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### President Baker elected to Board of Regents of American Architectural Foundation

President Baker has been elected to a three-year term on the Board of Regents of the American Architectural Foundation.

He is the first academician to join the board, which includes 41 other national leaders in business, the arts, media, and architecture.

Baker has also served as a presidential appointee to the National Science Board and is a current member of the board of directors of John Wiley & Sons Inc.

"I'm privileged to serve on this prestigious foundation," Baker said. "My appointment is further indication that the profession holds Cal Poly's College of Architecture and Environmental Design in very high esteem."

The American Architectural Foundation, based in Washington, D.C., is a national nonprofit educational institution dedicated to increasing public

awareness of the value of architecture and the important role the built environment plays in shaping the quality of life.

The 53-year-old foundation builds public understanding about architecture through a variety of educational materials for young people; television programs and videotapes; exhibitions, lectures, symposia, and other public programs and events; books and other publications; research on the effect of architecture on the human experience; its renowned Prints and Drawings Collection; and grants and scholarships.

The foundation also operates the historic Octagon Museum in Washington, D.C., the oldest museum in America dedicated to architecture and one of the most important examples of federal architecture in the nation's capital.



### Civil engineering students win region

Cal Poly's student chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers emerged as conference champions for the fifth time in seven years in a recent annual competition.

The 54-member squad earned more than a dozen awards at the 1995 ASCE Pacific Southwest Regional Student Chapter Conference held in Las Vegas. They competed against 15 other teams.

Their award-winning accomplishments included a 56-pound concrete canoe with a hull only 0.2 inches thick and a Popsicle-stick bridge that held almost 2.3 tons – more than twice as much as its nearest competitor.

In all, Cal Poly's team earned first-place honors in 11 competitions and second-place plaques in three.

Civil and environmental engineering professor Jay DeNatale is faculty advisor.

### Take Back the Night planned May 15-18

A film documenting actual assaults in the streets of New York will be shown as part of the fifth annual Take Back the Night event at 6:30 pm Thursday, May 18, in Chumash Auditorium.

A variety of activities intended to increase awareness about violence against women is scheduled during the week of May 15.

♦ On Monday, May 15, a workshop on sexual assault will be held from 3 to 5 pm in UU 220.

♦ From 2 to 4 pm Tuesday, May 16, a Model Mugging demonstration will be given in UU 204.

♦ A resource fair is planned from 1:30 to 3:30 pm Wednesday, May 17, in UU 220.

Thursday night's documentary, "War Zone: Abuse of Women in the Streets of America," was produced by the event's keynote speaker, Maggie Hadleigh-West.

Hadleigh-West took her video camera to the streets of New York City and captured 112 incidents of "street abuse" in seven and a half hours of filming.

After Hadleigh-West's presentation, a candlelight march will be led through campus to remember the survivors of past assaults.

Liquid Sunshine, a Santa Barbara-based band, will perform in Chumash Auditorium after the march.

### Rec Sports announces three summer programs

Registration begins May 8 for classes designed for youngsters interested in swimming, tennis and martial arts.

Three sessions of swimming lessons will be offered beginning Monday, June 26. The two-week classes last 40 minutes, and lessons are available for all skill levels. The class costs \$38 and is designed for children 4 to 10 years old.

Beginning tennis will be taught starting Monday, June 19. The classes will cover the fundamental skills of hand-eye coordination, footwork and racquet techniques. The class meets from 8:30 to 9:30 am for three weeks on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays and costs \$25.

Introduction to Martial Arts, for children 7 and up, will begin Tuesday, June 27. Boys and girls will be taught basic concepts with an emphasis on hand-eye coordination, body awareness, following instructions, and social interaction. The six-week course costs \$45 and will meet from 4 to 5 pm Tuesdays and Thursdays.

### Austrian opposition party leader to speak

Jorg Haider, leader of the opposition in the Austrian parliament and chairman of Europe's most successful radical right-populist party, will speak at 11:10 am Thursday, May 11, in Erhart Agriculture, Room 223.

Polls show that since Haider took over leadership of the Freedom Party in 1986, its membership has grown from 1 to 2 percent of the population to its current 26 percent. Polls also show the Freedom Party ahead of the Christian-democratic Peoples' Party, giving Haider a chance of becoming Chancellor after the next elections.

History professor Max Riedlsperger has met Haider and describes him as dynamic, energetic and charismatic.

"The bulk of the press in Austria treats Haider much like Doonesbury has been portraying Newt Gingrich, albeit without any of the humor," Riedlsperger said.

An opponent of Haider referred to him as "either a fascist or a psychopath."

### Leading Chicano novelist to read at Cal Poly

One of the earliest and most significant modern Chicano fiction writers, Jose Antonio Villareal, will read from his work at 7 pm Monday, May 15, in Room E-27 of the Science Building.

Born in 1924 in Los Angeles, Villareal is the author of "Pocho," the 1959 novel that initiated contemporary Chicano literature.

The book has been termed "the quintessential Chicano novel of self-discovery."

Now teaching in the English Department at Pan American University in Texas, Villareal also wrote "The Fifth Horseman" (1974), a novel about the Mexican revolution, and "Clemente Chacon" (1984), the tale of a Mexican who comes to the United States as a youth and rises to success in the Anglo world, but at a high cost to his sense of identity.

## **Three equipment donations to GrC**

The Graphic Communication Department recently received three equipment donations:

✓ The DuPont Corp. of Wilmington, Del., donated an environmentally friendly \$25,000 color proofing system that requires only tap water to produce high-quality proofs.

Waste water from the system is safe for ordinary drainage, and no permits or special waste-removal programs are needed.

✓ A Southern California couple donated a Scitex large-format color scanner that can process color photographs as large as 8-1/2" x 11" and combines the preparation of artwork and text. The gift, from Bill and Sue Gordon of North Hollywood, was valued at approximately \$250,000 when bought new three years ago.

✓ Screen (West) of Irvine donated two desktop scanners, an imagesetter and film processor, and other graphic arts equipment worth \$200,000.
