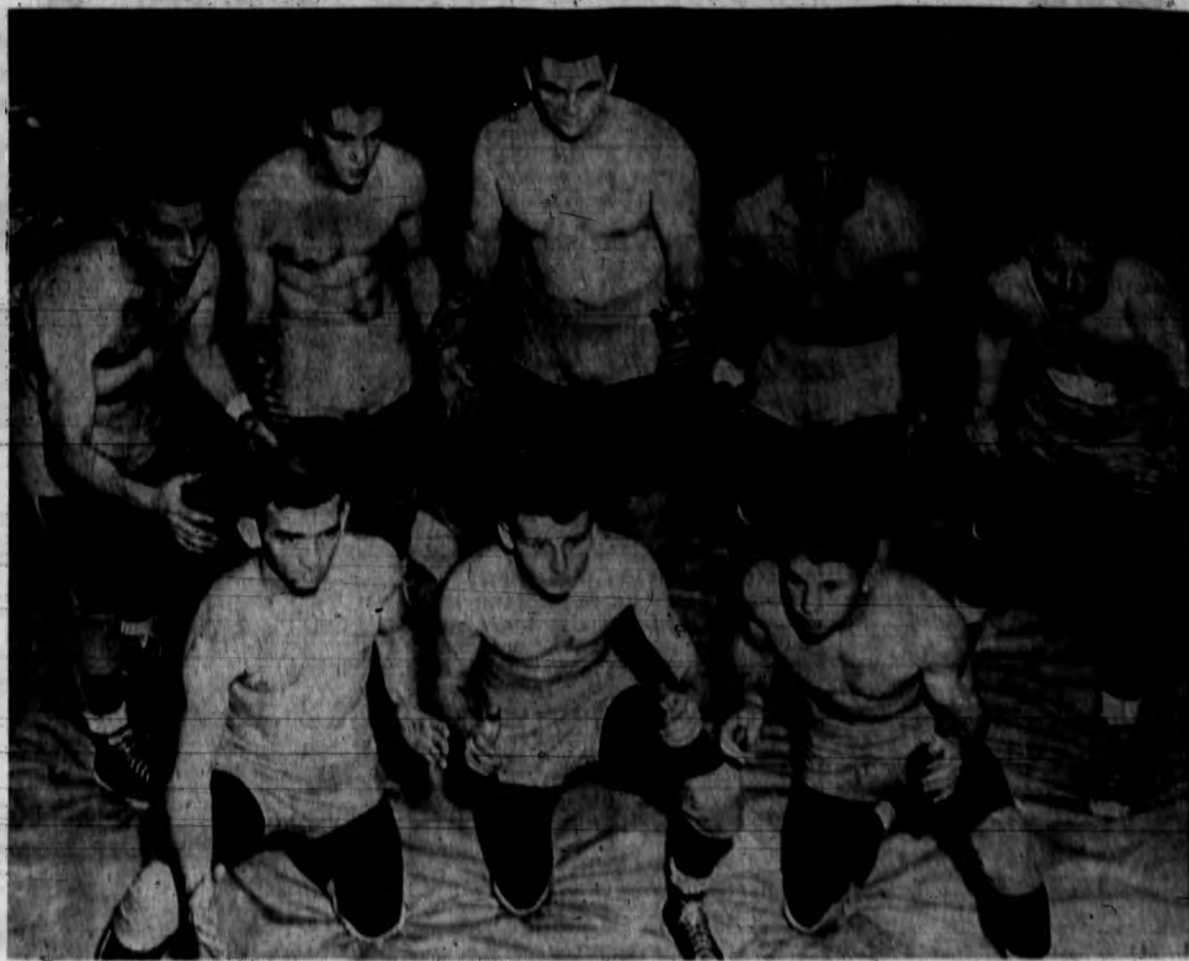

Last Friday night the Hardenmen posted win number 16 by putting Santa Clara Broncos, 88-22. To date the locals have scored 479 points to the opposition's 51. This ranks high—if not at the top—among college mat clubs in the country.

While the Mustangs have been drawing between 700-900 spectators for home outings, it is expected that Crandall gym will be filled to the rafters for the UCLA match.

Heading the Bruins' hopes for a triumph will be grid star Barry Hillington. He will probably go against Poly's 177-pounder Lynn Dyche. Dyche has scaled-down from 191. Freddie Ford, who has been a standout at 177, and Bob Machado (167) will be fighting it out to determine who will go against UCLA letterman Irv Septowitz.

Other probable bouts include Mustang Howard Bryant and Bill Choy at 125 pounds; Harold Simonek (180) against Bruin John Hogg; and Poly's Bill Corcoran and Glenn Alsko at 137. It is hoped Mustang Tom Hall's ankle will be improved so that he will be able to battle Jack Keester at 147. Jerry Canfield, Poly 157-pounder, is to meet Bill McKinley and it is likely Clint Whitfield will go against Mustang heavyweight Pat Lovell. There is a possibility that Del Mealea will wrestle Bruin Ed Felix in a 191-pound exhibition.

'Explorer' Satellite Engineer Speaks Thursday, P. M.

William H. Pickering, prominently identified with the "Explorer" satellite program, will speak at the Engineering Week assembly Thursday, February 20, at 7:30 p.m. in the AC Aud. The lecture is sponsored by the Engineering Council.

Dr. Pickering is Director of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory at California Institute of Technology. He has been a member of the Cal Tech faculty since 1946 when

he was appointed Professor of Electrical Engineering. He has been associated with the Jet Propulsion Laboratory since 1944, first having charge of work in electronics. In 1950 he was given responsibility for the Corporal missile program at the Laboratory. He became director in 1954.

He is a member of the United States National Committee's Technical Panel on the Earth Satellite program and chairman of its working group on tracking and computation. He has been a member of the Scientific Advisory Board of the Air Force and chairman of the Research and Development Board's panel on guided missile test range instrumentation.

Freshmen Win Inter-class Swimming Title

Hotly contested action marked the recent Inter-Class Swim Meet, which the Freshmen annexed with 58 points. The Juniors were runners-up with 79 tallies, while the sophomores collected 75. The Seniors managed 11.

Feature of the meet was the 50 yard butterfly, in which the college record of 29.4 seconds was broken three times. Freshman Allen Starr and Junior John Carr erased the existing mark in the preliminaries, while frosh Ken Geisler established the final record of 28.7 seconds in the final racing of the event.

Cagers Drop Two Conference Tilts

Poly's Mustang cagers limped home this week following a disastrous COAA two-game tour to the Southland last Friday and Saturday. Long Beach State handed the locals a 57-78 pasting, and long and lanky Los Angeles State duplicated the trick, 77-55. The pair of losses makes the Mustangs' loop record stand at 0-6, and the season standard, seven wins and 12 setbacks.

The locals host San Diego State this Friday night, and travel to meet Pasadena College, Saturday. Mike Simmons, 5-11 all-COAA pace the scoring for Coach Ed Jorgensen's crew. Simmons has 318 points in 19 games for a 16.8 mark. Veteran guard Len Oswald has 287 tallies, and a 15.7 figure per contest. Sophomore standout Vic Di Giovanni has a 13.5 mark. While this trio of regulars dominate the statistics, starters Bob Thetford, 6-6 center, and forward Rich Russell have chipped-in with their 6.2 and 5.2 averages. Guard Ed Krienke sports a 5.5 points per game mark.

An upstart Mustang boxing team earned a 4-4 tie with heavily favored 1957 NCAA champion Idaho State last Saturday night in Crandall gym. A near-capacity crowd watched the Poly punchers go ahead of the ISC'ers, 4-3 only to have Dale Latham and Hal Esby pound out wins over Mustangs Gory Martinez and Don Tessier to knot the count. Both Latham and Esby are '57 national champs.

Coach Tom Lee's Mustangs now sport a 1-2-1 record. They host Chico State at 8 P.M. in Crandall gym this Saturday night.

Poly's sophomore Walt Halley took a split-decision over Bill Haynes, last year's NCAA 147-pound titlist, in a 189-pound slugfest, which was one of the classic performances of the evening.

The results: 125 pounds—Dave Aberts scored second-round TKO over Poly's Ed Murakami, 132 pounds—Mustang Bernie Martinez scored a split-decision triumph over Ben Simpson of ISC, 155 pounds—Halley defeated Haynes, 147—Non-Rail, ISC's NCAA 139 champ counter-punched his way to decision over Poly's Bob Alvarez. Alvarez proved to be a real crowd pleaser, 155 pounds—Poly's Sam Marquis hit 165 pounds—Yelaman Mustang Don Adams outboxed Don House for unanimous decision, 175 pounds—Gordy Martinez gave ISC's Dale Latham all he could handle in losing one of his best bouts. 187—Somebody failed to inform Poly's Don Tessier that his foe—NCAA heavyweight champ Hal Esby—was top man in brawling and throwing wild punches in the second round. Tessier ran out of gas in the final 30 seconds, but hung on to win acclaim of the partisan crowd.
