form and waiver. No membership sign-ups will be taken without the proper Cal Poly faculty/staff I.D. card. Access will not be activated until all the paperwork is completed.

Also beginning Sept. 9, payroll deduction members will need to complete a new Deduction Authorization Form. Access will not be activated until the forms have been completed.
