Fund Drive Progresses; Several Benefits Set

The Student Memorial Fund established to aid dependents of the Cal Poly football players who were victims of the ill-fated plane crash in Ohio on Oct. 29 has received donations from many individuals, families and organizations.

Donald Nelson, college business manager and treasurer of

the Student Memorial Fund Committee, indicated that contributions to date are impressive from the standpoint of numbers of donors but the dollar total is not large. However, he indicated, the biggest contributions to the fund are still to come with several commitments made.

Proceeds from the Bowling Green State University-Southern Illinois football game last Saturday are expected to be made to the fund by the Bowling Green student body and the college. Collections have been made at several other games, including two at Cal Poly's Pomona campus, some high school contests and possibly some college games not yet confirmed.

The Cal Poly staff at Pomona contributed \$1,000 almost immediately to the fund to get it started and other collections and contributions from that campus are expected, according to C. O. McCorkle, dean of the college at Kellogg-Voorhis.

Student Wives Club held a rummage sale in downtown San Luis Obispo on Nov. 10-11 and plan to donate to the fund. The Cal Poly Women's Club has made a donation as has the Cal Poly Staff Club. The latter group is planning a family "Scram-o-rama" of recreation and athletics in the new Gym on Sunday, Nov. 30 to raise further funds.

Individual contributions include sums ranging from 50 cents to several hundred dollars. Nelson has received donations with accompanying letters written by school and some pre-school children. Businessmen, the San Luis Obispo Mustang Boosters, alumni, and many people not affiliated with the college have been prompt and generous with donations, Nelson said.

One anonymous sender mailed a \$100 cashier's check and wrote the fund that two more would be mailed later.

Six Team Members Stay in Hospital

Roy Scialabba and Bill Dauphin, two Cal Poly football team members injured in the plane crash on Oct. 29, were released from the Toledo hospital and have returned home.

According to Dean Everett Chandler, both men are resting at their respective homes in Bakersfield and San Bernardino.

Chandler gave the following report on the remainder of the players still in the Toledo hospital:

Gil Stork has been discharged as a patient but is waiting at the hospital for another member of the team for return to California. The players are required to travel in pairs, Chandler said.

Roger Kelly will be placed in a back cast and may return to his home in Bakersfield later this week.

Don Adams is in good condition except for a scalp infection.

Walt Shimek and Billy Ross are scheduled to remain in the Toledo hospital for many weeks and are still listed in serious condition.

Al Maranal's condition is listed as fair.

Russ Woods is in fair condition. According to Dean Chandler, Woods suffered a head injury.

Telegram-Tribune Sports Editor John Nettleship is improving steadily.

Dean Chandler complimented the staff of the Toledo hospital. He said that the players have all been under excellent care in this new 450-bed modern structure.

Special Class Is Aid To Campus Foreign Students

A unique program to help foreign students overcome the language barrier is now in progress on campus. Every day from 8 to 5 p.m. in Ag & ES 215, two college English instructors and two adult volunteers from the community help foreign students solve their language problems by the use of informal discussion periods.

Cal Poly students also help by conversing to the foreign students, correcting their grammar, and clearing up any misconceptions they may have about our country. The program also helps foreign students to adjust socially to the strange customs and new situations they find here.

Problems arise because the students think in their native language and then have to translate their thoughts into English before they speak.

"The students know English, but have trouble using it," said Dr. Robert Yeaton, who initiated a similar program at Pasadena City College in 1959.

Students from many South American countries have participated in the program, as well as some from Kenya, Jordan, Viet Nam, Cambodia, France and Hong Kong.

"The program has been very successful so far, as many as 30 students coming in at a time," commented Dr. Yeaton. It is hoped that more students will participate in this program to acquaint foreign students with our language and customs.

The trio will enter six Berkshires, three Poland Chinas, three cross-bred and two carcass fat swine.

Gary Ferguson is planning to exhibit three Southdown market lambs, Jim West, one Southdown and three cross-bred lambs; Gary Petterson, three cross-bred lambs; Bill Fournier, three cross-bred and Charl-Dene Almond and Gerald Hunt one carcass class lamb.

In the market beef division, entries are by Bill Barlow, Art Linton, Jon Hillen, and Dennis Price, each with one Hereford steer.

Individual Angus steers will be shown by Charles Bruce, Ron Cole and Bob Cooper. Carol Ramsey, Marilyn Snavley, Bill Barlow and Harry Masterson and Bonnie Saunders will exhibit Shorthorn steers.

A carload of Angus steers will be shown by Robert Sanders and Dewayne Holmdahl. Duane Offield will show a carload of Angus steers and one Hereford cross-bred carcass steer; Norm Fowler, one

carload, 15 head of Angus steers.

In competition with 10 western teams at Ogden Utah recently the livestock judging team placed fourth with 2979 total points. Fresno State was first, Colorado State University, second and University of Arizona at Tucson, third.

Lewis Clement was high individual in swine judging and the team placed second in the class at the Golden Spike Meeting.

Gary Taylor placed 16th in all products at the 26th Collegiate Students' International Contest in judging dairy products held recently in Chicago, Ill.

The nationwide event saw 25 colleges and university teams competing for prizes and scholarships.

Bob Taylor placed fifth in cheese judging; the team took 10th place in ice cream judging and stood 17th in over all competition.

Highlight of the trip, reported Howard Eastham, coach of the team was the banquet the night after judging. Red Grange, football star, was emcee for the program.

More than 500 team members, coaches and guests attended. Members of the dairy products judging team are Gary Renger, Gary Taylor and Robert Taylor.

Boxing Tournament Heads For Dive; Boxers Are Needed

"Imagine! A boxing tournament without any boxers!" came Bob Bruner's cry last week when queried as to the progress of the forthcoming novice boxing tourney to be held in the Men's Physical Education Gymnasium. Bruner, listed in fistic annals as novice boxing tournament director, added: "Maybe everyone's just plane chicken this year."

Bruner's plight was validated when it was discovered that only ten aspiring pugilists have inked contracts for the current tourney which last year drew a total of 75 participants.

Bruner emphasizes that trophies will be awarded to each of the champions and runner-ups in the eight weight classifications.

Bulldogs vs. Bullpups Friday In Memorial Fund Contest

Collegiate football returns to Mustang Stadium next Friday night when the undefeated Hancock Junior College of Santa Maria football squad meets the Fresno State College junior varsity in a contest with all proceeds earmarked for the Cal Poly Memorial Fund.

Through the joint efforts of the local Telegram Tribune newspaper, the game has become a reality. Both squads will donate their services Friday night in an effort to increase a fund to assist the families of the Cal Poly Mustang football players killed in the ill-fated air crash in Toledo, Ohio on Saturday, Oct. 29. Donations for the memorial game will be \$1 per student and \$5, general admission. There will be no reserved seats for the game.

Cal Poly football fans might take special interest in the success of the Hancock Junior College Bulldogs, since two former Mustang gridgers, John Madden and Dick Maninni, serve as assistant coaches under head mentor, Al Baldeck. The Bulldogs, prior to press time, were undefeated in seven straight contests, rolling over College of the Pacific frosh, and Needley, Taft, Colings, Occidental, Santa Barbara and Porterville junior colleges.

Hancock rolled up 246 points to their opponents 77 in their first six games this season.

The Bullpups from Fresno are currently sporting a two-win, three-loss record, including a 44-0 whitewashing at the hands of Tom Lee's Cal Poly freshman Colt squad earlier this season. While the Bullpups knocked over Taft J.C. 14-6, Hancock trampled Taft 42-16. (The Colts managed to tie Taft in a 6-6 deadlock in their opener.)

Hancock will feature the running of halfback Vince Antonio, a speedster from Arroyo Grande, who prior to the Needley game two weeks ago, had chalked up 11 touchdowns and eight running conversions for a total of 82 points. Bulldog quarterback Milo Lissolo, from Santa Maria, completed 19 of 30 passes in Hancock's first six games.

Halftime entertainment will be supplied by the Cal Poly Mustang marching band, featuring a musical salute to Rogers and Hammerstein.

Novice Matmen Still Seek Tourney Talent

With the 1960 novice wrestling tournament just one week away, tourney chairman Jim Root registered mild alarm early this week as he scanned a somewhat skimpy list of participants. According to Root, approximately 30 persons have signed up for the wrestling tourney to be held Nov. 21-22 in the Men's Physical Education Gymnasium.

With ten weight classifications offered (115, 125, 135, 145, 155, 165, 175, 185 and heavy-weight), sign-ups are still being accepted in the gymnasium lobby. Eligibility requirements prove somewhat simple: Anyone is eligible to compete with the exception of previous tourney winners and intercollegiate wrestling lettermen.
