Cal Poly's rodeo team got a glimpse at another national championship with their recent win at a regional show in Reno, Nev.

The team scored a total of 686 points over second place Arizona State's 421. There were six college teams competing.

Jack Sparrow won the all-around cowboy title with a first in bareback riding, second in first go-round bulldogging and fourth in both bull riding and the bulldogging average.

Ray Hunnell took first in second go-round saddle bronc riding, second in the average, and third in bull riding.

Marvin Smith won the saddle bronc average and was second in both go-rounds of this event.

New members starting at Reno were Rich Curtis, first in first go-round, ribbon roping, second in the average, second in second go-round calf roping and third in the average; Rocky Reagan, first in second go-round bulldogging, second

Under the black thin headlines of "No Raid Pact Dishonored," comes the following editorial: A no-raid agreement between Fresno State College and California Polytechnic Institute at San Luis Obispo was dishonored during its first year of practice.

Saturday night following the SAC-Cal Poly football game pranksters desecrated the newly built memorial to the war dead on the corner of the FSC campus at Cedar and Shaw Ave.

College authorities valued the damage at \$50, but the insult to a veteran's memorial far outweighs a mere few dollars.

The excess of paint on the "green I" has been removed by the FSC ground keepers, but the smear of green cannot be removed unless the memorial is sandblasted.

The Alumni Association, builders of the memorial, were planning to hold dedication ceremonies around the first of 1961. But until the memorial is repaired the ceremonies will have to be postponed.

Despite the fact that the no-raid agreement was dishonored, vandals desecrating a memorial removes any hint of fun from a typical college prank.

Animosity for the attack would not have been so severe if the square in front of the library or the old water tower on the campus had been painted. The pranksters should realize that a memorial to the war dead should not be used for any prank. Stop, look, and read might be a warning to such vandals. The plaque on the memorial clearly states that it is a memorial to the war dead.

It is time for college students to take an adult view of fun and pranks. They should consider the object of their abuse and decide if the joy they get from pulling such a prank is stronger than the insult and hard feelings which it can cause.

Forms may be picked up in the ASB office.

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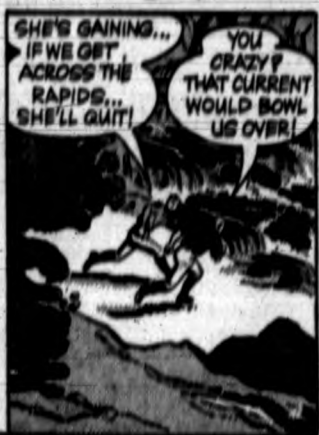


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WOFFORD IN DISTANCE WIN

Mustang Kickers Drop First Match To San Jose State

In their first appearance, the Mustang soccer team was defeated 3 to 0 by San Jose State last week before 100 fans.

The Mustangs started the attack and center-forward Ravil Sharafetdin's shot at the goal early in the game missed by inches. In the first 15 minutes, play was dominated by the Mustangs, with raids on the Spartan goal foiled by excellent goal tending by Huntse.

Twenty-four minutes into the game, center-half Bahador of Cal Poly handled the ball in the penalty area and the Spartans scored the penalty kick for the game's first tally.

Late in the first half Stroud of San Jose made it 2 to 0 with a goal off his head from a corner kick. The Spartans dominated play until halftime.

After the half, The Mustangs came to life and once again began the attack. The Polyites scored when right-half Fred Chavez passed the ball to outside right Bill Brown who crossed to center Sharafetdin who kicked the goal.

The Mustang eleven continued the attack as they tried to tie the score, but the visitors put on a brilliant defensive show to halt the drive.

In the 68th minute, a breakaway by the Spartans resulted in center-forward Kobayashi putting the visitors further ahead.

Late in the game, the Mustangs came to life and inside-left Federico Girbal scored to make the tally 3-2. From this point on, play was dominated by the Mustang forward line. Backing from the Poly defenders helped the forwards to pressure the Spartan defense. But time ran out.

Forty-Niners Strike It Rich; Dump Mustang Eleven, 36-12

A spiritless Mustang grid machine sputtered in Long Beach Saturday night and Long Beach State took its first win in history from a Cal Poly eleven. Final score 36-12. Things started to miss right at the first for the Mustangs as the Long Beach 49ers scored a safety in the first quarter.

When quarterback Ted Tollner was caught behind his own goal when a play went awry.

Shortly after the Mustangs' free kick, the 49ers hit pay dirt on a pass from quarterback Bob Stangel to Dallas Moon, good for 57 yards. Tom Turrill kicked the extra point.

The 49ers were to still strike again. A Stangel-Moon pass set up another touchdown. Steve Hartman picked up the tally on a plunge from the three yard line. Turrill's toe found the mark again.

Then the Mustangs seemed to find themselves for the only time during the night. Cal Poly marched 71 yards with halfback Hodger Kelly and fullback Carl Bowser carrying most of the load. Bowser went over from the one-foot line. The point after touchdown run failed.

It looked as if Coach Roy Hughes charges would get back in the ball game when Curt Hill in the second quarter intercepted a Long Beach pass on the Mustang 41 and returned it to the 47. Tollner hit Kelly on a pass play that put the ball on the Long Beach 28. Fullback Ray Porras hit the line twice for 6 yards. A penalty put the ball back on the 31. Tollner found Gary Van Horn open—the play good for 10 yards.

Bowser ran for 9 and Tollner passed to end Fred Brown to the 5 and a first down. Kelly went around right end for the score. PAT try failed.

This made the score 16-12, and Mustang alumni and followers attending the game thought the green machine had tuned up, but Long Beach came back to move 59 yards in eight plays to score.

From then on the 49ers controlled the game and scored twice more over the hapless locals.

The Cal Poly passing game

failed to hit at important times. Hill caught but three passes for 48 yards. Tollner attempted 19 passes and completed 10 for 118 yards.

Game statistics showed the first gained were close—526 for the Mustangs and 584 for Long Beach. The Mustangs fly to Bowling Green this week to face one of the top small college teams in the nation, Bowling Green University, Saturday.

This is the society which has been shoved down our throats so far, that it's like the man says, "everything I like is either immoral, illegal, or fattening."

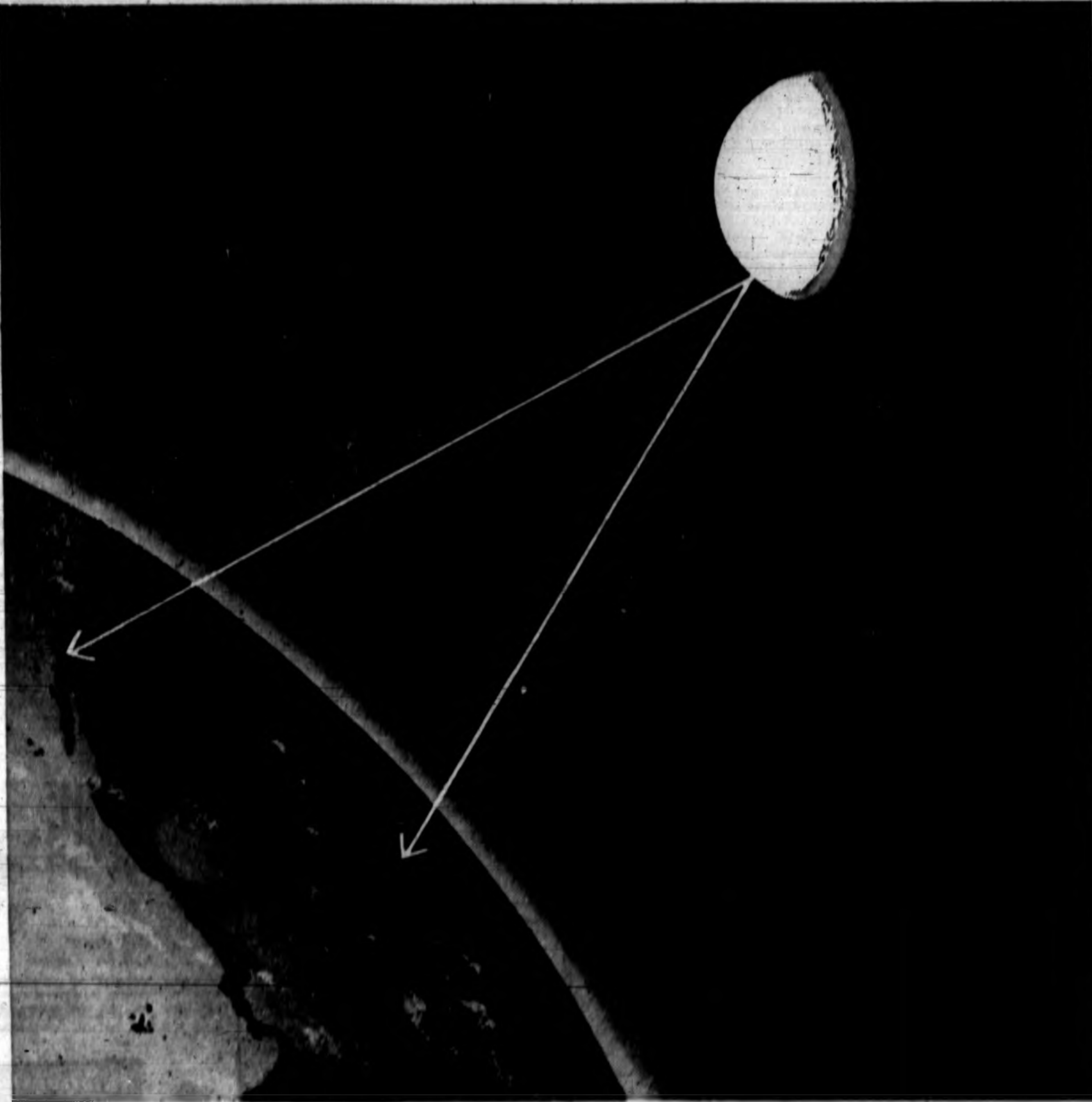
Then the question comes up, "are we conservatives?" What choice do we have?
