Full Accreditation Granted By WCA

Full five-year accreditation has been granted by the Western College Association to both campuses of Cal Poly, President Julian A. McPhee announced this week. A survey team from the WCA visited the college campuses at San Luis Obispo and Pomona last month. Its report and recommendations were forwarded to the Committee on Membership and Standards which serves as an accreditation commission. Upon favorable recommendation of that committee, the WCA Executive Committee voted the accreditation.

The five-year period is the longest granted by the association to any college within its jurisdiction. Cal Poly previously had been granted accreditation for a three-year period.

President McPhee said the grant of the five-year accreditation is "a strong indication that Cal Poly is coming of age."

Cal Poly also is accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools and by the State Department of Education.

Vets Needing Cash May Borrow On GI Insurance

Veterans holding permanent GI life insurance do not need to surrender their policies for cash in order to raise money needed during financial emergencies, according to the Veterans Administration.

These veterans may borrow up to 94 per cent of their policies' cash value. Although this action reduces the amount of protection for the veterans' beneficiaries by the amount borrowed, it does leave the policy in force.

Once surrendered for cash, however, all protection under the insurance ceases forever, since the GI policy is cancelled and cannot be renewed or reinstated. Should a veteran borrow on his GI insurance and then die before repaying the loan in full, the outstanding indebtedness will be deducted from the policy proceeds before the latter is paid to the beneficiaries. For example, if a veteran dies while owing \$500 on his \$10,000 GI policy, the beneficiary would receive \$9,500.

Annual interest on GI policy loans is charged at 4 per cent on the unpaid balance and must be paid on or before the due date. Otherwise, the unpaid interest is added to the outstanding amount of the loan. This would soon eat up the remaining cash value of the policy and the insurance protection would cease. Repayment of the principal on GI policy loans may be made in amounts of \$5 or any multiple thereof, and at any time before default in payment of premiums.

Loans can be made only on permanent-type GI insurance policies. GI term insurance has no loan value.

The local Veterans Administration Office, located at 804 Santa Rosa Street, San Luis Obispo, is prepared to assist veterans in making loans and will forward the application to the office of jurisdiction by air mail if there is an emergency indicated. The average time to obtain a loan is around three weeks from the date of application.

Cal Poly Blood Bank Still Needs 77 Pints

"The Cal Poly account of the Tri-County Blood Bank will soon be in trouble unless more blood is received," said Dr. Earl D. Lovett, head of Cal Poly's new Health Center.

"We now have only 88 pints of blood when a level of at least 100 pints should be maintained at all times," he continues.

According to J. D. Lawson, Associate Dean of Activities, it is possible for students to donate blood starting March 8, and thereafter on Wednesday of every other week.

"The time to donate blood is from 2 until 4:30 P.M. and it is possible to process five to six people very 15 minutes, making carload groups ideal situations," said Lawson.

Blood received from the donations of students and staff members will be available to two groups. Group one consists of the students, faculty and staff, and the alumni.

Any time these people need blood, it will be available in unlimited quantities. A student will be eligible to use blood regardless of the distance he is living from Cal Poly or of the number of years since graduation.

Group two consists of the immediate families of the students, faculty staff, and alumni. This group will be eligible only if the number of pints of blood remains above 80 per cent of the total enrollment.

The main requirement for giving blood is that the donor must be 21 years old or have his parents' permission.

All appointment reservations must be made through Lawson, in Adm. 185.

Ric Berndt, Finance Committee Chairman, appeared before the group with three requests from the Board of Athletic Control, a recommendation for Fall Leadership Conference Travel, and a transfer to ASB General miscellaneous.

County Schools Plan For Annual Science Show

The Fourth Annual Science Fair will be held on campus March 18-19 in the D and E wings of the Science Building, according to Vance Lewis of the Physical Science Department.

The fair will be made up of projects and exhibits submitted by students from secondary and elementary schools in the Central Coast area which includes San Luis Obispo County and the northern half of Santa Barbara County.

Judging from previous fairs, there will be from 1500 to 2000 displays by students from over 40 schools, Lewis says.

Projects in the past have been concerned with working models of scientific equipment, models of rockets, collections of shells and fossils, examples of unique forms of plants and animals.

The projects will be judged by a team of Cal Poly science instructors, and will be rated according to scientific correctness, ingenuity in applying scientific principles, and the apparent amount of work put in on the project. The contest phase of the fair will be open to Junior and Senior High School students only.

A guidance committee made up of Ralph Collins, Lewis, and Dave Thomson are in charge of the organization and planning of the fair.

Model United Nations Founded As "Workshop For Peace"

Editor's note: For the benefit of the Cal Poly students, a background of information about the Model United Nations is being presented. It is hoped that this and following articles about the MUN will stimulate enough interest among students in more students will participate in this "Workshop for Peace."

Cal Poly is preparing to send delegates to the tenth session of the Model United Nations in April, according to Thomas Nolan of the Social Science department. The session will be held in Berkeley, April 6-9.

Ten years ago collegiate students from all over California took the initiative to discuss ways and means for the formation of a Model UN assembly. The world at the time due to the Korean incident was uneasy with the fear that the "last war to end all wars" did not seem to have been the last, and that the world was confronted with the possibility of a Third World War.

The enterprising group of students while entertaining the hope that the UN experiment would prove to be a deterrent also felt that they should do their share and educate other students toward a better understanding of international affairs and to acquaint them with some of the problems facing our world.

With the aid of the Collegiate Council for the United Nations, the first Model UN was set up at Stanford University in 1951 and more than 800 students met to debate the current issues.

The athletic budget received approval from SAC for additions of \$700 for track; \$536.80, swimming, and \$25.85, gymnastics, all from contingency.

Final athletic recommendation consisted of a request to send Herman Farlough to the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Gymnastic competition to be held in Berkeley, today and tomorrow. SAC approved the transfer of \$25.85 to allow Farlough to enter the meet.

Approval of \$36.75 from contingency to Fall Leadership Conference Travel to send three persons to Sparta Camp at Asilomar was passed.

The final finance committee item was a \$65 transfer from contingency to ASB general miscellaneous for the purpose of payment for a top coat belonging to the Taft College coach. The coat was missed following a contest in Crandall Gym. The incident was reported to the Dean of Students and to the Security Department.

Don Bryant, Poly Royal General Superintendent, gave a run down of Poly Royal progress and a board recommendation for 1960 prices. The theme for Poly Royal, April 29-30, is Education-Experience-Opportunity and honored guest will be Dr. J. Burton Vasche, Department of Education. The Poly Royal Board proposed the staging of a High School Day to be held Friday of Poly Royal.

SAC approved the Poly Royal Board recommendations for prices which will prevail during the event. Prices are: barbecue, \$1.75; Coronation Ball, \$5 per couple; rodeo, \$1.25 adults, 75 cents students, and 50 cents children; carnival tickets, 10 cents; Nappy Lamar concert, 50 cents and carnival dance, 70 cents per couple and 40 cents for stag.

University of Southern California in the Spring of 1952. The third and fourth sessions were hosted at the University of California at Berkeley, and University of California at Los Angeles, respectively.

The fifth conference coincided with the anniversary of United Nations in 1955, and San Francisco State College was considered the most appropriate site for the Conference due to the fact that San Francisco is the birth place of the United Nations. The plenary sessions were held in the Opera House of the city and more than 1,000 students participated.

In 1956, for the first time in its short history, the MUN Conference was held outside of the State of California, in Corvallis, Ore. It was in Oregon that a new element was added to the proceedings—the International Court of Justice.

Stanford University in 1957 and the University of Washington in Seattle, Wash. In 1958 played hosts to the meetings. At the University of Washington it was maintained that the conference should rotate yearly between Northern and Southern California, and the Pacific Northwest. At the Eighth Session, the University of Southern California was chosen as the site of the ninth session. In the three-day conference there were five committees, two councils, and the International Court of Justice, the latter was composed of law students from the University of Southern California, Loyola and University of California.

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Eleventh Annual PCI Wrestling Tourney Begins Here Today

Wrestling, collegiate style, comes to Cal Poly in a big way today and tomorrow as the Eleventh Annual Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Wrestling Association Championship Tournament is presented in the Men's Physical Education Gymnasium.

With a record entry of 23 colleges and universities representing the cream of the West's collegiate wrestling crop, local wrestling fans will get a chance to watch approximately 160 outstanding wrestlers vie for championship honors in ten weight classifications—115, 121, 130, 137, 147, 157, 167, 177, 191, and heavyweight.

Sheldon Harden, Cal Poly wrestling coach, will assume the role of association president, with Bill Tomaris of University of California and Harry Broadbent of San Diego State, as Vice President and Secretary, respectively.

Prelims Today

Harden plans to use three mats simultaneously during the tournament which gets underway this afternoon at 2 P.M. with the preliminary round matches. Tonight's quarter-finals will begin at 7 P.M., giving way to the semi-finals tomorrow afternoon at 2 P.M. with the finals starting tomorrow night at 8 P.M.

In addition to defending PCI champion Oregon State and 1958 champion Cal Poly Mustangs, the tournament will feature grapplers from the University of Arizona, University of California, University of California at Los Angeles, Lewis and Clark, University of Oregon, Portland State, San Diego State, San Jose State, San Francisco State, Southern Oregon, Santa Clara, University of Washington, Washington State, Oregon College of Education, Pacific University, University of California at Davis, Long Beach State, Chico State, Seattle Pacific, and Los Angeles State.

Oregon State Favored

Oregon State's Beavers should stand in the spotlight as pre-tourney favorites. One needn't check too far into the Beaver's wrestling record in the past ten years to discover the fact that they have established one of the most enviable mat records in the West Coast Collegiate world. In fact they have been the PCI Wrestling Champion five times since 1950, garnering the crown in 1950, 55, 56, 57, and 59. Their attempt at five consecutive years (1955-59) was thwarted in 1958 when Cal Poly walked off with top honors at the tourney in San Jose.

Here, then, on the eve of the Eleventh Annual PCI Wrestling Tourney, Dal Thomas' Oregon State squad rates top rung on the pre-tourney ladder as favorites to repeat.

The fact that they have three defending champions back in the fold in the form of Fritz Fivian, 167 pounds; Mitz Tamura, 115 pounds; and Don Conway, 177 pounds, doesn't seem to hurt their chances any.

In addition to the trio of Oregon State grapplers anxious to keep their titles intact, Gary Hoagland, Portland State 155 pound champion, returns for top-seeding in his class, along with team mate Autry Ehler, 167 pounder, who should give Oregon State's Fivian some competition.

Bill Berry, Washington State's 147 pound defending champion, is expected to appear, as is Pacific University's Charlie Peterson, defending 191 pound title holder.

Cal Poly's hopes rest with heavyweight Pat Lovell, who won the 1958 PCI's and Ken Roberts, Mustang 191 pounder, who, though injured two weeks ago, should be ready to go.

Referees for the tourney will be ex-Mustang grappler Webber Lawson, David Hengsteler, coach at El Camino Junior College; Von Hitch-



Poly's Harden Directs Tourney, Association

Hosting the PCI Tournament this year is the man who has "made" wrestling at Cal Poly. He's the PCI President this year and the Mustangs' head mat coach, Sheldon Harden.

Mustang footballers call him "Mr. Conditioner," the man who leads the vast assortment of calisthenics on the football field. Mustang wrestlers know him for his devotion to the wrestling game. In any event, Harden, who just completed his eleventh season at the Mustang wrestling helm commands respect wherever he is, since, in addition to being one of the most popular of Cal Poly's Physical Education instructors, only one glance is necessary to uncover his occupation. Harden, at 6'8" and what he describes as "a trim" 230 pounds, fits the role of a wrestling coach perfectly.

As a tribute to his success as a college wrestling coach, Harden was selected by his fellow coaches on the western college scene as the 1959 Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Wrestling Association President.

Wrestling at Cal Poly, prior to Harden's arrival in 1949, was lost in the throes of apathy. Harden has turned this apathy into a popular sport in San Luis Obispo. Interest in the local area hit a fever pitch when Harden and his proteges hit the PCI jackpot in 1958; this fever has yet to die.

More than a small portion of the credit for the growing interest and emphasis on high school wrestling in the San Luis Obispo area must be accredited to Harden. He has initiated many mat programs, including the annual high school tourney, approaching its fourth year of activity.

Married, Harden and his wife, Dorothy, reside in San Luis Obispo with their children, Michele, Maureen, and Tim.

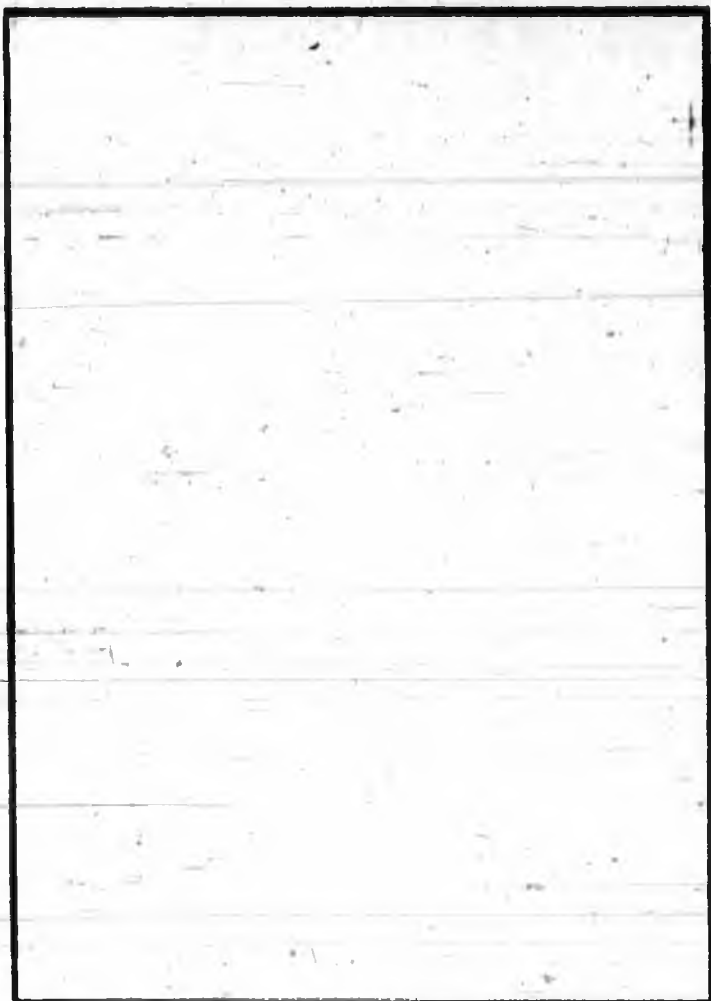

Hoping to repeat his 1958 performance is Cal Poly Mustang heavyweight Pat Lovell. The 240-pound muscle man won the title two years ago and is one of the favorites to bring the title home again this year.

Lovell lost only one match this year. That was against Gary Stensland of Oregon, who is also here to work for the Ducks.

Among others in the top ranks of the heavyweights are Charles Cassidy, Portland State, and Dave Enslow and Jim Skaggs, U. of Washington. Skaggs, from Arroyo Grande, also played on the winning Washington team in the Rose Bowl this year.

Skaggs, however, does not hold a monopoly on doubling as a football player. Poly's Lovell is a four-year letterman for Coach LeRoy Hughes' Mustangs and has been a starting tackle for three years.

Winner of the heavyweight title last year was John Dustin of Oregon State. He will not return this year.

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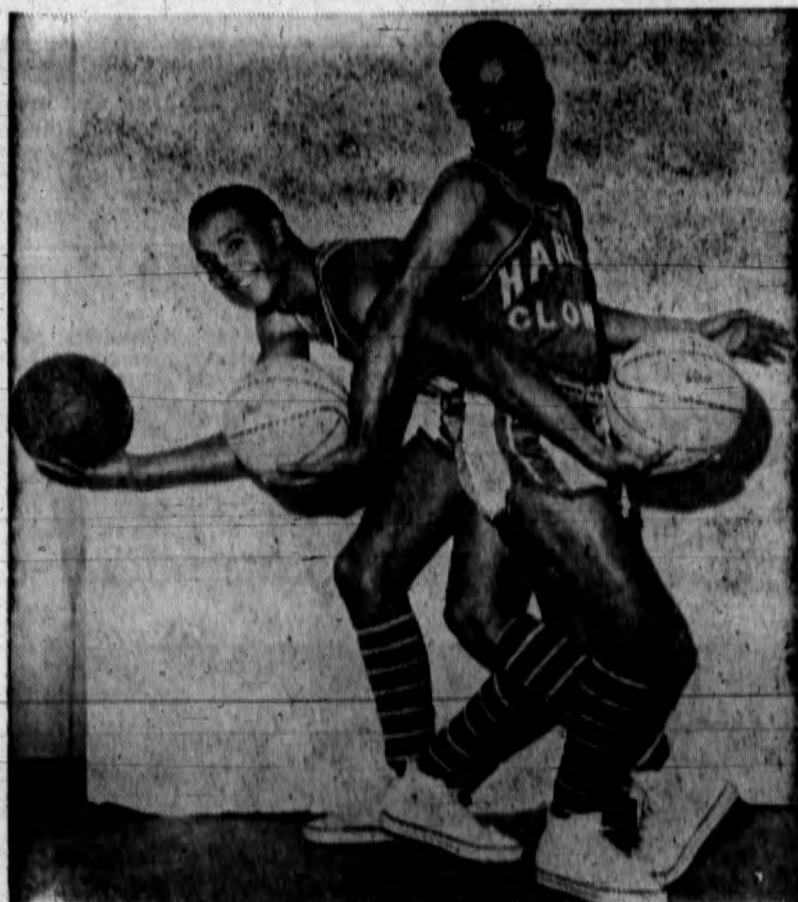
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Undefeated Colts After Repeat Wins

Lee was undecided at press time as to his 165 pound contender.

The University of Wisconsin, boasting several national champions in their stable, are expected to be led by the following men: Brown McGee, a scrappy 125 pounder, who will meet experienced Mustang Marty Sykes. The Badgers' Charley Moir, 165 pound national champion, will be favored over whoever Lee draws out of the hat to meet him. Another

formidable Badger contender is to be found in Bob Christopherson who weighs in at 178.

Among the Badgers' 1960 victories are two impressive 7-1 decisions, one handed to the University of Washington, and one to Idaho State.
