

Search begins for vice provost for planning

Recruitment has begun for vice provost for institutional planning, the position in which Linda Dalton is serving on an interim basis.

The vice provost for institutional planning will be responsible for coordinating universitywide strategic planning, engaging all divisions of the university in planning issues and efforts, and providing analysis for all elements of the strategic plan and related projects, including the Cal Poly Plan.

Provost Paul Zingg hopes to have the position filled by the end of winter quarter.

Finalists for the position of vice provost for information technology will likely be invited to campus by the end of fall quarter. David Walch is serving as interim vice provost for information technology and is chair of the consultative committee for that recruitment.

Glenn Irvin's title has been changed to vice provost and associate vice president for academic affairs to reflect his universitywide assignments, including those associated with the Performing Arts Center, and his responsibilities in academic affairs.

The three vice provosts will report to Zingg.

Funds available for faculty development

Strickmeier joins Cal Poly Plan committee

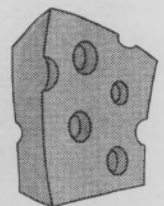
Mathematics professor Bernard Strickmeier has joined the Cal Poly Plan Steering Committee as Labor Council representative.

Dairy center helps make fat substitute



The Dairy Products Technology Center has helped an industry partner produce an ingredient that can be used to make fat-free baked goods, desserts, sauces, salad dressings, and other foods.

San Francisco-based yogurtesse inc. funded the research that contributed to the development of the new dairy-based fat substitute.

The product, named yogurtesse, has one-tenth the calories of ordinary fat, contains no fat or cholesterol, and functions well in place of fat.

Yogurtesse and Mid-America Dairymen Inc. are marketing the product to large food companies. Foods containing the ingredient could be on supermarket shelves within the year.

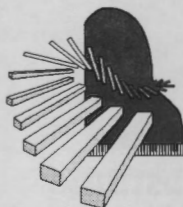
Atchity's book, "A Writer's Time: A Guide to the Creative Process," has been hailed by The New York Times as "the best recent book on writing."
