Gale Manley Wins Queen's Election

Matmen Seek Win 14 Against Broncos Tonight

Lovell, Hall, Scales at Navy Meet

Unbeaten in thirteen outings, Coach Sheldon Harden's Mustang wrestlers host the University of Santa Clara tonight at 8 P. M. in Crandall gym. Even though the Poly squad will have to alter its starters they are still rated pre-match favorites. Three Mustang grapplers will be competing in the San Diego NTC tournament and won't be available for tonight's action.

Poly holds an earlier 22-8 triumph over the Broncos. Heavyweight Pat Lovell, 147-pound Tom Hall, and Del Scales (191) -- the trio participating at San Diego -- shouldn't be missed as the Poly outfit goes after win number 14.

Darwin McGill is to fill-in for Lovell, and Norm Geiger will wrestle at 137 pounds. Bill Corcoran, regular 137 pound Mustang entry, will move up to 147, taking Hall's place in the lineup.

Howard Bryant will compete at his usual 125 pound spot, while Harold Simonek will be the 130 representative. Jerry Canfield will go at 137. In the 167 pound division, Poly's Bob Machado is expected to find the action plenty

The clubs must submit their reports for "Mr." on or before Tuesday, Feb. 11, and candidate for "Mrs." next week. Final selections will be made Feb. 18.

She will be crowned at the formal Coronation Ball, held in the Camp San Luis Obispo National Guard Armory April 26. The other four finalists will serve as her royal court for the campus celebration. Music will be furnished by the Cal Poly Collegians.

Dick Wilson, Director of Special Events, announces the Jerry Gray orchestra will play for the Poly Royal Carnival dances April 25. The Carnival will be held in the north end of the football stadium this year.

Cotton Rosser, well-known rodeo contestant and Poly Alumnus, will furnish rodeo stunts for the two-day Poly Royal intercollegiate championship rodeo, according to Poly Rodeo Club President Tommie Brown.

The Second Annual Central Coast Science Fair has been scheduled for March 21-22 according to Dr. Ralph C. Collins, Education Department, who will help direct the affair.

The fair will be an exhibition of science projects made by elementary and secondary school students. For the first time awards will be given. Judging will be held in the Biological Sciences and Physical Sciences Division with students participating either in the group for seventh, eighth and ninth graders or grades 10, 11, and 12.

Last year the event, attracting about 725 projects, was held during Poly Royal. The fair has been moved up from Poly Royal and given a date of its own because of the tremendous response last year and because Poly Royal is the college's open house inspection while the fair is for grade school students. Under the new arrangements the number of projects is expected to reach between 800 and 1000.

Greg Ward, Bakersfield, Larry Fanning, Tullhull, South Dakota, Bill Nielsen, Santa Cruz, Marv Roberts, Salinas, and Riley Freeman, Baker, Oregon, complete the starting team. Alternates are Mike Parker, Arcadia, and Fred Gilbert, Van Nuys. Gilbert was on the Pierce JC squad last year.

Roberts was last year's collegiate world champion bulldogger.

Rodeo Club President Tom Brown said the first Rodeo at Clovis will probably include about nine teams, some of which are Arizona State at Tempe, Oregon Technical Institute at Klamath Falls, Pierce JC, Canoga Park, Fresno State and possibly U. of California at Davis.

Cagers Travel To Meet Aztecs in CCAA 'Toughie'

Coach Ed Jorgensen's Mustang cagers face the "impossible" tomorrow night when they take on the San Diego State Aztecs in a CCAA contest. The Border City bunch still have their eye on the conference cage title, and will be out to take a stride nearer that goal Saturday. To make the situation worse, the Aztecs were joined by Fresno State last week-end, 98-85, in a loop game.

Don't believe the southerners won't be out to make up for that trouncing.

The Aztecs meet Los Angeles State, currently sharing the top spot in the loop standings, Friday. A loss to LAS would mean the Border City crew certainly would have to defeat the Mustangs tomorrow night to stay in contention for the cage crown. Coupled with the fact the tilt is being played on the Aztec's home floor, it isn't difficult to see why the Saturday affair is "impossible."

A victory over the SDS five would give Poly its first CCAA triumph. The team currently has an 0-8 mark, compared to the Aztecs' 2-1 loop record.

Heading the Mustangs' efforts for a win tomorrow night will be Mike Simmons, 5-11 forward who heads the Poly scoring with a 17.8 points per game average. Veteran guard Len Oswald, 16, who missed last week's 75-64 conquest over Whittier, is expected to give San Diego a run for its money. Vic Di Giovanni, pogo shot artist, will also throw his 13.6 tallies per tilt mark against the Aztecs. Besides the Big Three leading scorers, 6-6 center Bob Thelford (8.4 average) and forward Rich Russell (8.4) will start against the Aztecs.

The sluggers of Coach Tom Lee lost a 7½-1½ decision to the SJS'ers on January 18. Last week-end the Leemen pasted College of Idaho, 4½-1½. The Mustangs will be underdogs in the match, but are eager to chalk up a conquest over the visiting Spartans.

Two Poly ringmen are undefeated, Don Adams, 165, and Don Tessier, 175, both will be out to protect their records. Adams declinated Idaho's Dick Cochrane, and was given a draw with SJS's Harold Mince. Tessier scored a TKO over Russ Camilleri of Prunville, and declinated Alan Tondore of COI, last Saturday.

Spartan Coach Julio Menendez is noted for strong boxing clubs, and the 1958 squad is no exception. The Northerners are unde-

feated, having bounced Nevada, along with the locals.

Three Spartans have gained national recognition for their boxing efforts. Nick Akana, 125, is a PCI champion and a NCAA finalist. At 139 Welvin Stroud is a top contender for both PCI and NCRA honors, as is Stu Rubine the Spartans' 147 pounder.
