Dean Cites Need for Increased Fees for Activity Building

The possibility of a 3-story Student Activity Building, a finance committee report and the price of the western dance for Poly Royal were discussed at the Student Affairs Council meeting Tuesday.

At last week's SAC meeting Dan Lawson, Associate Dean of Activities, discussed the possibilities of replacing the planned new book store building with a 3-story Student Activity Building. The book store building with a 3-story, 2-level but an underground floor and a third floor would be added. To make this possible, a \$5 a year student body fee raise was discussed. The raise would take place only if a student body election favors the decision and approval is granted by President Julian McPherson and the State Director of Education.

Tuesday night Lawson said, "There is a possibility that we could build the book store and the shell of the basement floor without the \$5 raise in student body fees."

"Therefore the basement floor, bowling alleys and other recreation areas would not be in operation, and we would not be getting any profit from it to build the third floor of the building," said the associate dean.

Lawson continued by saying, "With the increase in student fees it might be possible to have the basement floor operating and the shell of the third floor will look finished from the outside."

"If the \$5 raise is defeated by

the student body, it might be considered a lack of student interest in such a facility," said Lawson.

The question was brought up at the meeting if write-in candidates are legal for Poly Royal Queen.

"According to the Poly Royal code, write-in candidates are not legal and those students writing in a candidate will have their ballots voided," said Bob McCorkle, ASB Vice President. "The codes have been decided upon and in order to have an orderly process of government we must maintain these codes."

"Group pressure will do no good in a case like this," commented Lawson, "and I will be glad to talk to anyone who is interested, and has a question."

Graduate Manager Bob Spink announced the State Gymnastics Meet will be held here Saturday, April 9 and proposed that a 75 cent charge for general admission and a 25 cent charge for students be carried through. "The reason for charging the students is that it is a state meet," said Spink. The recommendation was approved.

Don Bryant, Poly Royal Board Chairman, requested that a motion be carried to charge for the Poly Royal Western Dance. The motion was carried.

Dick Robben, Westminster Fellowship spokesman, asked the council's permission to circulate a petition which calls upon the council of Vanderbilt University to re-

Wisdom Of West Is Next On Books At High Noon

"The Wisdom of the West" by Bertrand Russell will be the next presentation on Books at High Noon.

The review will be made Tuesday, April 12, in J.B. 118 by Loren Nicholson of the Journalism Department.

"The book, itself, displays an interesting dimension in communication containing some 800 illustrations, at least half of them in color," says Nicholson. He adds that the illustrations are not ordinary because they "utilize symbolism and abstraction as a means of expressing ideas that do not readily take familiar image form."

The review in TIME says, "In a prodigious feat of analysis, narrative and condensation, Bertrand Russell has compressed the history of the western philosophy in 820 pages."

Riders, Ropers Take Top Honors

Cal Poly's rodeo team won their second all-around championship in Tucson, Ariz., last weekend competing against eight other college teams.

Cal Poly ran up a total of 580 points with University of Arizona 40 points behind.

Jack Sparrow, AH freshman, won the reserve all-around individual cowboy title, placing first in the calf roping event, and third in the bareback bronc event.

Riley Freeman, AH senior and rodeo team captain, took first place in the bulldogging event and third in the two-day average for calf roping.

Bill Nielson, ABM junior, took first in calf roping on the second day and placed second in the bulldogging event.

In the saddle bronc event, Marvin Smith, AH junior, placed second and Jim Walker, AH sophomore, placed third. Smith also split third and fourth places in the bull riding event.

R.C. Nunes, ASB sophomore, split fourth and fifth places with Walker in the ribbon roping contest. Walker also placed fourth in the bulldogging event.

The next intercollegiate rodeo will be held during Poly Royal, with seven other college teams participating in the two-day event.

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State Gymnastics Meet on Campus Attracts Top Performers

Mustangs Meet Bulldogs Here Tomorrow in CCAA Twin-Bill

Eager to get back on the winning trail after seven consecutive losses, Coach Bill Hicks' Mustang baseball squad tangles with the Fresno State Bulldogs tomorrow on the Poly Diamond, first game scheduled to start at 12:30 PM.

Veteran Jim Newkirk will hurl for the Mustangs in the opener, with Ted Tollner scheduled for action in the seven-inning nightcap.

Hicks listed his starting lineup as Jerry Johnson, catcher; Bob

Williams, first base; Chuck Giordano, second base; Wayne Sorenson, third base; and Rally Rounsaville, shortstop. Hicks will start with Rich Simmons, Cameron Best, and Jim Taylor in the outfield.

Thinclads Win Again; Meet SF-LA Tomorrow

Sticking to his claim of "not losing another track meet for the remainder of the year", Walt Williamson's Mustang track team knocked over a combination Pomona College - Claremont Mudd College squad 72 2/3 to 87 1/8 here Wednesday afternoon before one of the largest track crowds in Poly's history in attendance.

Williamson's spikers head north tomorrow for a triangular meet with San Francisco State and Los Angeles State on the Gator's oval. Though San Francisco State will assume the role of host squad, Williamson figures the meet to boil down to a "dual" match between the Diablos and the Mustangs, since the Bay Area spikers have not displayed any degree of power to date.

Pre-meet color finds a natural looming in the 440 yard dash, with Los Angeles State's Chuck Cobb (48.4 seconds) and Poly's Vic Hall (47.9) scheduled to meet each other. All-American footballer Joe Womack will probably go against Hall in the 100 yard dash.

In last Wednesday's affair with the associated southern colleges, Mustang broad jumper, Art Wilson, stole the show with a 24'4 1/2" leap to nail top honors in the event. Williamson expects Wilson to near the 25 foot mark tomorrow, unless the weatherman is correct, and Wilson should resort to galoshes by necessity.

Denis Hester had a busy day for the Mustangs, placing third in the mile (his first try at this distance), second in the 880, and appeared in the winning mile relay quartet.

Bruner, Martin Box In NCAA Tourney

Bob Bruner, 118 pounder, and Freddie Martin, 189, are participating in the National Collegiate Athletic Association boxing championships now underway April 7-9 at the University of Wisconsin.

Both were finalists in the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate matches held in Sacramento two weeks ago. They will be accompanied by Coach Tom Lee.

The tourney has drawn more than 70 entries from 35 schools. Seven 1959 NCAA title holders will be back to defend their crowns. Bruner has won three matches and lost one in dual meets this season. Martin has won seven and lost one.

Mustangs Enter Full Team; LAS Favored

The gymnastic spotlight will turn to Cal Poly this weekend as the Mustangs host six visiting teams in the second annual State College Gymnastics Championships. Competition will begin Saturday at 2 P.M. in the new Men's Gymnasium.

Competing with Cal Poly in the Saturday meet will be teams from Sacramento State, San Francisco State, Long Beach State, Los Angeles State, San Jose State, and San Diego State.

Cal Poly coach Dr. Glenn Noble says most of the teams were recently in the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate meet at Berkeley and all demonstrated high quality performances.

The first state meet was held at San Jose State two years ago and was won by the host team.

Admission prices for the event will be 75 cents for general admission and 25 cents for students.

Two Cal Poly boxers were honored this week by being named to the 1960 All-American Boxing Team. Freddie Martin, 189 pounds, was selected for the first team, while 118 pound Bob Bruner was named to the second team.

Martin and Bruner, accompanied by Coach Tom Lee, will represent Cal Poly at the NCAA championship tournament now underway at the University of Wisconsin.

San Jose State, strong contender for the NCAA crown this season, placed two men on the mythical team. Charley Brown was named top 147-pounder, while the tough Spartan heavyweight Archie Milton also took first team honors.

Of the 20 boxers selected by the National Intercollegiate Boxing Coaches Association, 15 were from western colleges, while seven of the remaining five were from the University of Wisconsin.

Sign Up Now For Intramural Track; Meet Is April 13

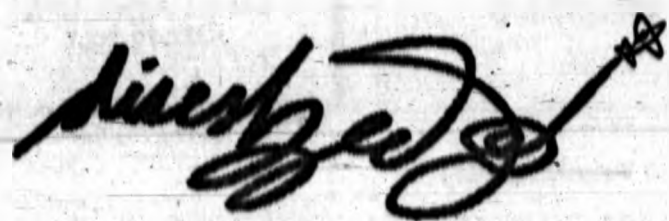
