Football Patrolmen Again; Alumnus Of Year Other SAC Action Taken

While Cal Tjader was beating out tunes at a fast pace in Crandall gym SAC's fifth meeting was more like a slow waltz to the tune of "Down With The Bottles Fellows, The Policemen Are Still Standing There." Graduate manager Bob Bontrum reported the results of last week's rooting section action as follows: five police officers were hired for last week's game at \$10 per man and no one was removed from the stands.

After an informal huss session was called to discuss the issue, Ed McGrew moved that two officers be obtained for the Homecoming game at a cost of \$20.

Members opposing the motion said students would be on better behavior because of homecoming guests (dates, parents, and friends) and because of the cost and the noted improvement at the last game no officers would be needed.

Members in favor of the motion stated that there would be more drinking at this game and that

last week was not a true test.

The motion carried with a vote of 10 yes, and 4 no, and 2 abstain.

A motion was passed to have a committee at the next Rally Committee meeting to inform them the student body was displeased with the performance of the head cheerleader as well as the rooting section as a whole and an improvement was expected.

The Board of Publications reported that at the present it was working on four objectives: (1) workable awards system; (2) revise the circulation system; (3) target dates for the Polyrama editions; (4) maintain records on El Mustang advertising to see it does not exceed 50 to 55 per cent.

Queens, Dances, Rallies Highlight Homecoming

Queens, ugly men, football games, dances, barbeques, and alumni meets are the order of this weekend traditionally known as Homecoming. And this, the 51st Annual Homecoming weekend should be no exception to the rule—"it will be bigger and better than ever," according to officials of the event. Rollo Beatty, chosen as alumnus of the year will return to campus to participate in the tomorrow's parade and football game.

Queen Mary Jo Livers, Poly's third "home-grown" queen, will preside at the bonfire rally this evening at 7 p.m. will ride atop the Blue Key queen's float, will present awards to the alumni of the year at the Montana-Poly game, and finally be crowned queen at the Cinderella ball. Theme for the ball will be "Mother Goose Comes To Sputnik Land."

Other events include a dance in Crandall gym following the bonfire rally tonight. Time for the rally is set at 7 p.m. A talent show was planned for tonight but will not be presented.

Tomorrow, alumni registration, a general alumni meeting at 9:00 a.m., and departmental reunions will take place. Departments will be open while many will have coffee hours and barbeques.

The homecoming parade through town, starting at the Safeway parking lot, is slated to start at 3 p.m. Following the parade the alumni have a "friendship hour" set for the Anderson hotel and a dinner in the south cafeteria at 6 p.m.

Two Rallies; Caps Needed

Judging Team Conquers Permanently Win Trophy

Bank of America's perpetual trophy was permanently corralled this week by members of Cal Poly's livestock judging team. Polyites accumulated enough points in winning the swine division, and placing second in the cattle, sheep, and horse judging to nose out Fresno State by five points. The trophy was won for the third consecutive year, giving it to the team permanently.

The contest is held each year in conjunction with the Grand National Livestock Exposition at San Francisco's Cow Palace.

In addition to the trophy, the squad was awarded the American Hampshire Swine Registry's trophy as top performer in the swine division.

"A new feature of this year's contest, reports R. F. Johnson, coach of the team, "was the presentation of the team at the evening arena show where they paraded before a capacity house while the master of ceremonies introduced the team members."

The 1958 show was the largest one to date with eleven universities and colleges competing, reports Johnson.

Poly's starting line-up consisted of Lilla Hunter of Hollister, who is also the first coed ever to compete on one of the college's judging teams. She turned in a top record placing first in horses, second in beef cattle, and was second in the overall rating for the entire contest.

Aaron Nelson, El Cajon, was fifth overall and second in horses; James Cody, La Mesa, was third in horses and eighth overall; while David Rickanrud, San

Luis Obispo, was second in sheep and placed seventh in the overall ratings.

Other team members were Kent Whipple, Alamo, Nev. and Don Tompkins, King City.

The Mustangs will travel next to Ogden, Utah to compete at the major livestock event of the intermountain area, the Golden Spike National Livestock show.

In the dairy judging division Tony Nunes, sophomore dairy husbandry student, was top individual among 57 contestants from nine colleges and universities.

In team competition Cal Poly placed second but had a first in Ayshire judging and seconds in Holstein and Guernsey placing. Fresno State team finished in first place.

Nunes won individual honors with one of the highest scores ever made in judging competition at the Cow Palace. He was first in Jerseys, Brown Swiss, and Guernseys and third in Ayshires.

Two Steer Carloads Win Championships

Two car loads of fat steers brought home three big prizes from the 1958 Grand National Livestock show this week.

A grand champion carload, a reserve grand champion carload, and a champion Hereford carload were among honors won by livestock from Cal Poly and shown by CP students.

Forty-five project owned steers received prizes at "one of the west's biggest livestock shows." Champion awards were given to Cal Poly in both Hereford and Angus group-of-three classes.

In the sheep division a Southdown, exhibited by Lilla Hunter, All Junior of Atherton, was chosen as Grand Champion Wether Lamb.

Other awards and winnings will be announced next week.

Floor Show, Dice On Campus Soon

'Hard Work' Keeps 1957 Probationary Students in College

"About half the probationary engineering students admitted a year ago are still enrolled in school," says James G. Andresen, assistant to C. E. Knott, Cal Poly's Dean of Engineering.

According to figures sent to Andresen from the records office, 142 probationary students were permitted to register in the '57 Fall Quarter. Of these, 108 were college or junior college transfers, 34 coming directly from high schools.

"Of the original 142," says Andresen, "68 registered this fall. Although a few are still in scholastic difficulty, the rest of the 68 have weathered the academic year in fair shape. I know it took a lot of work on their part, but it seems to have been worth it. One man even achieved a 3.7 g.p.a. for his efforts."

To gain normal admission at Cal Poly, a college transfer must have a "C" average and those entering directly from high school must have above a "C" with "B" or better grades in specified "solid" subjects.

Freddie Ford, Poly's leading ground gainer and CCAA top scorer, will start the game along with Claude Turner at the halfback slots.

Quarterback Bobby Beathard will call signals and Dick Mannini

will round out the backfield at fullback. Beathard and Allan will be game captains for the remainder of the season, says Hughes.

On the opponent side of the mid stripe will be three of the biggest names in Rocky Mountain football. Jim McLeod, last season's leading Rocky Mountain Conference ground gainer will be at one halfback. Bob Rudio, RMC's leading '57 scorer will run from the other HB slot. Rudio sports a 9.8 yards per carry average this year.

The big name in the MSC line is Sonny Holland, last year's Mid Bracket All American center.

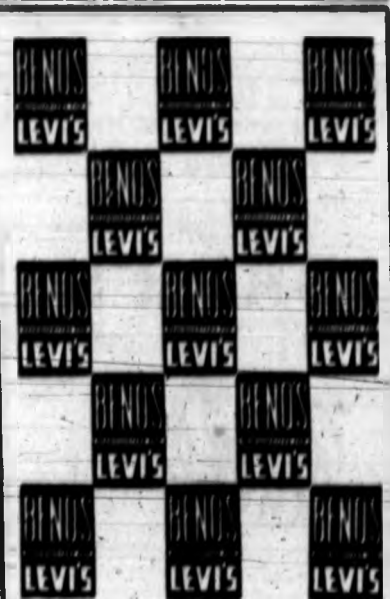
