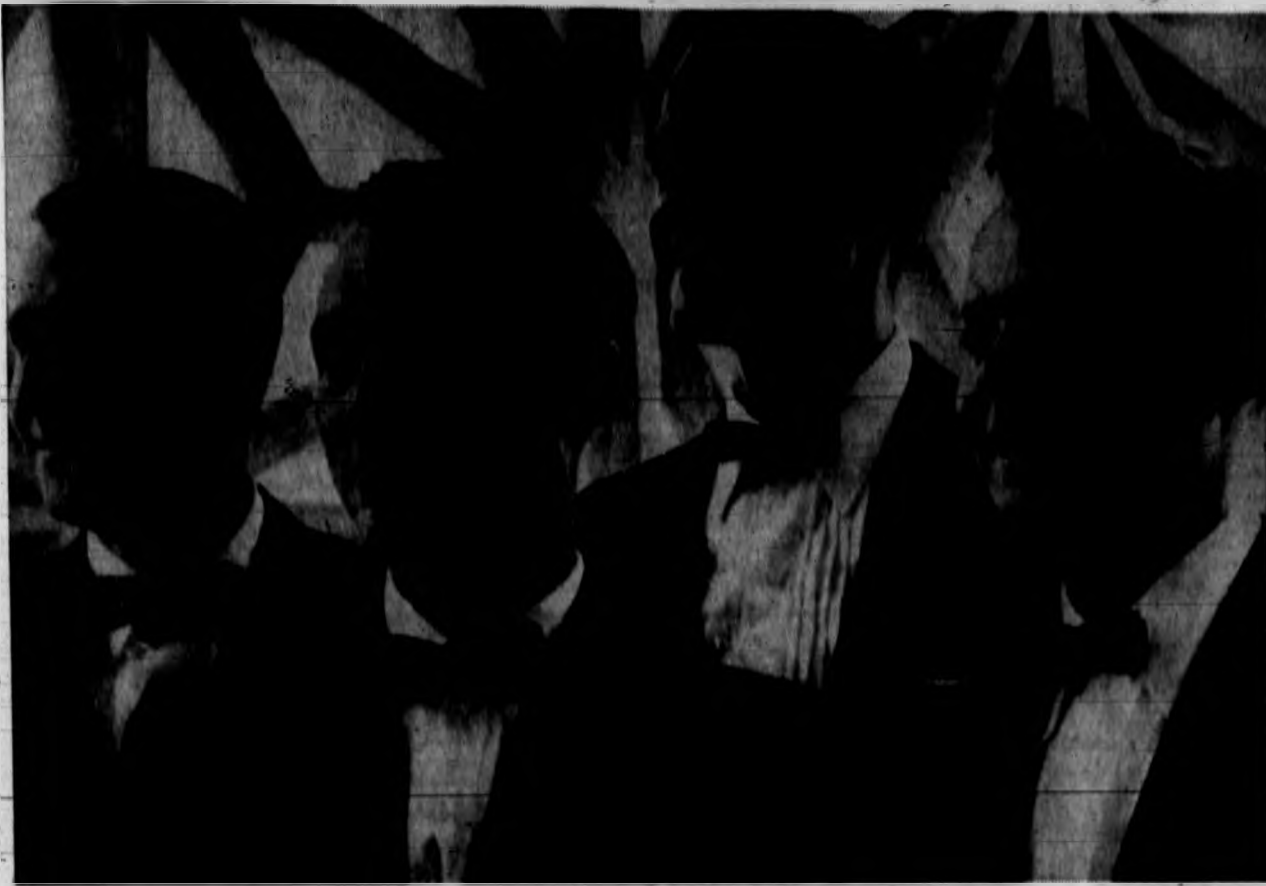

President Advises Against Student Body Fee Increase

The Student Affairs Council voted last week to postpone further action on a proposed Student Activities Building. The postponement was announced following a meeting earlier in the week with President Julian A. McPhee. "One thing that the student body can count on is that they will not be asked to increase their fees unless it is absolutely necessary, and all other methods have failed," said McPhee.

National Lecturer Sets Mathematics Speeches May 9-10

Prof. J. Rutherford Frame, lecturer for the Mathematics Association of America, will speak at Cal Poly May 9 and May 10.

On May 9 at 4 P.M. in So-E-82, he will speak on "The Power Series for Inverse Functions," and at 8 P.M., in Lib. 118 he will speak on "Space Drawings with a Trimeter Ruler."

At 4 P.M. on May 10 in So-E-82, his topic will be "Continued Fractions," and at 8 P.M. he will explain "Professional Opportunities in Mathematics."

Dr. Frame received his doctorate from Harvard and has been head of the Mathematics Department at Michigan State University since 1943. He has held various offices in the Mathematics Association of America. He is also the author of 48 mathematical articles and several textbooks.

Dr. Frame will be available throughout the day for consultation with students and faculty.

He is the first nationally-known lecturer in the mathematical field to speak at Cal Poly. His talks are sponsored by the Cal Poly Chapter of Kappa Mu Epsilon.

The proposed \$5 increase in student body fees has been discussed the past week by SAC. The proposed fee increase would make possible student activity facilities in conjunction with the college bookstore.

President McPhee explained, "It is unwise at this time to consider raising the student body fee for two reasons: First, the committee, appointed by State College Presidents that is investigating various sources of capital to help finance student activity buildings has not completed its study. It is possible that a plan can be developed without assessing students unnecessarily."

"Second, our own planning has not progressed to the point where complete plans and sketches would be available for use in an informational campaign necessary to any fund raising venture."

The President explained "the background of the college bookstore."

"It was started more than 25 years ago to provide essential student supplies and services," he said. "Assets have slowly accumulated over the years to the point where we now have approximately \$300,000 available for construction. We can raise this figure to more than \$400,000 with other funds that can be made available," he continued.

"Many proposals have been made from time to time on ways to spend this money, but it was not made for a bookstore and activities center, and no other use has been or will be approved," he emphasized.

According to McPhee, the new cafeteria, which is now under construction, was planned with the bookstore and activities building in mind.

"If our money is wisely spent, we will someday have an excellent college union complex in one central location," said McPhee. The President explained that an architect is under contract to plan these buildings as one functional area. The bookstore will cost about \$200,000. A roughly finished basement with utilities would cost about \$300,000. To install bowling alleys, pool tables, and ping-pong tables would require additional funds.

Aggies Challenge All in Tug-o-War

A giant tug-of-war will be an added attraction this year at Poly Royal's annual two-day rodeo. The event will be open to all members of the student body and will be staged Friday afternoon in the Bud Collet Arena.

According to Rodeo Club member Bill Nielson, the "aggies" will challenge student spectators in the stands.

Nielson explained that the event is designed to increase "non-aggie" participation in Poly Royal rodeo activities.

"We hope that in the future, all campus organizations will participate," he says.

Rodeo Club members planning the "aggies versus all" tug-of-war are Fred Church, Bill Fuller and Nielson.

Annual SAE Economy Run Set For May 14

The second annual S.A.E. Mobilgas economy run will be held Saturday, May 14, at 8 A.M. at Wall's Mobil Station at French Road and the Highway 101 freeway.

The run will cover 99 miles and take approximately 2 1/4 hours to complete. Cars entering the event will receive free gas.

Eight prizes will be given with classifications in foreign cars, compact cars, and sport cars.

Tom Bragg, Aeronautical Engineering major, has defeated Howard Bryant in the race for Associated Student Body President. The announcement came this week at the meeting of the Student Affairs Council.

George Maybee, Aero junior from Santa Barbara, was elected Vice President and Jim Clark, Electronics sophomore from Visalia, won the position of Secretary.

SAC Acts on Fund Drive, Requests

Besides the clarification of the ASB election results, the Student Affairs Council acted on several other issues.

SAC refused the student chapter of California Association of Physical Education and Recreation permission to hold a "Hole In One Contest."

The contest scheduled for Thursday did not take place due to a failing of CAPHER to present their request to the Donation Drive Committee.

According to ASB Vice President, Bob McCorkle, all donation drive requests must be presented to the committee for approval. They must also go through the Poly Royal Board if the activities are to take place during the month prior to Poly Royal.

The tournament will be postponed until CAPHER goes through the proper procedures.

Two recommendations by the Board of Athletic Control were accepted by SAC. The recommendations were that the first place winner in the PCI boxing and wrestling tournaments may be eligible for NCAA competition. Also, the 115 pound and 191 pound wrestlers who do not participate in dual meets, may take part in PCI events recommended by the coach.

Ris Berndt, Finance Committee Chairman, brought before SAC a request made by the Writer's Forum for \$200 which would be paid back to the student body funds. The request was made for "Poly Syllables." Because Writer's Forum is not a budgetary group on campus, the request was not granted. Sherrill Keller was approved by SAC as the new 1960 El Rodeo Editor.

Gale Enstad, Chairman of the Board of Publications, announced that for the first time in Cal Poly history, a 20 page El Mustang Poly Royal edition will be published.

Local Clubs View Ag Fashion Show

Modern milking tools, tips on stock showmanship, modern rodeo equipment and dress fashions for the rodeo rider will be part of a show designed to spark interest in Cal Poly's 28th annual Poly Royal, April 29 and 30.

The "Agriculture Fashion Show" will highlight meetings of Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions, Exchange and Optimist clubs this month as Poly students demonstrate advances of the American farmer.

Mary Fran Crowe, Agriculture Journalism major, and Bill Brooks, English major will moderate the presentations.

One part of the program will show the contrast between the old three-legged stool method and automatic milking machines.

A Hereford beef animal will be shown to stress points on the care and grooming of show stock.

Dress fashions for the thrill-seeking rodeo riders will be modeled along with modern rodeo gear to be used during Poly Royal's inter-collegiate rodeo.

Sweet Bird of Youth Topic at High Noon

Tennessee Williams' latest play "Sweet Bird of Youth," will be the topic of the Books at High Noon discussion, Tuesday, April 26 in Lib. 118.

Kenneth Holmes of the Architectural Engineering Department, who has acted, directed and designed stage settings for the play, will talk about the problems faced in the presentation of the play.

"Due to a misinterpretation of the code concerning Student Body Officers elections, a re-count of the ballots was necessary," announced Bob McCorkle, ASB Vice President. "When the votes were re-tabulated, it was found that Bragg replaced Bryant for the Presidency."

"The first time the ballots were counted the winner was Howard Bryant, but after checking the code an error was found. This made it necessary to have a re-count of the ballots," said McCorkle.

The Vice President quoted code 82, article 5, section 7 of the Student Activity Guide: "The first choice votes shall be counted first. If no single candidate receives a clear majority of the votes cast, the candidate with the lowest number of votes is eliminated and his second place votes are counted and distributed among the remaining candidates."

"This process of eliminating the candidate with the lowest number of votes and crediting his second choice votes among the remaining candidates shall continue until one candidate receives a clear majority."

Every student who voted, theoretically voted for a second choice. When no majority was reached on the first choice count, the candidate receiving the least number of votes eliminated. The second choice votes on the eliminated candidate's ballot were assigned to the appropriate candidate. This procedure was continued until votes had been counted for all five choices.

"The mistake made, when first counting the ballots, was the distribution of the third-place votes. According to the code, the third choice vote is not to be distributed until all second choices have been distributed, and it is determined that no one candidate has a clear majority of the valid votes cast," said McCorkle.

Tom Bragg's election was carried by considering all of the second choices of the eliminated candidates, at which time he received a majority of valid votes.

"In order for the election to become official, there will be a two week waiting period, during which any candidate may protest, for reasons other than dissatisfaction. Protests must be presented in writing to SAC," said McCorkle.

Tom Bragg said this morning, "I am very happy to have been elected, and hope to show you that your confidence is well placed. I will strive to do what is right and just, and what will meet with the approval of the majority of the students, not just a select few."

Howard Bryant expressed his feelings by saying, "Of course I am very sorry to have lost the position, but I am glad that the error was found and corrected now while it was still possible without affecting student affairs."

Eager Mustangs Meet Warriors Today in Non-League Clash

Mustang Head Baseball Coach Bill Hicks is not normally a superstitious gentleman. In fact, effigy-type lynchings bother him not. (e.g., one hastily contrived dummy found suspended in front of Crandall Gymnasium last Tuesday evening). However, Hicks does hold mystical connotations on the number 13.

It seems the Mustang baseball squad has dropped 12 consecutive games dating back to March 20 when the San Diego Marines took a doubleheader from the Hickamen. The drought has continued, without fail, right up to this afternoon at 2:30, when the locals meet the Westmont Warriors in a single game on the Poly diamond.

Today's contest will feature a heretofore dormant bunch of Mustangs banded together in a unified cause to thwart loss number 13. According to Hicks, "We're through losing ball games in large quantities. As of this afternoon we're going to start a win again."

When asked if the current Mustang drought even approaches any collegiate record for the most consecutive losses, Hicks chuckled, then, with an air of satisfaction, mentioned the most severe case of non-productivity in his (or probably anyone else's), recollection, to wit: "College of Pacific lost 34 consecutive ball games during the 1954-55 season."

Hicks has revamped his starting lineup for today's opener against the Warriors, with Jim Harper, 2B; Wayne Norenson, CF; Rich Simmons, LF; Bob Williams, 1B; Jim Taylor, 3B; Chuck Jordano, RF; Billy Rounaville, SS; and Jerry Johnson, catcher.

The Mustangs will open with Ted Tullner on the mound, with Bud McFadden ready for relief duties.

Though a non-league affair, today's game shouldn't fall into the "easy-pickin'" category, since Westmont, currently sporting an 8-2 record, shut out the UCSB Gauchos 6-0 last week behind Steve Gruwell's two-hitter. Lyman Butterfield and Bill Smrtnik head the list of Warrior batsmen, both are hitting a torrid 491.

The Mustangs resume CCAA league action tomorrow when they travel to Fresno to meet the Bulldogs, who are currently tied with Los Angeles State for the league lead with identical 4-1 records. Jim Newkirk will start for the Mustangs in the single game.

Cal Poly's swimmers hope to successfully defend their California Aggie Relay title tomorrow at 8:30 P.M. in Davis and will meet the College of Pacific at 2 P.M. today in a warm-up meet.

Spikers Run Today In Mt-SAC Relays

Though coach Walt Williamson's Mustang trackmen ran against strong competition in last Saturday's Easter Relays in Santa Barbara, his mile relay team gave local railbirds something to talk about.

Featuring Marshall Kulju, Louis Rodriguez, Dennis Hester and Vic Hall, the Mustang quartet blazed a 8:16.0 mile, chopping one full second off the now "antiquated" school record and establishing a new Easter Relay meet record in the college division mile relay. The Mustangs competed against Pomona, Whittier, University of California at Santa Barbara, Los Angeles State, Claremont-Mudd, Cal Tech and Redlands.

Williamson, who seems to have a knack of making predictions come true, said this week that, "We will break the 8:16.0 mile relay mark at the Mt. San Antonio Relays." Williamson will get a chance to prove his prediction correct this afternoon when the Mustangs compete against Fresno State, San Diego State, Los Angeles State, Redlands, Whittier, Pomona, Claremont-Mudd and Cal Tech.

"Just a bonus prediction, we'll win the college division today," asserted Williamson.

'Mural Track Meet Won by Collegians

Though approximately half of squad was reduced to individual status, the Collegians, a group of musicians - turned - track men, "walked" away with top team honors in last week's Intramural Track Meet.

Dean Carlson, running under the Sierra Dorm banner, stole individual honors, nabbing three gold trophies, winning the 70-yard high hurdles, 120-yard low hurdles, and the pole vault. Carlson accumulated all of Sierra's 15 points, enough to place them second behind the Collegian total of 21 points.

Ed McGrew, farm management major from Imperial Valley, was named Associated Student Body President as a result of elections held Tuesday and Wednesday. McGrew won with 950 votes compared to 570 for his opponent Ric Berndt, Ag. chemistry major from Morro Bay. Other student body offices were won by Bob McCorkle, farm management major from Glenn, vice president, and Skip Munsee, soil science major from Pleasant Hills, secretary. Runners-up were Dick Bartlett, M.E. major from Apple Valley for the veep post, and Luis Bustos, social science major from Angeles, Philippines, secretary.

"I am happy for the confidence the students have bestowed upon me and I would like to thank all those who had enough interest in their student government to vote in this week's elections," McGrew said in an interview following the announcement that he had won.

McGrew said that he does not plan any revolutionary changes in student government or policies. He added that he will deal with problems as they arise. McGrew said he realizes the problem of growing enrollment at Poly without a substantial increase in student body revenues, but feels that all phases of campus life should get fair treatment in their allocations.

McGrew feels that all the divisions of the campus should have fair representation, however, his appointments will be made from among the best qualified men for the job, rather than from sole consideration of division or major.

Concerning the elections, he said that he was sorry that more students did not exercise their right to vote. Almost two-thirds of the student body failed to go to the polls.

McGrew was also sorry that more people did not take the opportunity to meet the candidates at the campaign meeting held last Monday evening. This meeting, he said, was an opportunity for students to voice their criticism of student government and to express their views on current student issues.

Coronation Ball Climaxes Events

"This year's Coronation Ball will be the best ever," says Dean Markum, chairman of, the biggest social event of the season. "With all of the departments in school planning and working harder than ever to put on an outstanding Poly Royal, it's only fitting that we do our best to make the weekend a memorable one," Markum added.

As in previous years, the Ball will be held at the Camp San Luis Obispo Sports Arena, tonight from 9 to 12.

With music by the Collegians, unusual decorations, and the Coronation of the Queen at 10 p.m., the event is destined to be everything Markum says it will.

Tickets may be purchased at the door for \$2 per couple or from members of the Engineering Council, sponsors of the annual event. Attire for the evening will be semi-formal (dark suits for men and formal for women).
