Volleyball queen Marsha Hall presented awards to the winners.

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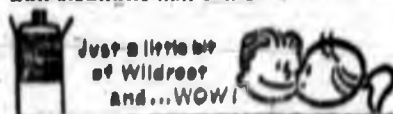
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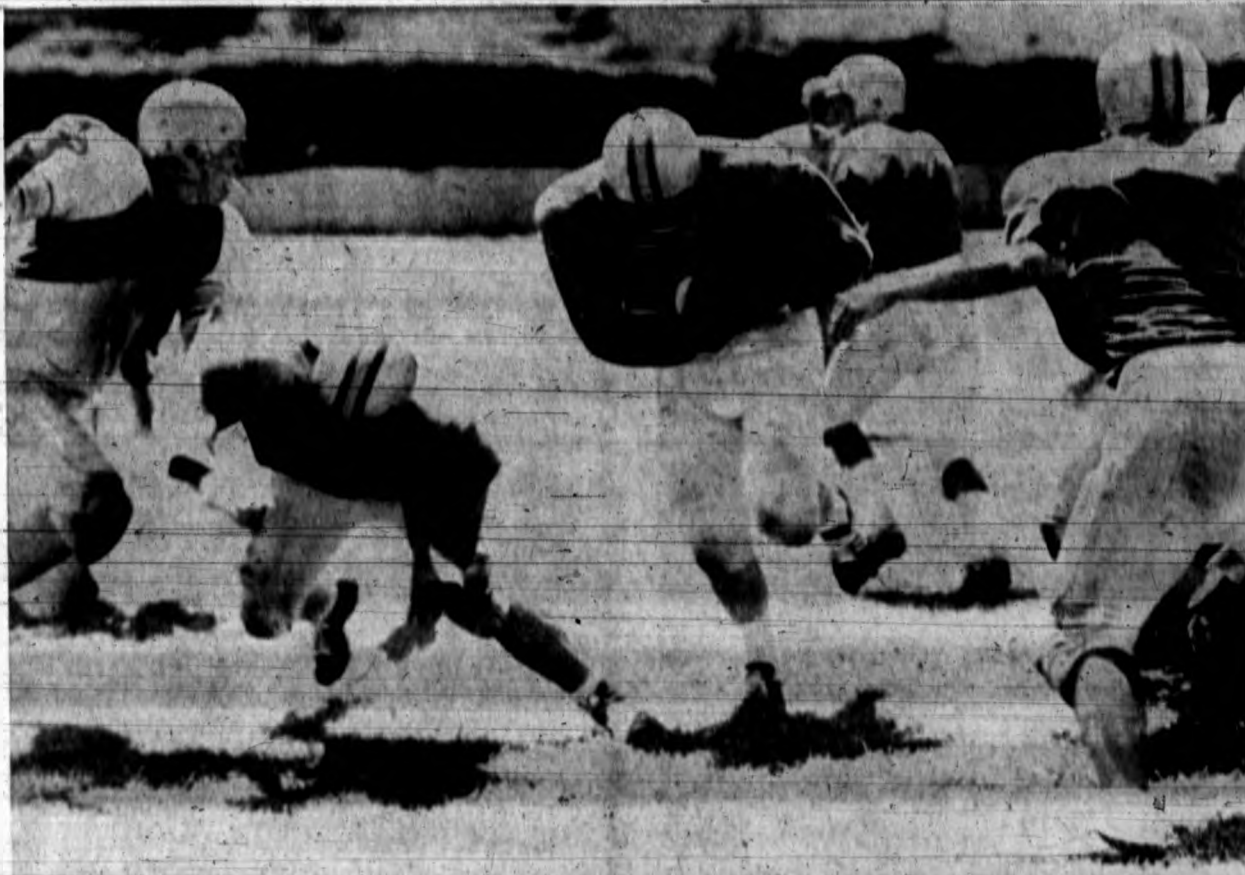

## Surprise Flinch For Horsehiders

Poly's horsehiders didn't win the championship, but they surprised a lot of people by finishing in a third place tie with Los Angeles State in CCAA standings. Winner was Fresno State followed by San Diego State.

The Mustangs' biggest shocker was their 8-7 league record compared to last year's 8-12. The local nine stopped the Santa Barbara Gauchos three times, Los Angeles State twice and earned single wins over the Bulldogs, Aztecs, and Forty-Niners.

Al Warnick, 4-2 led the pitchers with a 3.20 earned run average and was followed closely by Dan Haak, 4-4, with 3.45. Southpaw Dave Regalile, 6-3, took the honors in league play, posting a 4-1 record.

All-conference Jim Newkirk, 8-2, ran into some trouble this spring, but the big righthander worked 85% innings compared to Haak's 68%, Regalile's 82%, Warnick's 68%, and Bill Collins' 84%.

In CCAA action Poly had seven batters hitting over .300, Carl Underwood, .364; Jim Taylor, .345; Bob Williams, .340; Willis Hill, .333; Regalile, .333; Bob Napoli, .333; Red Simmons, .326; and Cameron Best, .308. However, Underwood, with .327, was the only regular above .300 in all the games.

Bob Williams led in RBI's with 16 in league games and 24 for the season. He was followed by Underwood, 25, and Taylor, 15.

Coach Bill Hicks is all smiles as he anticipates next year. The Mustang mentor loses only catchers Marv Almond and Bob Manini, and outfielder Dan Shaw from this year's squad. He will still have all the hurlers plus a more seasoned team.

## First Scrimmage Tabbed 'A Success'

Today is the last day for brotherly love among the football players, as tomorrow Coach Roy Hughes plans to divide the 60-man squad into two teams in preparation for the Green and Gold battle May 27.

Last Saturday was a day of mixed emotions for the Silver Fox as the Mustangs held their first scrimmage. "The players looked good for a first scrimmage, but they still have far to go," Hughes said.

The Mustang mentor was pleased with all the backs with Gary Van Horn, Willis Hill, Claude Turner, and Carl Bowser each breaking away for long runs. Quarterbacks Tom Klobertman, John Panagakis, Ted Tollner, and John Ramsey worked smoothly and threw some nice passes, although the ends often had trouble hanging on to them.

Over 100 fans saw why Hughes is delighted with some of his newcomers. Bowser demonstrated why he has been tabbed "Bumper". Each time the 210 pound fullback carried the ball he made good gains while leaving a string of would be tacklers behind.

Sylvester "Boxcar" Cooper proved capable of "filling" one of the tackle spots.

## J V Horsehiders End Successful Season

Led by the pitching and hitting of Dick Guerra, Coach Jerry Smith's J V baseball team turned in a 10-1-1 record during the 1959 season.

All games were played with high school and junior college teams. The lone loss came at the hands of Allan Hancock J C 7-5. The Colts had previously defeated Hancock 14-1 and 12-1, but errors allowed seven unearned runs to score and spoiled an otherwise undefeated season.

Guerra won six decisions without a loss on the mound and hit .455. He played first base and the outfield when not chucking.

The outstanding win of the year was a 5-0 victory over Colings J. C.

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Applications Up . . .

Admission applications for the fall quarter totaled 1,255 at the beginning of May, as compared with 1,158 a year ago. Accepted applications totaled 994, compared to 704 in 1958. Engineering has 500 applications. Agriculture 848, and Arts and Sciences 817. Continuing the trend, shown by application statistics so far this year, an increase is shown over the number made a year ago in Agriculture and Arts and Sciences and a decrease of 57 in the Engineering division. Of the students accepted, 179 are women.
