

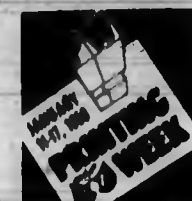

Printing Industry Honored At Annual Joint Banquet

Nearly 100 members of Mat Pica Pl and the Craftsmen's Club are expected to attend the annual Printing Week banquet at the Santa Maria Inn Jan. 17.

Appropriately, the banquet date coincides with the birthday of Benjamin Franklin, patron saint, and most famous of American printers.

The local and campus observance of Printing Week was kicked off earlier this week when President Julian A. McPhee and Mayor Fred Luckeinger signed a proclamation proclaiming the vital part that printing plays in our modern civilization and its effect on mankind.

Guest of honor and main speaker for the evening will be Gordon J. Holmquist of Los Angeles, a past president of the International Association of Printing House Craftsmen.

Topping off the evening will be the coronation of Miss Flora Kay Scott, 18, of San Luis Obispo, as Miss Central Coast Printing Week.

According to Jack Pierce, president of Mat Pica Pl, Printing Week is not sponsored to encourage more business for the printer, but rather, he explained, "... it is an educational institution designed to acquaint the public with the marvels of the present printing age and with the great progress being made in the graphic arts industry.

"Printing is the sixth largest industry in the country," continued Pierce, "and ranks third in our nation in number of establishments with 45,000."

The printing industry employs over 780,000 persons.

VA Man Explains Payment Delay On GI Checks

The majority of all training allowance checks due veterans at Cal Poly have been paid," said Howard E. Harlow, local officer-in-charge, "but naturally there are a few cases where administrative difficulties have prevented payment."

All veterans who have been in attendance at Cal Poly since September 20, 1958, the beginning of the fall quarter, and who have not yet been paid can be given assistance in this matter if they will call in person at the VA Office in San Luis Obispo, located at 844 Santa Rosa Street, he commented. Interested veterans should bring with them their latest copy of VA Form VB7-1987, Authorization of Education and Training Allowance, commonly referred to by most veterans as the "purple sheet".

Harlow continues "that on the average it takes approximately three months to pay a veteran his first check when he enrolls at the beginning of the regular session in the fall. When checks do not arrive after a three month period, there is some real reason for the delay. The local VA Office takes over the problem and follows through on the veteran's behalf until he is paid."

"One reason PL 850 checks have been delayed during the current term is because the VA has changed over to a mechanized system of accounting through the use of IBM cards," declared Harlow. "In all installations of this nature certain 'bugs' show up which have to be resolved through trial and error.

This is true in this instance, but Harlow emphasized that he is prepared to go "all out" to assist the veteran to be paid at the earliest possible date and that certain procedures are available to speed up payments where there has been a long delay.

Shearing Here Jan. 28; Tickets On Sale Today

George Shearing is coming to Cal Poly!

Tickets for the George Shearing concert will be on sale tomorrow in the A.S.B. office beginning at 8 a.m. The concert, which is being sponsored by the College Union, is planned for Wednesday evening, Jan. 28, in the A.C. Aud. Paul Sullivan, chairman of the C.U. assemblies committee, strongly advises students to get their tickets immediately since the auditorium has a seating capacity of only 488.

Shearing, a popular jazz pianist, is totally blind. He was born about 50 years ago in London, England, and his first musical successes were in that country. In 1947 he traveled to the United States in an attempt to establish himself as a jazz artist in the country known as the birthplace of jazz.

At first, he found it difficult to get a foothold in that field here, but finally he landed a job at Irving Alexander's Clique on Broadway. From there he started making records for MGM, and has since been carried to the highest heights in the world of jazz.

Shearing has won every trade and disk jukey poll of any significance, some of them as many as seven times. The demand for personal appearances has swelled to international proportions, and he has been named the number one pianist in a dozen nations, including Japan, Australia, Germany, France, and South Africa.

EDITORIAL: Viva La IBM Registration

From two hours to 10 minutes!

That's about the difference in time for a single student to go through registration procedures now opposed to the old system, not only saving time, but nerves and shoe-leather as well.

El Mustang wishes to heap praise on Registrar Thomas Lambre and his crew, responsible for the rapid flow of students through the gymnasium last Monday.

Of course, there were some with problems. But name one organization, department club etc. without them.

Quite a number of students found they were not registered in classes marked on their schedules, but were in other sections. Lambre pointed out early last week that in most instances this was due to the students not checking IBM code numbers before leaving the gym or not having the right numbers in the first place. Some, too, found sections closed and did not have an alternate schedule to work from which had been suggested before entering the line.

Not all mistakes were made by students. But look at it this way. The machine age isn't perfect either. It was made by man.

The Registrar said he meets with a registration committee every

week to iron out registration and scheduling difficulties. This is where they make plans to operate as smoothly as possible.

"Registration has so many parts and intricate details that none of the students can possibly understand the behind the scenes work going into the overall operation," Lambre said. "Some of the administrators don't even know all of the mechanics. Therefore, a problem that seems small on the surface may have a background prohibitive of change. For this reason, my door is always open and I'm willing to talk to anyone who has a problem with our procedure."

The ones who had to wait until late afternoon or early evening to register naturally have a gripe, but they will have their chance at earlier times for the spring quarter.

We think it's 99 and 9/10 per cent better than the old system. Think back to those who spent the night in a sleeping bag in front of the door where the line gathered in the wee hours of the morning, or when you stood in line in the rain for hours finally arriving at the door only to find you were in the wrong place.

Maybe it isn't perfect yet, but Lambre and Company have taken large strides in the right direction. And like he said his door is always open.

A column featuring humorous campus events is slated to begin soon in El Mustang.

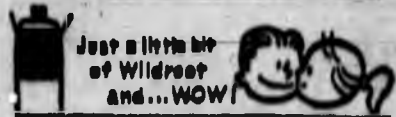

Engineers' Council Reveals Plans for Remainder of Year

Plans for the remainder of the year were made Friday night by the Engineering Council at their first meeting of the new year.

The engineers voted to sponsor the Coronation Ball for Poly Royal again this year and will handle planning and promotion for Engineering Week.

The council will bring a nationally famous speaker for a public address again this year. Last year they featured Dr. William H. Plummer, Director of the Jet Propulsion Laboratories at Cal Tech and Chief of the Telemetry Division for the International Geophysical Year. They will also sponsor a campaign for Mrs. Engineering Week, a wife of a Cal Poly engineering student. Festivities will be during the last week in February.

Members voted to recommend to all engineering clubs that club representatives to the council be elected officers rather than appointed by respective chairmen. The council pointed out that it would give the representative more prestige and at the same time make the selection more democratic.

A code change was discussed which heretofore has allowed the council's representatives to Student Affairs Council to come from anywhere in the Engineering division. The group is proposing that the representatives come from the council only. SAC is slated to vote on the recommendation tonight.

With a 16 match win record, the 1958 Pacific Coast Inter-collegiate Champion Wrestlers should provide fans with plenty of excitement Thursday when Cal Poly tangles with UCLA at 8 o'clock in Crandall gym. According to Coach Harden, this match will be an "eye-opener" for this year's season.

"The team is far from being in the 'pink' of condition," says Harden, "but it's a team with lots of experience and more depth than last year's."

Humboldt State leads the small colleges in defense with an average of 43.3 points per game.

Poly Hoopsters Smashed In First Two CCAA Games

Blaming "inexperience and jitters," Cal Poly dribblers got off to a bad start by dropping their first two CCAA games. Long Beach State slammed Poly 58-45 and San Diego State rang up a 73-54 victory.

"With as many sophmores on the team as we have, we are bound to make mistakes," explains Coach Ed Jorgensen. "Against Long Beach we just tied up and against San Diego we were outclassed."

Jorgensen rates San Diego as one of the finest small college teams in the nation. "They are real fast and good shots," Jorgensen says. "They hit 14 out of 15 free throws against us and the night before, when they beat Santa Barbra, they made 22 in a row. Poly hit 10 out of 19."

The Long Beach game was Poly's worst this season, according to Jorgensen. The Mustangs shot about 24 per cent of their field goal attempts with one forward going scoreless and a guard making only four. The Forty-Niners out-rebounded Poly by 45 to 36.

The first 10 minutes of the second half was a "dry spell" for the Mustangs as Poly went scoreless for about nine minutes while the Forty-Niners spurted to a big lead. Poly lead at half time 22-21.

Jorgensen gives credit to both the Long Beach and San Diego rooting section. "They backed their players 100 per cent and were razing ours all through the games," he said.

Forward Mal McCormick was high pointer for the Mustangs against Long Beach with 11 points while center Bob Thetford hit 10. With San Diego, guard Vic Di-Giovanni tanked 18 and Thetford 12. In Crandall gym against Fresno State Saturday, Jan. 17.

Hughes Reveals Poly's Offense To Coaches

Roy Hughes, who coached the Cal Poly Mustangs to 61 wins, 26 losses and one tie in the nine years he has been at the college, addressed 500 of the nation's football coaches last night at the annual American Football Coaches Cincinnati.

Hughes represented the west coast small colleges and was joined by Clarence Stasavich of Lenoir-Rhyne college of Hickory, North Carolina, who represented the eastern colleges. It marks the first time that small college coaches have been asked to address the association.

Hughes talked on the Cal Poly offense—an attack that has failed to score for him but twice in nine years. The Silver Fox's prototype offense has scored nearly twice as many points as the opposition in those nine years—2264 to 1137.

Tulare Wrestlers Take Home Trophy

Fresno and Tulare high schools tied for first place in Cal Poly's third annual high school wrestling tournament held Saturday. Tulare took home the trophy on the flip of a coin.

Four of the eight teams were coached by Cal Poly grads. They were Oscar Edminister, Tulare; Jack Frost, Palmdale; Don Tucker, Atascadero; and Jim Miller, Arroyo Grande.

With only four days remaining until their first bout, Mustang boxers are busy getting ready for Sacramento State, which Coach Tom Lee has tabbed as one of the finest teams in the nation.

The Hornets will be "loaded for bear" when they come to Crandall Gym. Not only do they have two national champions, but this will be their sixth dual match this season (they won the other five).

Four Poly sluggers form the nucleus for Lee. Don Tessier, 178 and heavyweight last year will box this winter as a light heavy. Walt Hailey will be the 139-pound entry and Sam Marquez will be at 147. Freddie Martin, 156, is back following a two-year service hitch.

Bob Alvares, one-year letterman, is expected to box at 132. Sheldon Green will be seeking a berth on the varsity at 147.

Other Mustang mittmen showing good form, according to Coach Lee: Gerald Gebble, 132; Brad Wheeler, 139; Dave Correa, 125; Orval Arebalo, 125; Tom Sherman, 147; Ray Porras, 165; and Don Fisher, 165.

Worried mostly about conditioning, Lee says Poly will probably start slow, but pick up speed at mid-season and finish strong in the tournaments.

Poly Royal Queen Contest Opens Today; Ends Jan. 28

The 27th Annual Poly Royal queen contest was officially launched today with the announcement by Don McCullum, Chairman of the Queen's Committee, of the contest petitioning dates.

Petitioning begins today, according to McCullum, and will end Jan. 28 at 12 noon.

To participate in the contest, queen hopefuls must be sponsored by a campus club or organization, McCullum said. "This policy has been adopted because it is felt that a girl has a better chance if she is given strong, united support by a club, rather than try to run her own campaign.

All clubs are strongly urged by McCullum to sponsor a girl for queen. Petitions may be obtained in the student body office no later than 12 noon, Jan. 28.

Rules adopted for this year's contest are as follows: All contestants must have a 2.0 grade average. A club or a group of clubs must sponsor each contestant. No girl who has been queen of any previous event at Cal Poly

may enter the contest. Girls who were princesses of other contests MAY enter, however. Engaged girls are ineligible. Girls entered in any other contest which runs concurrently with the Poly Royal contest cannot enter.

After the closing of the petitioning period, Jan. 28, all contestants will be interviewed by a selection committee at a closed reception Monday evening, Feb. 2. At that time, five finalists will be selected from among the contestants.

The five finalists will be given a week to wage a campaign for student votes. On Feb. 11 a general student body assembly will be held and each finalist will be introduced. Voting for queen will be held Feb. 12 and 13. The name of the queen will be announced Feb. 14.
