Rodeo Team Brings Home Everything But Arizona Arena

Serving notice that they're out to retain the Western regional National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association title, the Cal Poly rodeo team came back from a rodeo in Tucson, Arizona, last weekend bringing home everything but the arena.

Cal Poly's team is competing in Tempe this weekend. The locale tallied more than twice as many points as any of the other five teams entered, and veteran Jack Roddy not only brought back the all-around cowboy title, but a whole horse trailer full of awards as well.

Roddy's winnings included a saddle, hat, buckle, pair of boots and three subscriptions to the Hoofs and Horns magazine.

Other teams competing in the rodeo were Arizona State at Flagstaff, University of Arizona, Arizona State University at Tempe, Cal Poly of Pomona and Fresno State.

In roping, Bill Nielson and Jack Roddy grabbed off first and second places respectively while Nielson also took a first in ribbon roping. Riley Freeman was fourth in average. He was first in the third in first go-round of riggon roping.

Bill Stroud annexed a first in bullhogging followed by Roddy, who also took a fourth in bareback riding and the saddle bronc event. Ray Bunnell was third in saddle bronc riding.

Stroud split second and third place points in bull riding while K. C. Nunes and Roddy split fourth and fifth.

Allen Reports Loss Of 1,248 Library Books; Asks Return

"I only needed that one book, but of all the books in the library, that's the one they can't find."

This is getting to be a familiar sound on busy days at the library. In fact it could happen more than 1,200 times a day and never be said twice about the same book!

During the last quarter break Dexter Memorial library underwent a complete inventory, not actually finished until this week, which shows a loss of 1,248 books since the last inventory in 1956. Although library authorities say books filter back in from time to time, that's still over 400 books a year that have been carried out of the library and not returned.

The 1,248 volumes missing represent a 2.4 per cent loss based on the average holdings of the library. "The percentage isn't bad compared to the national college loss average of approximately 3.5 per cent," said Francis Allen, head librarian. "However any loss is a serious one to the library because the books that always turn up lost are the most important ones that are in great demand."

Books that have to be replaced in the library are paid for out of funds that normally would go to purchase new books.

Allen extends an invitation to return any books you may have found, reminding students that no fines are charged for overdue books.

"We don't like a lot of overdue books, but we would rather get them back late than not at all," said Allen.

Two Candidates Seek Each Student Body Post

Student body elections get underway Tuesday morning and will continue through noon Wednesday. Polls will be set up in front of the post office and in front of the main entrance to the library. Names and pictures of the six candidates running for A.S.B. positions are elsewhere on this page. There are two

for each office. An elections assembly is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Monday night in the A.C. Aud. Each candidate will be permitted about five minutes to speak on his platform and each will be required to answer questions directed to him from the audience. The meeting is open to the entire student body.

"The preferential voting system will be used again this year," said Bob Alberti, A.S.B. vice-president and chairman of the elections committee. "A first and second choice should be marked on each ballot. Marking a second choice for your favorite candidate's opponent will not hurt your first choice in any way. Full instructions will be posted in the polling places."

Only requirement before voting is that student body cards will be punched.

Western Fair Men To Take Notes At Poly Royal

Seeking means of improving the educational values of fairs throughout the west, Western Fairs association will sponsor a College of Fairs Educational Field Day here during the second day of Poly Royal. Purpose of the field day will be to give fair managers and staff members an opportunity to observe methods used students in Cal Poly's divisions of agriculture, arts and sciences, and engineering.

"Since many of the problems facing students putting together displays for Poly Royal are the same as those that face fair managers, our people would like to know how these problems were solved," explained Robert R. Stein, assistant manager of the Western Fairs association.

The fairmen will tour specially selected departmental exhibits including those in home economics, electronic engineering, architectural engineering, crops, poultry and the annual Flower Show of the Ornamental Horticulture department. Personnel who designed and constructed the low-cost exhibits will be on hand to describe the display techniques used. The fairmen will also visit the child care laboratory of the home economics department where children of Poly Royal visitors are being entertained.

Some 30 fairmen from all parts of California including Assistant Manager Stein and Joe Blankie, director of public relations of the Western Fairs association will attend the field day. Dick Turley, Manager of the Douglas County Fair at Roseburg, Oregon, will fly to the Cal Poly campus by private plane to participate.

CCAA Victory Looms; Thinclads Face Gauchos

One of the top dual meets of the track season is on tap tomorrow as the Mustangs tangle with the Gauchos of UC at Santa Barbara. The affair is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. on the Gaucho oval.

The Gauchos defeated San Diego State, 74-57, last Saturday while the Mustangs of Coach Jim Jensen placed second in a triangular meet in the Bay City, Los Angeles State copped the three-way affair with 80 points. Poly captured eight first places of the 15 events and 62 points, but did not have the team depth to contend with the L.A. Staters. Host San Francisco State mustered 81 points.

Poly's two mile run record, held by John Lesley who toured the eight-lapper in 10:07.3 in 1950 was shattered by distance man, Don Lee, a newcomer this spring. Lee turned in a 10:00.8 performance to set the new standard and letterman Jack Wofford also bettered Lee-

ley's '50 mark with a 10:05.6 clocking. Saturday's run was the first time this year Lee has competed in the two mile run. He finished second in the mile, behind L.A. State's Dan Schweikert (4:18.3) in 4:23.7—just .3 seconds off the college's mile record which he set last month.

Jensen singled out Wofford for praise. The sophomore distance man has improved his time in the two mile event 28 seconds over his best time last year. This past cross country season saw Wofford chip 20 seconds off his best freshman performance.

In Saturday's track meet in San Francisco, it was Vic Hall, the versatile Mustang performer who stole the show. He won the sprints in 10 flat and 21.4, captured the high jump with a leap of six feet, and swept the low hurdles with a time of 23.9. Hall's chief opposition this coming Saturday will be Gaucho Dave Braker, former San Luis Obispo High school track star. Braker claimed first place in both the 100 yard dash and furlong event against San Diego State.

Cal Poly's Dennis Hester gave indication he was rounding into shape with a 49.8 showing in the quarter mile race. He is also capable of a 1:57 timing in the 880 yard run.
