

Cal Poly receives grant to hire 2 more officers

Cal Poly police are becoming more visible on campus, thanks to a \$150,000 federal community-policing grant that helps fund the salaries of two new full-time officers for three years.

The Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) grant will allow campus safety officers to create closer working relationships with students and faculty and staff members. It will bring the total number of patrol officers to 14.

Tom Mitchell, chief of university police, said he plans to establish several new, high-visibility programs and services, including a police substation in the residence halls and increased foot and bike patrols.

The substation will be staffed by both university police and Cal Poly students serving as community service officers.

The substation will provide a con-

venient place for students and staff members to get their bikes licensed, fill out crime reports, and take care of other matters.

Other programs designed for students, especially those who live on campus, will also be instituted. They include workshops on personal safety, substance-abuse awareness, and general citizenship, with a focus on individuals' rights and responsibilities.

One new officer is already on the job. Lori Hashim was hired in July. A second officer is expected to join the staff by January.

The COPS program was developed by the U.S. Department of Justice under the Public Safety Partnership and Community Policing Act of 1994. The act was designed to increase the number of officers patrolling neighborhoods on foot or bicycle.

Faculty members needed for new service program

Study Service Connections, a new community service program funded by the Cal Poly Plan, needs faculty members interested in exploring how community service can enhance student learning.

By the end of spring quarter 1997, at least 140 Cal Poly students will participate in seven demonstration classes that will include a community service component designed to strengthen understanding of course content.

One class is under way, four more are planned for winter quarter, and two more are to be held in the spring.

The Study Service Connections staff will help participating teachers find appropriate placements for their students. Trained student assistants

will help other students connect with agency staff members, will monitor student progress and satisfaction, will facilitate discussion groups outside of class, and will coordinate the evaluations of students and agencies.

One program goal is for professors to develop the service component in no more than eight hours.

The fee for renting videos and films from outside sources will be charged to an individual's department. For more information, call Henry France at ext. 7198.

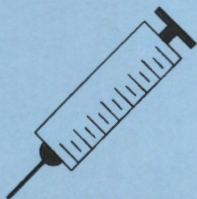
Faculty members should still make requests for media distribution to classrooms through UMS by noon at least one day before needed.
