Prop. 203 could bring Cal Poly projects closer

Passage of Proposition 203 in the March 26 primary election could bring several Cal Poly facility projects closer to reality even though they're not on the ballot.

A new engineering building, new agriculture facilities, a telecommunications upgrade, and work on the sewer and storm-drain systems are on the CSU's capital facilities list, but didn't make the cutoff for this month's \$3 billion bond issue.

Facilities Planning Director Bob Kitamura expects the Cal Poly projects to be on the next bond issue. If Proposition 203 fails, the projects on it would probably be delayed until the next bond election, Kitamura said. That could delay the Cal Poly projects for an additional two years.

Proposition 203 would provide about \$2 billion for repairs, upgrades and new construction for the primary and secondary grades and about \$1

billion for higher education. The general-obligation bond measure would fund \$150 million worth of projects in the CSU.

Hawkes

Miles came to Cal Poly in 1973 and retired in 1973.

Barrios, 73

James Neil Barrios died on Feb. 24 in a San Luis Obispo hospital.

After 20 years of military service, Barrios worked as a custodian at Cal Poly from 1965 until 1978.

To help celebrate the Easter season, Cal Poly Arts and the O.D.C./San Francisco modern dance troupe will present three performances of "The Velveteen Rabbit."

Shows are scheduled for 7 pm Friday, April 5, and 11 am and 4 pm Saturday, April 6, in the Theatre.

Inspired by Margery Williams' children's classic, "The Velveteen Rabbit" is a two-act fantasy that appeals to all ages.

The book's message that anything deeply loved eventually grows real is carried through in the imaginative production of the tale of a little boy's beloved toy rabbit that comes to life, first as a reality to the boy, and then as an actual rabbit in the woods.

The O.D.C./San Francisco production preserves much of Williams' text, which is read on tape by comic actor Geoff Hoyle. K.T. Nelson's choreography and Benjamin Britten's music mesh with the animated narrative.

join the 15-member ensemble in the three performances.

Graphic Communication celebrates 50 years

The Graphic Communication Department, in celebration of its 50th anniversary this year, has begun a \$1 million endowment drive to support graphic arts education.

The drive will continue through the 1996-97 academic year.

Other anniversary events will include a Tom Flores Celebrity Golf Tournament in Reno, Nev., in June; an alumni activity scheduled during the Gutenberg Festival in Long Beach in May; and a national conference sponsored by the advisory board. Fund-raising drives for a new building and for industry support to upgrade laboratories will also be held.

The department has received several recent donations toward its goal:

- ♦ The K/P Corp. has pledged \$15,000 over three years to be used for faculty training, laboratory improvements, curriculum development, and overall program upgrades.
- ♦ Gilbert Paper Co. of Menasha, Wis., has donated 300,000 sheets of Gilbert Neu-Tech laser paper to support education, testing and research involving the Graphic Communication Department's new Xerox DocuTech system.
- ♦ Linotype-Hell Corp. has donated a Herkules Pro drum imagesetter and two PostScript RIP 50s. The gift is valued at approximately \$185,000 and is being used in the department's Electronic Prepress Lab.

Library receives grant for cultural studies

The CSU Council of Library Directors awarded \$15,000 to the Kennedy Library for a project designed to link special collections related to California architecture, history, politics, ethnography and journalism.

The California Cultural Studies Digital Library aims to link the collections at one site for easy access by students, faculty members and other researchers.

Building on a prototype developed by the Kennedy Library, the grant provides additional funding to expand the scope of the project to include eight special collections:

- ♦ California Fairs Collection (1945-1980).
- ♦ California Travel and Promotional Ephemera Collection (1915-1955).
- ♦ Healey Collection of California Newspapers (1847-1960).
- ♦ Moor Collection of Underground Comix (1960s).
- ♦ Julia Morgan Collection (1890-1950).
- ♦ Painted Rock Collection of Native American Pictographs (1870 - ?).
- ♦ Smith Collection on Japanese-American Internment (1940s).
- ♦ Upton Sinclair Collection on California Politics (1930s).

The digital library provides researchers with greater access to those rare and unique materials using World Wide Web technologies.

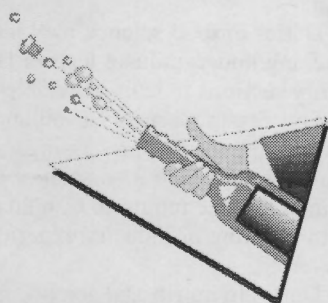
Weather permitting, the auction will be held from 10 am to 2 pm on the outside patio. If it rains, it will be held from 1 to 4 pm inside the cafe.

- Duties in food science may include teaching undergraduate lecture-laboratory sections in fruit-vegetable-cereal processing, sensory evaluation, packaging, or meat processing. Master's degree in food science or animal science required. Candidates with teaching or industry experience preferred.

- Duties in nutritional science may include teaching courses in basic nutrition, clinical nutrition, and nutrition in special population groups; and supervising internship students and undergraduate research projects. Master's degree in human nutrition, dietetics, or related field (must include graduate courses in nutrition) and teaching experience required. R.D. preferred for some appointments.
