

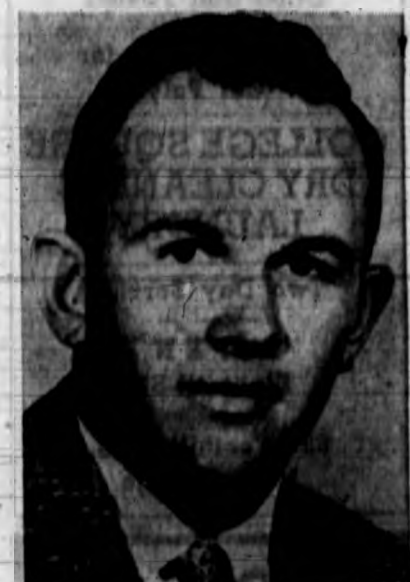


Dick Streeter

SAC Rules on Objection To Campaign Procedure

An objection claiming a violation in candidate Dick Wilson's campaign procedure was submitted to Student Affairs Council by Dick Streeter's campaign manager, Glenn Farber at the regular meeting Tuesday night.

In qualifying his objection, Farber stated that Wilson gave talks to the Engineering and Agricultural Councils and attempted to do so at the Arts and Science Council meeting before campaigning was allowed to open April 7.

Farber went on to say that Wilson said, "I am here asking for your support and not campaigning in any way." Farber then asked, "Is not enlisting support the definite purpose of campaigning?"

Members of each of the councils claimed that Wilson had not campaigned at any of their meetings. In fact, one said Wilson was not sure he would be running for office at the time he attended the meeting.

A recommendation from the election committee that Wilson not be disqualified, but that an item be placed in El Mustang stating that he did not technically violate campaign rules and that his actions were not approved was voted down. A motion to disqualify Wilson,

and to reopen nominations for two days was also voted down.

In a statement to El Mustang after the meeting Farber said, "My intent and purpose in submitting my objection, in behalf of Dick Streeter, to certain methods used by Dick Wilson in campaigning was only to inform the student body that a fair campaign should be the objective of any candidate. Also, this was intended to show decided inadequacies of existing campaign rules.

"This action was not intended as a means of slander. I feel my objection to advance publicity was part of the duty in my assuming the role of campaign manager."

Wilson said, "The circumstances which developed at the candidates meeting on Monday night and aired in the SAC meeting Tuesday night were unfortunate. I was accused of campaigning before the prescribed time, however, testimony offered by the membership of the three divisional councils has proven that I was not attending their meetings to campaign, but merely to enlist their groups' support in the current election campaign. I do not feel that I was in any way campaigning ahead of the prescribed time. I don't believe the students at Cal Poly are looking for this type of issue in a presidential campaign, and I hope you will examine my qualifications along with those of my opponent and then make your decision and vote April 15-16."

Other SAC action included contracting rain insurance for Poly Royal to protect the student body with \$3000 for the carnival and \$1500 for each of the two days of the rodeo.

Norm Geiger's appointment to the Board of Athletic Control was approved.

Preferential Vote System to be Used

The battle-scarred head of elections rises again this week as nominees prepare for another race for student tallies.

And battle-scarred it is. The campus has seldom seen a more battered campaign than this year's. With campaign accusations, attempted disqualifications, and write-in candidates this election should prove to be one of the most exciting in a long time.

As El Mustang went to press Don Roberts, Social Science Junior of San Luis Obispo also put in his bid for the presidency. Roberts, Music Band chairman and drummer in the Collegians, is a "last-minute" candidate and will be running on a write-in ticket.

An elections assembly is scheduled for Monday, April 14, at 7 P.M. in the AC Auditorium. Each candidate will have five minutes to speak and will be open for questions from any member of the student body. All students are urged to attend.

A preferential voting system will be used in the election to eliminate the necessity of a possible run-off vote. Under this system, when the two top candidates do not receive a majority vote, second-choice votes from the third candidate are re-counted and these votes go to the designated candidates.

Voting first and second choice for the same candidate does not help that candidate because the second choice vote would not be counted under these circumstances. On the other hand, voting second choice for someone else does not hurt the first choice candidate since second choice votes are not counted unless that candidate has the lowest number of first choice votes.

Many Attractions Set for Poly Royal

A mechanical robot, multi-colored chicks riding a miniature merry-go-round to pay for their supper, a "sonic" washing machine, are but few of the attractions lined up for Cal Poly's 25th annual Poly Royal, April 25-26.

Something new has been added to the Poly Royal, too. This year the carnival will be held in the north end of the football stadium, instead of on State Street, as in the past. Reason given for the change by carnival chairman Ed McGraw is the inadequate space on State Street and tie-up of traffic experienced during previous Poly Royal carnivals.

Bill of fare for the carnival dance will include some of the dreamiest music in the world, provided by radio-television-recording star Jerry Gray and his fifteen piece Hollywood orchestra.

This year's Poly Royal rodeo will feature some of the top bucking stock in the west, according to Rodeo Club president Tommie Brown. Brown reveals that stock contractor Cotton Roesser will furnish stock for the rodeo. Roesser, Cal Poly alumnus from Marysville, was one of the outstanding collegiate rodeo stars when he attended Poly.

Poly Royal opening ceremony will be broadcast from the clock tower, announces General Superintendent Jim Troxel. The ceremony itself will take place in President McPherson's office.

Left Sparks and his Poly Playboys have been signed to provide music for the Saturday night western dance, while the Cal Poly Collegians will play for the formal Coronation Ball to be held at the Camp San Luis Obispo Armory again this year.

Noted Architect Praises Poly's Department

Cal Poly's Architectural Engineering department has received a highly complimentary appraisal from Buckminster Fuller, internationally-known architect best known for his modern parenthood of the geodesic dome. And Fuller's compliment came from Osaka, Japan, where he talked with Bob Stein, Agricultural Journalism alumnus now representing the U. S. Department of Commerce at Osaka's International Trade Fair.

"Last evening I had dinner with Fuller," Stein writes Cal Poly officials. "His comment on Cal Poly is something I want to pass along."

"After visiting the school's architectural engineering department, he said he believes Cal Poly is one of the three most promising schools in the United States for an architectural student."

The Osaka fair opens April 12. Stein, on leave from an executive job with Western Fair Association, Sacramento, was trained for international duties at Brussels and now is "on his own" at Osaka.

From gridiron to classroom:

Math Teacher Here Tells Experience in Orange Bowl

Have you ever heard of training football players like racing dogs? That is how the Santa Clara Broncos were prepared for the 1950 Orange Bowl game, says Saxon Wraith, fullback of that team and now a mathematics teacher here.

Wraith said that since the climate in Florida is hotter and

more humid than it is in Santa Clara, Bronco Coach Len Casanova wondered how to get his team used to the change in weather to play a good game.

His assistant's father, Jack Roche, had a string of racing dogs that competed all over the country. They asked him how he trained them for racing in Florida. He told the Bronco coaches he trained them at home and went to the racing site a day before the race. They weren't trained in the Florida climate, but had one good race in that weather.

Casanova decided to try it. He held all team workouts in Santa Clara. Five days before the Orange Bowl game against U. of Kentucky they started for Florida. They stopped twice to workout on the way, but held no practice sessions in Miami.

It worked. They dunned the favored Kentucky team, 20-17. "We were used to playing the whole game being from a small school and were as fresh in the second half as we were at the beginning of the game," Wraith said. "It was all Kentucky the first half as they pushed us back to our goal, time after time and even scored once, but Hall Haynes, who later played for the Los Angeles Rams, kept us in the game with some beautiful punts. In the second half our endurance began to show and it was our ball game."

Wraith played high school football at Chico and went to Santa Clara, hoping to be a lawyer. (Cont. on page 4)

ERA covering 25 1/3 innings.
