Wilson Proposes Insurance Against Poly Royal Rain

Five thousand dollars for rain? Yes, if one-twentieth of an inch or more falls April 25-26 during the Poly Royal Celebration. Poly Royal Board Director of Special Events Dick Wilson proposed that the Board pass action to insure the celebration for an extra \$1000 this year.

"According to all predictions received so far from Farm Journal and Long Range Weather Reports, we will have rain," Wilson said. The insurance policy would cover the sum of \$3000 for the rodeo and \$2000 for the carnival. This is an increase of \$1000 for the carnival proposed for this year's celebration. Estimated income for the rodeo is \$2,500 and \$2,600 for the rodeo this year.

The Hartford Fire Insurance Company Rain Insurance Policy states, "Loss under this Policy is contingent upon rainfall during a specific period of time on the day insured. Arrangements should be made so that rainfall reading will be taken at the location, during the period of time and under the conditions mentioned in the Policy."

Enrollment Down 106 This Quarter

As the year continues the number of students usually decreases and this quarter is no exception. This quarter 8706 students enrolled on a full time basis, according to Associate Dean of Admissions, C. Paul Winner, compared to 8812 Winter Quarter.

The number of coeds also decreased by five, from 321 to 316 enrolled this spring. Limited students number 161.

Engineering division students led in registration with the agricultural division second and the growing arts and sciences division third.

Students can look forward to a vacation studied Spring Quarter with Easter, Poly Royal, and Memorial Day holidays. Midterms are scheduled for May 5-9 with graduation ceremonies being held June 14.

The success of our team was a team effort, yet only a portion of this team was allowed to go to the NCAA tournament at Laramie, Wyo., to represent our school and also to represent the schools which are PCI members.

Three deserving members and the team manager were not able to go to the NCAA, because SAC would not allocate the money to send the entire team. After Rally committee raised \$1,100 to send the team SAC offered the scant sum of \$650.

It seems to me that a team which has brought much recognition to our school should be sent as a team in its entirety and it is pretty poor when our school cannot finance this trip for the entire team, especially to a most deserving team.

Editor's Note: ASB President Chuck Cummings said he received a lettered memo from Coach Sheldon Harden asking SAC for \$1710. Harden said he realized that although he would like to take the entire team to the national meet to represent Cal Poly and Pacific Coast College, he knew it was not possible. SAC allocated the difference between \$1710 and the amount collected by the Rally Committee. This amounted to about \$610 which was taken out of the contingency fund. The fund now has about \$200 left in it for the remainder of the year.

Swimmers Entertain Today

National television audiences watched Poly's Gene Lens nab fourth place in the 440 freestyle event, and the Mustangs' seventh point in the NCAA swimming championships in Ann Arbor, Mich. last Saturday. The Poly entry also took third in Thursday's 1500 meter event. His 440 time in the 440 finals was 4:14.

Michigan won the NCAA title with 72 points. Yale's 68 were good for second. Lens' times shattered existing Poly marks. His 1500 meter performance of 19:40 erased 52 seconds off the former Mustang record. His 4:14.8 qualifying time in the 440 was 5.8 seconds better than the former mark.

The splashes of Coach Dick Anderson entertain the Arden Hills swimmers at 8 o'clock this afternoon. The visitors are rated the top swimming group in Northern California and will undoubtedly give the Mustangs their roughest "go" of the year.

Two Poly Boxers In Finals

Coach Tom Lee's Mustangs placed 118-pound Ed Murakami and Walt Halley (147) in last Saturday night's NCAA boxing championships, which San Jose State captured with 23 points.

The Leeman posted 4 tallies. Murakami dropped a decision to SJS's T. C. Chung and Halley was outpointed by Idaho State's Walt Sheppardson.

Idaho State, defending champion, was runner-up with 21 counters. San Jose won four of the ten individual championships.

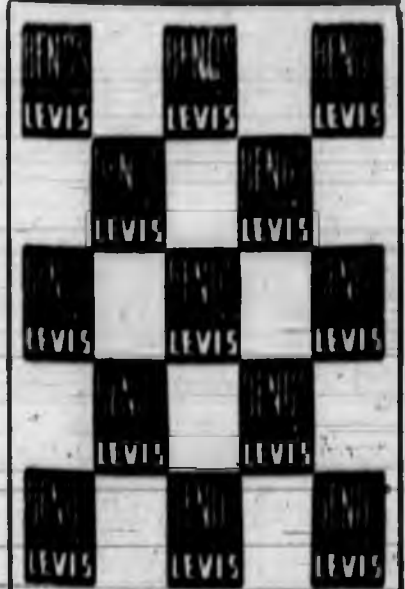
