### For the Birds—Flying That Is

With two great nations hurling tanks, vanguards, monkeys, dogs, and other assorted objects into space, one would think a relatively basic thing like flying from San Luis Obispo to Roseman Montana, a distance of approximately 1,200 miles, would be fairly simple.

However, modern science, specifically in the aeronautical realm seems too revert to the Wright brother era when the Mustangs take to the air. A four year history of Mustang air travel would produce enough thrills to render even the most skilled air ace jittery.

The latest, and probably most noteworthy, episode in the Mustang travel book came this past weekend, a story, though somewhat complex, that is very true.

Friday morning September 25 started the whole affair, as 24 Mustang gridders plus coaches, trainers, and other passengers totaling 46 persons started the venture from the Paso Robles airport.

Forty-five minutes of pleasurable air travel ensued before Mustang tackle Boxcar Cooper, who was sitting next to local sportsman Hugh Harling, glanced out over the right wing. Cooper, a most serious gent, nonchalantly announced to Harling that the right engine had stopped. Harling, appreciating Cooper's wit, giggled, then out of curiosity glanced in the direction of the engine. Forty-six voices joined in unison . . . The engine was very much dead!

Pilot E. J. Colon, an airman with some 12,000 hours to his credit, announced to the unusually calm crew that, though this was the first time anything like this had happened to him in a two-engine craft, everything was okay. Colon was right, as he brought the C-46 to a rather bouncy landing at Bakersfield's Meadows airfield.

A seven hour wait ensued at Bakersfield, while coach Hughes phoned ahead for another plane, preferably with two good engines.

After a one-hour workout at Bakersfield JC, the Mustangs, already sporting their first "Forced Down in Action" medals took off in another identical C-46 . . . destination Salt Lake City, Utah.

Arrival in Salt Lake came at 9:30 p.m., when it was discovered after checking fuel consumption, that the craft was some 1,500 pounds overweight. Hughes, in an effort to lighten the load, pointed his finger at a sextet of hefty fellows who would make the six Fat Dutchmen bluish. 1,500 pounds of flesh left the plane at Salt Lake City in the form of coaches Howie O'Daniels, and Sheldon Hardin; graduate manager Bob Bostrom; Booster Art Spring and Bud Edwards, and local sports scribe Johnny Nattleship.

With extra poundage missing, the Westair aircraft breezed into Roseman, arriving at 1 a.m. The (Continued on Page 4)

### Enrollment Figures Are Made Available

Total student enrollment for the fall quarter of 1959 at California State Polytechnic College will be 4,345 students, according to Thomas A. Lambra, Registrars office.

Of the 4,345 students enrolled, 1,453 of them are freshmen, 2,894 of them are old students, and 165 are former students. There are 4,165 regular students and 187 limited.

Division-wise there will be 1,083 in the Agriculture Department, 2,000 in the Engineering Department, and 1,140 in the Arts and Sciences Department.

In the fall, 1958, 4,345 students were registered—the same number registered this year; however, instead of 408 women, Cal Poly now boasts 608, leaving 3,740 men.

Officers of Cal Poly's student government and other campus organizations will again be given an opportunity to brush up on leadership abilities, according to Dan Lawson, associate dean of activities at Cal Poly.

The Eighth Annual Leadership Conference will be held at Camp Pinecrest, Cambria, Oct. 2 through 4. Highlight of the workshop will be the keynote speech by Robert E. Kennedy, Vice-President of Cal Poly, at the General Session Saturday night. His speech is entitled "Leadership: Peacemaking or Pacemaking."

Students heading up organizations from both the San Luis Obispo campus and the Kellogg-Voorhies campus can attend the camp. San Jose will be represented by the chairman and vice-chairman of San Jose's Leadership Conference, Spartacamp.

### Official Interim Parking Plan Is Announced By Officials

At its 1959 General Session the State Legislature instituted a requirement that all State College parking be partially financed by a system of parking fees. This was implemented by the passage of the 1958-60 Budget Act and the establishment of a schedule of parking fees by the State Director of Education.

**RESERVED PARKING:** 1. There will be 180 spaces designated in staff areas for reserved parking at a fee of \$15.00 for the quarter. Spaces will be individually numbered and reserved from the hours of 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. 2. Additional stickers at \$1.00 each can be purchased to accommodate car pools or second cars. Car pools will be limited to the reserved areas; 3. In case an unauthorized person is parked in a reserved spot, the holder of that space can park in any unreserved area as long as his reserved space is illegally occupied; 4. All sales will be handled by the Cashier; 5. Sales will start September 1 and will be accepted in person or by mail; 6. Only staff will be eligible; 7. A master list of reservations will be maintained by name and number both by Security and the Cashier; 8. Sales will be on a quarter basis only.

**UNRESERVED PARKING:** 1. Unreserved areas will be designated as staff, off-campus student or on-campus student as at present; 2. Sales will be handled by the Cashier effective September 1 and will also be made a part of the registration line procedure. The fee will be \$9 per quarter and \$4.50 for limited students or staff working less than half-time; 3. Sales will be on a quarter basis only; 4. Holders of unauthorized parking permits will be entitled to use the 2-hour and the 15-minute zones subject to the time restrictions; 5. An additional sticker for a second car may be purchased for \$1.00.

Entering freshmen as well as students in advanced standing in any field of study are eligible, although the law provides that special consideration shall be given to (a) students with superior academic background who express a desire to teach in elementary or secondary schools, and (b) students whose academic background indicates a superior capacity or preparation in science, mathematics or engineering.

Specifically, to the extent that funds are available, any citizen or other permanent resident of the United States who has been admitted and is carrying 12 or more units at Cal Poly may apply for a loan, if there is a established need for help, and the individual will execute an oath and affidavit of loyalty.

The maximum loan to one individual is \$1,000 in any one year, and no more than \$5,000 total. Loans must be repaid with three per cent interest over a period of ten years beginning one year after the individual ceases to be a full-time student at an institution of higher education. However, a borrower may have ten per cent of the loan, and the interest thereon, cancelled, for each full year of full-time public elementary or secondary school teaching, up to a maximum of five years and 50 per cent of the loan.

Car pools will not be accommodated in the unreserved areas; 6. The entire campus will be under the parking plan. Campus boundaries (by entrance) are defined as California Boulevard at Campus way, the unnamed road entering at Grandall Way, Foothill Boulevard and Hathaway, the service road off Black Street, the entrance of Grand Avenue at Black Street, the farm entrance at the old Fissalini house (highway 1), and any similar entrances unnamed herein.

**TWO-WHEEL VEHICLE PARKING:** 1. Two-wheeled, self-propelled vehicles required to be licensed by the State Department of Motor Vehicles will be charged for parking privileges at the rate of \$2.55 per quarter for full-time students and/or staff and \$1.55 for limited students or employees working less than half-time. 2. Parking will be limited to three specified areas located at Poly Grove, Power Plant, and the Fire Station except that they shall have the same privileges as other permit holders for use of 2-hour and 15 minute zones; 3. Sales, except for price, will be handled in the same manner as with regular unreserved parking; 4. Sales will be by quarter only.

**VISITOR PARKING:** 1. The designated spaces for the Fall quarter will be those presently designated; 2. If official guests or visitors of the college expect to be here in excess of one day they should be given Guest Parking stickers. They will be issued at the Information Desk and the Security Office. These permits will be dated. Each permit so issued, whether by the Information Desk or the Security Office, will be recorded by name and number in the Security Office; 3. Use of Visitor Parking spaces by staff or students will not be permitted. **MISCELLANEOUS PARKING:** 1. Contractors' employees will not be charged but will be required to park in assigned areas.



## INTRAMURAL GRID PROGRAM SUCCUMBS TO BASEBALL

Dr. Robert Mott, Director of Physical Education, has announced that the intramural touch football program will not be held this year.

The defunct grid program, always popular in previous years, is being replaced by Fall baseball practice. To offset the loss of intramural football, Dr. Mott discloses that Crandall Gym will remain open in the evenings from 4 to 9 P.M. This system has been set up to accommodate those students who wish to work out on their own, or in groups in preparation for the approaching basketball season.

December 2, 3, and 4 are the dates for the eleventh annual novice boxing tournament under the direction of Coach Tom Lee. Interested students may sign up on the bulletin board in the Physical Education office. Coach Lee also says that there are several vacancies on the Mustang varsity boxing squad.

Junior varsity coach Lynn Dyche, former Mustang grappler, has given the week before Thanksgiving as the tentative date of the novice wrestling tournament. Complete plans have not yet been formulated, but a sign-up sheet will be located in the PE office.

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## Mustang Harriers Seek League Crown

With probably the best squad in Cal Poly's history, Coach Jim Jensen's cross country team has its sights set on the league championship, won last year by the always rough San Diego striders.

The conference crown may be within reach of the Mustangs with all of last season's third place team returning. The Mustangs will also be aided by the arrival of new-comer Edgar Chavez. Returning from last year's squad are: Jack Wofford, Don Lee, Louis Rodriguez, Charles Thronson, Dennis Heater, and Gary Oyercompur. Freshmen are also eligible and are urged to contact Coach Jensen if interested.

Cal Poly last year finished the conference meet in third place, two points behind Long Beach.

The Mustang record for the 8.5 mile distance, 18 minutes 22 seconds, stands a good chance of being shattered this year.

Conference opponents Poly will meet this year are Santa Barbara, Fresno, Long Beach and San Jose, with the conference meet to be held in Fresno, November 21.

## BOBCATS 35 — MUSTANGS In Wet Northern Tilt

Successfully finding revenge for their 16-6 loss to the Mustangs last year, the Bobcats of Montana State College temporarily halted the '59 "Big Green Machine," 35-18, Saturday afternoon before 7,000 rain-soaked customers in Bozeman's Gatten Field.

Proving their 400 yards rushing against South Dakota

State two weeks ago was no fluke, the Montanans, featuring three talented squads proved tough in the Mustangs "acid test."

The Mustangs set the pace for the day's activities when Claude Turner, aided by the blocking of Darwin McGill, scampered 73 yards for the ice-breaker with many native Montanans still looking for a dry seat. Conversions proved to be non-existent for the Mustangs all day, as Willie Hill's kick went astray.

Tommy Molen, a fleet-footed Bobcat who romped 102 yards for the day, jogged 20 yards through the Mustang line for Montana's first tally. A Mustang penalty gave the Bobcats two cracks at the conversion, with 'Cat quarterback Alt running for 2 points on the second try.

"Bumper" Howser bounced the Mustangs back into the lead with a 69 yard sprint to paydirt. A Klosterman to Hill conversion attempt failed.

Montana scored again, when a Klosterman aerial intended for Curt Hill was nabbed by Bobcat Rocco Perciavalle deep in Mustang territory. On a fourth down situation the Bobcats sent Perciavalle through the middle from the one for their second score. Lowell converted.

Mustang halfback Benny Martin took Montana's kickoff, and scampered to the Poly 40 before fumbling into the waiting arms of 'Cat lineman Ron Frank. A Davies aerial to Nawotczynski was good for 31 yards and another Bobcat score. Again the Bobcats utilized two conversion attempts to garner their 23-12 halftime lead.

Montana opened the second half with scatback Molen reaping havoc on the Mustang defense. Molen's 47 yard sprint to the Mustang 10 set up Montana's fourth score; a pass play from Alt to Molen.

The Mustang's final tally came in the final period, as Klosterman threw to Curt Hill for a 30 yard touchdown. Klosterman's conversion pass to Hill failed.

Top gainer for the Mustangs proved to be Carl Bowser with 107 yards, tops for both teams.



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## Mustang-Aztec Tilt Saturday; Stage Set for CCAA Opener

With fire in their eyes as a result of Saturday's northern venture, the Mustangs are ready to plunge head-first into CCAA conference play meeting the Aztecs of San Diego State next Saturday night in San Diego.

While the Mustangs were bowing to the Bobcats in Montana, the Aztecs were humiliated 21-8 by a fast moving Los Angeles State Diablo outfit Saturday night.

### Sir Robert Beathard Dons Canadian Togs

Bobby Beathard, Cal Poly's 1957 All-CCAA quarterback departed last week for Ontario, Canada, where he signed a contract with the professional Barnia Golden Bears football team. Beathard, who was recently released by the pro Washington Redskins, expects to see action in the newly formed American Football League next year.

Former Occidental grid star, Walt Williamson, who may be seen assisting freshman coach Tom Lee with the Colts, recently returned from the pro Chicago

The Aztecs will probably feature the talented arm of 1957 All-CCAA quarterback Joe Duke, back for his senior season with the borderlanders. Halfbacks Bobby Ball and Dick Morris, both veterans, are on hand to try to thwart the Mustangs in their league debut.

Aztec head coach Paul Governall predicts that his '59 Aztec eleven will be a definite improvement over the 1958 (8-5-0) club, but reserve strength is missing.

The Mustangs returned from Montana with only one major injury, involving first string tackle Billy Ross's knee. Ross will see limited practice duty this week in an effort to be on hand for the southern trip.

Other CCAA foes turned in a profitable weekend, with a "tremendously sharp" looking Fresno State Bulldog eleven downing Brigham Young University 27-16, and the Santa Barbara Gauchos dumping the Whittier Poets 20-15. Both games were played Saturday night.

## '59 Freshman Squad Tough; Bullpups File Same Claim

Featuring a squad of 46 ex-high school gridders, the 1959 Cal Poly freshman "Colt" aggregation is billed by coach Tom Lee as "The most promising bunch of youngsters I've seen in recent years."

Lee, smiling from ear to ear over the club's 26-8 drubbing of the Taft JC Cougars two weeks ago, compares his '59 outfit to the undefeated Colt squad of 1950, when two ex-Cal Poly greats, Alex Bravo and Stan Sheriff romped around in Colt duds.

Lee, and assistant coach Walt Williamson, former Occidental gridders who has served with the pro Pittsburgh Steelers, both manage wide grins when they scan their roster of future Mustangs; a list which, upon first glance, appears to be a recap of Who's Who in California High School Football.

The Colt line, formed around 280 pound Al Marinal, All-City tackle in San Francisco last year, proved formidable against the Cougars. End Mike Nichols, who's destined for Mustang future greatness, nabbed several aerials from the arm of quarterback Ken Lott, just recently removed from Corcoran High School. Eddie Pope, a talented 200-pound halfback from Tulare, rolled for 58 yards against the valley crew, and bears watching the season.

Current Colt workouts are pointed at thwarting the Fresno State Bullpups Friday night in Ralcliffe stadium. The Freshman of coach Gene Beyer, though boasting a smaller squad than the Colts, will probably feature the running of Jim Hendricks, a fleet 195-pounder who landed a berth as All-City

halfback at Edison (Fresno) High in 1956.

Lee, who just recently regarded his '59 season schedule as "plenty tough", is more optimistic now than his initial content was successful.

The remainder of the schedule finds the Colts on the road to Santa Barbara JC on October 10; meeting the San Jose Fresh, in what could be the outstanding freshman game in years, in Mustang Stadium on October 24; and finishing up in Watsonville, against Cabrillo College on October 31.

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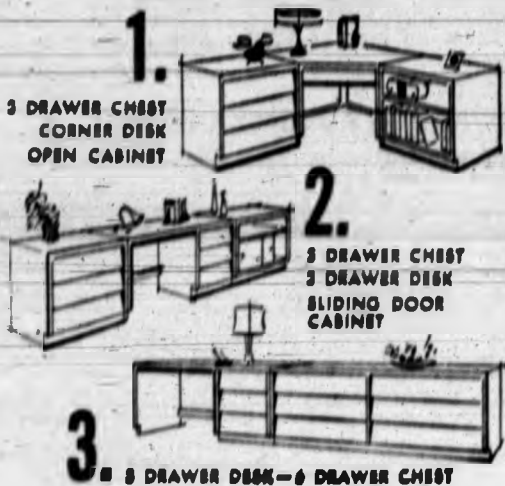
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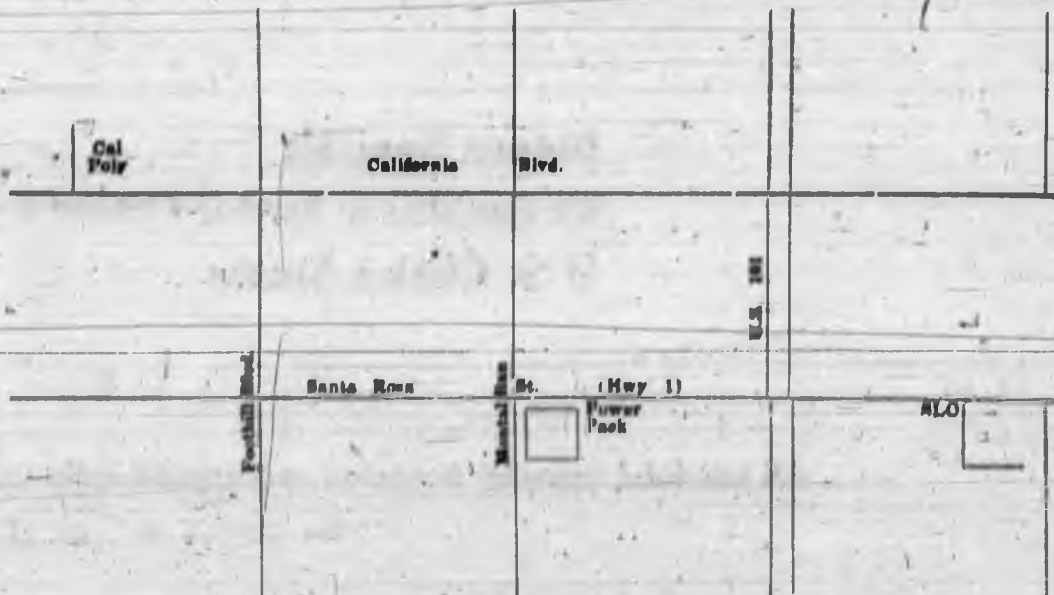
