Bio Science Head Gets Study Grant

Dr. Glenn Noble, Head of the Biological Science Department, has received a research grant from the National Institute of Health's Allergy and Infectious Diseases section. He'll study the effect of stress on parasitic infestation this summer at the Biological Research Station in Jackson Hole, Wyo.

Said Dr. Noble, "Science knows that if you get worried or emotionally upset, your resistance is lowered to disease; but what will it do to parasites in the body?"

Dr. Noble's job this summer will be to work with ground squirrels and find out if their body will flare up chemically or physically from the tests. His study will be published in the "Journal of Parasitology." Dr. Noble is a member of the Society of Parasitology that publishes the journal.

For several years Dr. Noble has done research work in Wyoming. The research station is operated by the University of Wyoming and supported by the New York Ecological Society. Dr. Noble has received two grants to do his work with the Society. He has also worked with the National Science Foundation and the National Institute of Health.

According to Dean Everett Chandler, violation of this parking regulation will result in a citation and possible removal of the student's privilege of pool car parking.

"Students are not putting their parking stickers on the windshield in the lower right-hand corner with the glue provided on the sticker. The affixing of the sticker with scotch tape and other means is undesirable and can lead to traffic citations, and can also result in having the parking sticker stolen. There have been 18 such stickers reported stolen or lost this quarter," says Chandler.

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Bridge Club Grabs Honors in National Mail Tournament

The newly-formed Cal Poly Bridge Club has received word this week that one of their team entries placed fourth in the National Intercollegiate Bridge Tournament.

Approximately 141 schools competed in the tournament, which is conducted by mail with clubs mailing their scores to a central tournament director at the University of Massachusetts. Over 2300 students participated in the tournament with a maximum of eight teams allowed from each school.

Georges and Marie Awad, a married Cal Poly couple from Egypt, were the winners, taking first place in Region 10 of the Association of College Unions, which sponsors the contest. Region 10 includes Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming, and Southern California. The pair went on to tie for fourth place nationally with Wofford College of Spartanburg, S.C. North Carolina State College was the national champion. Carleton college of Minnesota was second, and Yale University third.

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Spartans Nab Gymnastics Championship; Poly Sixth

Though Mustang rope-climber Herman Farlough took top honors in his specialty, the San Jose Spartans nipped defending champion Los Angeles State 118-116 in the California State College Gymnastics Championships held in the New Men's Physical Education Building Saturday.

Opening with the free exercise division, Sacramento State's Curt Bohban walked off with top honors, with teammate Ray Deutch placing second.

The rebound-tumbling department saw Ted Boglos of San Jose State emerge as champion. Farrell Cummings of the Mustangs placed eighth in the event.

Farlough ascended the rope in 3.7 seconds to win the state college championship. Bill Lopes of Long Beach State placed second.

Eric Montesanti, of Los Angeles State, won the side horse event, the parallel bars, and placed second in the still rings, to walk off with the All-Around Performance trophy. Kit Burton and Dalton Sherwood of the Mustangs placed eighth and tenth respectively in the side horse event.

Bill Lopes of Long Beach State took top honors in the horizontal bar, with Louis Enriquez of LA State taking a first in the still ring. Benny Padilla, of Los Angeles, won the long horse event, with Charles Cox and Julie Branca of the Mustangs placing fifth and tenth respectively. Cox and Bill Silva placed fourth and sixth in the parallel bars for the Mustangs.

Mustangs Drop Two To Fresno State

Coach Bill Hicks' Mustang baseball team covered the goose egg market Saturday, when they fell twice to a smooth operating Fresno State nine, 8-0 and 5-0, adding losses number eight and nine to their current consecutive streak. Though the Mustangs are currently 0-5 in CCAA play, the Long Beach State 49'ers took a pair from UCSB Saturday, leaving the Gauchos in the collar with the Mustangs. The Gauchos, too, sport a 0-5 league record.

The Bulldogs garnered all their runs in the first two innings off Mustang hurler Jim Newkirk in the opener. Fresno leadoff man, Stan Busch blasted a solo blast to open the game. Bulldog pitcher, Ed Vagaly took over from that point, allowing only four Mustang safeties, striking out six and walking only four. Bulldog right fielder, Augie Garrido took advantage of the Mustang's hospitality, nabbing five for five in the opener, and three for five in the abbreviated nightcap.

In the second game, it was another proposition of stellar Bulldog pitching, with veteran Jerry MacDonald holding the quiet Mustang bats to three nits. Ted Tollner opener for the Mustangs, and was relieved by Rod Atnip in the sixth.

Garrido and Busch proved to be the big guns for the Fresnoans in the nightcap, with Garrido spraying three hits in five trips, and Busch tagging a Tollner offer over the short right field fence for his second four-bagger of the day.

In addition to Nichols, Colt hurdler, Stan Ishi grabbed top honors in both the high and low hurdles, while running lead-off in the mile relay. Nichols won the 440 yard dash in 58.0.

Larry Larson, recently removed from Bob Thetford's Colt basketball team, won the two-mile run in 11:07.4.

Mustang football prospect, Ken Lott, won both the shot put (41' 10") and the javelin (169' 7") events.

Walt Williamson's Mustang cindersmen took top honors in a triangular meet with San Francisco State and Los Angeles State Saturday, scoring 68 points while the Diablos and Gators followed with 58 and 41 points respectively.

Dennis Hester and Louis Rodrigues both turned in 1:58.8 800's, establishing a new school record. Hester won by an eyelash.

Splashers Edged in CCAA Meet

Only six points separated champion Long Beach State and second place Cal Poly in the California Collegiate Athletic Association swimming and diving championship meet held in the Fresno State College pool Saturday. The 49'ers amassed a total of 186 1/2 points to 180 1/2 for the Mustangs.

Fresno State College was third with 88 points followed by Los Angeles State, 24, and UCSB, 22. Every event was a record time except the 80-yard dash in which the pool mark was tied last Friday.

Though Long Beach State capped top honors, Jack Adams of the Mustangs stole the entire show, winning three events: the 220 freestyle, the 1500 meters freestyle and the 440 freestyle, all in record times.

St. Louis won the first National Collegiate Soccer title with a 5-2 decision over Bridgeport.

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Out Of The Din

An open letter to the student body:

Some of the distressing results of the recent non-violent lunch-room demonstrations in the South focus on a Jim Lawson, a senior in the Divinity School of Vanderbilt University. Jim was arrested for counselling young people in techniques of non-violent resistance to such "outrages" on society as sitting at lunch counters.

The charges of law were only remotely applicable and contrary to actuality. The law was used as a gimmick to uphold segregation, the justness of which the courts will decide. However, Jim was expelled from Vanderbilt, as the university admits, solely because of this arrest. The Divinity School of V.U. vigorously protested the expulsion, posted Jim's bail, and stated, "We believe that Mr. Lawson has endeavored to follow his Christian conscience, and we see no adequate justification for his expulsion."

Dean Liston Pope of Yale University Divinity School said, "Only the expression of opposition by students and faculty of the school has served to preserve the reputation of this university among its sister institutions."

L. Harold DeWolf of Boston University School of Theology defended the "tradition of freedom within the universities of the world to seek truth and to act on the convictions of truth-seekers." As a result of these typical criticisms from across the country, V.U. has decided to reconsider its action for expulsion.

Continuing the expressions of concern for justice and preservation of the democratic processes the Westminster Fellowship of Cal Poly will nondominationally make available at polling places during the ABB elections today and tomorrow petitions protesting the expulsion and urging prompt reinstatement. Your signature will help promote the progress that other similar petitions have effected to date.
