Art outreach program earns national recognition

A Cal Poly art education outreach program designed to put the arts back into county elementary schools has received national recognition and will become a partner in a nationwide effort to advance the role of arts in educating children.

The outreach project to be part of the Arts Education Partnership is the California Arts Council Demonstration Project, headed by Susan Duffy and Kathleen Friend of the Liberal Studies Department.

The Cal Poly project is a partnership of the Liberal Studies Department, the Lucia Mar Unified School District and the San Luis Obispo County Arts Council. Supported with funds from the California Arts Council, it is a three-year program to assess the influence of the arts on the academic achievement of children in all Lucia Mar elementary schools. The project follows 818 students from third through fifth grade.

Six resident artists provide 22 hours of supplemental visual arts instruction. All teachers in the district are invited to participate in professional development workshops addressing California's newly adopted visual and performing arts framework and standards. □

Internet 2 team seeking project proposals

The Cal Poly Internet 2 (I2) team is soliciting proposals for mini-grants to fund projects related to I2, a consortium of more than 200 universities working to deploy advanced networks and networking applications.

As part of Cal Poly's participation in Internet 2, the university is connected to other participating universities via a super-high-speed backbone network. The Cal Poly group is looking for proposals that will use the capabilities of the network to facilitate creative teaching and research opportunities at Cal Poly.

Applicants sought for Fulbright scholarships

Applicants are being sought for the 2004-2005 Fulbright U.S. Student Program competition.

The grants provide opportunities to study and conduct research in other nations with the aim of increasing mutual understanding through educational and cultural exchange and serving as a catalyst for long-term leadership development.

The U.S. Student Program awards approximately 1,000 grants annually and operates in more than 140 countries. Full grants generally provide funding for round-trip travel, living costs for an academic year, health and accident insurance, and full or partial tuition. In addition, Fulbright "travel-only" grants are available to some countries.
