## IE Major Wins Poly Royal Design Contest

An Industrial Engineering major has won the design contest for this year's Poly Royal button contest, sponsored by the Collegiate FFA.

Emil Saxberg of Berkeley won the \$15 cash award for his design of a Mustang hunting through a test tube. The button will be in three colors—green, gold and black.

Saxberg's design was selected by a special committee representing the college's three divisions.

The large, three-inch buttons will go on sale to students and San Luis Obispo merchants about the end of March to advertise the forthcoming Poly Royal, April 25-26. The price will be 25 cents.

Acceptance of the buttons last year proved so successful that the CFAA has ordered 1800 of them this year.

Cal Poly will be well-represented in the next production of the San Luis Obispo Little Theater, "The Love of Four Colonels," to be presented in the Elmo Theater at 8:00 on Friday and Saturday evenings, February 21 and 22.

Kenneth Holmes, Architectural Engineering instructor, is producer and director of the play. Wayne Ford, Senior Aeronautical Engineering student will play the part of the American Colonel, and Joe DeMarko, Senior Social Science major, is acting as stage manager and lighting and sound director.

Phyllis Milos, who will portray the "Sleeping Beauty," is the wife of Robert Milos, Senior Mechanical Engineering student.

Wicked, waggish, and witty, the play, written by Peter Ustinov, author of the current Broadway hit, "Romanoff and Juliet" is a saucy satire which pokes ribald fun at international politics and the eternal struggle between the forces of good and evil.

It had successful runs both on Broadway and in London.

The Colts play the local High school Tigers tonight in a 6 P.M. warm-up, and travel to meet Monterey Peninsula College tomorrow.

If the thought of having to meet the title-contending Aztecs and the winning (20-3) Crusaders wasn't enough to give mentor Ed Jorgensen the jitters, the possibility of losing leading scorer Mike Simmons via an injury, could. At last report, it was not determined whether the 5-11 forward would be able to participate. He is bothered with a lingering back ailment.

The Border City five and Fresno State continue to fight for the CCAA cage crown. Their first division record sparkles when compared to Poly's 0-6 loop standing. Both clubs hold previous victories

over the locals. Pasadena trounced the Mustangs in the Redlands Invitational tourney on their way to the tournament crown.

High-scoring Astor Archie Rambeau has graduated at mid-year. Ordinarily, a loss similar to this would be a great blow, but coach George Ziegenfuss has a bevy of performers to play.

Tonight's starters shape-up with Poly's Simmons (12-1) and Rich Russell (6-2) at forwards, against Aztecs Ray Waters and Bernie Finlay, both 6-8; Mustang center Bob Thetford (6-6) against 6-5½ Tom Noonan; and Astor guards Blake Neal and Hal Brown both 6-0 going against Poly's Len Oswald (5-10) and Vic DiGiovanni (5-11).

Coach Lee indicated Chico has always been a tough opponent for the Mustangs. He has hopes that the crew could "keep up a full head of steam" such as was demonstrated last week-end against ISC. He indicated a letdown could prove fatal for the green and gold.

A nine-bout card is on tap for the affair. Eight matches will sag in the scoring column. Ed Tully, 165-pounder, is slated to fight an unnamed Wildcat in an exhibition feature.

Poly's record now stands at 1-2-1. The lone victory came at the hands of College of Idaho; and San Jose State has victimized the Lee-men twice.

Veteran Mustang Don Adams, 165, is the only undefeated Poly performer. He will fight Wildcat Gene Karr tomorrow night in a bout which features a duo of experienced mittmen.

In the 125-pound clash, Poly's

Bobby Sals is slated to go against Don Stapp. Chico's George Aranda will be matched with Ernie Martinez in the 132-pound bout. Bobby Alvarez, ragged local puncher, is to meet Chico's Hal Canter at 139 pounds. Stylish left-hander Walt Halley will be out to out-bust Chico's Bill Moule in the 147-pound debacle.

At 150 pounds, Mustang Sam Marquon's opponent has yet to be named. Still fighting at 175, rather than heavyweight, Gordy Martinez is to face Wildcat Ed Netherton. John Nelson is to go against Mustang heavyweight Don Tessier.

Coach Bill Hicks makes his local debut with his 1958 Mustang baseball squad tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 against a "star-studded" alumni nine.

Tomorrow's contest will be the final rehearsal for the Mustangs. They travel to USC and Stanford, Feb. 28 and March 1 before opening the home slate Mar. 7-8 against the El Toro Marines. Rain and wet grounds has plagued the squad's progress, and Hicks indicated the outfit needed "much polishing" before launching the campaign.

## UCLA Falls; Undefeated Wrestlers Await PCI's

Coach Sheldon Harden's Mustang wrestlers downed UCLA, 19-10, last Wednesday night with 1,400 spectators witnessing the local matmen chalk-up their sixteenth consecutive win in the last dual-meet of an undefeated season.

Next stop for the locals is the Oakland Far Western tournament, March 1-2. A ten-man Poly crew will be on hand for the PCI tourney in San Jose, Mar. 7-8. It is probable that the hometowners, who piled up 470 points this year against the opposition's 55, will be the PCI pre-tourney favorites.

Mar. 21 is the date for the I.A.M. Wyo. NCAA's. It is hoped "financial backing" is available to send the locals as an entry.

UCLA proved to be as stubborn as their advance publicity indicated. With but two bouts left, the Bruins were trailing 14-8 and had opportunity to draw or upset the Mustangs. Poly's Lynn Dyche, however, in the 177-pound clash, grabbed a 4-2 decision over Ivan Catton which put the locals out front for good.

The result: UCLA's John Hunt (188) defeated Howie Bryant, 7-0. In the 180 battle, Mustang Harold Simmons was forced to pursue Ken Matsumoto for decision. Bill Cameron (187) showed decision. Bill Cameron (187) showed two periods before registering a 1-1 tie in decisioning Bruin Roy Freeman. The only Mustang win of the night was dealt UCLA's Warren Kaufman by Tom Hall in the 147-pound bout. Hall needed but 5:01 to turn the trick.

Poly's Jerry Landis (165) looked like a brief later at work with his deliberate and industrious 10-2 decision over Bill McKinley. Mustang Freddie Ford (167) bout-up with heralded Barry Williamson for more than two rounds, but at 7:00 minutes was defeated by a pin. In the 145 bout Dyche defeated Catton on a 4-2 decision. Catton's second period two-point penalty afforded Dyche the margin of victory. UCLA's heavyweight Clint Whiteside was not to session in match with Pat Lovell. The two bruisers battled to a 1-1 draw in a 147-minute exhibition. Poly's freshman standout John Liles scored a 7-1 decision over Ivy Antunovic.

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Gene Lenz, Mustang swimming great, shattered the National AAU 880 yard record last Wednesday night in the Santa Maria 20-yard pool. Lenz' time was 9:48.4—11 seconds better than the former record of 9:59.4 held by Arne Borg of the Illinois Athletic Club.
