## ASB Nominations Close Tomorrow

"Nominations for student body officers must be in the student body office by noon tomorrow, final deadline," announces Ron Kelllogg, ASB vice-president.

Students will go to the polls on April 17 and 18 to vote on their choices for officers. Students will also vote on one of the most controversial subjects of the year at Cal Poly—three-branch government. In line with the requirements of the ASB constitution, El Mustang has published the constitution and by-laws of the proposed govern-

ment in their entirety on pages three and four of this issue. To be eligible, a candidate must have completed 90 units with a grade point average of 1.0 or better.

All candidates for student body office will give their campaign speeches and present their platforms at a special assembly to be held next Wednesday, 8 p.m., in the Engineering Auditorium. Questions and answers from the floor concerning the candidates' platform will be a new feature of this year's meeting.

## 'In Line' Move Brings An Increase In Campus Meals And Housing Cost

Cal Poly will give to its students next year the complete board and room plan that has been traditional for many years at most colleges which have dormitory facilities. Beginning with the fall quarter, 1956-57, dormitory rooms and meals will be provided for a single fee. This fee will be \$175 or \$180 a quarter, payable in advance, depending on the rooming accommodations involved.

The new rate will represent an increase for most students, Gene Brendlin, founda-

tion manager, pointed out in making the announcement. "The percentage of students who will find the rate an increase and the average amount of increase are difficult to determine because of the varied amounts which students now spend on meals," Brendlin said. Some men regularly buy two \$85 meal tickets a quarter while others make one ticket pay virtually all of their board.

### Charge Unavoidable

"The increase is in line with a growing policy in all states and colleges that the rates for living services provided to students must be sufficient to cover all costs," Brendlin said. Several factors made the change unavoidable at this time, he added.

First among these was the elimination by the 1955 Legislature of funds requested in the State budget for the purpose of buying new furniture for the College Avenue dorms. Because of this action, the Foundation had to borrow the necessary funds from the state on a ten-year re-payment plan.

Second, new furniture for the county dorms not only depleted the Foundation's general reserve but also part of its operating reserve.

Third, the state's policy now

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## Poly Enters Toad In Coalinga Derby

One horned-toad is in intensive workout with the Cal Poly track team this week in preparation for the annual Coalinga Horned Toad Derby to be held this Saturday in that Western San Joaquin oil town.

"Royal Poly" is the college's first entry in the traditional event, which ranks with the Calaveras Frog Jubilee as the only occasion of its kind in the nation.

During the week animal husbandry students have been pawing through Morrison's "Feeds and Feeding" in a frantic attempt to find a balanced ration for the entry, but with little success.

Meanwhile, electronic students have been cogitating a device that could be used to give the toad an electrical shock without detection when the starting gun is fired.

El Mustang editor Bob Flood, trainer and publicity agent for "Royal Poly," anticipates heavy competition from over 100 other aspiring horned toads. All will compete for the grand prize of \$100, but "Royal Poly," a new twist to Poly Royal, will also be out to publicize the "Country Fair on a College Campus" to be held here April 27-28.

Members of the Student Affairs Council Tuesday night threw in 50 cents apiece to pay the \$10 entry fee, and agreed that any prize money should go to the college union fund. This did not cover expense of the buckshot purchased to weight the other contestants.

The derby this year also marks Coalinga's 50th anniversary, along with the celebration of Fresno county's centennial.

## Engineers To Get Expanded Facilities

Numerous changes in the engineering division facilities were told this week.

Construction of a new engineering building is slated to begin about July. It will provide facilities for electrical engineering, electronic engineering, materials laboratory, lecture and drafting rooms.

A sheet metal shop is slated to move into the present EE facilities upon completion of the new building.

Aero engines will soon be housed in a new 12,000 square foot building being constructed next to the present hangar. The building will be completed by September.

The materials lab, formerly housed in the old machine shop, will be temporarily located in CR-18. It will be moved ultimately to the east wing of the new engineering building.

## Three-Branch Government Gets Airing On Pros And Cons By Political Class

There is a new constitution coming up for a vote this spring. "What is wrong with the present constitution?" What basic improvements would the new have over the present constitution?

These were some of the questions asked by 28 students in a Political Science 100 class when this subject was brought up at one of its regular class meetings. By a show of hands, it was brought out that not one person in the class felt qualified to explain the working parts of either constitution.

This class decided to look into the merits of both constitutions to see if they met the needs of the individual student.

### Five Objectives

Before the group obtained copies of the respective constitutions for

study, five objectives that any constitution should contain, were

1. True representation.
2. Opportunity to practice government.
3. Means provided to serve students interests.
4. Adequate means of transmitting information, to and for the student body.
5. A high degree of student responsibility in the administration of extra-curricular campus activities.

The class was divided into groups to make a study of each constitution to determine whether or not the present or proposed constitution met the standards of the five objectives set up by the class.

### Class Committee

At the same time there was a class committee working on the securing of a panel group whose

purpose would be to represent the merits of both constitutions. The five-member panel to discuss and answer questions concerning this subject.

William Troutner, crops department head, and Jim Barlow, crops major, were to represent the present constitution. Dominic Perello, instructor, Ed Stevin, journalism major, and Bob Bostrom, animal husbandry major and proponent of the proposed constitution, were to represent the new form.

The idea took action at an open forum Wednesday, March 7. A group of about 40 students and faculty were present to hear the discussion opened by the moderator, Bald McKeon, on objective number one, true representation.

## Music Tour Spreads Poly Reputation Before 20,000

Five days and 600 miles after staging a successful first-night show at Castle Air Force Base in the northern San Joaquin valley, members of the Cal Poly glee club and Collegian orchestra found themselves over in Coalinga, in the two usual extreme stages of conditioning: (1) in great shape

and near perfection after 22 successive appearances (2) lips "shot" and voices fading away like the old soldiers that never die.

After one of the most successful tours on record, the men are back home at regular rehearsal in preparation for the annual Home Concert April 19-20 and recording of a 33 r.p.m. record of glee club, orchestral and barber shop harmonies that will go on sale in late May.

### Appear Before 20,000

As for the valley tour, the 57 men fortunate enough to make the trip will verify its success. The men performed before an estimated 20,000 people, and nearly 5,000 in one day while touring the large high schools of the Fresno area.

Audiences everywhere gave the Collegians hearty applause on such numbers as "Night Train," "Harlem Nocturne," and "I Hear You Knockin'," featuring soloists Don Snider, Phil Carpenter and Jim Alstrunk respectively. The glee club fared as well on numbers like "Little Bare Mare" and "There is Nothing Like a Dame," the latter used appropriately enough as a tie in to the admission of coeds

in the fall.

Particularly inspiring to the troupe were the receptions at Madera high school; Porterville high school, alma mater of director Harold P. Davidson; and Fresno's Roosevelt high, largest audience of the tour with a student body gathering of 8100.

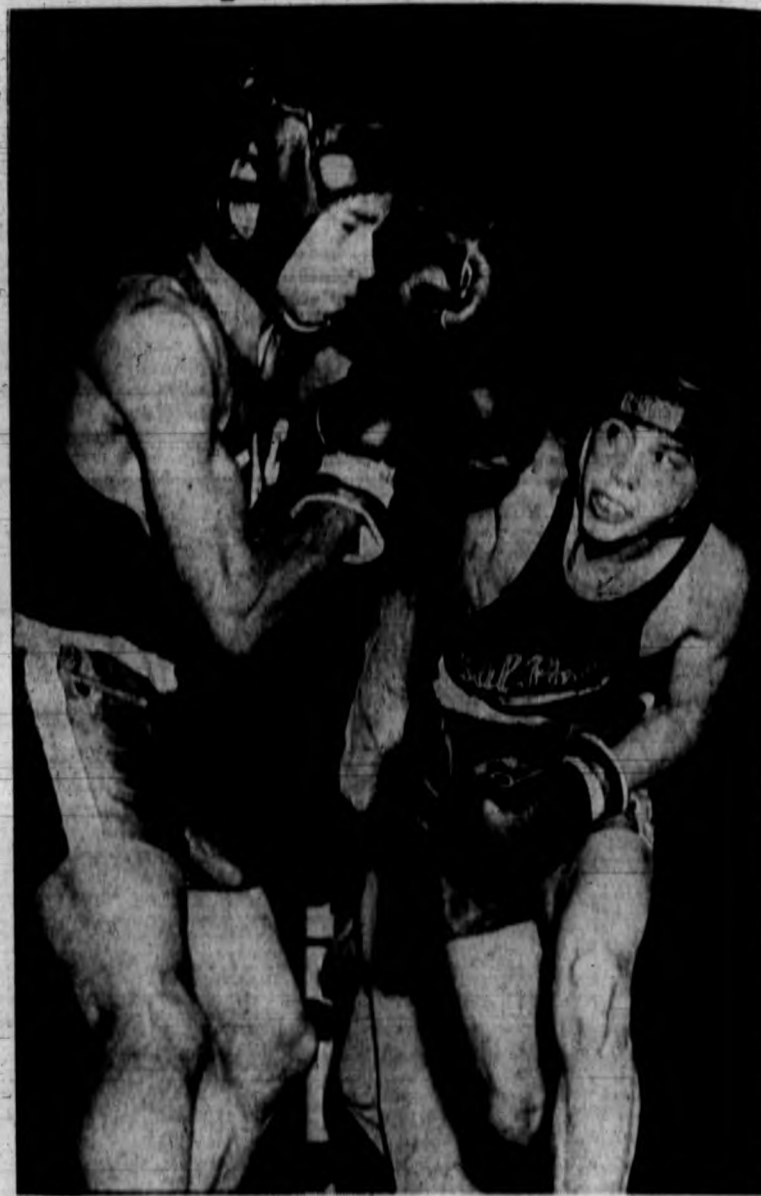

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**PROPOSED CONSTITUTION  
ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF  
THE CALIFORNIA STATE  
POLYTECHNIC COLLEGE  
San Luis Obispo  
PREAMBLE**

Believing that the highest efficiency of the Associated Students of the California State Polytechnic College can best be attained through the application of democratic principles, we the students of the California State Polytechnic College working in collaboration with the administration and the faculty, do hereby adopt this Constitution and By-Laws.

**ARTICLE I  
Name and Colors**

**Section A.** The name of this student association shall be the "Associated Students of the California State Polytechnic College" at San Luis Obispo.

1. The Associated Students of the California State Polytechnic College is referred to as "Associated students" throughout the constitution and By-Laws.

2. The student association shall be colloquially known as "The Mustangs."

**Section B.** The official colors shall be green and gold.

**ARTICLE II  
Membership**

**Section A. Active**

1. All enrolled students of the California State Polytechnic College shall become active members by purchase of an Associated Student Body card at the time of their registration.

**Section B. Associate**

1. Any faculty member, immediate member of faculty member's family, regular employee in the California State Polytechnic College, alumnus, or spouse of an enrolled student may become an associate member upon purchase of an Associate Membership card.

2. An Associate member who has been a member for five consecutive years shall be granted annual associate membership without further assessment.

**Section C. Honorary**

1. Any individual who performs an outstanding service or deed for the college may have honorary membership bestowed upon him by the Legislative Council.

**ARTICLE III  
Officers**

**Section A.** The elected officers of the Associated Students shall be President, Vice-President, Legislative Secretary and Executive Secretary.

**ARTICLE IV  
Governing Bodies**

**Section A.** The government and direction of Associated Student activities and the control of Associated Student property shall be vested in a three branch government: The Executive Council, the Legislative Council and the Judicial Council.

**Section B. The Executive Council**

**1. Powers**

a. Shall execute and administer policy.

b. Shall act upon all matters presented by active or associate members of the Associated Students, faculty, administration, Legislative Council, or Judicial Council.

c. Shall direct and co-ordinate all Associated Student activities.

d. May propose legislation or policy.

**2. Membership**

a. Elected officers of the Associated Students.

(1) President

(2) Vice-President

(3) Executive Secretary

b. Divisional Councils

(1) Chairman of each instructional division as established in By-Laws Article V, Section II.

(a) Agriculture

(b) Arts and Sciences

(c) Engineering

c. Boards

(1) Chairman as established in By-Laws, Article V, Section B.

(a) Athletics

(b) College Union

(c) Music

(d) Poly Royal

(e) Publications and Publicity

d. Residence Councils

(1) Chairmen as established in By-Laws, Article V, Section I.

(a) Women's Inter-Dorm Council

(b) Men's Inter-Dorm Council

(c) Non-Resident Council

e. Inter-Class Council

(1) Chairmen as established in By-Laws, Article V, Section J.

f. Standing Committees

(1) Chairmen as established in By-Laws, Article

**V. Section K.**

- (a) Awards
- (b) Rally
- (c) Election
- (d) Student Government
- (e) Orientation
- (f) Personnel
- (g) Homecoming
- (h) Intramural
- (i) Leadership Conference
- (j) Standing committees as established by the Legislative Council.

**g. Advisors**

(1) One member from the faculty at large appointed by the President California State Polytechnic College.

(2) The President of the California State Polytechnic College or his representative.

(3) Activities officer or his assistant.

**3. Voting.**

a. All members of the Executive Council shall be voting members.

**Section C. The Legislative Council**

**1. Powers**

a. Shall be the policy determining group.

b. Shall initiate legislation which shall become law when passed by a simple majority vote.

c. Shall act upon all matters presented by active or associate members of the Associated Students, faculty, administration, Executive Council, or Judicial Council.

(1) Shall form standing committees

(2) Shall form temporary committees to study and reflect student opinion on current problems.

d. Shall be responsible for preparing the Associated Student annual budget.

e. Shall prescribe penalties for violations of the Associated Student Constitution and Codes as defined by the Judicial Council.

**2. Membership**

a. All student members of the Legislative Council are elected.

(1) The chairman shall be the Associated Student Body Vice-President.

(2) Associated Student Body Legislative Secretary

(3) Representatives of the Associated Student Body, to be elected by precinct areas as detailed in the By-Laws, Article VI, Section B, Item 2.

**b. Advisors**

(1) One member from the faculty at large appointed by the President California State Polytechnic College.

(2) The President of the California State Polytechnic College or his representative.

**3. Voting**

a. All members shall be voting members.

**Section D. The Judicial Council**

**1. Powers**

a. Shall determine constitutionality of all matters presented by the Executive Council, Legislative Council, President of California State Polytechnic College, or any member of the Associated Student Body.

b. Shall determine constitutionality of all Associated Student Body Constitutions and Codes.

**2. Membership**

a. Appointed members

(1) Nine justices shall be appointed by the Associated Student Body President with the approval of the Legislative Council.

(2) The justices shall elect a Chief Justice and a Judicial Recorder from their membership.

**b. Advisors**

(1) One member from the faculty at large appointed by the President California State Polytechnic College.

(2) The President of the California State Polytechnic College or his representative.

**3. Voting**

a. All members shall be voting members.

**ARTICLE V  
Meetings**

**Section A. Associated Students**

1. Special meetings of the student body may be called by the President of the Associated Student Body or the President of California State Polytechnic College.

2. Special meetings must be called within two weeks by the President of the Associated

Students upon request of the Executive Council, the Legislative Council or the Judicial Council.

3. Special meetings must be called within two weeks by the President of the Associated Students upon presentation of a petition signed by twenty (20) per cent of the active members of the Associated Students.

**Section B. Executive Council**

1. Regular meetings shall be held at least four times during the academic quarter as called by the President of the Associated Students.

2. Special meetings may be called by the President of the Associated Students.

**Section C. Legislative Council**

1. Regular meetings shall be held at least four times during the academic quarter, the dates to be determined by the Legislative Council, except that no more than 15 days shall elapse between meetings.

2. Special meetings may be called by the President or Vice-President of the Associated Students.

**Section D. Judicial Council**

1. A two-thirds majority of the membership shall constitute a quorum.

2. Regular meetings shall be held at least four times during the academic quarter, as called by the Chief Justice.

3. Special meetings may be called by the Chief Justice.

**Section E. Time and Place**

1. The chairmen of each Council shall designate the time and place of the first Council meeting of the academic year.

2. The membership of each Council shall then establish the time and place of future meetings.

**ARTICLE VI  
Term of Office**

**Section A.**

1. The tenure of an elected or appointed officer shall be from the day after the close of the Spring Quarter to the last day of the following Spring Quarter.

**ARTICLE VII  
Recall**

**Section A.**

1. The provisions of the article shall pertain to positions filled by vote of the Student Body and/or positions requiring the approval of the Executive, Legislative, and Judicial Councils.

2. The Judicial Council shall not be subject to recall.

**Section B. Elected Officers**

1. Any elected officer may be subject to recall upon the presentation of a petition at a meeting of the Legislative Council, if said petition is signed by thirty (30) per cent of the active members of the Associated Students.

2. The petition shall then be referred to a vote by ballot of the members of the Associated Students within two weeks of receipt of the petition by the Legislative Council. Such an election shall be held under the provisions of Article IV of the By-Laws.

3. A two-thirds majority of the votes cast shall affirm a recall.

**Section C. Precinct Representatives**

1. May be recalled by a two-thirds majority vote of his precinct, or by a three-fourth majority vote of his precinct by petition.

**ARTICLE VIII  
Referendum**

**Section A. Procedure**

1. On petition of thirty-five (35) per cent of the members of the Associated Students, any official act of the Executive, Legislative, or Judicial Council must be submitted to a vote of the Associated Students.

2. To be effective such a petition must be filed with the Executive Council within two weeks after the minutes of the Legislative Council announcing the action have been posted.

3. The President shall then call a special meeting of the Associated Students, at which meeting the question shall be openly discussed and a date set for election, not less than one week nor more than two weeks, from the day of the meeting. Such an election shall be held under the provisions of Article IV of the By-Laws.

4. A two-thirds majority of the votes cast shall be affirmative to effect a referendum.

**ARTICLE IX  
Amendments**

**Section A. Procedure**

1. The proposed amendment must be initiated by either of the following two methods:

a. Must be signed by at least twenty (20) per cent of the active members of the Associated Students and handed to the Legislative Council through the Legislative Secretary, or

b. Must be proposed, upon two-thirds favorable vote of the total membership of the Legislative Council.

2. The date of filing the petition and notices of the election, with a full statement of the amendment, shall be posted in five (5) prominent places on campus and shall be run in the paper of the Associated Students for two consecutive weeks previous to the election.

3. A two-thirds majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to pass the amendment. Such an election shall be held under the provisions of Article IV of the By-Laws.

4. Results of an election shall be declared official upon receipt of the Election Committee's report, which shall be submitted to the Executive Secretary within two weeks following the election.

**ARTICLE X  
Administrative Review**

**Section A.**

1. All regulations and procedures outlined in the Associated Student Body Constitution, By-Laws and Codes, as well as Constitution and By-Laws of other groups, and the amendments thereto, shall be subject to approval by the President of California State Polytechnic College.

**ARTICLE XI  
Ratification**

**Section A.**

1. Ratification by a two-thirds majority of the voters in an Associated Student election shall establish this Constitution and By-Laws.

BY-LAWS**

**ARTICLE I  
Membership, Privileges, and Benefits**

**Section A. Active**

1. Admission to all Associated Student sponsored activities including athletic contests, music activities, and social functions free or at a rate recommended by the activity and approved by the Legislative Council.

2. One copy of the yearly publication, "El Rodeo," at a rate recommended by the activity and approved by the Legislative Council.

3. Subscription to the publication, "El Mustang."

4. One vote at each general Associated Student election.

5. Participation in any Associated Student sponsored activity.

6. Such additional privileges as may be prescribed by the Legislative Council.

**Section B. Associate**

1. Admission to all Associated Student sponsored activities, including athletic contests, music activities, and social functions, at a rate recommended by the activity and approved by the Legislative Council.

2. Eligibility to participate as advisor and/or member on Associated Student Councils, Boards, Committees, and other student organizations provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws or created by the Executive, Legislative, or Judicial Councils.

3. One copy of the yearly publication, "El Rodeo," at a rate recommended by the activity and approved by the Legislative Council.

4. Subscription to the publication, "El Mustang."

5. Such additional privileges as may be prescribed by the Legislative Council.

**Section C. Honorary**

1. Admission to all Associated Student sponsored activities, including athletic contests, music activities, and social functions, at a rate recommended by the activity and approved by the Legislative Council.

2. One copy of the yearly publication, "El Rodeo," at a rate recommended by the activity and approved by the Legislative Council.

3. Subscription to the publication, "El Mustang."

4. Such additional privileges as may be prescribed by the Legislative Council.

**ARTICLE II  
Dues**

**Section A. Establishment, Collection, and Administration**

1. The required membership fee is subject to referendum upon the presentation of a petition containing the signatures of 35 per cent of the Associated Students to the Legislative

Council, through the Associated Student Legislative Secretary.

2. Active membership fees shall be collected by the College officials during quarterly registration and transmitted to the Graduate Manager for deposit to the account of the Associated Students.

3. The annual associate membership fee shall be established by the Legislative Council.

**Section B. Authority**

1. All provisions of this article are set forth in the Education Code of the State of California, Section 20845.5, 20845.6, and 20845.7, which shall be incorporated in full in the code pertaining to finances.

**ARTICLE III  
Duties and Qualifications of Officers**

**Section A. President**

1. Shall be chairman of the Executive Council.

2. Shall be responsible for calling and conducting meetings of the Associated Students and the Executive Council.

3. Shall have the power of appointment as delegated by the Constitution and By-Laws and the power of appointing temporary committees.

4. Shall be ex officio member of all Committees, Councils, and Boards.

5. Shall appoint nine justices to the Judicial Council with the approval of the Legislative Council.

6. Shall make appointments to fill any vacancy, subject to approval by the Legislative Council.

**Section B. Vice-President**

1. Shall be chairman of the Legislative Council.

2. Shall call and conduct meetings of the Legislative Council.

3. Shall assume duties of the President of the Associated Students in case of his absence or disability.

4. Shall assist the President in performing his duties.

5. Shall be a member of the Executive Council.

**Section C. Legislative Secretary**

1. Shall be Secretary of the Legislative Council.

2. Shall record the meetings of the Associated Students and of the Legislative Council and shall cause the minutes of such meetings to be filed in the permanent Associated Student office files.

3. Shall keep an attendance record of the Legislative Council and shall notify members of all meetings.

4. Shall keep a current list of the officers of Legislative Council Committees and other college students organizations formed from or by the legislature.

5. Shall notify members of the Legislative Council of all special meetings of the Associated Students.

6. Shall post the minutes of Legislative Council meetings within five days in at least five prominent places on the campus.

7. Shall post the minutes of the Associated Students within one week in at least five prominent places on the campus.

8. Shall act as chairman of the Legislative Council in the absence or disability of the Vice-President and shall appoint an acting Secretary.

9. Shall send minutes of the Legislative Council to members of the Executive, Legislative, and Judicial Council, the President of California State Polytechnic College and other appropriate persons.

**Section D. Executive Secretary**

1. Shall be Secretary of the Executive Council.

2. Shall record the meetings of the Executive Council and shall cause the minutes of such meetings to be filed in the permanent Associated Student office files.

3. Shall keep attendance records of the Executive Council and shall notify members of all meetings.

4. Shall keep a current list of committees and other college student organizations formed from or by the Executive Council.

5. Shall post the minutes of the Executive Council within five days in at least five prominent places on the campus.

6. Shall send minutes of the Executive Council to members of the Executive Council, Legislative Council, Chief Justice, the President of California State Polytechnic College, and other appropriate persons.

**Section E. Chief Justice**

1. Shall preside over all meetings of the Judicial Council.

2. Shall call meetings of the Judicial Council.

3. Shall appoint all committees

formed from the Judicial Council.

4. Shall be ex officio member of all committees formed from the Judicial Council.

#### Section F. Judicial Recorder

1. Shall be Judicial Recorder of the Judicial Council.

2. Shall record the meetings of the Judicial Council and shall cause the minutes of such meetings to be filed in the permanent Associated Student files.

3. Shall keep an attendance record of the Judicial Council and shall notify members of all meetings.

4. Shall keep a current list of committees formed from the Judicial Council.

5. Shall post the minutes of the Judicial Council meeting within five days in at least five prominent places on the campus.

6. Shall assume duties of the Chief Justice in his absence or disability and shall appoint an Acting Recorder.

7. Shall send minutes of the Judicial Council to members of the Judicial Council, chairman of the Legislative and Executive Councils, the President of California State Polytechnic College, and other appropriate persons.

#### Section G. Qualifications of President, Vice-President, Secretaries of the Legislative and Executive Councils, and members of the Judicial Council.

1. Shall have completed at least 90 units of collegiate study and shall not graduate during the term of office.

2. Shall carry at least twelve units each quarter of the academic year during the term of office.

3. Shall have an accumulative grade point average of 1.8 or above in academic work taken at this college at the time of nomination; shall maintain a 1.8 average or above during the term of office or will be subject to Judicial review and removal from office.

4. Shall have been in regular attendance at California State Polytechnic College at San Luis Obispo for at least two consecutive quarters immediately preceding nomination.

5. Shall hold active membership in the Associated Student Body.

#### Section H. Qualifications of other officers.

1. Elected and appointed officers of recognized Associated Student Councils, Boards, Committees, and other College Student organizations, except as enumerated in Article III, Section G, of these By-Laws shall have an accumulative grade point average of 1.0 or above in academic work taken at this college at the time of nomination or appointment; shall maintain this average during the term of office or will be subject to Judicial review and removal from office.

2. The provisions of this section shall be considered as minimum standards only. Organizations may set higher standards.

3. Shall hold active membership in the Associated Student Body.

#### ARTICLE IV

##### Elections

#### Section A. Election Committee

1. Shall be a standing committee of the Executive Council, organized as provided for in Article V, Section K, of these By-Laws.

#### Section B. Voting

1. The plurality voting system shall be used in electing all Associated Student Body Officers, as provided in the code pertaining thereto.

2. A secret ballot shall be used in all Associated Student elections.

#### Section C. General Spring Elections

1. The general election of the officers of the Associated Student shall be held during the hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesday and during the hours of 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. on the following Wednesday of the third, fourth, or fifth week of instruction in each Spring Quarter, the actual date to be set by the election Committee and approved by the Judicial Council.

2. Constitutional amendments, referenda, recalls, or such other matters as shall be properly presented shall be included on the ballot.

3. Nominations for the elective offices of the Associated Students shall open three weeks prior to the opening date of the election and close ten days prior to the opening date of the election.

4. An active membership card in the Associated Student Body shall be presented at the time of voting as evidence of registration.

5. A candidate must receive a plurality of the votes cast for the office for which he is running in order to be elected.

#### Section D. Special Election

1. At any time specified by the Judicial Council which conforms to the requirements assuring sufficient time for publicity, as provided in Articles VIII and IX of the Constitution, special elections must be held for the following reasons:

a. To fill a vacancy in the offices of Vice-President, Legislative Secretary or Executive Secretary of the Associated Student Body, as provided for in Article III, Section B through D and G and H of these By-Laws.

b. To vote upon constitutional amendments, referenda, recalls, or such other matters as shall be properly presented.

c. A candidate must receive a plurality of the votes cast for the office to be elected.

#### Section E. Records of Elections

1. The ballots and any other records of any Associated Student Body election shall be kept in the permanent Associated Student files for two weeks after the election.

2. Any person wishing to contest the official results of the election must do so within two weeks after the election.

#### ARTICLE V

##### Executive Council

#### Section A. Duties

1. Shall consider all legislation referred by the Legislative Council and shall present its recommendations to the Legislative Council and shall present its recommendations to the Legislative Council.

2. Shall be responsible with the Legislative and Judicial Councils for supervision and direction of the affairs, properties, and conduct of the Associated Student Body.

3. Shall establish standing rules for the conducting of business.

4. Shall be responsible for the master calendar of all college activities.

#### Section B. Boards

1. Shall be established with an appropriate code for each of the following Associated Student activities:

a. Athletics  
b. College Union  
c. Music  
d. Poly Royal  
e. Publications and Publicity

2. Shall conform to the provisions of the Associated Student Finance Code in requesting funds.

3. Shall be responsible to the Executive Council.

#### Section C. Board Members

a. The Student Chairman of board.

b. Other officers and members as provided in the codes pertaining thereto.

#### Section D. The Advisor

a. Each board shall elect and recommend to the Executive Council for its approval a candidate for the chairmanship of the board during the next year. This candidate shall be elected at a meeting held not later than the eighth week of instruction of each Spring Quarter.

#### Section C. Athletic Board

##### 1. Membership

###### a. Students

(1) Student Chairman elected by the board and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Six students at large appointed by the President of the Associated Students.

(3) The President of the Block "P" Society.

###### b. Advisors

(1) Two faculty members selected by the board, one of whom shall be elected by the board as its advisor.

(2) One faculty member appointed by the President of California State Polytechnic College.

(3) Director of Athletics

###### c. Graduate Manager

d. Two alumni members

2. All members shall be voting members except the graduate manager and alumni members.

3. Shall be responsible for the expenditure of allotted funds.

4. Shall be responsible for general policies concerning inter-collegiate athletics.

#### Section D. College Union Board

##### 1. Membership

###### a. Student

(1) Student Chairman to be elected by the board and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Student Secretary to be elected by the board.

#### (3) Student Treasurer to be elected by the board.

(4) The Chairman of each recognized Activity Committee.

(5) Six students at large chosen by application submitted to the board.

(6) Six students at large appointed by the President of the Associated Students.

b. Advisor, one of whom shall be elected by the board as advisor.

(1) One faculty member appointed by the President of California State Polytechnic College.

(2) College Union Social Director.

(3) One faculty member elected by the board.

(4) College Union director.

#### c. Alumni

(1) One alumnus who shall be the President of the Alumni Association or his appointed representative.

2. All members shall be voting members except alumni members and the College Union Director.

3. Shall be responsible for the expenditure of allotted funds.

4. Shall be responsible for conducting the College Union program.

#### Section E. Music Board

##### 1. Membership

###### a. Student

(1) Student Chairman elected by the board and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Two representatives elected by each established organization in the Music Department.

(3) Six students at large appointed by the President of the Associated Student Body.

b. Advisors, one of whom shall be elected by the board as its advisor.

(1) The head of the Music Department.

(2) One faculty member at large appointed by the President of California State Polytechnic college.

2. All members shall be voting members.

3. Shall be responsible for the expenditure of allotted funds.

4. Shall be responsible for general policies concerning music activities.

#### Section F. Poly Royal Board

##### 1. Membership

###### a. Student

(1) Student Chairman elected by the board and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) One student from each recognized department of the college as selected by the department clubs.

b. Advisors, one of whom shall be elected by the board as its advisor.

(1) One faculty member appointed by the President of the California State Polytechnic College.

(2) One faculty member elected by the board.

2. All members shall be voting members.

3. Shall be responsible for the expenditure of allotted funds.

4. Shall be responsible for conducting the annual Poly Royal.

#### Section G. Publications and Publicity Board

##### 1. Membership

###### a. Student

(1) Student Chairman elected by the board and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Editor of El Mustang elected by the board and approved by the Executive Council.

(3) Editor of El Rodeo elected by the board and approved by the Executive Council.

(4) Six students elected by and from the established publications and publicity staffs, representing business, editorial and production phases.

(5) Eight students at large appointed by the President of the Associated Students.

###### b. Advisors, one of whom shall be elected by the board as its advisor.

(1) One faculty member appointed by the President of California State Polytechnic College.

(2) Two faculty members elected by the board.

2. All members shall be voting members.

3. Shall be responsible for the expenditure of allotted funds.

4. Shall be responsible for general policies concerning student publications and publicity activities.

#### Section H. Divisional Councils—Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Engineering

1. Shall act as coordinating bodies between the groups represented by its membership and the Executive Council.

##### 2. Membership

###### a. Student

(1) A chairman who shall be elected by the membership and shall be their representative to the Executive Council.

(2) The President or elected representative of each recognized department club.

###### b. Faculty

(1) One faculty member at large, elected by the Council.

#### Section I. Residence Councils

1. Shall coordinate inter-resident activities.

##### 2. Resident Council Membership

a. Women's Inter-Dorm Council

(1) One representative elected by each women's dorm.

b. Men's Inter-Dorm Council

(1) One representative elected by each men's dorm.

3. Non-Resident Council Membership

a. One representative elected by each precinct by petition.

4. Each Council shall elect a chairman from its membership who shall be its representative to the Executive Council.

##### 5. Advisors

a. Each Council shall elect one faculty member.

#### Section J. Inter-Class Council

##### 1. Membership

a. A Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary-Treasurer elected in Spring Quarter by the incoming Council membership.

b. The Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers of the Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, and Senior classes.

c. The advisor of the most recently graduated class shall be the advisor.

d. The four class advisors.

2. Shall coordinate the policies and activities established by the four classes.

3. Shall plan and develop inter-class activities.

4. Shall initiate and conduct Freshman class activities until their officers are installed.

#### Section K. Standing Committees

##### 1. Rally Committee

###### a. Membership

(1) Chairman elected by the membership and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Forty-two members recommended by the chairman of the Rally Committee and approved by the Executive Council.

(3) One faculty advisor appointed by the President of California State Polytechnic College.

b. Shall be responsible for promoting college spirit and shall assist in conducting student activities.

c. Shall select the yell leaders.

##### 2. Award Committee

###### a. Membership

(1) Chairman elected in the Spring Quarter by the membership and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Eight members, two from each class, recommended by the chairman and approved by the Executive Council.

b. Shall recommend to the Executive Council the award of an activity key and certificate to eligible students.

c. All records shall be in the custody of the Activities Officer.

d. Shall be responsible for Activity Transcripts.

e. Shall select outstanding students for El Rodeo and "Mustang of the Week."

##### 3. Election Committee

###### a. Membership

(1) Chairman to be elected in the spring quarter by the membership with the approval of the Executive and Judicial Councils.

(2) Nine students appointed by the chairman and approved by the Executive Council.

b. Shall be responsible for conducting all elections of the Associated Student Body, as provided for in Article IV of these By-Laws.

c. Shall report the result of each election to the Executive Council and those results shall not be announced and declared official until received by the Executive Secretary.

d. Shall be responsible for establishing precinct boundaries.

#### 4. Student Government Committee

##### a. Membership

(1) Chairman elected in the Spring Quarter by the Executive Council.

(2) Twelve students, four from each division, appointed by the Chairman and approved by the Executive Council.

(3) One advisor elected by the committee.

b. Shall be responsible for continuously evaluating student government.

##### 5. Orientation Committee

###### a. Membership

(1) General chairman appointed in Winter Quarter by the Associated Student President and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Chairman of each student orientation activity appointed by the general chairman.

(3) Six students at large appointed by the Associated Student Body President.

(4) The Activities Officer shall be the advisor.

(5) The Guidance Officer.

b. Shall be responsible for planning and conducting the student phases of the new student orientation program.

##### 6. Personnel Committee

###### a. Membership

(1) Chairman appointed at the close of the academic year by the Associated Student Body President-elect and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Five students appointed by the chairman and approved by the Executive Council.

b. Shall be responsible for fulfilling the personnel needs of the various student activities and shall define the methods by which such needs shall be met.

##### 7. Homecoming Committee

###### a. Membership

(1) General chairman appointed in May by the Associated Student Body President-elect and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) A Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Publicity Director appointed by the general chairman.

(3) Activity chairmen appointed by the general chairman.

(4) The Activities Officer or his representative shall be the advisor.

(5) The Alumni Association Co-ordinator.

b. Shall be responsible for planning and conducting annual Homecoming activities in co-operation with the Alumni Association.

##### 8. Intramural Committee

###### a. Membership

(1) Chairman appointed by the Associated Student Body President during Spring Quarter and approved by the Executive Council.

(2) Chairman or co-chairman for each intramural sports activity appointed by the committee chairman and approved by the faculty advisor.

(3) One Athletic department faculty member appointed by the Dean of Students shall be the faculty advisor.

(4) Such other advisors, selected by the head of the Physical Education department, as may help plan and operate specific intramural sports programs.

b. Shall be responsible for planning and conducting the intramural sports program.

##### 9. Leadership Conference Committee

###### a. Membership

(1) General chairman elected by the membership at the annual Fall Leadership Conference.

(2) Activity chairmen appointed by the general chairman.

(3) The Activities Officer shall be the advisor.

b. Shall be responsible for planning and conducting leadership conferences.

c. Shall establish and maintain a follow-up program for conference suggestions.

#### ARTICLE VI

##### Legislative Council

#### Section A. Duties

1. Shall provide for an annual audit of Associated Student funds.

2. Shall establish standing rules for the conducting of business.

3. Each representative shall publish.

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## Students Talk With Governor Knight On Problem Of Juvenile Delinquency

Cal Poly presented some of its own ideas on juvenile delinquency to Governor Goodwin Knight this week through the first annual "Governor's Council on Juvenile Delinquency."

Art Morrow, Cal Poly social science major, returned yesterday with representatives of other schools in the San Luis Obispo area. They advanced the recommendations made at a special county-wide meeting on campus last month.

One urged the strengthening of liquor control with stricter punishment for adult suppliers. Other

recommendations included the following:

- (1) stricter punishment of juvenile delinquents and more probation officer follow-up (2) improvements of the county's recreational facilities (3) more emphasis on spiritual and moral values (4) establishment of counseling facilities for young people and their parents (5) a community council to plan wholesome activities and offer guidance and (6) greater adult participation in young peoples' activities.

The new constitution pointed out that he was representing too many special interest organizations in the present set up, and as a consequence, was not doing a thorough job of representation for the students.

The members of the panel representing the present constitution opposed the new constitution because they alleged it was too complicated. They wanted to keep a simple type of constitution that everyone could understand. However, the so-called simplicity of the present constitution was left unexplained.

In the next meeting of the class these conclusions were arrived at after attending the panel discussion, and studying the constitutions:

1. The panel discussion was too short to cover all the objectives brought up by the class;
2. The workings of both constitutions are still not clear to the members of this class, but they now have a better idea of their workings after this open forum on the constitutions;
3. There should be more open forums discussing, and showing how both constitutions work;
4. That El Mustang should inform the student body by means of: (a.) feature stories, more personal interviews with students on what they like or do not like about each constitution; (b.) reporting the college president's opinion; (c.) devoting more space to the issue in El Mustang.

requires the Foundation to budget funds for major repairs and maintenance items for these buildings assigned to the Foundation for student living purposes.

### Rates Moderate

"All these facts made it evident that the Foundation board must build up a fund for repairs, maintenance and replacement of furniture," said Brendlin. "The only means of accomplishing this is an increase in rates charged."

Even with the increase announced, Cal Poly's board and room rates are moderate as compared with the average of those across the nation and are somewhat less than those in effect at many other colleges in California, Brendlin declared.

The new rates bring the fees for the dormitories in line with those charged the married students for whom the rates have always been set at full cost including amortization of the buildings.

### Cash on Weekends

The board to be provided under the new plan will be three meals a day for five days a week, Monday through Friday. Students who wish to eat on campus Saturdays and Sunday may buy ala carte meals in the cafeteria on a cash basis.

Advantages to students in the new plan are numerous, Brendlin pointed out. A more convenient and less complicated ticket system can be developed. The five-days-a-week

feature provides flexibility which enables the student to eat off campus part of the time if he wishes and makes this opportunity available on weekends when he is most likely to desire a change.

### Improved Service

At the same time, the plan will give the student the benefits growing out of the more efficient operation of the cafeteria which will be possible when it is known in advance just how many students are to be fed at each meal. The planning which can be done for a regular number of dinners will result in improved quality and variety of foods, stated Brendlin.

By the time the new rates go into effect Cafeteria One will have been redecorated and refurnished. New furniture for Cafeteria Two is scheduled for the following year. New equipment will be added including food warmers, french fryers, new ovens and other items which will help the staff to increase the quality and variety of food served. A policy of serving 16 ounces of milk with each meal if desired will go into effect next year.

### Seven Men Going

Making the trek, accompanied by Coach Lee, are Eduardo Labastida, 119-lbs.; Pete Godines, 139-lbs.; Frank Loduca, 147-lbs.; Rudy Brooks, 156-lbs.; Jack Shaw, 176-lbs.; and Vic Buccola, heavyweight. Labastida and Shaw, out for the PCI's due to injuries, were issued invitations by those eligible to do such things. Fans hereabouts, after observing the duo's ability through one or more seasons, were confident both were good choices for national honors.

Any one of the Poly men could go all the way. Most of them waded through some toughies at the PCI's where the Mustangs ranked second only to powerful Idaho State. We placed a champion—Champion Frank Loduca! A good many of us felt we should have placed another—Champion Rudy Brooks! One of the judges evidently thought differently. With Shaw and Labastida who knows how far we could have gone?

In Labastida's place we had no one in Shaw's was Gordie Martinez who put on an impressive performance in the semi-finals (he drew a bye the first night) to whip San Jose State's Jack Nelson. He lost to UC's George Pelonis in the finals. Martinez, you must remember, had only one bout before entering the ring at the capitol city. That was a loss to Pelonis in a meet only days earlier.

### Sacramento Roundup

Here is a round-up on who Poly men met at Sacramento. Lelevier, the first go-around, bowed out to Al Julian of San Jose State. Julian had decided Lambert twice before, once in the home ring, once at San Jose. Long-limbed Julian had an advantage "build-wise" that Lambert couldn't overcome.

Godines ploughed through Welvin Stroud of San Jose State the first night, then Ted Ratcliff of Santa Clara. Dan Arntman of Idaho State came out title-holder in the finals.

Champion Loduca drew a bye the first night then ran into Joe Zeeben, a Washington State college boy, in the semi and his final prey was Stu Rubine of San Jose State. He handled him effectively, leaving the judges little doubt who was champion.

A Disappointment  
Every boxing match has its disappointment. A big one for Cal Poly fans came in the 165-pound class when the championship nod went to Bill Haynes of Idaho State instead of our Rudy Brooks. We're not going to concede, though. We're still calling Brooks champion, based on the tremendous showing he made in the northern ring. A bye the first night was followed by Jim Richardson of Chico State, then Haynes.

Buccola, in the first night bout, met Bob Burkin of Stanford. Burkin was highly touted, which seemed to mean little to Big Vic. He finished him off in good style, earning the right to match with George Stathos, the contro-

versal student-taxi cab driver-man of many "skills" from Sacramento State. Stathos had won his match by a knockout on opening night—a lucky punch that landed his opponent. Buccola proved quickly and well that Stathos was second-best. In the finals he met Hal Esby of Idaho State who with several service titles and considerable experience (although he's only a freshman at ISU this year) proved better of the two.

San Jose State is considered one of the finest teams in the west this year, officials maintain.

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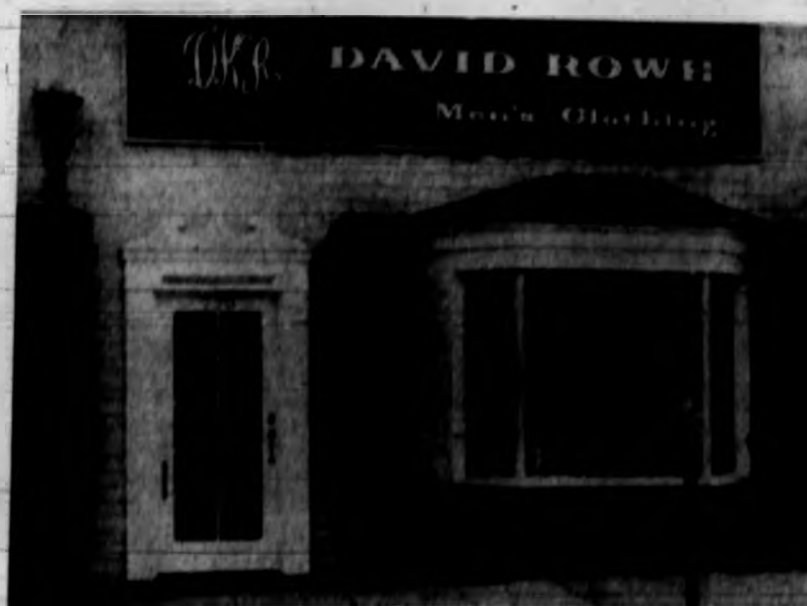
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### LA Editor Praises Poly From Abroad

lish and maintain at least one office hour per week.

4. Each representative shall inform his constituents following each Legislative Council meeting.

#### Section II. Membership

1. Elected officers of the Associated Student Body  
a. Vice-President  
b. Legislative Secretary

2. Representatives of the Associated Student Body to be elected by precinct areas.

a. A precinct area shall be comprised of 40-50 students which entitles them to one representative on the Legislative Council.

b. Maps of on-campus precincts shall be located in the Associated Student Body Office.

c. Elected by a plurality providing 2/3 of the members of the precinct vote or by a simple

majority of the precinct by petition.

3. Faculty advisors  
a. Two advisors to be appointed by President of California State Polytechnic College.

### ARTICLE VII Judicial Council

#### Section A. Duties

1. Shall establish standing rules for the conducting of business.  
2. Shall determine the eligibility of all candidates for appointive and non-appointive offices.  
3. Shall be responsible for the administration of oath of office to all Associated Student Body members of the student government.

### ARTICLE VIII Graduate Manager

#### Section A. Employment

1. The Graduate Manager will be selected by and be responsible to the Executive Council with approval of the President of California State Polytechnic College.

#### Section B. Duties of the Graduate Manager.

1. Shall assist the Finance Committee in the preparation of the annual budget.  
2. Shall submit a monthly financial statement to the Legislative Council.  
3. Shall act as fiscal officer and business manager of the Associated Students.  
4. Shall act according to the provisions of the Graduate Manager's Code.

### ARTICLE IX Activity Codes

#### Section A. Purpose

1. In order to provide a means for recording the specific regulations of any student activity, the Executive, Legislative, and Judicial Councils shall initiate activity codes.  
2. Such codes shall be initiated or amended in accordance with the provisions of the code established for this purpose.

### ARTICLE X Parliamentary Rules

Section A.  
1. Roberts' Rules of Order, revised, shall govern all Associated Students deliberations except where it is superseded by this Constitution and By-Laws.

### ARTICLE XI Amendments

#### Section A. Procedure

1. The proposed amendment must be initiated by either of the following two methods:  
a. Must be signed by at least twenty per cent of the members of the Associated Students and handed to the Legislative Council through Legislative Secretary.  
b. Must be proposed by two-thirds favorable vote of the total membership of the Legislative Council.  
2. The date of filing the petition and notices of the election, with a full statement of this amendment, shall be posted in five prominent places on the campus and shall be run in the columns of the paper of the Associated Students for two consecutive weeks prior to the election.  
3. Voting shall be by secret ballot, and a favorable majority vote of those voting shall be necessary to pass the amendment. Such an election shall be held under the provisions of Article IV of these By-Laws.  
4. Amendments shall take effect immediately upon passage by the required majority, unless a different time shall be specified on the ballot.



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
