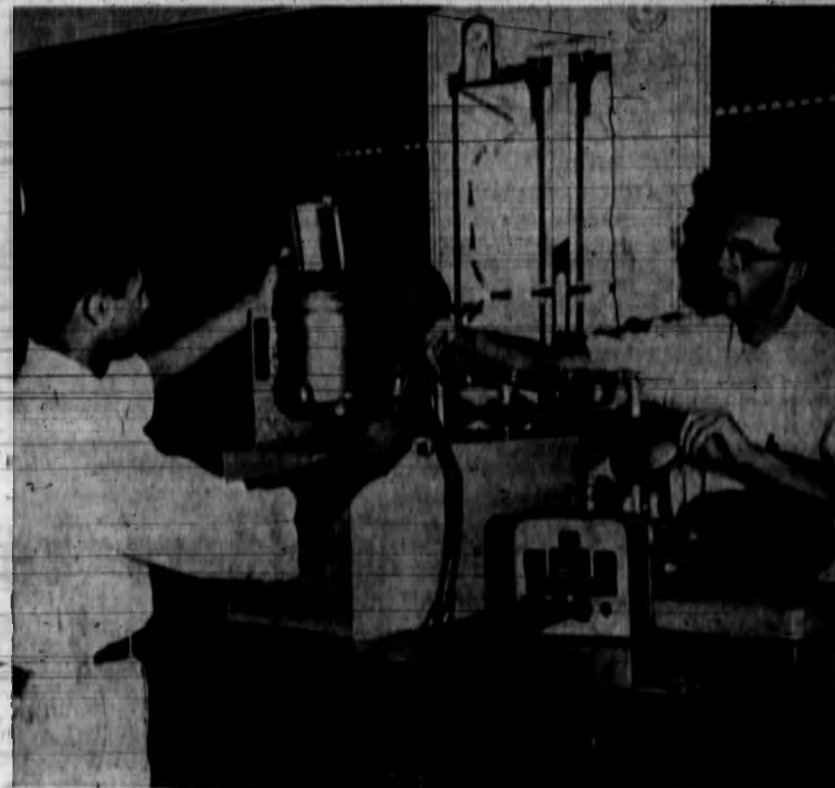

San Jose Cancels '59-'60 Grid Tilts

California Poly, San Luis Obispo, announced last week the cancellation of 1959 and 1960 scheduled football games with San Jose State College.

Roy Hughes, Cal Poly athletic director and head football coach, announced the decision following a request for cancellation last week by San Jose State officials who said they were seeking games with University of Oregon and Washington State College on the dates now held by Cal Poly—(Oct. 10, 1959 and Oct. 20, 1960).

Hughes says the Mustangs will play San Jose State this season on Oct. 11 at San Jose. Last year, Cal Poly defeated San Jose State 14 to 7. In 1955 and 1956, San Jose State won by 28 to 22 and 20 to 14 scores.

During the past three seasons, Cal Poly has won 22 and lost seven contests. Last year they were undefeated in collegiate play.

Hughes says he will attempt to fill the open dates in 1959 and 1960 with major inter-sectional opponents.

of a Centrifugal Filter", concerns using centrifugal action to filter a fluid without the use of electrical motors.

Worked Together

Mueggenburg and Cutti worked together on the paper which they also completed for their senior project. This marks the fifth time in eight years that Cal Poly entrants have won the award. It is the first time it has been awarded to two students working as a team.

The trophy is presented in memory of Mac Short, the former chief engineer for the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation to the young engineer who has contributed the most during the past year to engineering. After completion of the paper it is presented to a panel of engineers who choose the winner. Students this year participating were from Loyola University and Northrup Aeronautical Institute.

"Oil was used as the testing medium because of its lubricating qualities and because its viscosity could be changed at will by raising and lowering its temperature," explains Mueggenburg.

Many Uses

"Although time did not permit the testing of fluids other than oil we are positive that this unit will work equally well for purifying cutting fluids, grinding coolants, hydraulic fluids in automotive and aircraft manufacturing plants. It will also serve its purpose well in food processing plants as well as the chemical industry," continues Mueggenburg.

"The force which rotates the unit is provided by the pressure of the fluids which is forced through two nozzles located at the top of the rotor unit. The filtering action takes place when the suspended particles are acted upon by the centrifugal force which throws the particles toward the outside bottom of the rotor. Usually these suspended particles are harmful and need to be removed, however, at other times the filtration engineer is particularly interested in filtering out these suspended matter for a future use," Mueggenburg said.

Mueggenburg and Cutti were representing the local chapter of SAE while the award is presented by the Southern division of SAE.

Three Weekend Games End Home Baseball Slate

Making their last home appearance of the season, Cal Poly's Mustang baseballers host a pair of CCAA foes this week-end in three contests. The charges of mentor Bill Hicks entertain the Santa Barbara College Gauchos today at 3 P.M. and play the Los Angeles State Diablos, tomorrow, in a 12:30 doubleheader.

The Gauchos hold two victories over the Hicksmen, who now have a 1-10 won-loss record in loop play. The Mustangs, who are 5 and 23 on the season, have yet to play LA State. A previous engagement between the two clubs was rained out and will be played later this month.

Since last Friday the locals have dropped four contests—three of them to Marine nine. Last Friday the San Diego Leathernecks posted a 10-2 win over Poly, and Monday and Tuesday of this week the Camp Pendleton Marines pounded out 18-2 and 4-2 conquests over the Hicksmen. Fresno State, in the Raisin City last Saturday, posted a 2-0 CCAA triumph over the Mustangs.

Big righthander Jim Newkirk

was tagged with two of the week's setbacks even though the fast-baller allowed but four hits in each tilt. Costly errors and lack of timely hitting proved fatal for the Mustangs.

Though reserve catcher-outfielder Marv Almond is hitting at a .300 clip the leading regular hitter Lew Gentry is carrying a .290 mark. Following the righthander in hitting is first sacker Greg Briggs with a .274 mark. Third baseman Ray Kunes has a .278 average.

It is likely Newkirk will twirl against the Gauchos today, with Steve Whitesides—Poly's only southpaw—along with Dick Simmons and Gene Callan ready for relief work and a starting assignment against the Diablos.

Thinclads Grab Fourth Place In CCAA Meet

Although Fresno State romped to its sixth consecutive CCAA track crown last Saturday in Los Angeles, Poly's thinclads pulled themselves from the 1957 basement to a fourth place this year among the six loop members.

Coach Jim Jensen's spikers tallied 12 1/2 points compared to 80 for USC, 80 for San Diego State, and 37 1/2 for Santa Barbara College. Long Beach with 7 1/2 and Los Angeles with 6 points finished behind the locals.

Art Wilson led the Mustangs in scoring. He placed second in the broad jump and tied with Poly's Steve Walter for second in the high jump.

Henry Ellis copped a third in the 120 H.H. Roosevelt Wilson placed fourth in the broadjump, and Ernie Shelton tied for fourth place in the high jump. The Mustang relay foursome came in third to conclude the Poly scoring.

Jensen expects to take a small crew to tomorrow's West Coast Relays in Fresno.

Poly Nabs State Swim Title; Lenz Top Splasher

Cal Poly's swim team climaxed a successful year by annexing the State College swimming and diving championships last week-end in Fresno. Gene Lenz, Mustang all-time great, established three meet marks in Fresno, to bring his total of State College records to five. While Coach Dick Anderson's splashers were piling up 115 points to cop the crown, Lenz was making history in the 220 freestyle, 200 yard individual medley, and the 440 freestyle. He already holds the record for the 1500 meters and 200 butterfly.

Poly's Tom McFadden is pre-meet favorite to cop top honors. A native Santa Barbaran, McFadden holds the Montecito CC course record—a 64. Fresno's Dan Morgan will be the biggest threat to McFadden's bid for the individual title. Fresno State won the golf crown in the season's round-robin play.

Gymnasts Second In San Diego Meet

Tallying 44 points, Poly's gymnastics squad placed second in a three-way meet in San Diego last Saturday. It was previously reported to be a four-way affair featuring Los Angeles and Occidental. However, Long Beach State topped the outing with 86 1/2 points and host San Diego State finished third with 41 1/2 counters.

Artie Day placed second in the flying rings, and grabbed fourth in free exercise and the parallel bars. He tied with Mustang John Alday for third in the tumbling competition.

Gridders Launch Second Week of Spring Drills

Launching the second week of a twenty-day Spring practice session, the gridders of Coach Roy "Silver Fox" Hughes began scrimmaging this past week in preparation for the May 28, 8 p.m., inter-squad Green vs. White game.

Hughes reports that between 70-72 prospective varsity footballers are working out daily, 4:30 to 6 p.m. The Silver Fox began scrimmage sessions this past Wednesday, having divided the group of gridders into five elevens.

Though certain shifts are bound to take place as the scrimmages progress, Hughes has sized-up, tentative first and second squads.

Heading the first backfield is Little-All Coast quarterback Bobby Beathard. Backing the El Segundo flash is a veteran backfield which consists of Freddie Ford and Claude Turner at the halfback spots and Dick Mannini at full. The second eleven's backfield is headed by Tom Klosterman, letterman signal caller. The remainder includes Ray Parras at fullback, and Hideki Hamamoto and Dave Walters at the halfback spots.
