## Spring Could Mean Polio at Cal Poly

"Get your polio shots now," urges Dr. Earl D. Lovett, Head Medical Officer.

"Springtime is the season that polio hits. Students should be reminded to get their fourth shot and not let it go," says Dr. Lovett. "We now have a means for protecting people from polio, but the novelty of the vaccine has worn off and they are lax about getting their shots. Many students have not received the first shot."

"We have not had a serious case of polio for the past four years," Dr. Lovett comments, "but if the pattern remains the same, one student on campus will get paralytic polio this spring. His chances of dying will be about one in eight."

Anyone can get one or all shots at the Health Center between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. Monday through Friday.

## Cathedral Murder Next at High Noon; Foote Scores Hit

Books at High Noon today will feature Rev. Walter Phelps on T. S. Elliot's "Murder in the Cathedral." The meeting will be held in Lib. 114.

The late Albert Camus, 1957 Nobel Prize winner, was commemorated by Alvin Foote, English instructor, at a recent Books at High Noon meeting.

Ena Mayston, Chairman of Books at High Noon, introduced Foote as "the most widely known member of the English Department." Foote warned that the talk was not an interpretation of Camus' works.

"I'll leave that to the 'A' minus snots pummeling his bones for PhD's," he said.

The instructor explained the "Absurdity of Necessity," Camus' philosophy which ridicules the role of everyday man in the machine-age world, in that his life is without meaning. Man goes to work to earn money to buy shoes to go to work.

Albert Camus joined the Communist Party to oppose the French government, which he believed was destroying the Arabs in Algeria. He later withdrew from the party and attacked the Soviet labor camps. He attacked the United States for indirectly supporting Franco during the revolution in Spain, because he felt the primary responsibility of man was to do nothing that might hurt others.

Foote explained that Camus felt the modern world may be saved by a great writer—certainly by men and not by any of the great "lams" which are not the complete answer.

## Spring Enrollment Over 4,000 Mark

Spring Quarter enrollment shot past the 4,000 mark at the conclusion of late registration last week.

The total of 4,010—with about a dozen more unprocessed—is the highest Spring Quarter enrollment in the college's 59-year history.

Spring Quarter totals include almost 1,000 in Agriculture, 1,100 in Arts and Sciences and more than 1,700 in Engineering. Spring Quarter of 1959 totaled under 4,000.

W. Saxon Wraith, Registrar, points out that the total is only 178 less than Winter Quarter.

C. Paul Winner, Admissions Officer, also reports that applications for registration next fall indicate a heavy enrollment exceeding last fall's 4,500. He said the college can accommodate the students since 1,200 new residence hall living units will be ready.

Heaviest quarter-to-quarter increase in enrollment in the last year is in the Arts and Sciences Division. Dean Roy E. Anderson says that applications at this time for next fall enrollment are 70 per cent heavier than last year's pre-registration applications.

## Housing Fee Hiked To \$230 Next Fall

With the opening of the new residence halls, housing fees will be raised to \$230 per quarter.

This fee includes housing, meals, and parking. It is an increase of \$50, according to Harold Hayes, Dean of the College, to correspond with the standard rate on all college campuses. Meal tickets will provide the same three meals during the week, with lunch and dinner on Saturday, and dinner on Sunday.

To compensate for the increase, occupants per room will be reduced to two in the Mountain Dorms, and one in Deuel. The Freshman Dorms will be used only for overflow, according to Hayes.

New mattresses and furniture will be installed in the dorm rooms.

Plans are being made for 1,000 parking spaces to accommodate the additional cars for the new dorms. "Parking will be as adequate as it is now," says Hayes.

Root, who placed fourth in the recent PCI tournament, was the sole collegiate wrestler to place in the 130.5 pound class. Lovell also was the only college grappler to place in the heavyweight division.

The annual event, from which first and second place contenders will enter the Olympic tryouts, was won by the New York Athletic Club.

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## Eager after Dropping Three, Diamondmen Face Tough Marines

Facing a tough San Diego Marine nine both yesterday and today, Coach Bill Hick's Mustang baseball team will be out to avenge two earlier defeats by the Leathernecks. The Mustangs, who have one previous win over the service-

men will begin diamond activities at 8 p.m. on both days. In games over the weekend, Jerry Linnell's frosh batmen were the only winners, splitting a twin bill with Reedy J. C., dropping the first game 4-8 and winning the second 7-1.

Friday the Long Beach State Forty-Niners cut short a Mustang rally to edge Cal Poly 6-4 on the Long Beach diamond. Jim Newkirk started on the mound, with Ted Tollner stepping in in the third inning followed by Bert Warnick in the seventh. Jerry Johnson caught.

The San Diego State Aztecs were apparently ready for the Mustangs when they invaded the border city for a double header on Saturday. Holding the Mustangs hitless and capitalizing on three errors, the Aztecs blanked Poly 7-0. Rod Atamp, Bill Callan and Jim Newkirk alternately faced the Aztecs while Johnson again held down the pivot position. Poly dropped the second game 8-8.

## Netters Split Two; Linkmen Lose Out

The Mustang tennis team split a twin bill over the weekend, blanking UCSB 7-0, while San Diego State handed Cal Poly its first loss of the season. The Mustangs, still high ranked in CCAA competition, now hold a 4-1-1 record.

Jack Stanford and Tom Darnell were the lone Mustang winners in the ill-fated Astec match, while each team member took a win against the Santa Barbara Gauchos.

Coming out on the short end of a triangular golf meet, the Mustang linkmen lost to San Diego State 24-14, to put the Aztecs out in front, while the I.A. State Diablos notched a second with 21 points. John Clowin of Poly was high medalist with two under par. Tony Costa and Buddy Joe Petty were the other lone Mustang winners.

## Mermen Dunk FSC; School Marks Fall

John Carr and Jack Adam each grabbed two first places to help the Mustang mermen dunk Fresno State College 62-28 over the weekend.

However, Russ Poe and Frank Brooks put on two record breaking performances by bettering school marks in the 800 yard backstroke and 200 yard butterfly. Brooks broke his own record in the butterfly event, covering the distance in 2:16:7—3.2 seconds faster than the old mark. Poe, traveling the backstroke event in 2:30.2, broke Gene Lena's old time by five tenths of a second.

## Spikers Edge Gauchos 68-62

With records set in two nations, the Cal Poly Mustangs defeated the UCSB Gauchos in both varsity and frosh competition in a dual meet held on the Mustang oval last Saturday. The Mustang varsity came out with a 68 and 1/6 score while the frosh trounced UCSB 26 to 47.

Featured match of the day came when Santa Barbara's Henk Visser set a new Netherlands National record with his 0.6 hundred yard dash. Vic Hall ran a close second in what was described as "almost a dead heat". Hall turned in a torrid 20.6 220, which stood as the top time in the nation, until Ray Norton of the Santa Clara Village burned a terrific 20.1 220 in San

Jose several minutes later. Hall also turned in a 49.0 440 for the Mustangs.

Art Wilson of Cal Poly set a new meet record for the broad jump, hurtling 24 feet 4 inches, also taking high jump honors with a 6 feet 2 1/2 inch effort.

Leather-lunged Jack Wofford set a new track record in the mile, clocking a 9:58.9 time in the four lap event.

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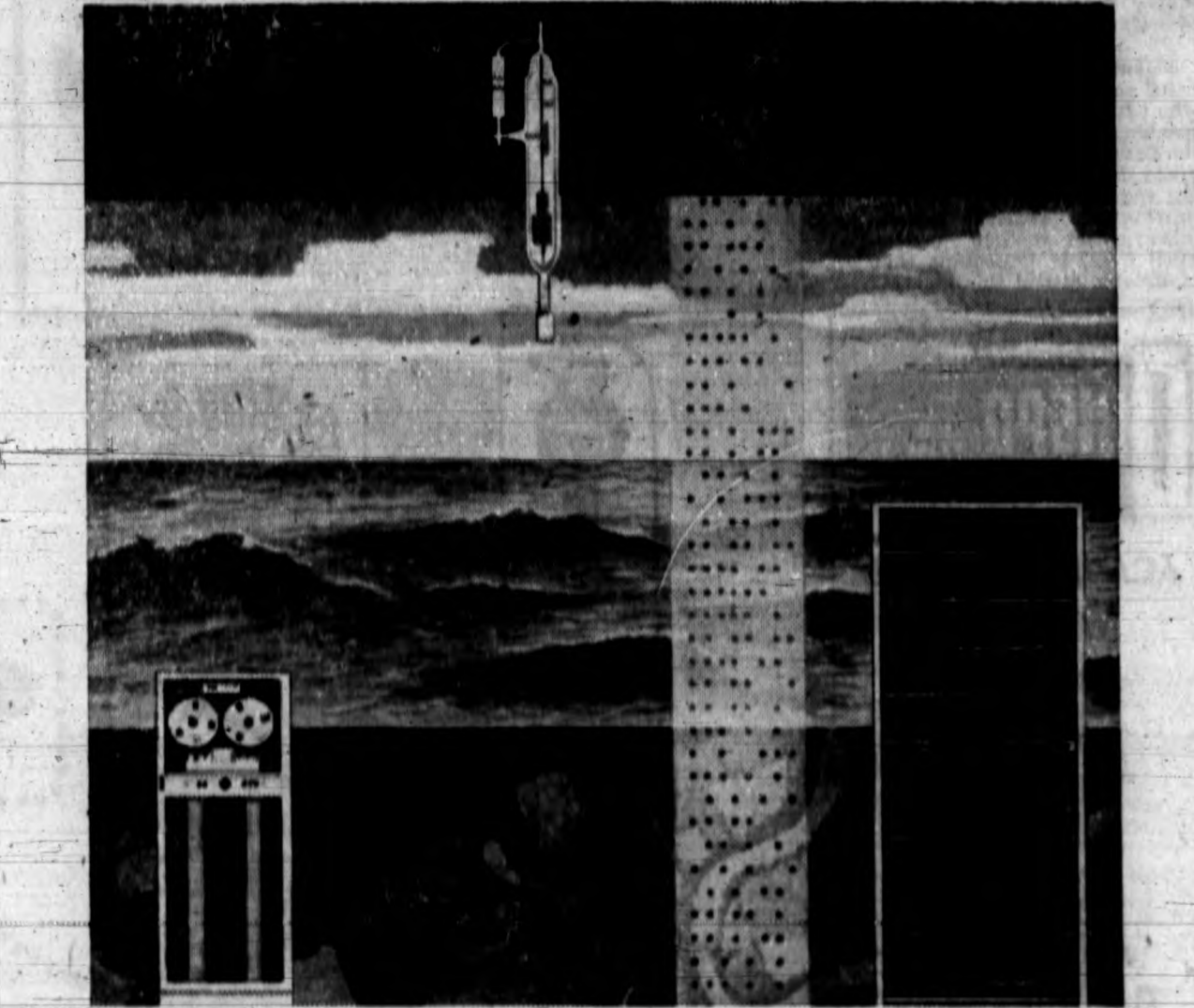
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

The all-around championship in the National Collegiate Gymnastics Championships includes competition in six events.

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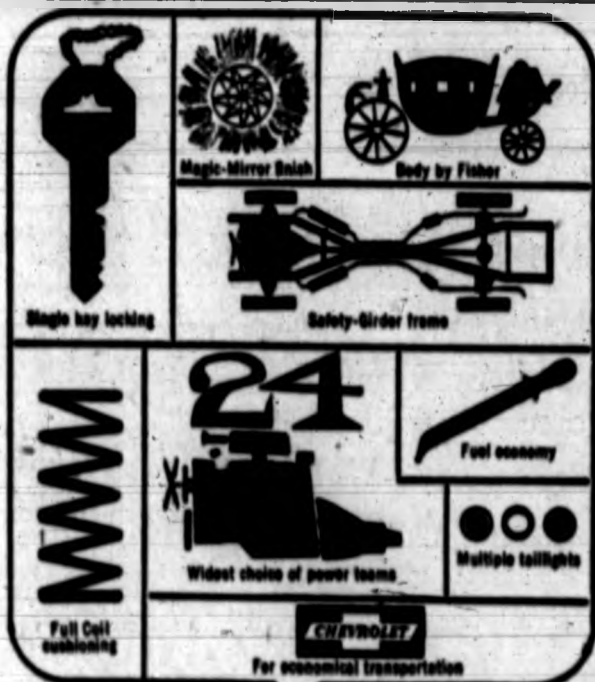
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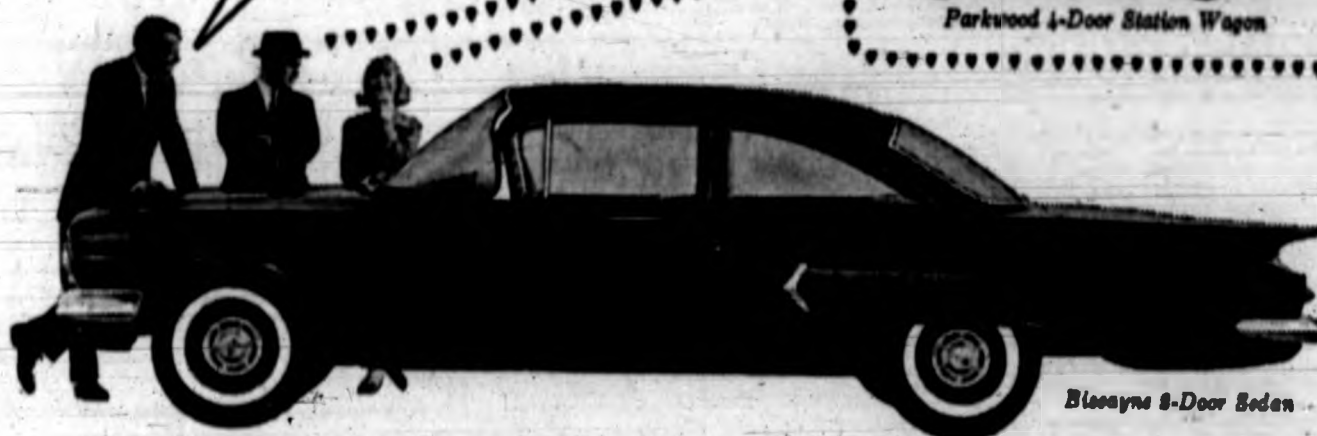
