Students pledge \$3 million to sports field complex

The board of directors of ASI has pledged \$3 million toward construction of a \$9 million baseball-softball-multipurpose field complex on campus.

The group voted 13-0, with one abstention, to provide the funds. The student organization will immediately begin seeking a \$3 million line of credit from a local bank, to be paid off over a 15-year period by a \$7-per-quarter increase in the student University Union fee.

"There's clearly a need on this campus for sports fields," said ASI Vice President of Operations Jason Brooks, who coordinated the proposal for the student organization. "It was very favorably received because there's such a large number of students who will benefit."

Cal Poly Athletics Director John McCutcheon was clearly pleased with the student decision.

"This is a very positive step for the project," McCutcheon said. "The facilities will benefit not only the students and intercollegiate athletics but the local community as well."

The pledge puts the university almost half way toward what's needed to build the project.

Cal Poly alumnus and St. Louis Cardinals shortstop Ozzie Smith has pledged \$1 million for the facility, which will include a baseball stadium named for him. The university hopes to raise another \$2 million from private donors and the remaining \$3 million from other sources.

The site is a 40-acre area on the north side of Cal Poly's central campus, between Via Carta and the railroad tracks.

The multipurpose facility the students will help fund is planned as a community athletic complex to be

used jointly by campus and community groups. It will include seven multipurpose sports fields and the baseball-softball facility.

The \$9 million project is part of a larger capital campaign to improve athletic facilities on campus.

Risser, Mitchell take on new duties June 1

Effective June 1, Joe Risser, now director of public safety services, will assume the new position of risk manager, and University Police Chief Tom Mitchell will head Public Safety Services.

Risser will be responsible for protecting the university, faculty members, staff members, and students from accidents. He will also serve as the campus information security officer, administer the university liability and property insurance program, supervise the campus environmental health and safety program, and supervise emergency management planning.

Mitchell's title will continue to be university police chief. He will head the two areas that will now constitute Public Safety Services: University Police Services and Parking and Commuter Services.

Risser's office will be in Adm. 116. The offices of other environmental safety and emergency planning staff members will continue to be in the Public Safety Administrative Offices building.

Risser and Mitchell will report to Vicki Stover, associate vice president for administration and finance.
